Structure, Governance and Management

Governing document

Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Lincolnshire North East Branch is a registered charity with the Charity Commission. The charity is governed by the RSPCA Branch Rules effective 18 February 2009.

Trustee induction and training

When considering appointing new trustees, the Board has regard to the requirement for any specialist skills needed in order to support the charities work.

Trustees are offered any specific training they feel is necessary to perform their role.

Public Benefit

The trustees' have had due regard to guidance published by the Charities Commission (CC) on public benefit. They believe the below objectives and activities, along with the year's performance, clearly show how the charity brings benefit to the public.

Trustees' responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England & Wales requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP 2015 (FRS 102);
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the trust deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Objectives and activities

The objects of the branch are:

• To promote the work of the RSPCA, i.e. to promote kindness and suppress cruelty.

The activities performed to fulfil these objectives are:

- · To help people in need with their animals
- To help inspectors by taking in free of charge, mistreated, abandoned animals and;
- To provide neutering for the animals of people on low income and benefits.

TRUSTEES' REPORT OF R.S.P.C.A. LINCOLNSHIRE NORTH EAST BRANCH (CONT'D) YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2017

Achievements and Performance

This year has seen a surplus of £12,598 compared to 2016 which incurred a deficit of £6,534. The surplus has been generated due to the loan of £15,000 not having to be repaid.

The charity has again supported local animals in North East Lincolnshire, and also continues to help the public in respect of neutering, especially with our neutering scheme. The current reserves will allow the charity to continue this for future years.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our committee members for their help during the year and the kind support shown by the public.

Financial Review

The charity has made a surplus this year of £12,598, and the reserves remain healthy at £43,104.

Reserves Policy

The RSPCA national charity has a policy to assist any branch who has insufficient funds to continue. However, the branch aims to hold enough reserves to cover 3 month's expenditure. This is currently being maintained.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General Information

This charity is an unincorporated entity.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historic cost convention. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011, and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS102.

The financial statements are presented in sterling and rounded to the nearest pound.

Going Concern

The trustees expect the organisation to remain a going concern for the forthcoming year and consider it appropriate to prepare the accounts on a going concern basis.

Definition of Funds

Unrestricted general funds are those available for general use by the Charity, without restriction.

Incoming Resources

Incoming resources are accounted for when the charity has entitlement, it is probable the income will be received and the income can be reliably measured.

Expenditure

All expenditure has been classified under operational headings which reflect the activities of the Charity, and has been accounted for on an accruals basis and is included net of VAT.

Costs of generating funds include both fundraising and trading activities.

Charitable activities include expenditure associated with the various activities of the Charity: The costs include both the direct costs and support costs relating activities carried out.

Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

The Trustees present their report for the year ending 31st December 2017

The objectives of the RSPCA Lincolnshire North East Branch are to promote the work and objectives of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals [the Society] in the Branch area, namely to use all lawful means to prevent cruelty, and promote kindness and alleviate suffering of animals.

The Branch is governed by a committee who are Trustees of the Branch, they have individual and collective responsibilities for the management of the Branch and its funds, subject to the overall supervision of the Society, the committee controls and monitors the fundraising and animal welfare initiatives of the Branch.

The charities Act 2006 highlights that all charities must have charitable purposes or aims that are for the public benefit. This is known as the public benefit requirement. All charities must demonstrate their aims are for the public benefit.



Objects and public benefit statement

- 1. The RSPCA Lincolnshire North East Branch is an unincorporated charitable association and a separately registered branch of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (the Society), carrying out its direct animal welfare work in the areas of North East Lincolnshire and East Lindsey.
- 2. The objects of the Branch are to promote the work and objects of the Society to promote kindness and to prevent or suppress cruelty to animals by all lawful means with particular reference to the area of the Branch, in accordance with the policies of the Society.
- 3. The trustees have reviewed the outcomes and achievements of our objectives and activities for the year, to ensure they remain focused on our charitable aims, and continue to deliver benefits to the public. We have complied with the duty under the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Commission.

Advancement of animal welfare

- 4. Under the Charities Act 2006, the advancement of animal welfare is recognised as a distinct statutory charitable purpose. This legislation and the Animal Welfare Act of the same year indicate an acceptance by society that treating living creatures with compassion has a moral benefit for the public as a whole. Whilst this public benefit is clear, it is sometimes difficult to quantify and must be balanced against any detriment.
- 5. The Branch's animal welfare work, although local in nature, benefits society at large, and also aims to help people in need with the care of their animals. The next section of this report highlights the Branch's main activities and demonstrates the benefit provided to the public (in italics). All our charitable activities, as described in more detail in the following pages of this report, focus on promoting kindness and preventing or suppressing cruelty to animals and are undertaken to further these purposes for the public benefit.

Charitable activities pursued for the public benefit

- 6. We support our local Inspector[s] by taking in, free of charge, mistreated or abandoned animals, including pets whose owners suffer ill health or financial difficulties or pass away. The Society's Inspectorate (as well as providing education, information and advice) rescues animals in distress and enforces laws against the cruel mistreatment of animals in England and Wales by bringing prosecutions. This work is key to 'the prevention or suppression of cruelty' part of the RSPCA objects, and promotes humane sentiments towards animals which involves moral benefit to humankind as a whole.
- 7. We provide subsidised veterinary treatment for animals which are sick or injured and belong to local people on low incomes. We do this through [a voucher scheme]. This work benefits those on means tested benefits by giving them financial help to obtain care for companion animals in need of veterinary treatment.

- 8. We provide subsidised neutering and microchipping of companion animals for those in the Branch area on low incomes. We do this by [a voucher scheme]. This work helps to control dog/cat populations through neutering and benefits those on means tested benefits by giving them financial help to neuter and microchip companion animals, thereby promoting responsible pet ownership.
- 9. Animals in our care receive veterinary treatment, vaccination, neutering, microchipping and are assessed for rehoming. This work helps to control the incidence and spread of disease and suffering through vaccination and neutering.
- 10. We rehome animals in need at low cost to people willing and able to have a companion animal. Whilst we recognise that companion animals provide measurable benefits to people's physical and mental health, we consider the provision of pets as subsidiary to the main charitable of aim of this service, which is to reduce animal suffering. Our policy to charge a reasonable adoption fee for animals aims to highlight the ongoing personal and financial commitment of pet ownership. It would not be in the best interests of animals, and therefore would fall outside our objects, to rehome to those who could not afford them.
- 11. We take in, free of charge, lost animals and take steps to reunite them with owners. This work benefits our local community (including local authorities) by preventing animals straying and posing a risk to themselves and to people through road traffic accidents.
- 12. We respond to enquiries (both direct and via the Society's national call centre) from the public about animals locally. The public benefits from knowing that we can intervene to assist animals in need.
- 13. We offer free animal care advice by distributing information and guidance in the form of leaflets at public events and for members of the public visiting our advice centre/shop. The public benefits through the promotion of responsible pet ownership.
- 14. Within the terms of our governing document, we support the National Society and other RSPCA branches through the networking of animals to re-home and by carrying out home visits on behalf of other branches and by collaborating at events and meetings such as the Lincolnshire Animal Welfare Group.
- 15. We provide volunteering opportunities for those who wish to support our work, including [trusteeship, fostering and fundraising]. This benefits local people and companies by providing the possibility of doing work which is compassionate and rewarding.

TRUSTEES REPORT

The Trustees are pleased to give their report for 2017

It is with great sadness that in 2017 we lost one of our trustees Mr. Allan Holmes had been a trustee of the branch for over 15yrs he will be sadly missed by us all.

2017 has been another challenging year for the branch once again raising funds for the branch has been the main concern and we will have to think up ways to try and increase funds

The shop is still our main source of income but during 2017 we did not see the same amount of day trippers and holidaymakers as in previous years and this does boost our income, we don't know if it was because of the economy or just the weather was not as good we will have to see what happens next year.


The shop is still used for all the committee meetings and our AGM this is a big saving for the branch, although it is difficult to find a venue for the AGM that will suit all the members because of the size of the branch we do try our best to please everyone.

The branch as continued running the subsidized neutering scheme for dogs this is with the help of the regional board who granted us £1,000 towards it, we have also been giving out vouchers for neutering cats, we still offer microchipping at the same time as the neutering, but now because of the change in the law that says all dogs must be microchipped we are not being asked to do as many. We have continued to help people to get veterinary treatment for their animals when asked for help, this is usually arranging a consultation at a vets to get the Animal seen.

The branch also answers the phone for seven days a week to the public, helping when we can, and giving the national helpline number out for sick and injured Animals, and cause for concern about animals.

Our dogs and cats are being rehomed at the RSPCA branch animal home in Chesterfield they are doing a great job of rehoming our cats and dogs much quicker then we could if we used private boarding kennels the other problem we have is there are no boarding kennels in our branch area that we could use and the nearest one is about 30 miles away, so the option of an rspca animal home being able to home them quicker for us means we are able to take more animals in from the Inspectorate, we still pay for all the veterinary treatment before they are moved on for rehoming and we are still pay the boarding until they are rehomed we would like to thank Chesterfield very much for all their help.

All the animals we take in are from the Inspectorate and the Animal Collection Officers, have to be treated at the vets and recovered before they can be rehomed, one sad incident was a little cat that had had both its ears cut off with a pair scissors Inspector Dan Bradshaw dealt with it and got it to the vets, it then had further treatment later, but it was still upsetting to see the poor little thing in that state, not knowing what it had suffered, on an happier note she did recover and was found a loving home.



Chesterfield branch and Woodside animal home have been giving us pet food this as saved us a lot of money, we have also been getting vouchers from pets at home and have used them to buy the cat litter.

Allan attended the RSPCA Animal Welfare Conference this was a two day event held in Staffordshire it is becoming very popular and more than 300 people from branches and staff were there.

DOOR TO DOOR FUND RAISING FOR 2017

The Door to Door money we received from HQ was once again up on the previous year and the branch received £24,661 this is a boost to our finances helps the branch at the beginning of the year when funds are low.





We would like to thank Jan Merrikin she is still working hard for the branch and helping the inspectorate and aco with wildlife, she is also still our main person to call if anything needs bottle feeding.

We would also like to thank Chris and Brian Cliffe for their help Brian still comes every week to the shop loads up his car and takes all the rubbish to the tip for us we don't know what we would do without him thank you. Sheila Middleton is still our auxiliary in Sutton-On –Sea although we do not see her very often had a conversation on the phone she was well and still running her dog training classes.

The branch will still work hard to help the Inspectors with animals that need to come in although vets bills are getting higher and fundraising is getting harder, we will always prioritize the animals that the Inspectors pick up as they are the ones that are most in need.
