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#### Chairman's Report for the Year Ended 31 March 2018

Undoubtedly the major event of the second year of my chairmanship has been Bury St Edmunds winning the Anglia in Bloom competition under the guidance of Melanie Lesser, Robin Burnett and the Committee of Bury in Bloom. We look forward to further successes in the national contest.

As in past years, the town was 'blooming beautiful' with many hanging baskets, window boxes and colourful roundabouts. All of these contributed to the Anglia in Bloom judges view that Bury St Edmunds' victory was well deserved. The glorious Abbey Gardens was also recognised with a Gold Award in the large Parks category.

Once again, the contribution of so many people involved in the Certificates of Merit garden judging scheme, so well organised by Elizabeth Clement, materially helped. The Society is blessed with a very dedicated team of volunteers who not only participate in this initiative but also in the many other events that Bury in Bloom are associated with across the town.

Equally, the Bury Society is very fortunate to have dedicated executive and events committees which have seen membership reach an all-time high of almost 640 members. Sue Savage our amazing membership secretary and Stephen Moody, our events co-ordinator have been at the helm as ever organising coffee mornings and other events with Stephen's culinary delights being much appreciated.

A well-attended excursion to Stamford took place in July and, locally, a trip around the Great Churchyard and a visit to Moyses Hall took place thanks to the generosity of Dr Pat Murrell and Alex McWhirter respectively. Our excursions always seem to be very popular! The annual lunch in February 2018 took place at the Cathedral's Edmund Room preceded by a very interesting talk on Bury Fair by Victoria Savoulidis of the Suffolk Record Office. Tasty food was provided by the Pilgrims' Kitchen.

In 2017, we reviewed the application of the Society's Reserves Policy and, because of this, the Bury Society and Bury in Bloom gave a substantial grant of £20,000 to the very worth-while Guildhall Project. In addition, £500 was provided to Moyses Hall Museum to purchase a jewelled aestal - the end of a book pointer. Further grants have been made to West Suffolk College, Bury Water Meadows Group and to local schools to send staff on educational courses.

The Society remains committed to supporting our heritage and in 2018 the restoration of the Ouida Memorial will take place thanks to generous grants from the Town Council and Councillors Chung and Rout.

As for monitoring planning applications, Roderick Rees our Planning Officer, has been dutiful in what he will readily admit has been a quiet year. The Bury Society is committed to keeping a watchful eye on the various proposals that can affect the undoubted uniqueness of our town; good design and affordable housing being at the forefront of course. We are being listened to these days by St Edmundsbury Borough Council on planning matters and, whilst obviously we will not always be successful in our lobbying, it is good for the Council to know that we are there as a sounding board.

The Society's grateful thanks must go to Richard Summers for the unstinting work that he has carried out on its behalf. Firstly, with yet another well organised Town Centre Master Plan meeting and secondly as co-ordinator of the Abbey of St Edmund Heritage Partnership which has recently announced that the consultancy and conservation interpretation is proceeding successfully. A well-attended Heritage Workshop Day also organised by Richard took place earlier this year. Unfortunately, my own intended 15 minutes of TV fame discussing the whereabouts of St Edmund were reduced to 15 seconds!

The Society is set to change its current constitution and to convert into a Charitable Incorporated Organisation [CIO] and a resolution to this effect will be put forward to the members of the Bury Society at the AGM to be held on 24 May 2018. The Trustees of the Society are recommending this change in governance which will enable the Society to be fit-for-purpose in the future.

In connection with this, mention must be made of our secretary Tim Page and treasurer Doug Beardon. Their work in past months in revising the Bury Society constitution and governance procedures to ensure compliance with charity rules and regulations has been phenomenal and deserves the Society's appreciation.

## Chairman's Report for the Year Ended 31 March 2018

As a charity, we cannot operate without the generosity of others and I would like to thank St Edmundsbury Borough Council, Bury St Edmunds Town Council and many County, Borough and Town Councillors who have supported us with funds and their time during the year. I would also like to thank our commercial and private sponsors for their support of the roundabout and hanging basket sponsorship schemes.

Project expenditure during the year included work on St Olave's footpath, a Textile Arts project, the willow workshop, the renovation of the Parkway pedestrian underpass, providing sensory planters for the Gatehouse Charity, the Crafty Creatures project, the provision and refurbishment of planters in the St Andrew's Street South and cathedral precincts, and the highly popular Young, Busy and Senior Green Fingers events. We were also pleased to work with John Williams on his wooden carvings project in the Abbey Gardens.

# Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2018

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### **Description of Restricted Funds**

The Dr Rae Bequest fund represents the bequest of the late Dr Alison Rae, to stimulate public interest, to promote high standards of planning and architecture, and to secure the preservation, protection, development and improvement of features of historic and public interest in Bury St Edmunds.

The Bury in Bloom fund represents sponsorship and other receipts for the Bury in Bloom campaign. These funds are used for the establishment and maintenance of hanging baskets in the town and for designated areas of planting within the control of the Borough Council, together with community projects.

The Magna Carta 800 fund is for the 800th anniversary celebrations of the signing of the Magna Carta.
