Trustees annual report for the year ending 31st December 2017

Declaring HOPE in Jesus



When we first moved into our building in 2009, we called it Hope House. As our ministry here has developed and adapted, we have found more people coming to us who are facing despair and challenge in their lives. As a Church we believe that the Christian life delivers hope to those who feel hopeless. The sign above was presented to our Open House team by a man who was facing difficulties in life and felt that the support he had received had given him hope. Time and again, the Church is delivering hope through the support and care it provides to those in need. Our Open House provides support, meals, a listening ear and other practical help to those in need 4 days a week.

On Good Friday 2017, Churches Together performed a Passion Play on Mablethorpe Prom. This large scale production, with a cast of 60plus drew large crowds from across the area and was a huge success.

We worked closely with Churches Together in Mablethorpe & Sutton on Sea on a number of projects during the year. The Passion play in the Prom was our largest project, performed on Good Friday to as large crowd and with a cast and crew in excess of 60. The Passion Play was a huge success and drew people from a wide area. A number of our members were involved.

We held a prayer and worship gathering to start the year and held an octave of prayer Event for Lent which involved most of the Churches in the area in an wide range of prayer events. Ur Church led a prayer walk along the promenade

We held a summer lunch club for local families during the summer holidays but despite widespread support from the local schools with promotion, we only saw about 25 people access the lunches over 4 weeks.

A choir made up of members from Churches together once again led community carol singing at both the Mablethorpe 7 Sutton on Sea Christmas events.

We once again held a sponsored walk to raise funds for our projects and this was again well supported by a variety of Churches. See also Open the Book.



Community Bus @ Hope House

Our recently acquired community bus has once again been serving both the Church and a wider group of community groups. As well as providing regular service to our Church and other local Church groups, we have also assisted 10 other community organisations with their transport needs.

We once again helped get 360 children who were on holiday at the Leicester Children's holiday Centre (LCHC)to the circus over a 6 week period. The cost of this transport was met by Mablethorpe Christian Fellowship. (At the time of writing this report -March 2018, we were saddened to hear that the LCHC was to close its centre at Mablethorpe with immediate effect.

We launched a joint project with Rotary and the local Coastal Community Challenge to take people for hospital visits. Despite extensive promotion and widespread support it failed to have any uptake.

We supported 10 other community groups with social trips, which without the community bus would not have been possible. Right: The community bus helped with the Churches Together Sponsored Walk.

Our year from January started with us all having a pet duck to name and take home and photograph doing interesting things. For example- one went to Hull, another went out to dinner and another fell in love with a pottery duck!

At the group we did the usual weekly mix of, table top football, table tennis, snooker crafts and cooking etc. At the end of each night we did a group activity to get the kids to think about their spiritual and mo-

rale lives. We had special nights too- wacky hair, board game challenge, tech night and team games night.

Our tuck shop was popular, especially as we were able to offer a better number and quality of treats due to securing ourselves a card from a wholesaler. Hope house were also good to us as we had numerous occasion when donuts were given to us for free and very much enjoyed!!

In Feb we enjoyed an ice cream and trip to see it being made at Farmer browns. We were able to do



this due to funding given to us from the Colin Batts foundation. Our funding also took us out to pottery painting, and a spring sleepover at hope house with a visit to lazer questing and bowling with Mcdonalds in Skegness. We had a trip out in the summer too, to Wheelgate park and had a brilliant day as it was excellent weather just right for enjoying the water park and fairground rides.

Sadly, in July we decided to close the Bridge, as Judy who leads the group was under pressure at home due to her son being ill long term, and her daughter having just had a baby and needing support.

We ended with a splash literally as for our last evening together we took advantage of the paddling pool behind Hope house for a water night! Parents and the Bridge members must have really appreciated out group as we were given chocolates gifts and cards.

GLOW-WORMS - TODDLERS GROUP

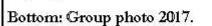
Glow-worms continues to be popular with families in the local area. Our main catchment of families is Mablethorpe and Sutton on sea but we also have families from Alford and Louth occasionally joining us. Our numbers have increased slightly over the year and we have had a number of new helpers to set out the toys and play with the children.

We had our annual teddy bears picnic, visit to the paddling pool and Toddle for Barnardo's which raised £131.00. Our summer trip was to Sundown park.

We were donated money for equipment by Scallywags, so we were able to buy a new trampoline and water/sand tray. Lidl's donated us some brand new clothes which we were able to give out to the families.

We had our usual Christmas party and this year the families chose to keep this to food and games at out usual venue.

Open House



for those facing homelessness. We were contacted by a local landlord who during the year worked with us to purchase and make available a 4 bedroomed house of multiple occupation which we made available to those facing homelessness or housing crisis. From past experience of working with the homeless, we decided to try and fund a worker to provide extra support to the men in the house. We received funding from Coastal Community Challenge to fund the worker for an initial 6 months. The house opened in September and initially faced slow progress. By the end of the year we had achieved occupancy of 2 of the 4 rooms in the house.

Our Open House is supported by a team of volunteers who serve in the kitchens and provide support and friendship to those in need. We are very grateful to all our volunteers who serve on a weekly basis, without whom we would not be able to operate. One of our regular Open House volunteers, who was also a member of the Church, died in November following a short period of illness.

Open House operates Tuesday to Friday every week. It provides free drinks, low cost meals (free to those in need) friendship, support, help with calls and forms to those who are vulnerable or lonely. We can also signpost people for extra help with addictions, housing, food larder, furniture or budgeting.

Our Open House manager received funding to support her salary from Dong Energy via the Coastal Community Fund to pay 80% of her salary for two years and we also had funding to replace all the carpets with wipe clean flooring in the areas of Hope House that are used for the Open House Our Open house team also worked closely with Furnchurch (a furniture and food larder charity) that is situated on the same site to provide support to those needing food parcels. Our Open House continues to be a reference point

Church Life

We held weekly Sunday morning meetings throughout the year. We also combined these with a monthly Church lunch. Our bible teaching themes this year were 'The Parables of Jesus' and 'Life Course lessons'.

The teaching themes from Sundays were followed up in the mid week house fellowship groups. We also held a monthly joint evening service with Alford Community Church until July 2017.

We held weekly prayer meetings at Hope House on Monday mornings which have had a small but committed following.

We hosted the first East Coast Worship Connection meeting with International worship leader David Hadden in September which was well attended by people from across the area. We are planning to hold a second worship day in 2018.

Home groups

MCF has always operated house type mid week fello wship groups. During the year, we had 2 mid week groups meeting on a weekly basis. One was a daytime group on a Thursday morning, the other an evening group on a Wednesday. Groups have had consistent attendance and have followed the Sunday teaching theme.



Teaching themes

Our main teaching themes this year have been:

- Parables of Jesus
- Growth course which covered such subjects as Defeating Satan, Alcohol abuse, The return of Jesus, Tackling difficult questions and effective witnessing.



Children & Youth

This year we have welcomed Claire onto our team; who comes with the experience of working in Sunday School her previous church. Numbers continue to be small as we average around 9 children, but this fluctuates so that when people are on holiday or have relatives over we can go down to one or two children then be bumped up to the teens numbers. Most of the children are from families who come along to church, but we have some who are brought as friends of those families. The children's age ranges are from 4 through to 11. Sometimes we include those who are older who jog along with us rather than sit in an adult service.

We have a mixture of games, activities and crafts based around a bible passage each week. This is founded using the online Scripture union 'Light live', supplement this with material form other sources. Our leaders and helpers operate on a rota, so children experience different teaching styles. Occasionally we have a break week and watch a DVD, accompanied by typical cinema type snacks.

The bridge Spring sleepover joined in with the Sunday School, and the kids enjoyed the interactive games and activities.



Ground level Network

The Church is part of the Ground Level Network of Churches. Throughout the year, Ground level have provided support via monthly leaders meetings, quarterly key leaders forums, 2 County team training days and the annual Ground level leaders conference in Swanwick which had a record attendance of over 600 leaders.

On a local basis, the Churches in our area enjoyed 3 prayer breakfasts and 2 key leaders meetings which were organised by Mablethorpe Christian Fellowship.

Our Church leader, Nigel Collins has also served as a Director and member of the Executive team of Ground Level throughout the year.

As always, one of he great highlights for Ground Level Churches was the ONE Event Christian celebration over the August Bank Holiday at the Lincolnshire Showground which saw over 10,000 Christians joining together to worship, celebrate and enjoy time together.

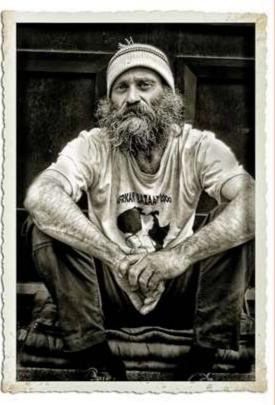




Homeless Ministry

Jeremiah Steepek is the internets most famous imaginary homeless person. Sadly, over recent years we have seen a rising number significantly less famous and very real homeless people coming to us for help. We provide meals, washing machine, sleeping bags, thermos flasks and support to the homeless. Last winter (2016/17) we helped rehouse 7 homeless people locally. One of the private landlords who assisted us with this offered to buy a house for us to manage and house the homeless people who came to us for assistance. In August 2017, we signed a contract to manage the house for a trial period of 6 months. We also applied for funding for a homeless worker with Coastal Community Challenge who generously provided an initial 6 months funding to help launch the project. At the year end, the home has provided help to 5 people who faced homelessness.

We were also encouraged to convert our holiday accommodation at Hope House into a homeless hotel. We submitted an application for change of use in July but at the year end it had been decided the application needed to be heard by a planning Committee due to concerns raised by local residents. We await



the outcome in early January 2018. We continue to hold a poor fund to assist those who face poverty.

Hope House Church

It is 31 years since Mablethorpe Christian Fellowship was first established. In that time, the Church has changed beyond recognition from a small group meeting in a front room to a Church that operates buildings, children's groups a homeless house and even a community bus. After much discussion we decided that the Churches best future would be secured by becoming a Charitable Incorporated organisation. In line with the way the local know and perceive us and how our



ministry has developed we have decided to name the Church Hope House Church– Mablethorpe. We started the legal process of establishing the new Charity mid way through the year and plan to launch under the new name from September next year.



We start the week with a weekly Monday morning prayer meeting which has been supported by a committed group of prayer supporters. We also hold a short prayer meeting prior to our Sunday meetings. We are learning the importance of prayer in every area of Church life . **#prayerchangesthings**.

Open the Book

Over the year our church has been involved with the local churches together 'Open the book' Two teams of storytellers go into 2 local schools to tell stories from the bible in a dramatized way. This has been very well received by the schools especially the children who enjoy the interactive parts of the storytelling.

We were able to give out to the year 6's in both schools, a Scripture union book about moving on to sec-

ondary school, and we gave out a newsletter to tell the children a bit of background info about what we do and where we go and how 'Open the book' is far bigger than just the local schools we go into.

We have accumulated a large number of props and costumes for the stories, and have been privileged to share how much we enjoy 'Open the Book' with other local churches some of which are not involved with Open the book.

Public benefit:

As a Church with a **community focus**, our public benefit can be clearly seen. We provided:

Morning service every week. Our morning service is modern and one of few services in the area that will appeal to those who have no Church background. We also provide a crèche and children's work

Open House 4 days a week to anyone who needs help, support, friendship or a meal (and provided free of charge to anybody who cannot afford to make a contribution). The Open house team have worked closely with other community workers to assist local people in need. We work with a growing number of homeless and people who are struggling with addictions.

For children and youth we provide:

Glow-worms mums and toddlers provides support and help to local carers and families.

We manage and operate a **Community bus** that provides support to a 10 local community groups.

We administer a **homeless fund** that provides help and support to local homeless people. During the winter of 2017, our homeless fund provided bonds for 6 people to obtain accommodation. We manage a house providing **supported living** for up to 4 homeless men

A summer lunch club for local children to have access to lunches during summer holidays. (provided at Hope House in conjunction with Churches Together)
