With the trustees having complete freedom to choose the charities to benefit from the Trust, the broad aim has been to 'help people'. Since the founding trustees were direct descendants of William Wilberforce, it is not surprising that one aim has been to help to eliminate slavery – starting when public awareness of the problem was much lower than today.

It is likely that there are few families in the country which have not been scarred by cancer in some way. And so cancer prevention, research, recovery, etc. is another important area. To that can be added other charities in the medical field, engaged primarily in research, and those providing treatment in developing countries.

Fellow men, women and children struggling overseas are not forgotten, and, among others, the Trust aims to help rough sleepers, hospital patients, service men and women who have been injured physically or mentally, alcoholics, prisoners, children who need extra assistance. A full list of donations is provided.

Future generations of trustees may have different priorities. The aim of the current generation of trustees is to maintain the Trust in sound financial health for the future.

Having regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit, the trustees have ensured that all charitable expenditure has been in the form of grants/donations to charities which they believe adhere to that guidance.

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

At the conclusion of its 49th year, the Trust was in good shape. Income from the expendable endowment, plus donations, continued to grow. During the year, £78,410 was distributed to charities chosen by the trustees.

Additions to the endowment have continued, which have been most helpful. As the endowment grows in size, the trustees are considering the introduction of a fifth investment fund specifically for charities, so as to spread both opportunity and risk more widely.

The trustees are spared many of the problems faced by the operational charities which they support. For instance, there is no worry about whether income will be sufficient to cover expenditure. If income does not come in, for whatever reason, the amount distributed to charities can be reduced. There are no long-term funding agreements, although the overall aim is to continue to support those charities where a relationship has been established over the years.

Once again, the trustees are most grateful for the professional services of Mr Ian Nelson, the trust's Honorary Independent Examiner.

The Trust invests in professionally managed collective investment vehicles which either are charities or are designed for charities. In this way, diversification is achieved. Such investments are not in the 'high risk' category.
