THE HISTORY OF THE OXFORDSHIRE PLAY ASSOCIATION

October 1974 – OPA is 'born' following a meeting convened at the Community Centre in Lake Street, Oxford.

November 1978 – OPA is officially registered with the Charity Commission, Registered Charity Number 276706.

1977 / 1978 – First recorded set of Accounts showing Annual Income of £69.92 against Annual Expenditure of £72.66

September 1992 – Working party established towards creating the OPA that exists today.

January 1993 – First public meeting held at Yarnton Village Hall of OPA, the County Play Forum.

July 1993 – First Play Newsletter is produced by OPA who are based at Osney Day Nursery in Botley Road, Oxford.

1994 – OPA continues to grow very quickly, services now offered include the Oxfordshire Playcare Foundation Course, Management Training Course and the Playcare Promotion Unit. The first OPA Playbox Catalogue is issued and OPA launch its own Payroll Service.

1994 – OPA moves to Agriculture House in Eynsham after outgrowing its old premises.

1995 – With funding support from the Heart of England TEC, OPA launch the Oxfordshire Childrens Information Service – this service went live on 1st July 1996.

July 1999 – OPA celebrates its 25th Birthday with an event at Weston On The Green.

August 2000 – First recorded Playday event held at Blackbird Leys Leisure Centre with 2000 Children & Young People in attendance.



September 2001 – Childrens Information Service becomes independent of OPA and moves to Long Hanborough.

December 2003 – OPA is awarded 3 year funding of £186,000 from the Learning and Skills Council to deliver Playwork Training across Oxfordshire.

October 2006 – OPA moves to Thorney Leys Park in Witney.

2006 – First County and District Play strategies written.

2007 – OPA moves to its present office location in Cowley, Oxford.

2008 – First National Play Strategy is issued by the Department for Children, Schools and Families as part of a Commitment from the Childrens Plan.

Summer 2008 – First Countywide, Oxfordshire Playday takes place at Florence Park in Oxford, attended by 5000 people.

2008 – West Oxfordshire Play Ranger Project is launched.

February 2012 – OPA secure the County Council contract to deliver Playwork Training across Oxfordshire.

Spring / Summer 2012 – First Armed Forces Playdays are delivered at the 6 Armed Forces bases in Oxfordshire.

2013 – Countywide Play Conference is reborn, delivered at Brookes University.

2013 – Twelve Playday events are delivered across Oxfordshire, attracting a record audience of 23,100 Children, Young People and their Families.

September 2014 – OPA 'Community PLAYback' pilot project is delivered.

October 2014 – First Autumn / Winter Playdays are delivered at Witney and Sonning Common in October Half Term.

April 2015 – OPA changes its legal structure from that of a Registered Charity to a Charitable Incorporated Organisation, Registered Charity Number 1160320

February 2016 – OPA secures 3 Year Funding from BBC Children In Need to deliver Play Ranger sessions on the Rose Hill Estate in Oxford

2017 – Pilot 'Oxford Therapeutic Playwork' project is delivered at Bayards Hill School in Barton in partnership with renowned Playwork Theorist Gordon Sturrock

Working with our District Council partners we co-Chair the Cherwell Young People, Play and Wellbeing Group as well as new groups in South Northamptonshire such as the newly created South Northants Youth Engagement Group.

This acts as a focus point to co-ordinate service delivery, reduce duplication and share best practice as well as increasing delivery capacity across both districts.

THE 12 THEMES OF THE CHERWELL PLAY STRATEGY

- 1. To enable more people to participate
 - To improve the access children have to play, either in green and open spaces, playgrounds or activity programmes.
- 2. To improve playgrounds and other play spaces including informal and natural environments
- To bring people together of different ages and backgrounds together The development of mix-age programmes and activities to provide play opportunities and build relationships within communities.
- 4. To include everyone regardless of background or disability
- 5. To make it easier to play in urban areas
- 6. To make it easier to play in rural areas
- 7. To allow children to take more risks when they are playing

This will help children to understand that taking risks is important in helping to develop an active population and encourages a greater awareness about safety and enjoyment.

Oxlep - Get Qualified November 2017 - will complete in July 2018

The Training Centre was successful in receiving funding to deliver a Level 2 Diploma in Banbury to ten learners. This project started in November 2017 and is due to complete by the end of July 2018. There are currently 9 learners on the project, eight of whom are receiving a fully funded place. The initial recruitment of learners and liaising with providers for volunteer placements was a mammoth task as participation criteria was narrow. However, 10 learners were successfully inducted on to the course in November 2017.







Marketing and Fundraising

Throughout the year I have assisted Julia, OPA Fundraising and Communication's Officer in completing bids for further funding of OTP project with BBC CIN and Delivering Impact for Level 2 Diploma in Playwork. We were successful with both bids. I also marketed a Level 3 Playwork Diploma and was successful in recruiting 10 learners for this.

Scrap Store Play Pod – July 2017

I was involved in the initial training and delivery of this project, delivered by Bristol Play Pod at Five Acres School in Bicester. It was great to see the pod in action and how the loose parts supported a wide scope of development through freely chosen play, for children and young people.

The Aims of OPA are to support Children and Young People through Families and Groups, Individuals and Organisations who work in Play / Playwork. We do this on a fully inclusive basis across Oxfordshire and beyond taking into account all relevant legislation and guidelines.

Review of the Year by the OPA manager, Martin Gillett

Like many other Charities, both locally and nationally, 2017/18 was another successful year for OPA in delivering its work across Oxfordshire and beyond. We are now expanding our reach into South Northamptonshire as well as Oxfordshire. Like many other local Charities we are finding funding and income very hard to secure with almost all grant opportunities being hugely oversubscribed. In this Financial Year we again used some of our hard earned reserves in order to continue with the delivery of our work but in order to secure the long term sustainability of OPA we will be making some structural and staff changes in Financial Year 2018/19.

We have worked extremely hard to reduce and control our core operational costs and these are carefully monitored and reviewed on a regular basis.

We are utilising our resources to identify, and apply for further funding to support and expand our work across the County and are also researching new and innovative ways to increase our levels of self-generated income to ensure the sustainability of OPA moving forward. Dedicated staff time has been built into our budgets to ensure that this is effective and we are also using Volunteer support far more effectively

The organisation is lean, flexible and open to change which we must be in these challenging and changing times.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE OXFORDSHIRE PLAY ASSOCIATION

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

I report on the accounts of the Oxfordshire Play Association for the year ended 31 March 2018, which are set out on pages 5 to 12.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The Charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The Charity's Trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year (under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act), and that an independent examination is needed.

It is my responsibility to:

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charites: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102((effective 1 January 2015) – (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

The transition date to FRS 102 was 1st April 2015 and there were no adjustments to the accounts as a result of this transition. OPA meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. The Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the trust's ability to continue as a going concern.

There were no adjustments to the balance sheet or statement of financial activities on transition to FRS 102

(b) Incoming Resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the charity is legally entitled to the income after any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be measured reliably and it is probable that the income will be received. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Donations - For donations to be recognised the charity will have been notified of the amounts and the settlement date in writing. If there are conditions attached to the donation and this requires a level of performance before entitlement can be obtained then income is deferred until those conditions are fully met or the fulfilment of those conditions is within the control of the charity and it is probable that they will be fulfilled.

Grants - Income from government and other grants are recognised at fair value when the charity has entitlement after any performance conditions have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. If entitlement is not met then these amounts are deferred.

Donated goods, facilities and services - Donated facilities and donated professional services are recognised in income at their fair value when their economic benefit is probable, it can be measured reliably and the charity has control over the item. Fair value is determined on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity. For example the amount the charity would be willing to pay in the open market for such facilities and services. A corresponding amount is recognised in expenditure.

(c) Expenditure

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably

(d) Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees' discretion in furtherance of the objects of the Charity. Designated funds are those earmarked by the trustees for use in a particular area or for specific areas

(e) Depreciation on assets capitalised is calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets over their estimated useful economic lives.

Computers and equipment-straight line basis over three years

Expenditure on fixed assets above £300 is capitalised.
