Structure, governance and management: The Parochial Church Council is a corporate body established by the Church of England. The PCC operates under the Parochial Church Council Powers Measure. The PCC is a Registered Charity. The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. All church attendees are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll.

This report has been adopted by the PCC at its final meeting before the Annual Parochial Church Meeting.





PCC Aims and Ministry

Wootton PCC is responsible in partnership with the vicar for promoting the whole mission of the church - pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical - in the ecclesiastical parish of Wootton (which includes Stewartby).

In planning and overseeing the mission of the church, the incumbent and PCC consider the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and especially the specific guidance on charities for the advancement of religion. We aim to equip Christians to live out their faith in Christ through:

- church services and prayer
- bible study groups and training
- young people's activity and educational involvement
- pastoral care for parishioners
- evangelism
- partnership in world mission

Our Mission Action Plan, adopted in 2016, calls on us to become over 2016-20: One body of wholehearted worshipping disciples, ever more deeply rooted in the Bible & prayer, growing together in holiness and every-member ministry to become a family of:

- **loving welcome**, caring for one another with the love of Jesus Christ
- **passionate proclamation**, committed to reaching the people of Wootton, Stewartby, and beyond, with the vital good news of Jesus Christ for a lost world
- **glad service**, dedicated to being salt and light for Jesus Christ in the world
- **global heart**, both prayerfully and practically engaged in the worldwide mission of the church, and training and sending men and women into gospel ministry within and beyond the parish
- sacrificial change, giving generously of ourselves, our money, and our talents to realise this vision

To this end the PCC has adopted a detailed plan of action with priority goals in the following areas: corporate prayer; making new disciples; equipping leaders and disciple-makers; and ministry to children and young people. Progress towards realising the plan goals is reviewed at each PCC meeting.

The vicar and PCC are supported in the church's mission by PCC committees, by a part-time employed administrator, and by teams of volunteer helpers, appointed by the PCC and vicar. Jim Hignett served as a licensed Reader, supervised in his post-licensing training (IME2) by the Vicar, and attending regular diocesan training events. We continued to have responsibility within the diocese of St Albans as a training parish for first-post curates, and during the year Lucas Durant, supported by his wife Catherine, assumed responsibility for the church's evangelistic ministry, as well as leading the monthly 'messy church' Encompass meeting.

In September at the beginning of his second-year as a part-time student on the Cornhill Training Course in London, Joshua Kendall began a one-year appointment as part time children's and youth worker.

To support the church's ministry the PCC maintains the fabric of St Mary's church, the church hall and grounds, and the curate's house. No major works were undertaken on the church or hall beyond routine maintenance. However, following the collapse into the churchyard of a large ash tree from a neighbouring property on Christmas Eve 2016, major repairs to the south porch were required. These were completed during the year with the support of the PCC's insurers, the Ecclesiastical Insurance Company. The PCC took the opportunity to renew the roof of the south porch, which was discovered to be deteriorating.

2018 also brought the quinquennial inspection of the fabric by the church architect. Items for urgent attention are principally the roofs above the vestry and crèche, and the stonework of some parapets. The PCC has reviewed the architect's report and commissioned action on matters requiring urgent attention.

The PCC is a charitable corporate body established in law and operating under the Parochial Church Council (Powers) Measure 1956, as amended, and the Church Representation Rules 2011. It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission.

During the year the PCC agreed revised Safeguarding policies for both young people and vulnerable adults. Appropriate training, guidance, and checks are received by all who have regular contact with young people and vulnerable adults. The PCC has reviewed its policies in light of guidance from the Church of England. The PCC is accordingly happy to confirm that it has complied with the duty under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016 (duty to have regard to House of Bishops' guidance on safeguarding children and vulnerable adults).



Public Worship and Prayer

A range of Sunday services were offered. At 9am a weekly service according to the Book of Common Prayer alternated between The Lord's Supper and Morning Prayer and attracted 15-20 people. Adult attendance at the 10.30am service, including children's groups and a crèche facility, was normally 75-85, with around 15 children. The Lord's Supper was celebrated once per month. A Prayer Service was held on the second Sunday monthly. Once a month a Sunday Plus meeting was held, with the aim of equipping church members to think biblically about contemporary issues; however, this meeting, held in the vicarage, became progressively less well-attended and was discontinued at the end of the year.

Morning sermon series during the year included the book of Jonah, forgiveness, the Sermon on the Mount, 1 Corinthians 1-4 and Isaiah 1-12, as well as short series on key Reformation truths and the Second Coming of Christ.

A monthly mid-week 'messy church' held in the church hall - Encompass - served younger families in Wootton and attracts a regular attendance of 60-70 adults and children. A large team of helpers sustained this venture and as well as building links with many families in the local community. During the year, Hazel Sanders stepped down from overall leadership of Encompass after five years, and was succeeded by Lucas Durant. Families attending now receive a booklet containing family bible studies following the monthly Encompass theme, to encourage continued engagement and discipleship.

A service of confirmation was held on a Sunday evening in January. By permission of the bishop of St Albans, four candidates from St Mary's were confirmed in a service full of his characteristic passion and encouragement by longstanding St Mary's mission partner Alf Cooper, recently consecrated an assistant bishop in the diocese of Chile.

Connections with the wider church in both diocese and worldwide were maintained by church members and visiting preachers. In 2017 these included: Tom Woolford, an ordinand in his final year at Oak Hill College, who had previously spoken on our Pathfinder residential and was a team member in the Oak Hill 2014 Love Wootton team; Revd Glen Scrivener, Director of UK evangelistic mission agency SpeakLife, who led STORY, a four-day parish mission in June, and also spoke at a Sunday of preparation in March; and Revd Shaun Atkins, Chaplain at Bedford School.

Baptisms were held during the main morning service and were often attended by significant numbers from the community. In 2017 there were three weddings at St Marys. The clergy officiated at a number of funerals at St Mary's, at Stewartby United Church, and at Bedford Crematorium.

On Remembrance Sunday, St Mary's hosted as usual the village's annual Service of Remembrance. At Mothering Sunday, Easter, Harvest and Christmas a range of services enable all ages to celebrate major festivals.

Where there is a fifth Sunday in the month, a team from St Marys led by Clem Lewin leads the weekly Sunday morning service of Christian worship at Bedford Hospital.

A weekly prayer ministry team supports those attending our morning service. Members of the congregation support the vicar and curate in their pastoral ministry in the parish. A visiting team ensures that a number of church members who are unable to attend services on account of infirmity or illness are regularly visited.

Members of St Mary's also support the ministry of Stewartby United Church, a Local Ecumenical Project. The Church of England is a member of a Sharing Agreement with the Methodist, United Reformed, and Roman Catholic Churches to provide pastoral ministry in the LEP.

Discipleship and Learning

The PCC provides many opportunities for people to grow as Christians. During 2017 six regular Growth Groups met for bible study weekly or fortnightly. Growth Group leaders met regularly for review and training, and during the year were: Angela Stephens and Allyson Cable, Clem Lewin and Ivy Peacock, Anthony and Jane Hall, Lucas Durant, Peter Stephens and John Robertson, Peter and JoJo Ackroyd and Diane Murray and Jim Hignett. A further two groups – including one providing bible study for Lunch Club members – met monthly. Early in the year, three BUILD training evenings were held, and from the autumn a Knowing God growth group met in the vicarage, gaining an overview of the Bible through studying God's Big Picture by Vaughan Roberts, and training in principles and practice of Christian ministry.





Church members are encouraged to attend events for training encouragement and fellowship in the Deanery and wider church. A small group once more enjoyed the May Bank Holiday 'Bible by the Beach' conference in Eastbourne.

In October, around forty five adults and twenty children attended a church weekend away held at Letton Hall, near Dereham, Norfolk. The speaker was Richard Newman, associate minister at Christ Church Cambridge, who gave four talks from the letter to the Philippians; Josh Kendall led a programme for children and young people, supported by a number of volunteers. Catering was in the hands of JoJo Ackroyd and Frances Wainwright.

2017 marked the 500th anniversary of the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. In addition to a Reformation bookstall in church and a short sermon series, St Mary's marked this anniversary by hosting a travelling production of Zadok Media's A Monk's Tale. Staged in the theatre hall of Wootton Upper School, this dynamic three-person show of sketches and music highlighted the issues which provoked Martin Luther's Ninety-Five Theses, and attracted a near-capacity audience from local churches and beyond.

As described in more detail later in this report, groups for young people are held on Sunday mornings and evenings, and midweek. Young people attended a range of residential events, including summer camps run by CPAS Ventures (Woolhampton I Pathfinder; Foremarke I CYFA ventures), and Lymington Rushmore Holidays, as well as our own Easter holidays Pathfinder residential at the Chellington Centre in Carlton. Church members including the vicar and curate served as leaders, cooks, and assistant leaders on a range of these residentials for young people.



Clergy, staff and volunteers attended a number of training events, including the Diocesan Clergy and Readers residential conferences in June and October, the Evangelical Ministry Assembly and Younger Ministers Conference run by Proclamation Trust, IME2 training events,

Deanery and Diocesan Synod

St Mary's is part of the Bedford Deanery comprising 23 different churches (stretching from Elstow to Cranfield and including the town centre Bedford Churches) that all fall under the care of the Bishop of Bedford. St Mary's sends 3 representatives to the Deanery - Tim Dillistone, Jim Hignett and Pauline Kendall – who is the present Lay-Chair of the Deanery. Meetings are held 4 times a year rotating around the churches and are an opportunity to get to know other Christians , to work together on outreach for example through Mission Action Plans and hear about Diocesan initiatives. At the moment there are 5 churches in the Bedford Deanery who are in vacancy – awaiting the appointment of a vicar and it has been good to hold these fellow churches in our prayers at a time of change.

The next level up the Anglican hierarchy is the Diocesan Synod which also meets 4 times a year and at present Revd. Peter Ackroyd and Pauline Kendall serve on this body. Peter also chairs the Diocesan Evangelical fellowship. Reports of both of these bodies are received at PCC and remind us of the wider organisation to which we belong.

Ecumenical

The PCC aims to strengthen Christian witness and service in the community through membership of Wootton and Stewartby Churches. All congregations meeting in the parish are actively involved: St Marys, New Life Methodist, Wootton Baptist, and Stewartby United Church.

As usual, a United Service was held in January, a Pancake Party on Shrove Tuesday, and a Senior Citizens Tea in May. During Lent WSC arranged a succession of prayer meetings for church members, one hosted by each member church. An Open Air service was held on 9 July in the grounds of Wootton Lower School's Harris Way site. The speaker was Revd Caroline Weaver. Members of all the churches came together to sings carols in the new housing development on Hall End Road, and ended the evening with carols and refreshments for the resident of Jenkyn Road.

Joint publicity was prepared and distributed to every household at Easter, and at Christmas.

Clergy attend bi-monthly prayer meetings for leaders of Bedford churches in sympathy with the doctrinal basis of the Evangelical Alliance, of which St Marys is a corporate member.



Evangelistic:

St Mary's aims to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ through its regular public services, through supporting the witness of Christians in their homes, neighbourhoods and workplaces, and through offering regular events and courses to enable people to explore Christian faith and practice.

The principal evangelistic focus of 2017 was a four-day parish mission, STORY, organised by a hard-working group led by Lucas Durant, and enthusiastically supported by church members. Preceded by six weeks of weekly prayer meetings, 22-25 June saw a range of occasions for all ages, at which Revd Glen Scrivener (SpeakLife) or his assistant Tom Schmidt presented the gospel to church members and their guests. The main events were Befriending a Brighton Bomber and Transformed through Tragedy - chat-show style evenings with Harvey Thomas and Jude Gayet – plus a Saturday evening family Midsummer Barbecue at Wood End Farm, Kempston, and Guest Services on Sunday morning. Outreach also took place to Upper School students through offering pastries and smoothies at the beginning of two school days and to families at Encompass and A Teddy Bear Picnic and Parachute Drop. The programme additionally include a pub outreach event, garden tea party, afternoon ramble, men's breakfast and a session on mental health and hope. A small group – 3-2-1 The Story Continues – met weekly after the mission to enable people to pursue questions it had raised for them.

Other ventures held to serve the community and reach out with the gospel included: a Burns Night supper and ceilidh in the Village Hall, an Easter Quiz night held at the Blue Cross social club, a parenting course held at the Lower School, and Wreath Making workshops before Christmas.

A Christianity Explored course was held in the autumn. In November, Lucas Durant began a weekly Wednesday evening pub drop-in, Curate's Corner, at the Cock Inn on Bedford Road.

Mega Makers - Summer Holiday Club for children aged 4 to 13

Our Summer Holiday Club in August 2017 was called Mega Makers. We ran the club for 4 mornings, Tuesday to Friday, with games and crafts on Wednesday afternoon. The Scripture Union material shared the Good News of Jesus using stories from Matthews Gospel. We heard about Jesus calling Matthew the tax collector to be a disciple, The Calming of the Storm, Jesus' Crucifixion, and his resurrection. Over the 4 days 127 children attended and had lots of fun and ap-



proximately 60 volunteers were involved in some way. We also held a BBQ on Friday night. Then we had a service at the Church Hall site on the grass on Sunday morning. Our memory verse which we pray children and adults will still know in their hearts was "We pray that you will have the power to know how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ".

Mission Beyond the Parish

The PCC tithes its income from regular giving to support Christian mission beyond the parish.

Longstanding mission partners in Belgium (YP & Jude Gayet) and Chile (Alf & Hilary Cooper) were supported directly and through the Church Mission Society. PCC continued to support the training of a Church of Uganda ordinand at Uganda Christian University through the UK Friends of Masindi-Kitara Diocese. In the autumn, the church council agreed to support the ministry of UK evangelistic charity SpeakLife (Director: Revd Glen Scrivener) as a further mission partner.

St Mary's also supports prayerfully and financially: the ministry of IMPACT, a Scripture Union affiliated charity, which employs Christian schools workers in the Bedford area; the local ministry of Karen Jones, local sixth-form & FE college worker with the UK charity Festive (a joint venture of UCCF and Scripture Union); and the Church Pastoral Aid Society.

Harvest collections were donated to Tearfund, while at Christmas collections of clothing and other items supported the ministry to the homeless of SMART (formerly BeChar). In November, church members contributed generously to the ministry of Operation Christmas Child (Samaritan's Purse). Church members also support the work of the Bedford Foodbank through a collection point in church; the church is a referral agent for the Foodbank.

Churchwardens' Report on Fabric

The Churchwardens role is very varied. We are responsible for ensuring the buildings and money are cared for, we look after the sidespeople, and we liaise between the congregation and the vicar, and we also keep an eye on the clergy and make sure they are OK. So 2017 has been a busy year. Prayerfully and practically supporting our clergy, talking to the congregation and sharing in their highs and lows, trying to keep on top of rotas, and then ensuring our buildings are maintained. We have ensured the fallen tree was removed from the back of the church, and repaired the porch and window it damaged. Replaced some carpets in church, and begun negotiating the renewal of the ground lease with the Scouts for their Scout Hut, amongst many other things. This would not have been possible without the support of many people, we are both very thankful for your help, support and prayers.

We have recently begun using a Church Management system called ChurchSuite, which will help us to manage rotas, groups, communications in a more coherent way.

Volunteers are always welcome to assist me keeping the Hall and grounds in good repair.

Treasurer's Report

2017 summary. The finances are again healthy, with reserves PCC are free to spend at £4k, having paid all bills and parish share. We have approx. £200k in the restricted buildings fund, and whilst we have not increased our £4k reserves from this time last year, we have done great things in 2017: Story outreach programme, contributed to Josh's Cornhill training fees, paid some legacy Parish Share arrears, and had



to pay £2k more in Parish Share contribution in 2017. These costs have totalled approx. £10k. Cautious spending remains key to increasing our surplus further in 2018. Thank you for your generous support in financing a Youth & Children's worker.

2018 outlook. Giving predictions remains similar to 2017, and no large forecast expenditure is planned. It is likely the PCC will wish to extend and/or enhance the Youth & Children's Worker employment in 2018, which may require your support.

St. Mary's Book Club

St Mary's Book Club continues to be an encouragement to read Christian books and give an opportunity to think through what we have read, to avoid the danger of reading and then instantly forgetting! We meet about twice a term at someone's house. We have decided to alternate reading a biography of a famous Christian from a different era, with a book on Christian doctrine or what it means to live and grow as a Christian.
