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TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT)

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2017

The trustees present their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2017. The report also serves as a Directors' Report required under Section 491(2) of the Companies Act 2006.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Trust's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016)

Objectives and activities

The principal object of the Trust is to further such charitable purposes for the public benefit that fall within the descriptions of charitable purposes set out in Section 3 of the Charities Act 2011 in particular but not limited to:

- The prevention of relief of poverty
- The advancement of education
- The advancement of citizenship or community development
- The advancement of the arts, culture, heritage or science
- The relief of those in need, by reason of youth, age, ill health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage

Charitable funds are raised for the Trust through grant applications to arts organisation such as Arts Council of Wales and Arts Council England and Trusts and Foundations such as PRS for Music Foundation. Grant funding come with restrictions as well as strict monitoring guidelines and reporting structures that are met by the Trust. These guidelines will dictate the way in which funding is allocated. We ensure the aims and objectives of any grant funding are monitored and evaluated and reported on accordingly.

We also receive donations from individuals and private donations which supports the core work of the Trust.

Funds raised through Green Man Trust Cafe are designated for community support. Small local organisations and community groups seeking funding submit applications to the charity, detailing their organisational and project aims. Suitable projects are researched and vetted to ensure the funds are used appropriately. Decisions about the beneficiaries are made by the Board of Trustees, in accordance with the charity's aims.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the Trust should undertake. In setting the objectives and planning the activities, the trustees have also given careful consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit.

Achievements and performance

Review of activities

Green Man Trust extends Green Man Festival's arts, educational and social aims beyond its acclaimed music programme to cultivate the much needed showcasing and creative development of music, performing arts, science and culture, both locally and nationally. The Trust has four key strands of activity:

- 1. Artistic Development
- 2. Training and Development
- 3. Community Support
- 4. Science Engagement.

The Trust locates funding for its projects from a variety of sources, including funds raised from individual donations. Statutory sources of funding include Arts Council Wales and Arts Council England and public funding sources include Trusts and Foundations such as PRS for Music Foundation.

Plantpot Ltd, Green Man's parent company, donates generous resources (festival tickets, site fees and utilities, as well as production support and staff) to support and deliver these projects. This close relationship allows the Trust's projects to have an excellent platform and showcase opportunity for the artists involved as well as tapping into large and varied audiences to widen the impact of the projects.

Activities receiving funding from statutory sources, trusts and foundations, and public donations:

Artistic Development Activities:

Green Man Rising Artist Development Programme: Green Man Rising (GMR) encompasses Green Man's development activities for new and emerging music talent, as well as established and developing artists. Funds are raised to support these development activities, including the Green Man Rising emerging artist competition and Festival stage.

The GMR competition is an open-access opportunity, providing performance experience, professional development, networking and mentoring opportunities for emerging musicians. Every submission is listened to, and whittled down to a shortlist of 20 acts, who are then sent to key tastemakers. These have previously included So Young Magazine, Dots and Dashes, Too Many Blogs, London On The Inside, Folk Radio, Goldflake Paint, A Sound Reaction, Buzz Magazine. Each tastemaker chooses their top 6 artists. The 6 most popular acts (on average) then go on to play the final.

The 6 artists play live in front of a judging panel which have previously included MOJO, The Guardian, 6 Music, Creative Artist Agency, Domino Records, NME/Beats, United Talent Agency, Beggars Record Label and (of course) Green Man. The winner of Green Man Rising open's Green Man's iconic Mountain Stage, appearing on the same bill as legendary acts like PJ Harvey, Future Islands, and Ryan Adams, while the other finalists will perform on the Rising Stage.

The Green Man Rising stage at Green Man Festival is a dedicated stage that showcases over 20 new artists/bands each year. Collaboration with **Green Man Radio** and **Green Man Sessions** allows for high-quality media exposure for artists involved and enables the creative offering from Green Man Rising to reach new audiences.

The programme continues to support established and developing artists through additional, larger showcase opportunities and career development at the festival and beyond. For example, we offer a development opportunity for an artist to gain curatorial experience by programming the **Settlement Stage** at Green Man Festival.

Performing Arts, Theatre and Circus: Since the introduction of Performing Arts to Green Man Festival in 2014, the programme has developed into an incredible offering of Welsh talent, showcasing the very best that Wales has to offer. The programme now offers a strong mix of interactive walkabout activity and static performance, existing touring work and bespoke commissioned shows.

In 2017, the Back of Beyond stage became a base of artistic expression for Green Man goers to take refuge in, set amongst the ever-inspiring backdrop of the Black Mountains and just next to the Green Man himself. The stage showcased incredible, newly commissioned performances for 2017 and was host to full day programme of performances and shows, while Walkabout performing arts delighted audiences as they wandered across site. As popular as ever, Walkabout extended Back of Beyond across the whole Festival with surreal roving theatre.

We present high-quality, engaging, and immersive programmes for theatre, circus and performing arts. Green Man Trust raises funds to support, expand and enhance opportunities for local, national and international artists. A focus on supporting new and diversifying arts organisations sees us offering opportunities to develop artistic practice as well as reach new, large, and varied audiences. The focus on building partnerships with small and Welsh-based artists in addition to UK and international acts to produce a well-rounded and diverse programme showcasing some incredible theatre, circus, dance and performing arts.

Visual Arts Development Programme: With the support of Arts Council England and Arts Council Wales in 2017, Green Man presented four large-scale visual artworks at the year's 15th anniversary festival, including new commissions by Antonio Roberts, Calum McCutcheon and Lumen (Louise Beer, Melanie King and Rebecca Huxley), and a significant reconfiguration of a recent work by David Ogle. The programme built on the inaugural year of this pioneering visual arts programme in 2016 and saw its first commissioned artists come up through the 2016 research and development residency. The festival has commissioned four new art works to date, which is expected to rise to nine in 2018.

The visual arts programme at Green Man is carving out a new space for visual arts in the music festival world with our ever-evolving programme. The ambition of the programme was increased this year, with the programme supporting three early-career artists to make new work, all with elements that were new and challenging to them. Artists gain technical experience and production skills as they develop new artistic ideas for work, contributing to sustainable onward careers. The research and development residency is a key part of the commissioning process, offering a supported opportunity for artists to explore the challenges and opportunities of the outdoor festival context in order to make proposals for new work. Through this activity we are also feeding the sector with skilled visual artists who are creating new and ambitious work using light and digital media for outdoor public spaces, for which demand is growing.

Training and Development Activities:

Merthyr Tydfil College Work Experience: Now in its eighth year, students from Merthyr Tydfil College join the Festival crew for a week in August. Students are offered a unique opportunity for personal growth and development, as well as enhancing their technical skills as they learn and gain hands-on experience from the Festival's Audio Visual team.

Green Man's friendly and highly professional environment creates an ideal context to both challenge and support the students. Under direction from Green Man's Audio Visual Department, students record and edit live footage of headliner acts on the Festival's main stages, which is broadcast across the stage screens. Feeding into their studies for their Film Foundation Degrees, the students learn how to vision mix backstage and operate video cameras live in front of 20,000 people. While on site the participants produce a short film of their experiences, with the final edit scheduled in the Festival programme and shown in the Cinedrome tent.

Other funded activities:

Welsh Signage:

As a charity rooted in Wales, the promotion of Welsh culture, language and heritage is important to Green Man Trust. Welsh signage across the Green Man Festival site, website and at other non-Festival events encourages interaction with Welsh language and ensures the accessibility of Welsh language to Welsh, UK and international audiences. Green Man Trust has received grants from Arts Council Wales for the last four years to support the installation of Welsh signage across Green Man Festival.

We receive funding from Arts Council Wales to support the development and accessibility of Welsh language across site and online.

Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies.

Financial review

The Trust's policy on reserves is to hold sufficient resources to continue our charitable activities and to ensure suitable overheads for the next financial year, equating to approximately £10,000 at the end of the financial year. If any members of staff were to be employed through the Trust then the reserve policy would also include 6 months salary of that member of staff to ensure continuity of staff should the income of the Trust fall below expectations.

Plans for the future

The primary aim of the Trust is to develop the activity within our four main strategic strands: Artistic Development, Training and Development, Community Support and Science Engagement – primarily concentrating on the first two strands. Our strategic plan is to diversify the income streams of the Trust in order to continue to support and expand the projects, as well as to widen their remit outside of Green Man Festival.

We will continue to expand and enhance the quality, impact and awareness of our activities. Additionally, future plans include:

Artistic Development:

We will continue to support artists, particularly those at the start of their career with showcase opportunities, networking prospects and career development. Future developments continue to involve widening the opportunities for showcasing and professional development post-festival.

- **Green Man Rising:** We will continue to support artists, particularly those at the start of their career with showcase opportunities, networking prospects and career development. Future developments continue to involve widening the opportunities for showcasing and professional development post-festival.
- **Visual Arts:** We want to explore partnerships with Welsh Arts organisations, investigating options for a collaborative large-scale commission for a site-specific art installation at the Festival.
- Performing Arts, Theatre and Circus: We will continue to develop the Welsh focussed performing arts as well as
 cultivating collaborations with arts organisations, encouraging site-specific work as well as further opportunities for
 developing artists.

Training and Development:

Green Man Trust is passionate about offering training and development opportunities to young people and early-career starters. Across a number of events and opportunities we offer professional and career development as well as technical training in a number of areas and disciplines e.g. Production, event management, programme curation and many more.

• Merthyr Tydfil College Work Experience: Future developments for this project continue to be the raising funds for a dedicated Project Manager who can expand the project, research potential collaborations to enhance opportunities for those students involved.

Community Support:

Green Man Trust is committed to enhancing the support for local causes and continually reviews its own grant making systems and charitable activities. Since the Festival's establishment in Crickhowell, Wales, Green Man has supported the community to raise funds for local causes and we want this to continue through the Trust.

Future developments for community support will include expanding our relationships with local schools, colleges and universities as a way of developing opportunities for young people in the local area. We also want to accumulate ring-fenced funds that can directly support community projects in and around the local area.

Science Engagement:

Future plans include the strategic development of links with science organisations and sources of funding to support successful science engagement. This will involve:

- Continuing to develop science engagement in a creative and innovative way, including developing partnerships with a wide range of science organisations.
- Developing science projects, partnerships and collaborations outside the festival.
- Explore ways in which the excellent science engagement during the festival can be translated to other cultures and countries.

Structure, governance and management

Constitution

The Trust is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association on 17 January 2013.

The Trust is constituted under a Memorandum of Association dated 17 January 2013 and is a registered charity number 1156453.

Method of appointment or election of Trustees

Organisational structure and decision making

Trustees:

The Trustees serve on the governing body of the Green Man Trust and this is where the decision making lies for the trust. Our trustees are responsible for the general control and management of the administration of the charity. They accept ultimate responsibility for directing the affairs of the charity, and ensure that it is solvent, well-run, and delivering the charitable outcomes for the benefit of the public for which it has been set up.

<u>Chair</u>: The Chair is required to lead the board of trustees regarding strategy and targets, to represent the Green Man Trust to external bodies and organisations and with support from the Board to sustain current and develop new forms of income or support for the charity. The chair of the Green Man Trust is Fiona Stewart.

<u>The Treasurer:</u> The Treasurer will interpret and explain accounting requirements, ensuring that the board receives financial reports and guide any other professional advisers or administrators they have appointed including the Company Secretary. The Treasurer for the Green Man Trust is Ian Fielder.

<u>The Company Secretary:</u> The role of the Secretary is to support the chairperson in ensuring the smooth functioning of the governing body, organisation, updating and recording of the administration and financial affairs of the Green Man Trust.

There are currently no staff employed by the Trust.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2017

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Green Man Trust Limited is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Old Bank House, Beaufort Street, CRICKHOWELL, Powys, NP8 1AD.

1.1 Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Trust's [governing document], the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The Trust is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The Trust has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the Trust. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of freehold properties and to include investment properties and certain financial instruments at fair value. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the Trust.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the Trust is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the Trust has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the Trust has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for goods and services provided in the normal course of business, net of discounts, VAT and other sales related taxes.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2017

1 Accounting policies (Continued)

1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

- Costs of raising funds comprise the costs of commercial trading including the bar and coffee lounge and their associated support costs.
- Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of performances, exhibitions and other educational activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.
- Other expenditure represents those items not falling into any other heading.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

1.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.7 Financial instruments

The Trust has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the Trust's balance sheet when the Trust becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

1 Accounting policies (Continued)

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the Trust's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.8 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid after taking account of any trade discount due.

1.9 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity.

1.10 Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discount due.

Financial instruments

The Trust only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and are subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at at carrying value plus accrued interest less repayments. The financial charge to expenditure is at a consistent rate calculated using the effective interest method.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the Trust's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
