REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2017

The Directors have pleasure in submitting the Report and Accounts for the year.

Objects of the charity

The Trust seeks to demonstrate the Christian faith in action by the advancement of the Christian Religion and the relief of the aged, poor, sick and disabled in the Sutton Coldfield area.

Government

The Directors are responsible for strategic and financial oversight of the Church, health and safety, insurance, employment matters, and ensuring compliance with all relevant legal and charity obligations. They met regularly during 2017 and were consulted and informed on matters of importance. The Directors were: Stuart Crane, Philip Colthup, Andrew Pinder and Charlotte Senior. The current board of Directors has remained the same since incorporation. The charity's constitution allows new Directors to be appointed by a majority of the existing Directors. The term of office of any subsequent Directors shall be three years from the date of their appointment.

Real Life Church is led by Stuart Crane and Melanie Crane, together with a team of Senior Leaders. During the year the Senior Leaders were Mike and Sarah Brewer, Jonathan and Georgina Dean, Jeremy and Becky Douglas-Jones, Ben and Charlotte Senior, and Matt and Philippa Yates.

The Senior Leaders met frequently throughout the year to discuss and oversee the affairs and operational matters of the church. They work with a large number of volunteers to implement the vision, goals and objects of the Church. The Senior Leaders are given input and guidance from Andy Martin, an Apostle within the Catalyst network of churches to which Real Life Church belongs.

Real Life Church is a member of the Evangelical Alliance and is affiliated to Catalyst, an apostolic team within Newfrontiers, a worldwide family of churches.

Review of Activities

Build and strengthen the church

Meetings were held on Sundays in Sutton Coldfield to worship, to teach and to pray for those attending. Age appropriate teaching and activities were provided for under 18s. These are freely open to all to attend and our regular attendance increased throughout the year. Small mid week "Life Groups" for members of the church met throughout the year to help discipleship, build community and support each other practically. Regular mid-week meetings were held to pray for the work of the church and our local community. During this time we ran an Alpha course for people who were interested in exploring the Christian faith as well as the Freedom in Christ course and a marriage course for those who are part of the church. In August we took a group to Newday, a Bible week for young people.

Bless the local community

The church ran a number of craft and activity events for young children that were free and open to all. Messy Christmas was an activity afternoon in December aimed at young children and their parents to have fun expressing themselves through art and play. Messy Easter was in April and was similar to the Messy Christmas event. Around 150 children and their parents attended each event.

In April we ran a Tabletop Games day consisting of a session for families and children in the afternoon and one for adults in the evening. We also ran a 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt' Challenge during May in a local park that involved a Chocolate Egg hunt and woodland craft. These events were free to attend.

In June Real Life Church entered a team in the Great Midlands Fun Run, raising over £2,000 for Acacia Family Support, a local charity which offers pre and postnatal depression support services to families. We also took part in the Boldmere Music Festival where our band played and we ran a free craft stall for children.

In July we took part in the Sutton Games, a large community event involving many local sports clubs and groups. We ran an obstacle course aimed at young children and oversaw the live music for both days of the event.

In September we ran a craft stall with music at a "Big Sleuth" community event in Boldmere High Street.

Help the poor and those in need

Throughout the year we made regular donations of food, finance and support to a local food bank run from the United Reformed Church in Sutton Coldfield. We also provided volunteers to work at the Food Bank. We gave a gift of £500 to The Bridge Project, a local charity working with recovering addicts in the city.

In planning the activities the Directors have had regard to the guidance on public benefit issued by the Charity Commission.

Financial Review

Income this year was £198,000 [2016: £140,000] and expenditure was £152,000 [2016: £119,000] which resulted in a surplus this year of £46,000 [2016: £22,000].

The increase in income and expenditure when compared with the prior year is as a result of the continued growth of the church, its members and activities.

Reserves Policy

The Board of Directors have established a policy whereby free reserves held by the charity should be maintained at a reasonable level to meet foreseeable expenditure.

Risk Statement

The Directors have reviewed the risks to which a small charity operating with few employees is exposed. Appropriate procedures are in place to identify, monitor and review these risks on a regular basis.

Directors' Responsibilities

Charity law requires us as Directors to prepare financial statements for each accounting year which give a true and fair view of the state of the charity and of its income and expenditure for the year.

1. Select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently

2. Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent

3. State whether the applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the accounts.

4. Prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

We are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable us to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006.

We also have a responsibility to safeguard the assets of the charity and to take reasonable steps to prevent fraud or any other irregularities.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT

TO THE TRUSTEES OF

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2017

1 Accounting Policies

The accounts have been prepared under the historic cost convention, in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014; and with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The accounts have been prepared on the going concern basis, as there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue. Based on the adequacy of the charity's reserves as at the balance sheet date, along with their knowledge of the charity's ability to meet bills, payments and other liabilities as they fall due, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the charity has sufficient resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

The following are the accounting policies which have been applied in dealing with material items:-

a) <u>Donated and grant income:</u>

Donated income and grants receivable are taken into account when received by the charity. Income received in circumstances where a claim for repayment of tax has been or will be made to HM Revenue & Customs is grossed up for the tax recoverable. Any amount of tax reclaimed from HM Revenue & Customs but not yet received is shown within the charity's debtors.

The charity has relied significantly upon volunteers in carrying out its activities during the year. In accordance with paragraph 6.18 of the SORP, the role of volunteers has not been recognised as income from donated services in the accounts.

b) Other income and expenditure:

Investment income is taken into account when receivable and expenditure, including irrecoverable VAT, when incurred by the charity, regardless of when payment is made. Grants payable are taken into account at the earlier of when they are paid or become constructive obligations.

c) <u>Funds:</u>

Unrestricted funds are donations and other income received or generated for the objects of the charity without specified purpose and are available for purposes as directed by the trustees. Restricted funds are amounts received where the donor has specified the purpose for which it should be used.

d) Fixed assets and depreciation:

Equipment

Fixed assets acquired for use by the charity are capitalised and depreciated over their estimated useful life unless they cost less than £50 when they are written off on purchase.

Depreciation periods are as follows:

Between 3 and 7 years

e) Pension costs:

The company operates a defined contribution scheme for certain of its employees. Pension premiums are charged as they are paid.

f) <u>Taxation</u>

The company is a registered charity and is exempt from taxation under the Income & Corporation Taxes Acts.

g) <u>Cashflow statement</u>

The company has taken advantage of the exemption provided by the FRS 102 SORP and has not prepared a Cash Flow Statement for the year.

The charity has one full time equivalent employed staff. Its activities are generally carried out by volunteers.

Stuart Crane, a director, was paid £33,587 (2016: £32,640) in his capacity as leader of the church, and not as a trustee. His spouse received £12,850 (2016: £8,000) in her capacity as children and youth leader. Both of these payments are permitted by the governing document.

No staff received salaries at a rate of more than £60,000 per annum.

Remuneration payable to key management (excluding trustees) amounted to £12,850 in the year (2016: £8,000). Key management is considered to cover the church leader and children and youth leader directly employed by the charity.

No remuneration was paid to any other trustee during the year nor to any person connected to them.

The total amount of donations funded by trustees [and connected parties], and other related parties, was £36,231, of which £2,200 was restricted for Catalyst (2016: £23,002).

No other transactions have taken place with related parties during the year.
