# REVIEW OF THE YEAR 2017

#### THE VICAR'S REPORT - APRIL 2018

As most of you will know by now we have an agreed 'Mission Statement' which is as follows:

### Our Mission is to worship God; to grow as disciples; to love and care for all; and to reach out with the Good News of Jesus Christ.

This is a good mission statement and, frankly, it's hard to see how anyone could have a problem with it. It is clearly an accurate reflection on the mission that Christ handed to the Church.

#### The real questions are:

- How effectively are we currently fulfilling this mission? And:
- How can we fulfil this mission better?

Let's consider each aspect of our mission in turn.

#### 1. Our mission is to worship God.

The Bible describes worship in two ways. Firstly, worship is the act of declaring the greatness of God in our words and music. This is traditionally what people mean by worship: the singing of hymns and songs, and the recitation of liturgical acclamations.

But the Bible is also very clear that 'real worship' is when our lives give glory to God.

"I urge you, brothers and sisters, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God -this is your true worship." (Romans 12V1)

Therefore, in order to fulfil our mission 'to worship God", we must live lives that honour him, whilst also honouring him with our songs and our words.

To a degree we perform both aspects of worship as well as we can, given our limited resources. But a couple of points are worth making.

i. Regular attendance at Church. It is part of our Christian calling to gather together each Sunday to offer our worship to God. In fact, the third commandment instructs us to do so. It therefore seems to me that it should be rare for us to not come to Church. God deserves our worship, every week. So, I encourage you to make Sunday worship a priority.

- ii. 'Heartfelt praise.' We are not the best singers here at St Paul's. I think, perhaps, that small numbers can make us embarrassed to sing up. However, I was reading recently in 1 Chronicles 15 about David bringing the 'Ark of the LORD' into Jerusalem. He was "dancing and celebrating" (1 Chron 15v29) as the Ark arrived because he was so full of joy. So, may I encourage each of us to sing up and celebrate with joy at the love that God has for us in Jesus Christ.
- iii. 'A life of worship'. God calls us to express our love for Him in lives committed to Him. May we all do so, myself included.
- iv. Our relative lack of musicians and singers. I am so grateful for John Deacon and for Dave and Carol Disspain. What a blessing they are to us. But we really do need more musicians and singers to complement and add to their gifts. Please pray that God will bring more such people to us. And, if you have musical gifts that you are keeping hidden 'under a bushel', please speak to one of us and offer your gift in God's service.

#### 2. Our mission is to grow as disciples.

A disciple is, literally, a learner. The sermons preached at Church should be a highlight for each of us: an opportunity to listen, to learn more, and to grow as disciples. I would love to see more of us opening the Bibles and reading the passage as it is read to us. We could also usefully keep the Bible passage open during the sermon, to help us as we take in the message. We could even take notes as the sermon is preached.

Psalm 1 says: "Blessed are those who delight in the law of the LORD and meditate on his law day and night." So, let's 'delight' in the Bible as it is read and preached to us; and let us also read the Bible daily in a time of personal spiritual discipline. You might also consider joining one of the weekly Bible study groups. We currently have three, let by Ann Fernihough, Ian Reid, and one led by Luke and Sarah. Please speak to any of us if you would like to join the respective group. And if too many people want to join, we'll just start a new group.

Growing as disciples doesn't just happen. It is something we need to work at, but it gives great blessing. Psalm 1 continues by saying that those who do delight in the law of the LORD:

"are like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither -whatever they do prospers." (Psalm 1v3)

So, sink your roots deep into the Word of God, and you will be richly blessed, and more fruitful.

#### 3. Our mission is the love and care for all.

I think this is probably our 'strongest suit' at the moment. We are a caring and welcoming congregation, and we have a number of meetings and groups that 'love and care for' their members. These include the Women's Fellowship, the Mothers Union, the monthly 'Fish and Chip' supper and the Thursday Communion congregation. We also have three Bible study groups that provide love and care for their members, whilst also encouraging their members to grow as disciples.

Nevertheless, in spite of our relative strength in this area, the call remains for each of us to love and care for each other, and for those who do not yet attend Church.

It is worth reminding ourselves that Jesus said that our Christian faith can be summed up in two great commandments: 'Love God, and love your neighbour as yourself.' If the first of these commandments relates to our 'mission' to worship God, then surely the command to 'love your neighbour as yourself' relates to this third aspect of our mission. It is Christ's command that we love one another, so let's make this a hallmark of our Church.

### 4. Finally, our mission is to reach out with the Good News of Jesus Christ.

If 'love and care for all' is our strongest suit, this is perhaps our weakest. But it's not just us; the whole of the UK Church is in decline and has lost confidence in Christ's call to preach the Gospel.

Fifty odd years ago Billy Graham personified confident Christian evangelism. Twenty years ago, the Alpha Course used small groups to share our faith. I wonder what will work today? Perhaps we should run the Alpha Course. It certainly might be worth a try. But I think the days of Billy Graham style mass evangelism are largely over.

But whatever means we use, it remains true that Jesus Christ commissioned his Church to "go and make disciples of all nations." (Matthew 28v19-20.) I am concerned that the Church in the UK seems quite happy to disregard this call. Surely, we should take the explicit command of Jesus very seriously? Perhaps some of you share my concern and my desire to 'proclaim the gospel afresh to this generation.' If you do, please speak to me. Perhaps we could meet, pray, listen to God, and discern together how we might reach the people of Hook with the good news of Jesus Christ. May God help us to do so.

Thank you all for granting me the privilege of serving as your vicar. May we together fulfil the mission that God has given us.

#### **CHURCHWARDENS**

A Diocesan Quinquennial inspection was made in October 2016 and the architect's report received at the beginning of the year. It listed a number of maintenance items that require our attention, some urgent, some less so. We have repaired the kitchen roof, which was letting in water during heavy rain. We are also intending to re-point the South wall during the Summer. Other work will be done when funds allow. We received a faculty to place a further three memorial plaques on the West wall. These have been fixed and inscribed with the names of those whose ashes are interred in the new Garden of Remembrance.

The electrical wiring in the church has been needing replacement for a long time. Steve Griffiths drew up plans for a new electrical and lighting layout some time ago. We have now commissioned an electrical contractor with wide experience of church work to refine those plans and help us through the Faculty process for a complete re-wiring and new lighting. We have already put some funds away for this exciting project and soon we will have more accurate forecasts of the cost. It will require significant fundraising.

Finally, our thanks to all who have helped with the maintenance and decoration of the church and the churchyard over the last year. Without volunteers willing to give up their time St. Paul's would be a much poorer place.

#### **DEANERY SYNOD**

The Deanery Synod meets three times a year and the first part of the meeting is open to everyone.

The first meeting, in June was held at St George's Tolworth, and was mainly an introduction to new members of the Synod. The formal business of this meeting was election of roles within the Deanery Synod.

The second meeting in October was held at St Paul's Kingston Hill. The subject of the open part of the meeting was given by Ian Christie, a Senior Fellow in the Centre for Environmental Strategy at Surrey University and Environmental Adviser to Southwark Diocese and the Bishop of Kingston. His subject was Reducing our impact on the environment: a theological and practical response.

The third, and final meeting for this year was held in February at Emmanuel Church Tolworth. The first part of this meeting was a presentation by Joanne McCrone, Refugee Co-ordinator, on the role of Southwark Diocese's Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation Department. This is a small team of 7 who advise the Diocesan and Suffrage Bishops, and parishes on social justice issues. Rev'd Peter Holmes of St Peter's Norbiton said he had received a lot of practical help from them when setting up the Joel Project.

The first meeting of the New Year will be held on Tuesday 19<sup>th</sup> June at St John the Divine Church, New Malden. The speaker will be Anne Deering, Chair of the Lay Ministry Advisory Group. #### **PARISH PREMISES**



The Parish Hall is located 300 meters up the road from St Paul's Church. It is a large hall that is widely used during the week by many different groups within our community. At the weekends it is used mainly by families for children's parties and also for fundraising events by both St Paul's Church and other charities.

With regards to the upkeep of the hall, we re-invest the funds from the hire of the hall in to maintaining and improving the facilities. In the summer holidays of 2017 we modernised and updated the kitchen which was our major 2017 project. These works are still ongoing with the intention to install a larger cooker and a dishwasher to allow more varied functions to be held there. This has vastly improved this area and we have received a lot of positive feedback and compliments.

We have a programme of improvements lined up for future years which include new heating (please note this was on the list but has been pulled forward due to it failing in January 2018 - more about that next year.....), new front doors, outside signage display, replace windows not already replaced, flooring, the list goes on..... If you have any ideas you would like us to consider, please let the Parish Hall Committee know. In addition, we now have morning cleaning in the hall that happens before the first users arrive - if you see the lights on at 6am, this is our new cleaner, Charlie, who is supporting Bob, who does a mid-afternoon clean to help keep the hall tidy for our evening users.

#### **SAFEGUARDING**

Safeguarding is a word heard more and more in modern society, and the Church of England is no exception. The Parochial Church Council together with the incumbent carries a duty of care for the safety of those who attend or use the church. We have a statutory legal duty to pay "due regard to guidance issued by the House of Bishops on matters relating to the safeguarding of children and vulnerable adults."

What does this mean in practice? As a church family we aim to 'love and care for all'. Our PCC members, Vicar, Readers, SPAs, Churchwardens and Parish Administrator have undertaken Safeguarding training relevant to their role within the church, and Safeguarding is an agenda item at each PCC meeting. Those working with children and vulnerable adults have received a DBS check.

We have designated Safeguarding Officers and their details can be found on several posters around the church buildings. A link to 'A Safe Church' can be found on the parish website.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT 2017

2017 has been a more demanding year in terms of the Church finances compared with 2016 and as you will see this has had an impact on our bottom line with a final deficit of £9,900 compared with a profit of £30,598 in 2016.

If we turn to the Statement of Financial Activity on pages 4 & 5 we can review the main causes of this.

Collections and Planned Giving has remained fairly consistent on 2016 with a slight increase of £1,330. I have split out the Gift Aid figures as requested and this shows that the value for 2017 is slightly lower than 2016, this is because Gift Aid collections have been delayed for 2017. £9,440 of the 2017 figure Gift Aid is the claim for 2016.

A claim for 2017 is still to be made and is expected to be in the region of £12,000. I have not provided an accrual for this as agreed with the Church Warden and Vicar as we prepare the accounts on a cash basis, we will therefore see this amount come into the 2018 accounts.

Moving down you will also see a significant decrease in donations this year, we received over £7,000 more one-off donations in 2016. We do recognise this was exceptional and cannot necessarily be replicated, or expected, going forward and we do thank you for your generosity and your continued support.

The other significant decreases in income to note are for Weddings, Funerals and Memorials due to the decrease in weddings in 2017, unfortunately we also do not have any weddings booked for 2018 as yet either.

Fundraising and fete income has increased by nearly £1,000 this year.

This year saw an increase in Total Expenditure of £24,875. The two main causes of which are the increased payment to the Diocese by £6,000 (however this is still £6,000 lower than we paid in 2015). Our pledge for 2018 has increased by just 2% to £53,652. The second is the Parish Hall expenses that have increased this year due to building works costing just over £20,500, however general upkeep has reduced by £5,000 seeing a net increase in Parish Hall expenses of around £15,000.

Another increase in expenditure worthy of mention is in the Repairs & Renewals line which was due to the Mary Wise kitchen roof repairs costing £1,464.

Moving to the Balance Sheet on pages 2 & 3, this represents the cash we hold in our bank accounts. This totals £92,695 split between the Church accounts of £59,652 and the Parish Hall accounts of £33,043.

I have also now split out the electrics fund to represent this as restricted funds.
