The main activities of Kilburn Older Voices Exchange (KOVE) in 2017-18 were:

- a) Organising community forums to discuss issues of concern to local older people, and identify issues to campaign on.
- b) Organising meetings to provide older people with information on issues such as health, transport and local facilities.
- c) Organising local walks to provide both exercise and a social activity to overcome isolation.
- d) To support a local film club to provide social activity and overcome isolation.
- e) To make films about local issues to help campaigns on facilities for local older people.
- f) To work in partnership with other organisations in the local area and in London to promote the charity's objectives, in particular Ageing Better in Camden, Age UK Camden and the National Pensioners Convention.
- g) To publicise activities and facilities for older people.
- h) To campaign for better street furniture, in particular benches, for older people; to campaign for better public transport facilities and to campaign for better public toilet facilities.

The trustees are aware of the guidance from the Charity Commission on public benefit.

We regularly involve volunteers in our work. Areas where volunteers make an important contribution include the local walks, community forums and the film club we support.

Volunteers are also involved in the meetings of our Steering Group, and meetings organised by Ageing Better in Camden and Age UK Camden.

We recruited 13 new volunteers during the year.

This has been another busy and productive year for KOVE. The main areas of our work are those funded by Ageing Better in Camden. However, we manage to combine with this with our campaigns on facilities for older people, and trying to reduce barriers to older people going out and being active in their local community. Our overall aim is to reduce social isolation among older people in our area.

One of the major issues we have campaigned on has been transport. We produced a new film, *All Aboard!*, which looked at some of the issues and challenges older people face using buses. Most of the film was KOVE members and members of the public talking about their experiences, which in our view is the best way to get our message across. We have continued to raise with Transport for London and Camden Council issues around bus stops, including the type of seating provided, the need for shelter and the need for indicator boards that show when buses are due. We attended Camden's annual meeting on transport issues. Some of these problems are frustratingly slow to resolve. For example, one particular bus stop, which it is accepted needs work done on it, is part of a larger contract that has to go out to tender.

A very positive development was a meeting we held with TfL and some bus drivers at Cricklewood Bus Garage. This gave some of our members the chance to raise concerns directly with the TfL staff 'in the front line', as well as listen to the issues the drivers face in doing what is a demanding job.

Another obstacle to older people going out is the provision – or lack of it – of public toilets. We issued a guide to public toilets in our area which was sent to all our members in March 2018. However, since it was produced, the public toilets at Kilburn (Jubilee Line) Station have been closed. We are going to take this up with TfL. We have also continued to support the Camden Council Community Toilet Scheme, and have worked with the Friends of Hampstead Cemetery to try to establish public toilet facilities for visitors to the Cemetery.

We produced four editions of our newsletter, which goes to all our members and to local libraries, community centres and voluntary groups in our area. We also produce individual leaflets to publicise different activities. Every new member is sent a copy of our annual report and information about KOVE and our activities.

Roads and crossings

Older people already find crossing the road at the Swiss Cottage gyratory system a difficult experience, particularly for those who find going up and down steps difficult and cannot use the underground station as a subway, but have to cross at street level. In our view, this will undoubtedly become worse when the changes at Swiss Cottage come in with the introduction of the Cycle Superhighway. We were in regular correspondence about this with Andrew Dismore, the GLA Member for Camden and Barnet. He raised the matter on several occasions in written questions to the Mayor. Some of his questions mentioned KOVE, and we would like to thank him for his support. We will continue to monitor the situation and attend meetings about it. This issue was originally discussed by our local forum in the area, then our Steering Group, so what we were doing reflected the views of older people in the area.

Another transport issue we are currently working on is Kilburn High Road. There are a lot of different issues that make this important road (with many

shops, cafes, buses etc) challenging for older people. With one of our members, who walks slowly with sticks, we 'tested' the road crossing times and she found it very difficult to cross in the allocated time. This was covered by the *Camden New Journa*l, although sadly the main focus of their story was about an older person who was killed crossing the road in the area the day before.

We have had a meeting with Camden's transport planners about Kilburn High Road, and discussed various issues with them. There are plans for improvements, but transport issues can be complex, with different factors to consider – for example, longer road crossing times makes the traffic and buses slower, which TfL are not happy about.

Benches

As part of our work on Kilburn High Road, we are also continuing to campaign for more benches, which can be very important for older people. They offer the chance to have a short rest when out shopping, or can just be somewhere to sit in the sun for a short while.

We were shocked when a bench KOVE had campaigned for was stolen from outside the entrance to Grange Park on Kilburn High Road. With significant financial support from Age UK Camden and Camden Council, we managed to get a new bench installed, this time set in concrete! We had an 'opening ceremony' for it, which was covered in the *Camden New Journal*. Also on Kilburn High Road, we reported to Camden that their bench by Lloyds Bank was in need of repair, and were pleased that it has now been replaced with a new one.

We were pleased to support one of our members, Pran Handa, and his family, in having a new bench installed by the bus stop outside Waitrose by Finchley Road Station, in memory of his wife. We have also successfully applied to Brent Council to use some of the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) money for the Kilburn Ward to have four new benches installed on or near Kilburn High Road. We will continue to look for new sites for benches and access local funding if it is available.

Our Sidings Community Centre Forum members arranged for a plaque to be fitted on a bench at West Hampstead Thameslink Station, dedicated to two local campaigners: Ruth Baillie and Iris Chapple.

Activities

All our main activities are funded through Ageing Better in Camden. Thank you to all their staff for their support and help. We would also like to thank Keeping Active Together (KAT) for their financial support for our Walks programme and the Waitrose Community Fund for their ongoing support for our activities.

We hold regular community forums in Swiss Cottage and West Hampstead, and work with the Kilburn & West Hampstead Pensioners Action Association to support their monthly meetings. We also support the monthly meetings of the Stroke Freedom Group, which meets at Sidings Community Centre, and the members arranged speakers for the group. Following a successful meeting in March 2017 about Arthritis, we have set up an Arthritis Group that meets regularly. This has now developed a core of regular members, although some cannot attend on occasions for health reasons. We have worked with Arthritis Action, who have provided speakers for some meetings, although we do not have a 'formal' partnership with them.

We also did some work during the year with tenants in housing association sheltered housing schemes, who had concerns about how the schemes were being managed. We drew up a policy document on this issue following discussions with them. However, disappointingly there was not enough support for a regular group to start meeting. The research we did was useful, and formed the basis of an amendment we sent to the National Pensioners' Convention to a document on housing for older people that they had produced.

Our walks programme continued to be very popular. We included more walks outside our immediate area, including St John's Wood, Belsize Park, Kenwood House and the Design Museum in Kensington. One had to be shortened due to a heatwave, while another took place in snow, at Kenwood House. We were

unsure if anyone would attend, but nine members came, showing determination not to miss out! Part of the House was closed when we got there because the volunteers stewards had not been able to get in because of the snow. It was still an enjoyable afternoon and we are returning there in the summer.

We continued to support and publicise the Reel Local Film Club. We showed a variety of films, and facilitated a discussion about the film over a cup of tea or coffee after each showing. This provides an extra social element to this activity, and also helps draw up future programmes.

We have always supported Intergenerational activities. Our main one this year was The Mad Hatters Tea Party at Belsize Park Library. Organised by Library committee member and KOVE member Myra Newman, this was an event to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the birth of Arthur Rackham, the illustrator of the original *Alice in Wonderland* books, who lived in the area. Young people from the Elfrida Rathbone Camden group attended along with KOVE members. We welcomed the Mayor of Camden, Councillor Richard Cotton, who wore the official Mayor's Hat for the occasion. John Miles, our Research Associate, did a reading from *Alice in Wonderland* and it was a very enjoyable afternoon. Further intergenerational activities have since taken place at Belsize Library with a group of young mothers and their children in partnership with The Winch.

John and Frances Eley are on the committee for Camden Intergenerational activities, which John chairs. John also makes an important contribution to KOVE's work, linking us into academic research and speakers. He is also extremely knowledgeable about older people's issues. He also organised our Age Research Forum in March.

We have continued to work with the Webheath Tenants and Residents Association. They have now set up a strong committee, and say that the estate feels more 'cared for'. This benefits the older people living on the estate, who have a better environment and have more say about the estate. Our thanks to Lynda Stuart for her sterling work on this.

There were two new activities, which both attracted new members. One was Adult Colouring, which was facilitated by Davi Kothari, one of our volunteers, at Sidings Community Centre. The other was a Men's Keep Fit class, organised by Keeping Active Together at West Hampstead Community Centre, and partly funded by KOVE. It is often difficult to get men involved in our activities, and this course was very successful. KAT has now secured some more funding for men's activities, and we will continue to support them.

Governance

The trustees and Steering Group met regularly during the year. We also organised a special meeting to discuss policies, and will continue the work of reviewing KOVE's structures and policies. Our thanks to the trustees and members who regularly attend the Steering Group. Also, at the October 2017 AGM, Barry Peskin retired as our Chair, and was replaced by Ags Irwin. Ags brings to KOVE many years experience in the voluntary sector, and has been very supportive and helpful to us.

With the temporary closure and refurbishment of Kingsgate Resource Centre, we moved our meetings to Sycamore Community Hall. That has now become a permanent move, because the new Kingsgate Centre is very busy and does not have space for us. We would like to thank the staff there for their support of KOVE over many years, in particular Lesley Rowe MBE. We would also like to thank Bernie O'Hara, the Scheme Manager at Sycamore Court, and a longstanding supporter of KOVE, for making us welcome at Sycamore Court.

With the changes at Kingsgate Resource Centre, we needed to move our official charity address, and would like to thank Training Link for offering us this facility, as well as the occasional use of meeting space.

We keep our members informed about our activities through a quarterly newsletter. This is sent to every member, as well as to community centres, libraries, doctor's surgeries and other community groups in our area. We also do individual leaflets and posters for the films and forums. We also publicise events through our website, which is now run through Wix.com and through various

	listings pages in websites and the <i>Camden New Journal</i> . We would like to thank Tony Ellis for his work on the website for some years. With the change to running it through Wix, we can now update it ourselves. Thanks to Tracey Hamilton for doing the initial work on the new website.
	For our funders, Ageing Better in Camden, which itself is funded by the Big Lottery, there is quite a lot of administrative work to do. We have to keep records of membership and activities on the Charity Log website. We attended quarterly monitoring meetings to discuss our work, and also attend meetings of all the groups involved in the project. These are very useful to hear what other
	groups are doing and if there are opportunities for joint work. Our members also attend the Older Peoples Action Group (OPAG) meetings organised by Ageing Better in Camden. Our thanks to all the staff at Ageing Better in Camden. Another very positive development has been the creation of the Outreach team by Ageing Better in Camden. They can do membership recruitment work on our behalf, which has resulted in people joining KOVE and getting involved. Overall, it has been a very positive year for Kilburn Older Voices Exchange.
