Structure, governance and management

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. All Church attendees are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC.

Objectives and Activities

Guisborough Parochial Church Council (PCC) has the responsibility of co-operating with the Rector, The Revd. Alison Phillipson in promoting, in the ecclesiastical parish, the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. It also has maintenance responsibilities for St Nicholas Church, the Church Hall and the Curacy situated at 16 Lealholm Way, Guisborough.

Achievements and Performance

Church Attendance

There are 379 parishioners on the Church Electoral Roll, 18 of who are not resident within the parish. The average weekly attendance across all services is 190 adults and 25 children. This number is increased at Festivals. This does not include Funerals, Baptisms, Marriages, Prayer Space, Messy Church or Morning Prayer. There are also 90 home/house communions per month

PCC Secretary's Report

The PCC as at December 2017 consisted of 23 members, by law including the Rector as Chair, two Churchwardens and five ex-officio members by virtue of their election to the Deanery Synod. The remainder were elected at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting normally for a period of three years or co-opted to the Committee. The number of members to be elected for three years is as determined by the previous year's APCM; for election in 2017, and the previous two years, the number had been five.

The PCC is required to report annually on the parish's finances, its fabric, the current Electoral Roll and the Deanery Synod and these reports will be found within.

The Council has continued to develop our mission for the future in the following areas: -

- Develop Discipleship
- Develop different styles of worship
- Develop Generosity
- Develop Communication

To be more effective in delivering these objectives the PCC agreed to re-structure its sub teams. The following teams were created - Children and Young People, Mission and Evangelism, Events, Resources Group, Communications Hub, Buildings Team and Church Hall Team. This structure allows the PCC to be more aligned to the messages that have come

from the Leading Your Church into Growth (LYCIG) work. Although early days for some of these sub teams, the early indications are positive and we hope that in 2018 we will see the benefits of this structure.

Develop Discipleship - During the year the PCC, along with members of the congregation, continued to progress the Leading Your Church into Growth (LYCIG) initiative. A series of successful meetings with the wider congregation were held where three initial priorities were clear - 1) Church Family, 2) Communication, 3) Christian Learning. The PCC are taking these areas forward through the sub teams and have regularly discussed progress. The PCC, and the sub teams, will continue to progress these ideas in 2018 and provide further information and engagement with the wider congregation. In addition to LYCIG a further Pilgrim course, was run in the autumn and was well attended. Our commitment to the younger members of our congregation has also continued with "Messy" church now a feature of the Churches calendar and the Youth Group providing a vehicle for the slightly more mature, younger members.

Develop different styles of worship - The PCC has been pleased to progress a long-standing objective of re-ordering the Church to facilitate different styles of worship in the future. An architect was engaged to provide ideas for how our Church could look in future years and an Open Day was held where members of the congregation were invited along to provide feedback and challenge to the options available to us. The process was very well received with a lot of comments and questions but overall the PCC has received overwhelmingly positive support for the ideas presented. The process continues and further information will be available in 2018.

Develop Generosity - The PCC agreed to increase our Freewill Offering for 2018. This has been possible in no small part to the efforts of the congregation in supporting Church Events. Whether that is helping with Fellowship, playing a part on stage or simply attending the event, the generosity of our congregation and wider community is outstanding especially given the challenging economic environment we find ourselves in. To support this generosity the PCC continues to be prudent when setting budgets and has had success in cutting costs. The PCC has also continued to take advantage of any grants that may be available to assist with the financing of the Church and Church Hall. The PCC has also continued to give to a range of Charities and good causes throughout the year.

Develop Communication - 2017 has seen the Choir thrive. Chris Nixon and the team have developed a number of initiatives including growing the numbers in the choir and the music events that the Choir participate in or bring to the Church. One major project the PCC have undertaken is the purchase and installation of a new sound system. This has greatly improved the auditory environment within our Church. The PCC has budgeted to install WiFi in the Church in 2018 providing another mechanism to aid communication. The PCC are currently reviewing the use of the website to see whether more can be made from this channel of communication. The Church Magazine continues to be a key pillar in the church's communication plans and is continually reviewed for any improvements that can be made.

Reports on the PCC's committees and other church activities appear within and our thanks are due to the leaders who have contributed them.

The Rector writes

Dear Friends

What a busy and successful year 2017 has been. Thank you to all who have played their part within that, encouraging lots of new people into the life of this church in various ways. We receive lots of positive comments from new people who find this to be a very friendly and welcoming church, but not only is it friendly, it has also proved to be a place where new people can come and actually make new friendships and that has been a joy to see. I am constantly impressed and often moved to see the care that people here offer to others, often those who are elderly and/or vulnerable, who wouldn't otherwise be able to come to church or join in our activities and who just generally show a very caring and compassionate side to this church. This of course is you living out your discipleship, as we are all commanded to do by Jesus.

So, a good year and a year of consolidation. Great team work, lots more people getting involved and feeling able to do that without any sense that they may be 'stepping on other people's toes' - there is absolutely no place for that sort of response towards people who want to play their part in the life of the church. There is a wonderful hymn that we have recently begun to sing called 'Let Us Build a House Where Love Can Dwell' (no. 432) - the chorus says this: 'All are welcome, all are welcome, all are welcome in this place'. It is worth reading this hymn through next time you have a hymn book in your hands. Indeed, all are welcome here, regardless of anything that society or minority groups within the Christian Church would use to cause division; colour, perceived status, sexuality, gender, or anything else that can be used to make people think they are not worthy - we are all beloved children of God, and this place should constantly strive to reflect that.

Some highlights of the past year have been:

- Our LYCiG Local meetings held before and during Lent, where many attended and showed their support for our church, as well as sharing their hopes and dreams for what might be possible here. There were many people saying they want to be more involved and committed to their church. Something to keep building upon.
- Our parish trip to the Isle of Cumbrae immediately after Easter, where friendships were built upon and where new friendships were made amongst members of our choir and congregation. A great time of relaxation, fun and worship.
- In July we held our now long established and much loved Open Door, where again all the Year 5 children of Guisborough experienced a whole day of fun, activities, learning and music in church. We had many new helpers this year who had as good a time as the children it seemed. Thank you to Margaret & Judy for all your hard work and to all your many helpers, remember there is always room for more, so look out for this again in July.
- We held confirmation preparation for both children and adults. It is always a joy to
 welcome and celebrate with people who have decided to take this important step on
 their Christian journey.
- In September we welcomed Canon Angela Bailey who took us through the 'Being Christian' course, which followed a book by the same name written by Rowan Williams a former Archbishop of Canterbury. Many people attended and felt they had learned something new about their faith, which is great because there is always more for us all to learn it's a lifelong process and we are never too old to grow and develop in faith. There are more courses planned for 2018.

We also held many social events throughout the year, a great opportunity to create and build friendships within the church. There was 'Joseph' alongside our choir concert, then we had what has now become our annual Schools Choir Festival, this year it was super to see Highcliffe and Galley Hill schools joining us, we hope more Guisborough schools will in 2018. And of course, we held so many other events, almost too many to mention here, but thank you all who organise and attend all these many events and fundraising efforts - all good fun and fellowship in the life of the church.

December was an incredibly busy month, during the course of which we welcomed nearly 3000 people into our church. There was the Mayor of Redcar & Cleveland's Charity Christmas Concert. Then we held the fabulous production of The Snowman, with our own choir and orchestra, as well as children from local schools. It was quite staggering how it all came together so brilliantly - again great team work from a huge number of helpers. We also introduced for the first time, Shadow Theatre into church in the form of a very good and moving showing of Shadow Nativity, again involving our choir and local schoolchildren (Highcliffe School). If you missed this, child or adult, then you did miss a treat. And of course, all our usual special Christmas worship, which attracted so many people into church, as we celebrated together the birth of Jesus. Thank you to all concerned, especially Chris, Sue & Geoff, who made this an exhausting, yet wonderful Christmas. We wouldn't have missed it for anything!

Throughout the year there has been a lot of work going on in the background working with our architect on our major re-ordering project. We must as a church have an eye to the future and how we can best make our building not only a warm and welcoming place, but also a place that is versatile and relevant for modern use, i.e. catering facilities, toilets, and space where people and groups can meet for learning and social activities. This was something that came out of our LYCiG Local meetings very strongly, people especially wanted us to cater better for our children to enable us to better encourage them into faith and learning. It was good to see so many of you at our Open Day in December, where we met with our architect and discussed our possible plans - all very supportive and encouraging. We are hopeful that real progress will be made during 2018. Another thing that came from the LYCiG meetings, was the desire for a lending library in church of good, modern Christian books. We were also very fortunate to receive two generous gifts of money for this purpose, so that will appear very soon where the pigeon holes are located in church.

It is also good to see how many couples want to make this church the place where they make their vows to each other in marriage, and the place where many parents still consider Baptism to be relevant. At the time of writing we have 25 weddings booked for 2018, with many coming in for 2019.

I would therefore like to encourage us all to continue working together on making this an open and warm church, a church that can become more relevant to the people of Guisborough, and a church where all feel welcome to come and be, and explore what it might mean for them to have God at the centre of their lives.

As a church I believe our task now is to concentrate on consolidating what we've recently achieved, to help to nurture and encourage new disciples, and to work on developing our own growth in faith. It is only in the power of the Holy Spirit and with Jesus by our side that we achieve anything. So again, I commend to your prayers, that the Holy Spirit would move in this place and move within our lives, constantly renewing us and encouraging us as we seek to do God's work and will, to allow God to grow his church here in Guisborough, and that we would be willing to allow God to grow and transform us in order for that to happen; allowing God to be God in this church.

As I close this report I would like to record some words of thanks:

Firstly, and especially I would like to thank Alwyn and John who are super Churchwardens to work with, incredibly hardworking, faithful and supportive. My thanks also to our wonderful team of Deputy Wardens, again such faithful and willing workers. My huge thanks also go to our Readers, Sue & Geoff and to the retired priests who live in Guisborough, who offer so much help and support in what is a very large and busy parish, quite what I would do without them, I don't know. I would also like to offer my thanks to Gail my secretary, whose hard work, support and commitment is so often above and beyond!

Finally, I would again like to take this opportunity to thank all those who give so very generously of their time, talents and money to the life and work of this church, it is very much appreciated, too many to mention, but I am confident you know who you are. So many wonderful things go on in this parish, the above mentioned are but a few, and they wouldn't happen without you! I also want to thank those who do so much unseen work in our church; again, I am sure you know who you are. Thank you.

Last but certainly not least, I want to offer my thanks to the PCC and to members of the Ministry Team whom I greatly value for their advice, support and willingness to do what they do. It's a great privilege for me to do the work I do, and I am so grateful for all the good and positive things we have done together this past year.

So, let us get on cheerfully together with the tasks that God has called us all to do, and let's always be ready to go out in peace, to love and serve the Lord.

Churchwardens Report

Much of this year has been spent organising and preparing for reordering the Church. As a result of several meetings and discussions work was carried out to produce initial briefing proposals that were submitted to the Church architect. These proposals were further amended over a period of time and Statements of Significance and Statements Need written and again submitted to the architect. Subsequently architects visited the



Church to collate information in order to produce initial sketches. The sketches were further amended in light of more discussions and plans produced and presented to the parishioners, community and any other interested parties in early December 2017. Feedback has resulted in the architect improving the plans ready for presentation to the Diocesan Advisory Committee for its scrutiny and suggestions. We're well aware that the process is very slow and cumbersome. Once the final detailed plans are received faculties will be applied for, then work can begin. It has been indicated that it is hoped to see the first signs of reordering by the end of this year.

Over the past year the Leading Your Church into Growth Programme has gone from strength to strength. After successfully running the course in Church we are indebted to the many people who attended and shared their opinions and ideas. This enabled a thorough evaluation to be conducted and highlighted several key points deemed essential for the future development at St Nicholas. The PCC was restructured into new working teams to tackle these issues and charged with keeping the LYCIG philosophy central to their functioning. The plans made in LYCIG meetings are now bearing fruit. We feel that we are

now a more open and welcoming Church, our events calendar is excessive, our worship is varied and comprehensive, our lists of helpers and volunteers are impressive and the workings of the PCC have been reformed.

LYCIG is not to be forgotten, but is now perceived that its philosophy is firmly accepted and established into our modus operandi. As a result, awareness has been heightened and we are all charged with the mission of trying to improve and grow as individuals and as a Church within the Guisborough community.

The congregation is growing, and it is good to see so many new faces. The Choir too is expanding both in numbers and activities. A trip to Cumbrae and the hugely successful 'Snowman' were just two of the activities this year. It is particularly good that both the Choir and the congregation are coming together to enjoy worship and leisure activities to help grow our church family.

Thank you to all involved in planning and carrying out both new and exciting activities and also to those who carry on with the groundwork of keeping the church alive and flourishing.

- That means everyone, the new and those who have attended faithfully for years.

Safeguarding

We take the safety and well-being of all people (especially children and young people, and vulnerable adults) who come into contact with the church very seriously, and have continued to develop our safeguarding policies and procedures, in order to comply with York Diocese policies, advice, and best practice.

During 2017, in accordance with Diocese policy, all members of the PCC were Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) checked (a check as to the suitability of people to work with vulnerable groups, including children), as well as leaders and relevant volunteers of the various church groups. DBS checking is now done on-line, making the process much quicker and easier.

A lot of work has been done this year on raising awareness of the need for good safeguarding practices, in particular by ensuring that all groups are aware of their responsibilities, with C1 training provided for those involved with activities involving Children, Young People and/or Vulnerable Adults, C2 training for those with safeguarding 'leadership' responsibilities or responsibility for leading activities involving children, young people, and or adults that may be vulnerable, and C3 training for those who are licensed or have permission to officiate from a Bishop, lay or ordained.

In 2018, York Diocese will be providing on-line safeguarding training, a more flexible approach that will enable volunteers to undertake safeguarding training at a time suitable for them.

The Child Protection Policy will be reviewed in the coming year, to ensure it remains in line with guidance and best practice provided by York Diocese, pending the introduction of a national Church of England template. We will also introduce a Vulnerable Adults Policy in line with York Diocese information and advice.

Fabric Group

We have a maintenance plan for the Church, and are producing a similar plan for the Church Hall, which we try to follow each year.

The main aim of the fabric group is to keep the church watertight. To meet this any water that lands on the church needs to drain away. This means keeping the gulleys on the roof, the gulleys at ground level and U bends, kept clear of tree debris and rubbish. A constant battle.



The growth of ivy on the church walls has been controlled.

The mice have been controlled by setting traps monthly. Often no mice caught but can be one or two.

The lighting system in the church has needed constant re lamping.

The bollards on the land in front of the church are serviced by us twice a year or they stop working.

This year we have solved some problems which have been with us for some time.

- The locks on the church doors have been changed. The problem has been the
 ease of copying keys. This has meant it has been impossible to control who has
 keys. The poorly copied keys have also caused problems for the locks themselves.
 The keys for the new locks cannot be copied. The new locks are working
 extremely well.
- The church heating system has sprung leaks. The leaks have been repaired but after several leaks, all in the same area, we began to question why this was happening. After talks with the installer it was suggested that the problem was caused by the piping not having enough flexibility to cope with the expansion and contraction as the pipes cycle through changes in water temperature. The installer has now built some flexibility into the piping in the affected area. We expect this to cure the problem; time will tell.
- The church lighting has been using tungsten bulbs. Light emitting diode (LED) bulbs which fit the existing light fittings have been found. This year all the light fittings east of the chancel arch have been converted to LEDs. These seem to be working well. The advantage is not only the considerable savings in electricity but also a much reduced need to climb up a high ladder to change bulbs. It is hoped to do the same with the rest of the lights in the church in 2018.
- The grade 2 listed wall between the church hall grounds and Bow Street is being pushed, at one point, by tree roots. In this area the wall is leaning towards the pavement below and our architect has said "it needs repairing sooner rather than later." The year has been spent trying to sort out the way forward. It has been agreed that the listed wall must be repaired and that to do this the offending tree, which has a preservation order on it, must be removed. The permission for this has been obtained from the council and Lord Gisborough. The permission from the council requires us to plant a new tree. The work should happen in 2018.

The costs of hiring the fire extinguishers, required by our insurer, in both the Church and Church Hall, was looking expensive. The end of our agreed period of hire was coming to an end so our agreement has not been renewed. New extinguishers have been obtained from another supplier, who will carry out yearly checks. The 5-yearly check of the electrical system in the church, due in 2017, has been carried out.

We maintain a list of outstanding actions; 25 actions, of varying sizes, have been completed.

It is perhaps worth mentioning that this year has been a year of *putting things on wheels*. The paschal candle stand, the crossing altar, the large on trial organ and the clavinova.

Our thanks to all who have helped to achieve what we have achieved, particularly to those who have rolled up their sleeves and given their own skills and time to help the church through another year.

Communications Hub

With this in mind, Nicky Clay has asked all church groups to provide information about their activities and who to contact. It was felt to be beneficial to work in two sub-groups to cover the various aspects of communication in the life of our church;

Electronics (Web-site, Priority, and Pew-sheet) Posters, Publicity and Events team.

<u>Website</u>: Sue Hood is now Website-Coordinator. Following discussions between Sue, Nicky, Louise and James Patterson, our current website designer, changes to the design and presentation have recently been implemented. Work is still on-going to make the site more colourful and interesting.

Priority: Nicky Clay and Louise Brownlie are now 'Priority' coordinators.

There are approximately 326 subscribers, 267 hard copy and 26 e-mail.

The amount of time and commitment made by the editors was acknowledged by the members of the 'hub' and highlighted within 'Priority.' Subscriptions remain at £7.00 for hard copy and £5.00 for e-mail. A new system for collection of subscriptions was devised and implemented. It was estimated that the income from 'Priority' would be £3,000. At the last meeting it was agreed that the colour of the cover should be the same every month; for this year, a bold blue.

<u>Pew-sheet</u>: Judi Ellis is Pew-sheet editor, (and minute taker for the 'Hub'.)

There have been no major changes during the year.

<u>Posters, Publicity and Events Team</u>: Julie Duffy is responsible for posters and up-dating information on outside events to be held in the church and Church Hall. John Simmonds continues to inform the local press about events held by St Nicholas Church.

Thanks have been expressed to Brian Gleeson, local correspondent of Stockton and Darlington Times for his coverage and support through the year.

Thanks to all members of the Communications Hub for your input and support. (and many thanks to Gail for her assistance and advice.)

Messy Church

Messy Church continues to meet on a bi-monthly basis. At each session we teach the Gospel in a short worship slot that is very relaxed and designed to be accessible to children and adults alike. We then take part in many craft activities and games to explore each theme in greater detail. At the end of each session we all come together to sing some songs, and then share in food and fellowship.

So far, this year we have covered the themes: -

- Promises (based on God's Promise to Noah),
- Mothers and others (looking at the theme of mothering and nurturing),
- Good Friday (using the book the 'Super Cool Story of Jesus'),
- > 7 days of Creation,
- ➤ The feeding of the 5,000
- the Parable of the Good Samaritan
- 'Forgiveness' (using the story of story of Joseph forgiving his brothers).

We introduced Good Friday Messy Church in April exploring Jesus' death and resurrection, using the book 'The Super Cool Story of Jesus' telling the amazing story of how Jesus lived and loved. The service was very well attended (attracting 48 children and 40 adults).

We have been really encouraged by the number of families who have been attending over recent months, and have been blessed and encouraged by families who continue to return for each session, and for whom Messy Church is either their main Church involvement, or supplements the other Church services and activities they attend.

We continue to receive lots of positive feedback from parents and children alike who comment on the way that Messy Church offers a friendly and welcoming atmosphere, and is enjoyed by all members of the family.

The Messy Church Planning team feel very blessed to be leading the Messy Church congregation and are looking forward to continued growth both in numbers and spiritually. The Ministry Team

The Ministry Team works closely with the Servers and the Choir in a Community of Service to assist the Rector and the congregation in worship. We aim to ensure a dignified and proper observance of the liturgy and maintain a prayerful atmosphere in Eucharistic services. With other members of the congregation we read lessons and lead intercessions.

Our Eucharistic Ministers are licensed by the Bishop of Whitby both to assist at communion services in church and to take consecrated bread and wine to those in the community who cannot get to church. These include people in their own homes who are ill or very elderly and those in residential homes who are part of our St Nicholas family.

Those of us who have the privilege of going out into the community find that services vary from a gathering in a communal room in one of the residential homes, joining in communion, sometimes singing hymns, chatting to residents, having a cup of tea and a biscuit, to just quietly ministering to one person. Our duties occasionally take in opening the door for deliveries, taking letters to the post and helping with jigsaws!

We usually have a monthly service and are very grateful to the staff in the residential homes who gather together the residents, most of whom are elderly, disabled or infirm, and we try to be consistent so that we present a familiar face and form of service. We minister to approximately 90 people a month.

In one of the homes we currently offer pastoral support in the form of singing hymns and fellowship and hope to expand this ministry to listening and chatting to residents who lack companionship. Our ministry in the community is available to all who need it; we would rather see in church those who can get there and have a team of willing drivers who will collect those who have no transport - they do take them home as well! For those who are unable to come to us either for a short time for recovery from illness or surgery or who are incapacitated through illness or infirmity, we will do our best to minister to you. We are all called to God's service; please pray for us as we do for you.

Thank you to Steve Maltby for helping us with this and for his continued support and encouragement.

Cabaret Dinner

Kian and Chloe organised a fabulous dinner with our ladies. They performed a whole range of songs from the shows ably assisted by Sonia and a few others. The evening included a wartime singalong enthusiastically led by some of our more elderly members of the congregation. It was a super evening and raised around £1000 for our funds.

The Organ

During the year we had an organ advisor come and look at the organ with a view to ideas for the future. This will be no doubt covered in other parts of our Annual Report but we are very pleased to have a new digital organ called Magnus for our worship. It is a fabulous instrument and takes up significantly less space, sounds so much better, is great for accompanying and sets us up for the 21st Century! Thank you to all who have helped support Magnus. We had an open day to look at Magnus and organists Steve Maltby, Robert Webb and myself played for our congregation. This was attended by the Mayor of Guisborough.

Children's choir festival

This was held in October in Church and saw hundreds of children from across the area performing at our church for the second year running. They sang both secular and sacred music. A fabulous event that involved hundreds of people in our community enjoying the performances by our local children including those from some Guisborough Schools. Children's Fellowship

The Children's Fellowship runs alongside church services and not instead of them. It is held on Sunday mornings after the morning service. Many of the children attend the service first as part of the congregation or as choir members. New children at CF are invited to all the church activities.



The group meets in the Church Hall and we use the space for running about games and also for messy crafts.

There is teaching in Bible stories, children's prayers that the children read, children's worship songs and the Lord's Prayer. I constantly update the content of the Children's Fellowship and spend several hours each week preparing material and activities. I would be very grateful if members of the congregation could identify children in their lives who would enjoy the group and church attendance is not required at first but we will encourage them to attend as they settle in.

Mother's Union


St Nicholas Ladies Guild

In January for The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, a series of short lunchtime services, was led by a different church each day. The main Sunday service was held at St Nicholas Church where Canon Michael Bayldon was the speaker. The Lent Courses this year were on a theme of "Walking Towards Glory" based on the lectionary for Lent. These were held at the Methodist Hall and were well attended. The Good Friday service at the Market Cross was well attended with positive feedback from many people. A better amplification system ensured people could hear the service which was led by ministers from the various churches with the Salvation Army band playing the music for the hymns. A Songs of Praise, as part of Guisborough Choral Society's 50th Anniversary, was held in the Priory grounds on 18th June when approximately 180-200 people attended.

Churches Together was represented at The Forest Festival in September and was welcomed by many people who spoke to staff and enjoyed cakes and buns. The Harvest Festival service was held at the Methodist Church on 8th October led by Revd. John Henry. The

theme was "All We Can" from a Methodist Charity in the Caribbean. The collection went to that charity.

Christmas Cards, using a photograph of the Nativity Scene, were distributed throughout the town to give details of services at all the churches in the group.

Guisborough Bridge Association

This year we have seen a few changes with staffing with Jenny Tyrie leaving the organisation in the Spring and Vivienne Trenchard leaving in November. We had a gap year worker for part of the year from Barbados, Nian, but due to a few difficulties Nian had to return early. We are grateful to all for their work for the Bridge. The new team is Shona Joselin, Joanna O'Neill and Juanita Osborne with Shona overseeing as Senior worker, Joanna focussing on the broader community projects and Juanita on the youth & children.

The Activities involving the young people have been well attended: The Escape group at North Guisborough; the 2 youth projects (Friday for the older youth 15-18 and 10-14 on Sunday evening) who had 2 very positive weekends away at the Emmaus Centre; Holiday Clubs in May (with a Spy theme) and August (All Aboard the Ark); Get Set Go monthly sessions; and Fun & Food4All sessions during the school holidays to try to tackle holiday hunger.

Also, there has been a steady increase in the numbers of older people involved in Monday Friends and Kemplah lunches but the latter has now had to move location and will be renamed due to kitchen problems at Kemplah House. Soup and Roll continues to be our main source of income and numbers on a Thursday remain pretty constant and Tuesday Coffee, though smaller, is still a welcoming space for coffee and chat. Separate fund-raising events include coffee mornings, refreshments at Choral Society concerts during the year and the annual Barn Dance at the Church Hall in January.

Foodstop, which is active on a Tuesday and Thursday lunchtimes, plus emergency packages during the rest of the week, continues to be well used by those individuals and families who are facing hardship caused mainly by problems with their benefit payments. The regular donations from Marks and Spencer has added to our provision and we are pleased to be helping reduce waste. Our NightLight team continue to patrol the streets on Friday or Saturday nights offering warmth and solace to those in need, whether it be a pair of flip flops, a comforting word, a warm drink or organising a taxi home. The Christmas Day meal was yet again well attended with about 80 people sitting down to traditional Christmas fare, friendship and fellowship. Over this last year we have started some new work with parents, Bridge2Parents, and are planning a course in May using the Care for the Family material.

A word of thanks to all those in our churches who by their continuing generosity in financial or material giving have kept the Bridge active and growing.

The progress of all our activities is dependent on volunteers and we are incredibly grateful for all those who give time to help the different activities - we are currently going through the process of becoming an 'Investing in Volunteers' organisation to ensure volunteering with us is a positive experience. Sadly, over the year we have lost a few volunteers and this has meant we still have demand for new volunteers at coffee mornings, Soup and Roll, Kemplah, Youth work, Holiday Clubs and Monday friends. If you feel that you would like to

help please see the present volunteers - names are in the March Priority magazine. Thank you for all the support.

We continue to serve God through prayer and action to the people of the town.

Pantomime Group

Financial Statements of the PCC for the year ending 31 December 2017

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Accounting Policies

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011, together with applicable accounting standards and the Charities SORP (FRS 102).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for the valuation of investment assets, which are shown at market value. The financial statements include all transactions, assets, and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their main affiliation to another body nor those that are informal gatherings of Church members.

Funds

Endowment funds are funds, the capital of which must be maintained; only income arising from investment of the endowment may be used either as restricted or unrestricted depending upon the purpose for which the endowment was established.

Restricted funds represent a) income from trusts or endowments which may be expended only on those restricted objects provided in the terms of the trust or bequest, b) donations or grants received for a specific object or invited by the PCC for a specific object, and c) funds set aside and designated by the PCC for a purpose, but which the PCC can reallocate if that purpose no exists.

Unrestricted funds are general funds which can be used for PCC ordinary purposes.

The PCC has previously considered it sound financial management to maintain reserves of between 25% and 33% of annual turnover. This implies that general reserves of at least between £39,750 and £52,470 are required in respect of the proposed budgeted expenditure for 2018. General Reserves at 31 December 2017 exceeded this, standing at £61,229.

Incoming Resources

Collections are recognised when received by or on behalf of the PCC. Planned giving receivable under covenant is recognised only when received. Income tax recoverable on covenant or gift aid donations is recognised when the income is recognised.

Grants and legacies to the PCC are accounted for as soon as the PCC is notified of its legal entitlement and the amount due.

Dividends are accounted for when receivable, interest is accrued.

All other income is recognised when it is receivable.

All incoming resources (e.g. funds raised by the bazaar, craft fair and similar events, sales of books and magazines) are accounted for gross.

Other ordinary income

Rental income from the letting of church premises is recognised when the rental is due.

Income from investments

Dividends and interest are accounted for when receivable. Tax recoverable on such income is recognised in the same accounting year.

Gains and losses on investments

Realised gains and losses are recognised when investments are sold. Unrealised gains and losses are accounted for on revaluation of investments at 31 December.

Resources Used

Grants

Grants and donations are accounted for when paid over, or when awarded, if that award creates a binding obligation on the PCC.

Activities directly relating to the work of the Church

The diocesan Freewill Offering is accounted for when payable. Any Freewill Offering unpaid at 31 December is provided for in these accounts as an operational (though not a legal) liability and is shown as a creditor in the Balance Sheet. Amounts received specifically for mission are dealt with as restricted funds. All other expenditure is generally recognised when it is incurred and is accounted for gross.

Fixed Assets

Consecrated land and buildings and movable church furnishings Consecrated and beneficed property is excluded from the accounts by section 96(2) (a) of the Charities Act 1993.

No value is placed on movable church furnishings held by the churchwardens on special trust for the PCC and which require a faculty for disposal since the PCC considers this to be inalienable property. All expenditure incurred during the year on consecrated or benefice buildings and movable church furnishings, whether maintenance or improvement, is written off as expenditure in the SOFA and separately disclosed.

Investments

Investments are valued at market value at 31 December 2017.

Current assets

Amounts owing to the PCC at 31 December in respect of fees, rents or other income are shown as debtors less provision for amounts that may prove uncollectible.

Short term deposits include cash held on deposit either with the CBF Church of England Funds or at the bank.

Treasurer's Report 2017

I would like to begin my report by taking this opportunity to thank the Gift Aid Officer, John Carr, in particular, all members of the PCC, and the congregation for all their help and advice the have offered during the last year.

In addition, I would like to thank all those who assist with the weekly Gift Aid Envelopes and weekly cash counts, and those who have helped with the management and accounting of income and expenditure during the year, both in the Church and at the events, concerts, and fund-raising activities.

Total funds in 2017 have increased by £34,667, with the general trading account increasing by £14,334 (before a transfer of 2016 designated funds to Restricted Funds, as these are restricted by designation), with additional unrealised profits on the general trading account investments of £2,203. This compares with a general fund surplus of £10,192 in 2016 (including unrealised profits on the general trading account investments of £2,438). There were total unrealised profits on investments of £6,001 in 2017 (this compared to a total unrealised profit on investments in 2016 of £6,522).

The Parish's Freewill Offering (the amount that the Church pays to the Diocese) for 2017 increased by £2,000 from the 2016 amount.

Did you know that if you are a tax payer and sign a Gift-Aid declaration, the PCC as a registered charity can recover the amount of tax you have paid on that (currently 25p for every £1 given in this way) at no extra cost to you?

While you can request your own set of weekly giving envelopes, you can give directly from your bank account, using bankers standing orders. There has continued to be a move towards the regular use of bankers standing orders, as a more convenient way of giving.

The use of Gift-Aid envelopes in the pews has remained steady, and I would encourage any tax paying members of the congregation who have not signed a Gift-Aid declaration, to use them whenever possible.

While general fundraising in 2017 raised a net £12,846, the Bazaar continues to be our main source of general fundraising from a single event, raising over £6,600 in 2017. However, other fundraising took place during the year including regular coffee mornings at Sunnyfield House, monthly Craft Fairs, Beer Festival, Shadow Nativity Concert, and numerous other events.

In addition, other fundraising activities took place, with a summer celebration, cabaret, and Joseph concert raising funds for the Choir Fund, and the Snowman Concert, which contributed over £3,600 towards the church and organ sound systems.

The PCC has previously considered it sound financial management to maintain reserves of between 25% and 33% of annual turnover. This implies that general reserves of between around £39,750 and £52,470 are required in

respect of the proposed budgeted expenditure for 2018. General Reserves at 31 December 2017 exceeded this, standing at £61,229.

However, as we have continued to explore ways of expanding our mission in the town, we have invested in improving our sound system, and we are in the process of exploring opportunities and options for re-ordering of the church.

Any re-ordering agreed will come at a substantial cost. Our general reserves will not cover these costs, and we will have to seek other means of funding any works, such as grant applications and specific fundraising events. However, we are lucky to be in a relatively sound financial position as we approach any re-ordering decisions.

Once again, I would like to thank everybody who has assisted me, with advice, guidance, and the counting and banking of monies coming in and going out. Without your help I would undoubtedly have struggled.

Finally, many thanks to all those who support this Church, both financially (planned givers, tax efficient givers, those using Gift-Aid envelopes, and all those who put into the plate or give using bankers standing orders), and with their time, skills, and talents. A sincere thank you all for giving so generously, in order that we are able to continue to maintain this beautiful and historic building, and look to expand the ministry of our Church.
