Our activities during 2017/18 to achieve our 4 core objectives have included supporting the following projects

- Star School in Rwanda including child sponsorship, the construction of a new walkway as part of making the school more disability friendly and funding new metal framed bunk beds for boarders at the school.
- Cyangugu Diocese in Rwanda including completing first phase of WASH project for vulnerable families on Nkombo Island in addition to continuing our meals programme on this island. We have renovated a pastor's house and completed a water harvesting project on Iswha Island
- Regarding the community development project in Rwanda with the
 historically marginalised people, we have moved from serving 2 villages
 to serving 5 villages, from one land cooperative to 3 land cooperatives,
 from 3 cow projects to 12 cow projects, doubled the number of children
 we are supporting to school and launched our second literacy project.
- Provision of Bibles in vernacular languages in Zambia
- Sponsored a community peace-making initiative in Burundi
- Supported a community library in a Christian Centre in Albania supplying new computers with related software.
- Ongoing support of Baby Box project serving Roma communities in Bulgaria. Also funded a soup kitchen in a Roma Village
- Contributed to costs of two shelter homes for children at risk in Russia
- Publication of 'The Essentials of Excellent Christian Leadership' by Richard Wallis for free distribution to church leaders in Africa and Asia.

In approving these activities, the trustees have considered the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit.

Policy on grant making

All projects we support will fit within our core aims and objectives and normally be in our core ministry geographical areas. We made no grants outside our core geographical area in 2017/2018.

All grants are recommended by the Executive Director, approved by the chair and reviewed by Trustee Board. Grants are made to our partner organisations in Eastern Europe and the Great Lakes Region of Africa. We seek to support the articulated needs of our overseas partners rather than imposing on our partners with what we perceive are their needs. We will seek to avoid long term dependency on financial support from MPUK, although child sponsorship for education requires several years of responsibility to avoid interrupting any one child's education

Contribution made by volunteers

In all the areas where we work overseas, our partners use volunteers alongside paid staff to achieve our objectives. In the UK, in addition to our volunteer Trustees Board, we have volunteers assisting us with raising funds from Trusts, IT support, child sponsorship administration and Facebook. A volunteer is also exploring for us new opportunities in Uganda including how we can fund those opportunities.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Financial

Our income was at a record level being 19% ahead of 2016/2017 which was a record year

Safeguarding

In April 2018, we launched a major review of all our safeguarding policies and procedures. The outcomes of this review will be implemented in 2018/2019.

We funded the head of the Star School in Rwanda to attend a week-long training course on child protection in Nairobi. We are considering sponsoring this course to come to Rwanda, so that our partners in all three of the ministry centres we support in Rwanda can benefit from the course.

Training

Working in collaboration with the Sovereign World Trust, 1900 copies of 'The Essentials of Excellent Christian Leadership' have been distributed to Christian leaders in Africa and Asia. We are exploring the possibility of publishing 'The Essentials of an Enriched Christian Marriage' in 2019/2020

We have sponsored a leadership training course in Zambia.

The outcome of our online Bible Correspondence course in Russian has been disappointing in terms of the number of students doing the course. This is largely due to payment challenges, so we are exploring moving from this being a fee based course to being a free course.

Educating children

We have increased marginally the number of children on our child sponsorship programme at the Star School Rwanda including the sponsorship of our first child with lower limb disabilities.

We have doubled the number of children we are facilitating 'Back to School' in the Historically Marginalised communities we are supporting in Rwanda

We are supporting a second nursery school in Cyangugu Diocese in Rwanda

We have received powerful testimonies of the difference that is being made by children who were at risk now living in the shelter homes we support in Russia and catching up on normal school education.

The new computers we have provided for the community library in Albania are equipping children who live in this community for the future.

Supporting health and medical projects

We continue supporting a programme of adult education on nutrition and hygiene issues on Nkombo Island in Rwanda. The programme includes the distribution of water filters and a children's feeding programme.

The Baby Box project in Bulgaria provides not only basic baby care materials but also both antenatal and postnatal care and seminars on parenting skills.

Relief of financial hardship

This is the focus of our community development programme with the historically marginalised people of Rwanda

Advancement of religion

Transformation is our goal. Our partners share our approach that this requires spiritual as well as material change. On a practical level, we now have funds to build a church for the historically marginalised people we support.

Seeking to comply with this new requirement has required a significant investment of time from a small team
