Trustees' annual report For the year ended 31 March 2018

The trustees of the charity submit their annual report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2018.

Structure, governance and management

The entity is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) which was registered with the Charity Commission on December 2013, charity number 1154862.

Previously the entity operated as Asylum Seekers Support Initiative Short Term (ASSIST), which was an unincorporated charity, charity number 1100894. The assets and liabilities of Asylum Seekers Support Initiative Short Term were transferred into the CIO on 1 April 2014.

Overall management of the charity is the responsibility of the trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the constitution. Day to day activity is managed and carried out by volunteers and paid staff.

Charitable Aims and objectives

The Trustees shall hold the trust fund and its income upon trust to apply them in the City of Sheffield and its environs for:

- The relief of those who are seeking refuge and are in conditions of need, hardship or distress.
- The advancement of the education of the public, and organisations (statutory or voluntary) to assist the inclusion of such inhabitants into the wider community.

Activities and achievements

The main activities undertaken for the public benefit during the year were the alleviation of destitution for asylum seekers and the education of the public about asylum and destitution.

In overseeing this work, the trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit.

The Charity produces an Annual Report each year which details the activities undertaken in the current year to show the public benefit and the achievement of their aims and objectives.

Summary of the main achievements during the year

The summarised achievements of the year include the following:-

A major overhaul of our organisational structures and processes is delivering a more robust and flexible approach to our governance and leadership. Trustees have stepped back from operations to concentrate on governance and strategy and a new Leadership Team consisting of the three managers (Client Support, Accommodation and Resources) and two experienced volunteers is now responsible for ensuring day to day operational management and communications and works with Trustees on organisational issues and strategy. We are beginning to see real benefits from the new structure with more effective, timely decision making being evidenced.

Our **advocacy service** has developed significantly. We have re-engineered our front-line advocacy service to provide a much more systematic and client-led approach to advocacy and support. Clients attending our drop-in service are allocated to a Support and Advocacy Team (SAT) led and delivered by volunteers. Each SAT is allocated up to 25 clients who will remain with their specific team for the whole time they are supported by ASSIST Sheffield. This allows for the teams to build a more trusting, personalised and responsive relationship with each client. The model also facilitates more contact and additional time allocated for client support which has improved welfare checks for individuals. This, in turn, has resulted in issues, including safeguarding concerns, being identified and addressed much faster.

In the past year our SAT Teams supported 160 clients from 36 countries holding 1,442 Advocacy appointments. They helped to maintain and improve their wellbeing and find appropriate long-term solutions to their support needs and their immigration status in the UK. Our clients received weekly £20 welfare payments or £10 plus a bus pass. Additionally, our Helpdesk answered questions from 174 refugees and asylum seekers and our accompanying team accompanied 54 clients to 280 appointments over the year.

Our **accommodation service** has changed and expanded, with more shared housing stock being leased or owned by ASSIST. As at the end of March 2018 we directly managed 7 shared houses (one being refurbished), and we have a further new house in the pipeline for 2018. Our hosting network has also expanded.

ASSIST provided 74 people with long term accommodation whilst our Night Shelter provided emergency accommodation for 68 people (29 of which used both long term housing and Night Shelter during the year). At weekends when the Night Shelter is closed, people were offered hosted accommodation. Overall we provided well over 13,500 bed nights of accommodation.

Our volunteer body has increased from around 120 to 393 currently active volunteers across 15 different teams. Our volunteers are absolutely key to ASSIST achieving its objectives in helping and supporting destitute asylum seekers. Having a large number of volunteers demonstrates the support that ASSIST receives from the local community in Sheffield. Our volunteers are excellent at spreading the message of ASSIST and our activities, which has a positive impact on the number of our regular individual donors. We have recruited a Volunteering Coordinator responsible for recruiting, inducting and training our volunteers. This is an increasingly important role. Our volunteers contributed an amazing total of 3,080 volunteer hours over the year.

Future plans

ASSIST Sheffield would like to continue to improve its services and support to asylum seekers in Sheffield and respond to their needs in an effective and caring manner that shows our determination to challenge destitution. ASSIST Sheffield would like to broaden its donor support base so as to increase capacity to assist asylum seekers in Sheffield. Additionally, ASSIST Sheffield is seeking to work more closely with partners especially in regard to the provision of legal support.

Reserves policy

ASSIST has a reserves policy of retaining sufficient unrestricted funds to ensure the charity has adequate financial resources to meet its unfunded financial obligations for at least 4 months if no further income is received. The trustees have reviewed the policy and reflected that 4 months would be adequate time for the charity to adjust its charitable activity and expenditure, should this be necessary due to a decrease in fundraising, or a series of negative grant decisions. The current reserves target is £113,500.

The free reserves as at 31 March 2018 were £130,172.

In addition to the free reserves there was £20,000 held in designated funds (see note 12) and £180,166 held in restricted funds (see note 14), of which £152,267 is carried forward as the value of the ASSIST owned houses (see note 13).

Notes to the Accounts For the year ended 31 March 2018

1 Accounting Policies

(a) General

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102). The financial statements have adopted Charities SORP (FRS 102) Bulletin 1, giving exemption from preparing a cashflow statement.

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value.

(b) Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Contract income is included in the year in which the service took place.

Contract/grant income is deferred if the period the monies relate to is specified or indicated by the funder.

(c) Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

(d) Tangible fixed assets

All items of capital expenditure below £1,000 are written off as incurred.

Properties are held at cost, and depreciated over the life of the asset. However, changes in market prices may indicate that the residual value of the properties has stayed the same or increased. In this case, the depreciation charge for the year will be £nil for the year, being a change in the accounting estimate.

(e) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

(f) Trade debtors

Trade debtors are amounts due from customers for merchandise sold or services performed in the ordinary course of business.

Trade debtors are recognised initially at the transaction price. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. A provision for the impairment of trade debtors is established when there is objective evidence that the company will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of receivables.

Notes to the Accounts (continued) For the year ended 31 March 2018

(g) Trade creditors

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if the company does not have an unconditional right, at the end of the reporting period, to defer settlement of the creditor for at least twelve months after the reporting date. If there is an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date, they are presented as non-current liabilities.

Trade creditors are recognised initially at the transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

(h) Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are donations and other income receivable or generated for the objects of the organisation without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor.

(i) Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
