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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2018

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2018. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

Chairs report

2017/18 has been an extremely busy and productive year for Wiltshire Sight both strategically and operationally, which will see significant changes to the organisation going forward in 2018, its centenary year.

Strategically we have for some time been considering how best to use our reserves to provide services for blind and partially sighted people in the most appropriate way. As a charity, we have been fortunate to have had significant reserves and, because of this, over the past 5 years we have been using these reserves as core funding for the organisation, to allow it to grow and develop in line with the needs and aspirations of those we support. But we know that this is not a sustainable option, nor does it allow us to meet all the growing needs and aspirations of blind and partially sighted people.

Over the past 3 years we have been developing a positive and cohesive working relationship with Thomas Pocklington Trust (TPT), through our 'Looking Out for Sight' and 'Making Rehab Work' projects. TPT and Wiltshire Sight have very similar strategic aims and they are also of the mindset that organisations should not hold huge reserves but need to work in a way which will ensure sustainability going forward. Discussions with TPT has led the Wiltshire Sight Board of Trustees to decide to pool its resources with that of TPT and other funders to extend the reach and explore a more collaborative working approach; taking the view that together we are stronger.

After considerable deliberations, it has been decided that a new organisation should be formed to take this work forward. The new organisation will take responsibility for overseeing all operational work. Wiltshire Sight will remain a charity and continue to conduct its charitable aims, but some of these will now be delivered through the new entity: Vision West of England. Wiltshire Sight will use some of its reserves to support this work.

Operationally the organisation continues to go from strength to strength, supporting a record number of clients both directly through our centre based and community work and indirectly through our 'Looking Out for Sight' project. During the summer of 2017, we further developed our children and young people's offer, as well as launch Saturday open mornings aimed at work age individuals. We also worked with Melksham Town Council to make their market place safer for visually impaired residents. With 2018 being our centenary year, we kicked it off in style with a fantastic concert celebrating 100 years of music performed by the very talented blind pianist Derick Paravicini and we have more similar events planned throughout the year.

In 2017 we have also invested in the staff's personal development by working with Wiltshire College, which has not only given the staff exceptional new skills but has also seen them grow in confidence.

We now look forward to a new year, where we will further develop our partnerships to provide more services to an increasing number of people with sight loss, their families and carers and improve our sustainability to take us forward in the future.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Wiltshire Sight runs a range of information, advice and support services complimented by a range of social activities aimed not only at those experiencing sight loss but also their family and carers.

Our strategy has four main aims:

- 1) Emotional well-being
 - We have been able to give access and information to support people living in Wiltshire and Swindon to attend Drop-Ins and to be part of peer groups providing the information and support that they need.
- 2) Social inclusion
 - Through our technology groups, people living with sight loss have been able to use the latest technology, which has given them access to lifelong learning. We have been able to support carers, friends and neighbours to look at new skills so they can get back to work.
- 3) Economic security
 - Our courses and information events have enabled people with sight loss to have access to understanding registration, benefits and staying in the work place.
- 4) Independent living
 - Our social events, Drop Ins and information provided at the Sight Centre have enabled many with sight loss to live independently in their own home.

Over the last 12 months:

- We've supported 844 individual clients with emotional support and well being
- Received calls from 400 individuals to our help line
- Over 170 people with a Sight Impairment visited our resource centre
- Saw 300 individuals with sight loss at our Wiltshire Conference and Exhibition
- 162 individuals and 4 dogs attended our peer support groups on a regular basis
- Provided 94 individuals with Sight Loss Awareness Training
- Run 40 sessions for individuals with sight loss and additional challenges with a regular attendance of 9 individuals
- Provided 2 families with specialist support through our Zoom Club
- Trained 370 carers through our Looking Out For Sight training
- Benefited from 600 volunteer hours

Our staff

We recognise that our staff and volunteers are at the heart of everything that we do, and we value their commitment and hard work. Without their hard work and determination we simply would not be able to do all that we do. We welcomed several new volunteers whose skills and enthusiasm have contributed greatly to the organisation.

Public benefit

The trustees confirm that they have complied with their duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to the Charity Commissions general guidance on public benefit "Charities and Public Benefit".

Wiltshire Sight's charitable objectives are enshrined within its articles and as such the Trustees ensure that this charter is carried out for the public benefit. This is done through the delivery of services, which whilst primarily aimed at those who are blind or partially sighted, are, where appropriate, open to all who might benefit.

Volunteers

We have benefited from the support of 16 regular volunteers who have provided over 600 hours of support. We also benefit from adhoc volunteers who play an important role in enabling us to run events and activities. We would not be able to run all of the services we do without the support of volunteers and wish to thank them for everything they do.

Training

All our Sight Advisers are trained to (or working towards) level 3 in Working with People with Sight Loss. We encourage a programme of continuous professional development, with staff attending relevant courses delivered by professionals from local corporate networks. We would particularly like to thank Wiltshire College for their support this year.

Our community fundraising has included Christmas markets, local community events, summer and winter raffles and eBay sales.

Great Relationships

We worked with many local organisations over the last year and we appreciate their help. We have also developed new working relationships with national charities, including the Macular Society and RNIB, running their national programmes at a local level. Our relationship with Thomas Pocklington Trust and Visionary continued to grow with the commissioning of the 'Looking Out for Sight' project and we would like to thank them for their continued professional and financial support. We will now be taking our relationship with Thomas Pocklington Trust forward into next year through a strategic partnership to develop Vision West of England, a new operational organisation that will deliver services across Wiltshire, Swindon, Bristol, Bath and South Gloucestershire, allowing us to work more collaboratively and make better use of the resources that we have.

Our Influence

Wiltshire Sight has been active in helping shape eye health services in Wiltshire and Swindon. We attend Wiltshire Council's Eye Health Promotion Group and chair the Local Eye Health Patients Reference Network in Swindon, enabling us to influence the national eye health agenda locally. We have also provided advice and information to local commissioners.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Principal Funding Sources

As an independent charity we do not receive statutory funding and therefore rely on the generosity of our supporters and the local community. Our community fundraising programme was further developed with support from local Lions groups and volunteers through a range of activities including street collections, static collections, sponsored events and attendance at a number of community fairs and activities.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Investment policy and objectives

Investments are reviewed on an annual basis by the trustees.

Reserves policy

Incoming resources in 2017/18 were £179,381, with 50% being for restricted purposes and represents a decrease of 0.2% on the previous year 2016/17.

Expenditure decreased by 16% before gains/losses on investments. Reserves decreased by £40,121. Total reserves at 31 March 2018 were £581,016.

Restricted reserves are currently £49,649, held for specific services agreed with our donors. £25,000 of unrestricted reserves is tied up in the capital assets of the charity and £167,740 is held as fixed assets, this being the building we operate from in Devizes, known as St Lucy's. £335,000 is designated by the Trustees for use for the strategic partnership that will create Vision West of England, leaving £3,627 available as free reserves.

The Trustees are particularly aware of the need to take certain factors into account to cover fluctuations in income (principally legacies), current liabilities and unplanned expenditure. The target amount for contingency set by the charity is therefore 12 months' operating costs. The reserves and funding policy is kept under constant scrutiny by the Trustees.

The level of reserves has been set by Wiltshire Sight considering the following:

- The smooth running of the charity, and the provision of core services to visually impaired clients, needs to be maintained by ensuring that redundancies do not have to be made in the event of sudden loss of funds. Funds should be available to continue to subsidise the provision of core services until alternative sources of funding can be found.
- The new strategic alliance with Vision West of England to deliver services for Blind and Partially Sighted people in Wiltshire and Swindon
- Funding should be available to deal with the contingencies which might arise in the day to day running of the organisation.

Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Board of Trustees has a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future, especially considering its strategic alliance with Thomas Pocklington Trust. For this reason, it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

FUTURE PLANS

The year 2017/18 was one of taking the charity forward and developing its future plans. This includes looking at the way we provide services, how we use our now limited reserves and how we generate income to support the services we provide. In August 2017 the board of trustees decided to embark on a strategic alliance with Thomas Pocklington Trust to create a new operational charity that would be able to provide a more sustainable and high impacting service for blind and partially sighted people in Wiltshire and Swindon. The board worked with Thomas Pocklington to create a strategy that will mean running costs for Wiltshire services will be halved in 2018/19 yet a better more comprehensive service will be developed.

Over the next three years, Wiltshire Sight will provide the new organisation, Vision West of England, an annual grant to run services in Wiltshire and Swindon increasing our impact on the lives of people with and at risk of sight loss by:

- Influencing local eye care pathways to ensure local people receive excellent services including growing our services in Swindon
- Developing links with other local organisations to provide innovative and joined up services
- Building on and growing our relationships with local business networks
- Developing and growing our volunteer and supporter base

Wiltshire sight will continue to own St Lucy's but will allow it to be used in line with its covenant to oversee the operations of the new charity for a period of 3 years, after which the position of Wiltshire Sight will be reviewed.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee. The organisation was established in 1918 and registered under the Companies Act 2006 on 22 January 2007, number 06060187 and registered under the Charities Act 2011 on 1 June 2007 number 1119462. A Memorandum of Association is in place which establishes the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association.

In the event of the company being wound up the Trustees are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The trustees are recruited and appointed by the Board as required.

Organisational structure

The organisation is governed by a Board of Trustees who are also Directors of the company. During the year to 31 March 2018, the Board met every 8 weeks. The names of the trustees are shown in this report. The trustees do not receive any remuneration for their services to the charity.

There is a clear organisational structure with an appropriate level of accountability and reporting, with the day to day operational activities of the charity delegated to the Chief Executive Officer. The Board approves the delegation of financial authority through the Chief Executive Officer.

From April 2018 the structure will change and delegated authority will be passed to the Chief Executive Officer of Vision West of England, who will be held account via a funding agreement with quarterly reports.

Induction and training of new trustees

New trustees undergo a briefing session on the working of the organisation and they have induction training. They are given information on the obligations of being a trustee, including employer responsibilities. They are provided with the business and strategic plans, most recent minutes of Trustee Board meetings, budgets and financial reports.

Related parties

There were no material related party transactions with trustees or senior management.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

Wiltshire Sight, like all organisations, is subject to risks and issues that need to be managed on an on-going basis. The risks are identified and documented in a register as a matter of normal practice by the management team. The risks are assessed with due regard to their degree of impact and severity on the organisation which, with appropriate mitigation, are reported to and reviewed by the Board of Trustees at their regular meetings.

The charity investment portfolio is managed by an independent investments manager who operates within the specific guidelines and restrictions set and is reviewed twice a year by the Board.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2018

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

Wiltshire Sight is a charitable company limited by guarantee registered in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is given in the reference and administrative information on page 6 of these financial statements. The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are provided in the Report of the Trustees.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 (as updated through Updated Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The charity has applied Update Bulletin 1 as published on 2 February 2016 and does not include a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is applying FRS 102 Section 1A.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are prepared in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest $\mathfrak{L}1$.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. Income received in advance of a specified service is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met.

For donations to be recognised the charity will have been notified of the amounts and the settlement date in writing. If there are conditions attached to the donation and this requires a level of performance before entitlement can be obtained then income is deferred until those conditions are fully met or the fulfilment of those conditions is within the control of the charity and it is probable that they will be fulfilled.

For legacies, entitlement is taken as the earlier of:

- The date on which the charity is aware probate has been granted
 The estate has been finalised and notification has been made by the executor(s) to the Trust that a
- distribution is made:
- or when a distribution is received from the estate

Receipt of a legacy, in whole or part, is only considered probable when the amount can be measured reliably and the charity has been notified of the executor's intention to make a distribution. Where legacies have been notified to the charity or the charity is aware of the granting of probate, and the criteria for income recognition have not been met, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material.

Income from grants is recognised at fair value when the charity has entitlement after any performance conditions have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. If entitlement is not met then these amounts are deferred.

Income from trading activities includes income earned from fundraising events and trading activities to raise funds for the charity. Income is received in exchange for supplying goods and services in order to raise funds and is recognised when entitlement has occurred.

Investment income is earned through holding assets for investment purposes such as shares. It includes dividends and interest and rent. Where it is not practicable to identify investment management costs incurred within a scheme with reasonable accuracy the investment income is reported net of these costs. It is included when the amount can be measured reliably. Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method and dividend and rent income is recognised as the charity's right to receive payment is established.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation of support costs

Costs of raising funds comprise the costs of staff, event expenses and fundraising costs.

Expenditure on charitable activities includes the cost of staff and other educational activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.

Other expenditure represents those items not falling into any other heading.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost (or deemed cost) or valuation less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes costs directly attributable to making the asset capable of operating as intended.

Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £50.

Depreciation is provided as rates calculated to write down the cost of each asset to its estimated residual value over its expected useful life. The depreciation rates in use are as follows;

Investments

Investments are recognised initially at fair value which is normally the transaction price excluding transaction costs. Subsequently, they are measured at fair value with changes recognised in 'net gains / (losses) on investments' in the Statement of Financial Activities if the shares are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Debtors and creditors receivable / payable within one year

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

Taxation

The charity is an exempt charity within the meaning of schedule 3 of the Charities Act 2011 and is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Operating leases

The charity classifies the lease of printers as operating leases; the title of the equipment remains with the lessor and the equipment is replaced every 5 years and the economic life of such equipment is normally 5 years. Rental charges are charged on a straight line basis over the term of the lease.

Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.

The specific purposes for which the funds are to be applied are as follows:

Club fund- relates to funds collected to support clubs and related activities for blind and partially sighted people.

Hard to reach project- Relates to Awards for All funding to support a pilot project around supporting people with sight loss in communities that are often perceived to be difficult to reach.

Zurich grant for drop-ins- Relates to income received to run drop in in the Swindon Area.

Vodaphone zoom club- Relates to monies received to support our Children and Young Peoples Activities.

Looking out for sight- Relates to monies received to provide training to people within the care sector.

Sobell foundation- Relates to monies received to support our Resources and Technology Drop ins.

Peer support- relates to income received to provide a range of activities that promote and provide peer support to the blind and partially sighted community.

Family support- relates to funds allocated to provide support to families who have a child affected by sight loss.

Sight loss & dementia programme in Wiltshire- relates to money to support our sight advisors to better support people with dementia and sight loss, raise awareness of dementia and sight loss and work alongside dementia charities to promote support and awareness.

Vision West of England- For the development of a partnership to expand our services and create more opportunities for blind and partially sighted people.

Transfers between funds

Project Swindon funds were moved into general funds in August when we agreed to expand our area through our partnership working and restrict all our funds for work in Wiltshire and Swindon, Project Swindon funds were designated funds and the money within them was not restricted for use in Swindon.

£45,000 has been transferred from general funds to the development fund.
