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CHAIR'S INTRODUCTION FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2016

It is my pleasure to write this introduction to NESTAC's 2015-16 annual report.

The charity continues to present high quality community-led project opportunities, widening its reach for the most disadvantaged hard to reach population of Black and Minority Ethnic communities, especially refugees, asylum seekers and other migrant heritage groups living across Greater Manchester and beyond.

The Support Our Sisters (SOS) programme, Award-Winner of the British Journal of Midwifery (BJM) 2015 continues to thrive and to support women and young girls affected or at risk of undergoing Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) in Greater Manchester. The SOS programme raised interest in other areas of the country and our peer mentor project was also delivered in London, Sheffield and in Leeds, training women and men within FGM affected communities to support emotionally their peers.

Our Youth programme through the NESTAC Supplementary Schools (NSS) as well as through the FGM Youth Project were highly quoted by local schools and colleges, with one of our Youth Advocate winning a national Award in London for her artwork completed on FGM part of her EPQ in college.

NESTAC's Drop-In Work Club also supported more than one thousand clients throughout the year, seeing an average of 20 clients per week in our main office in Rochdale.

This year has also experienced challenging times for Refugee Community Organisations, and although NESTAC have been a beacon of endeavour and innovation, like much of the sector we have had to pull in our belts and make changes to the core team makeup, which is already very small. Despite this, NESTAC was able to deliver at its full capacity meeting targets set for the year, retaining 12 regular volunteers, as well as the 3-strong core staff team.

I would like to thank the hard working and inspirational team at NESTAC, as well as our funders, partners and supporters who have demonstrated commitment and belief in the company.

NESTAC Status

New Step for African Community is a registered charity since 2005. Its governing documents are its Memorandum and Articles and it has a Management Committee currently comprising 5 members. Members are selected as part of proceedings at the Annual General Meeting. In order to meet the aims of the organisation, the Management Committee has the power to employ staff, rent or buy premises, raise funds, enter into partnerships and work with other organisations.

Our Aims and Objectives

NESTAC focuses on community-led projects, helping its members to integrate properly in the society by the provision of advice, support, guidance, volunteering opportunities, training, cultural awareness and wellbeing. We are a voluntary organisation, and one of our key priorities is to empower our members through valuable skills development by providing work experience, that could lead to further education or employment opportunities. NESTAC also aims to protect the rights of people from Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) communities, especially refugees and asylum seekers.

Our aims are to be achieved by:

- 1. Sustaining our volunteering scheme to enhance the service delivered to clients, whilst providing opportunities for apprenticeship and furthertrainings that might lead to employment.
- 2. Empowering disadvantaged people, especially Refugee and AsylumSeeker families, by getting them involved in all activities, events, meetings or other issues affecting their communities.
- 3. Developing funding strategy, to be able to maintain the sustainability of the organisation.
- 4. Developing our Wellbeing project, as well as partnership work with health providers, to look at the mental health of refugees and asylum seekers in the community
- 5. Developing disadvantaged/ excluded children and young people's sociocultural and educational backgrounds through the establishment of a platform providing intensive support, supplementary school and art activities to break the circle of socialexclusion.
- 6. Develop health and wellbeing of women victims of Female GenitalMutilation (FGM) through psychosocial support and raising awareness of FGM in communities and amongstprofessionals.
- 7. Providing a Drop-In Centre for clients, where they can easily access for guidance, support and advice, activities, educational training, language services and work club.
- 8. Developing a wider network and increasing partnership work with statutory and non-statutory services across Greater Manchester.

Our activities

We have continued to consolidate our structures focusing on the development of informal learning, cultural and wellbeing projects, as well as social cohesion. Capacity building for NESTAC staff and volunteers has also been advanced.

Educational activities included this year:

<u>Basic Peer Mentor Counselling skills training on Female Genital Mutilation (FGM):</u> To train peer mentors to support the emotional wellbeing of women who have or are likely to experience FGM.

<u>FGM Awareness Training</u>: To increase insight and understanding of Female Genital Mutilation (FGM)forthosewhoarelikelytocomeintocontactwithwomenwhohave,orarelikelytobeexposed to thepractice.

<u>IT Classes:</u> the centre offers IT courses for job seekers. As classes are opened to all, this gives the opportunity to those who cannot access the work club to be able to do job search from home.

Employment initiatives included this year:

- Volunteering opportunities (referred via CVS, the Job Centre and self-referral).
- Practice placement: referral from Hopwood Hall College andUniversities.
- Registered Work Club, supporting members of the community looking for employment.

Health and Wellbeing initiatives included this year:

- One to One counselling for refugees and asylumseekers
- Support Our Sisters (SOS) Clinics: safe spaces developed to supportwomen who have been through Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) or those at risk of FGM. Women are empowered through arts and wellbeing activities and through One to One emotionalsupport.

NESTAC Supplementary School (NSS):

- Provides after school Club every Tuesday and Thursday to children and young people aged between 6 and 16-year-old living in Kirkholt and Falinge areas in Rochdale.

Public benefit

In shaping our objectives for the year and planning our activities, the trustees have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit, including the guidance on public benefit and fee charging. The charity relies on grants and the income from fees and charges to cover its operating costs. In setting the level of fees and charges, the trustees give consideration to the accessibility to activities for those on low income.

Analysis of Public Benefit

The types of benefit that these objects promote are to:

- Advance participation in and therefore advance appreciation of beneficiaries in a variety of psychosocial and art activities, including art therapy, culturally adapted individual therapy, Group therapy and general advice and guidance;
- Provide educational opportunities for beneficiaries through specific training programmes and through participation in informal workshops;
- Facilitate social integration and cohesion by providing opportunities for people from different cultural backgrounds to participate in cultural awareness events and conferences, fostering a better understanding of each other's cultures.

NESTAC's programmes of activity are open to the general public, but primary beneficiaries of our services are usually resident within the North-West Region of England and usually live within the ten boroughs of Greater Manchester. NESTAC are members of the Greater Manchester BME Forum, the Greater Manchester FGM Forum and the NHS National FGM Steering Group.

Access budgets are put in place for all participatory programmes of work to remove barriers participants may experience due to disadvantages such as Gender Based Violence (GBV), poverty/low income, disability and cultural exclusion.

NESTAC offer a free service to its beneficiaries and actively seek to engage with people on the margins of mainstream society, especially those victims of GBV, more precisely FGM. Many of the beneficiaries either live in poverty or low income households. Some beneficiaries have experiences of or live on the fringesof destitution and are therefore subject to the stresses and pressures associated with this status.

Contribution of volunteers

The New Step for African Community is grateful to the volunteers who work with the charity. In addition to the work undertaken voluntarily by the board of directors, volunteers work to aid the operational activity of the charity as volunteers at events, volunteerson specific projects and administrative support for within the charity's office, helping with activities such as reception duties, support work, peer mentors, data entry and marketing. There were 18 volunteers in addition to the board in 2015-2016, providing over 1369 hours of volunteering valued at £21k of support to NESTAC's activities. Volunteers were recruited largely through self-referral, beneficiaries willing to give back to the charity and Volunteer Programmes.

This gave the time to our part-time paid staffs to work with the management committee and look for extra funding.
