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TRUSTEES REPORT

Directors' and Trustees' Report for the year ended 31 March 2018

The Trustees present their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2018. The Trustees, who are also directors for the purposes of company law and who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1. Enfield Carers Centre operates as both a registered charity and a company limited by guarantee.

Structure, Governance and Management

Enfield Carers Centre (ECC) is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 8 February 2010 and registered as a charity on 27 January 2011. The charitable company is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. The Trustees are appointed or reappointed annually at the Annual General Meeting. Appointment and retirement of Trustees is in accordance with the Articles of Association. All Trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the charity.

The overall management of finance is the responsibility of all the Trustees, acting on the recommendation of the Chairman, Treasurer and the Chief Executive. The Trustees form the management committee and meet regularly to oversee the running of the organisation.

The organisation advertises for Trustees or appoints them on recommendation. Trustees with the appropriate skill sets are appointed and training is given to the incoming Trustees.

Aims and Objectives

The charity's purpose as set out in the objects contained in the Articles of Association is as follows:

To provide benefits to persons suffering from disability arising from age or physical or mental disability by the provision of advice, support and information for those persons caring for persons with such disabilities in the London Borough of Enfield.

At the charity's Annual General Meeting in November 2016 a resolution was passed to amend Article 4 of the charity's Articles of Association by the insertion of a second object so that it reads:

"4. The Charity's objects ("Objects") are specifically restricted to the following:

4.1 The relief of persons suffering from disability arising from age or physical or mental disability by the provision of advice, support and information for those persons caring for persons with such disabilities in the London Borough of Enfield; and

4.2 The relief of sickness and the preservation of health and promotion of well-being among people residing permanently or temporarily in Enfield."

During the period April 2017-March 2018

Main Activities and Achievements

Voluntary & Community Sector Re-commissioning

Following Enfield Council's issue of one Voluntary Sector Recommissioning tender which contained 5 lots, ECC was successfully awarded the main contract to deliver Caring Services for the borough.

Following formal notice of the end ECC's previous council contracts, the new Contract began on 12th December 2017. The contract term is 3 years plus two possible 2-year extensions, subject to delivery and performance.

The new Caring Services contract includes counselling, support services, carers' breaks and a training and information programme. ECC has engaged two partners (Crossroads Lea Valley Carers Trust and Alpha Care Specialists (GGCCE) who will be delivering replacement care and emergency respite cover, subject to demand. There is also a commitment by ECC to engage other home care agencies to allow

for personal preference by carers.

Carers Benefits Advice Project

Financial Support spanning 3 years was awarded to ECC from City Bridge Trust's Older Londoners Fund in May 2017 for an Older Carers Benefits Advice Officer. The project aims to improve the financial position of carers over 65 by helping them maximise their income, reduce isolation and support them to access relevant information and services which aid their caring circumstance.

GP & Hospital Support Project

ECC was also successfully awarded 3-year funding from The Henry Smith Trust in September 2017 for a combined GP and Hospital Liaison Project. The fund supports one full-time project worker to liaise with GP Practices within Enfield and the three hospitals which support Enfield Residents: North Middlesex Hospital; Chase Farm Royal Free Hospital and Barnet Hospital.

Home From Hospital Project

In December 2017, ECC began working in partnership with Alpha Care Specialists (trading arm of Greek & Greek Cypriot Community of Enfield) to provide a Carers Hospital Discharge Support Officer, working 30 hours each week over each of the three hospitals mentioned above.

The Home From Hospital project is a newly contracted service which forms part of the Council's recommissioning of voluntary sector services. This project provides a home care service for patients, being discharged from hospital, who need assistance but whose needs do not require a full social services package of care. The Discharge Support Officer liaises with staff from the hospital discharge teams to promote the service and encourage referrals. The Officer also visits various hospital wards where they are able to speak directly to patients and carers about the project and the wider services on offer at the Carers Centre.

Carers Assessments

Enfield Carers Centre (ECC) was appointed Trusted Assessor for carers' assessments in January 2016. In recognition of its successful performance in this area, Enfield Council increased the Carers Centre Assessment staffing team from two to three Assessment Officers. This enhanced offer was made specifically to increase the number of reviews conducted on the council's behalf.

The new service level agreement targets of 480 carers assessments and 1000 reviews were exceeded by ECC Assessment Officers. ECC achieved a total of 492 Assessments and 1167 Reviews. Of the 492 Assessments, 478 were for adult carers and 14 for young carers at transition age (16yrs+).

During the year 62 new Direct Payments were issued to carers. At end March 2018, 118 carers were in receipt of Direct Payments and a further 229 carers' needs were met via universal services (accessing services already in existence in the voluntary, statutory or charitable sector).

Young Carers Project

Warburtons awarded one year's funding to ECC for young carers support. The funding provides one part-time Young Carers Worker and the overall project aims to identify and support Young Carers (YCs) aged 7 plus and Young Adult Carers (YACs) and their families by working closely with educationalists to: achieve better educational outcomes and their employability prospects; ensure young carers have earlier access to practical advice and support; improve families' financial stability.

Carers Trust funding for Young Carers support ended in this financial year.

In addition to the funding above, ECC were also successful in securing BBC Children In Need (CiN) Funding for a 3 year period. The funding provides the main source of income for the ECC's Young Carers Project which is called EyPIC (Enfield Young People In Caring). As a result of the funding, ECC

employs another part-time Young carers Worker and sessional staff for the fortnightly Young Carers Activity Hubs. The CiN funding also contributes to the cost of quarterly outings and newsletters and allows ECC to provide a dedicated young carers service, where children from 5 to 18 years can enjoy a break from caring, meet other children and young people in similar circumstances and receive support, training and information about services for their cared for persons.

ECC also provides a weekly homework club for young carers where they can receive assistance with and encouragement to complete homework assignments.

Local Business Metaswitch have taken a keen interest in supporting the future and career development prospects of Enfield's young carers. The Metaswitch Young Carers Fund provides financial support for disadvantaged young carers to assist them with educational or career related expenses such as: computers, interview clothes, travel costs, textbooks etc.

Future Plans

ECC intends to continue raising the profile of the Centre and its services to all parts of the borough. A major demonstration of our commitment to bringing services closer to home for carers is an increasing use of satellite venues in Palmers Green, Enfield Highway, Edmonton and Winchmore Hill.

ECC plans to reshape its internal management structure slightly to ensure frontline staff are adequately supported and senior management have space and capacity to address strategic issues and focus on securing additional funding for Young Carers services.

The Board of Trustees continues to seek additional members, particularly those with personal experience of caring, to strengthen the infrastructure of the organisation, ensure service user input and continue to meet the challenges of the future.

How Activities Deliver Public Benefit

Our main activities are described above. All our charitable activities focus on the provision of advice to the general public and are undertaken to further our charitable purpose for the public benefit.

Financial Review

ECC's main funding income streams are the restricted and non-restricted grants from the London Borough of Enfield (LBE) and other funders. Details of these are in note 2 to the accounts. It must be noted that ECC receives excellent support from LBE.

The organisation also received donations in the year totalling £12,290. The donors included: Tesco, Marks & Spencer, Bush Hill Park Golf Club, Metaswitch Networks, Care UK Community Partnership, The Freemasons Grand Charity, donations in memory of the late Jessie Burley and a host of other donors including private donors.

The total Incoming Resources in the year amounted to £671,460 (2017: £523,176). Of this amount £654,622 (2017: £502,280) was from grants received in the year.

The total Resources Expended in the year was for Charitable Activities. This amounted to £569,734 (2017: £537,482). Included within this amount are Governance Costs totalling £8,714 (2017: £8,739) and Support Costs totalling £2,728 (2017: £5,257).

The net effect of the above amounts is a surplus for the year of £101,726 (2017: Deficit of £14,306) with the total reserves carried forward of £502,409.

Reserves

The Board has assessed the Charity's requirements for reserves in the light of the main risks to the organisation. As a result, the Board has approved a policy whereby the unrestricted fund is not committed, should be held in reserve and maintained at a level which ensures that ECC's core activity could continue during a period of unforeseen difficulty. The target reserve is to be six months of expenditure and this is subject to annual review.

In the following financial year, Trustees have agreed use of unrestricted funds, in excess of the reserves policy amount, to strengthen the infrastructure of the Carers Centre. This will allow the charity to deliver additional services which contribute to its overall objectives.

In addition, the remaining reserves provide a safe guard against the probable cessation of two significant sources of funding which may end in March 2019.

Risk Management

The Trustees have worked to identify the major risks which impact upon our work and have ranked these by likelihood and impact. The risks include matters relating to key management staff, ensuring that the board has the requisite number of Trustees with the appropriate skill sets and future sustainability of payments.

The Trustees are confident that adequate procedures are in place to mitigate this.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The trustees (who are also the directors for the purpose of company law) are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations. Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the trustees must prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under company law the trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period.

In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- a) select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- b) observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- c) make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- d) state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- e) prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue to operate.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Trustees confirm that they have properly discharged their responsibilities in accordance with the above.

I report to the trustees (who are also Directors for the purpose of company law) on my examination of the financial statements of Enfield Carers Centre ('the charitable company') for the year ended 31 March 2018, which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, the Statement of Cash Flows and related notes.

1) Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015)-((Charities SORP (FRS102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable to the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102), and the Companies Act 2006.

The Charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transition value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s)

In preparing the financial statements the trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS102 and the Charities SORP FRS102, the restatement of comparative items was required. After due consideration, it was concluded that no restatement of the comparatives was required.

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. In arriving at this conclusion the trustees have taken into account any material uncertainties that may affect the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. The period covered by this assessment is at a minimum level of 12 months from the date of the approval of the accounts.

(b) Incoming resources

Voluntary income including donations, gifts and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature are recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. Such income is only deferred when:

- The donor specifies that the grant or donation must only be used in future accounting periods; or
- The donor has imposed conditions which must be met before the charity has unconditional entitlement.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

Income from charitable activities includes income received under contract or where entitlement to grant funding is subject to specific performance conditions is recognised as earned (as the related goods or services are provided). Grant income included in this category provides funding to support performance activities and is recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

(c) Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on the accruals basis inclusive of VAT which cannot be recovered. Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them. Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity and include project management.

(d) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less residual value of each asset over its expected useful life as follows:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment - 25% on cost

(e) Funds structure

The charity has a number of restricted income funds to account for situations where a donor requires that a donation must be spent on a particular purpose or where funds have been raised for a specific purpose. All other funds are unrestricted funds.

(f) Pensions

The charity operates a defined contribution scheme. The pension charge recorded in the accounts is the amount of contributions payable in the accounting year.

(g) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

(h) Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments in deposits or similar accounts.

(i) Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

The Unrestricted Funds of the charity are for the provision of advice and support services to carers in relation to their rights, responsibilities and services available to them.

Restricted Funds

EMHC Project - This covers: Carers Advocacy Service, Carers' Respite Programme, Emergency Respite Scheme, Carers Consortia Training Programme and Mental Health Carers Training Programme.

Enfield CCG GP Liaison Project -To identify and support carers at GP practices and establish improved Carers support at each practice.

Home from Hospital Project - Working with hospital discharge teams to identify and support carers in hospital setting. Assisting carers with the discharge planning process and referring suitable patients to Home From Hospital Services aimed at reducing readmissions to hospitals.

Counselling Project - Provision of psychotherapy service to support carers' health and wellbeing.

L. B. Enfield Southern Enfield Carers Support - Provision of monthly support group and complementary therapy services

Carers Assessment Project - Appointed Trusted Assessor for Enfield Council. Provision for stand-alone (carer only) assessment and processing of carers direct payments where appropriate.

The Henry Smith Charity: Carers GP & Hospital Support Project - To identify and support carers at GP practicesand hospitals at an earlier stage and establish improved support for Carers. To support practice and hospital staff with carer awareness training and increase signposting to Enfield Carers Centre.

City Bridge Trust: Older Carers Benefits & Advice Project - Supporting carers aged 65+ to maximise their income by ensuring they receive full financial and welfare benefit entitlements and do not experience financial hardships.

London Fire Brigade: Carers Fire Prevention Project - Identifying carers and cared for persons with mobility or sensory impairment in need of fire prevention equipment or services e.g. smoke alarms, flame retardant bedding etc.

CEPN NHS England: CEPN Safer Discharge Project - Aimed at reducing hospital readmissions and promoting the involvement of carers in smoother, faster, safer discharges from hospital. Also the production of 2 videos: one aimed at hospital staff - improving carer awareness and promoting the advantages of including carers in discharge planning. The second video is aimed at family/unpaid carers and explains: the discharge process; the need for carer involvement and the importance of planning for the discharge date. The project also provides a post-discharge training programme for carers covering topics such as: medication management, signs of infection, dehydration and pressure sores etc.

Awards For All - This relates to the work in respect of the Dementia/Active Ageing Project.

NHS Enfield CCG - Dual diagnosis and mental health training.

16) EyPIC Young Carers Project

The EyPIC Young Adult Carers project is part funded by grants as detailed in Note 2, page 13 of the accounts and also donations received in the year.

This project involves working closely with local schools delivering assemblies and teacher training to raise awareness about YCs and YACs aimed at: a) Identifying hidden carers and adopting a Schools 'Young Carers' Protocol b) Referring them to ECC for ongoing support c) Reducing absenteeism d) Improving educational attainment and their future prospects.
