Dorking Concertgoers Society

The trustees present their annual report and the financial statements of the society for the year ended 30th June 2018. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts, and comply with the society's constitution, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard for smaller entities (effective January 2015).

Structure and governance

The present constitution of the society was approved at the annual general meeting of the society on 26th October 2009.

The managing body of the society is a committee which is elected annually and is to be not more than twelve members including those holding the offices of Chairman, Vice Chairman, Hon. Secretary, Hon. Treasurer and Hon. Membership and Ticket secretary.

The society is a registered charity no 295839 and the committee members are Trustees.

The society has as its president the distinguished counter-tenor, James Bowman CBE, whose great support is much appreciated by the Chairman and committee.

Members, Friends and Sponsors of the society are those persons who pay an annual subscription fee at the rate determined by the committee. At the end of the financial year there were 98 Members, of which 20 were Friends, and 32 were individual Sponsors.

Objectives and activities for the public benefit

The purpose of the society is to educate the public in the art and science of music and it seeks to fulfil this by promoting concerts and recitals. The trustees confirm that they have referred to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit when reviewing the society's aims and objectives.

Trustees responsibilities in relation to the financial statements

The charity trustees are responsible for preparing the trustees annual report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards.

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the charity trustees to prepare financial statements for each year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity for that period. In preparing the financial statements the trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- Observe the methods and principles in the applicable charities SORP
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- State whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the applicable Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations, and the constitution. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities. The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the charity and financial information included on the charity website.

Review of the year

Dorking Concertgoers promoted eight concerts of the highest musical standard. The size of audience and membership including Friends and Sponsors remained stable. In view of the Society's financial position it was decided at our AGM in October 2017 that this would probably be the last season that the Concertgoers would be able to promote a concert given by one of the London orchestras. We very much regret that we have had to make this decision but since 2013 when the financial support we received from Mole Valley District Council ceased it has only been a matter of time until this decision was reached. We will be able occasionally to promote a small chamber orchestra but unless considerable funding is obtained we will not be engaging the large London orchestras. The Society was founded in 1962 to support the local authorities in promoting orchestral concerts so we are very sad that in future such concerts will not be a part of our season.

The 2017/18 season began in October with a concert given by the Marylebone Woodwind Trio comprising oboe, clarinet and bassoon. The trio was formed in 2003 when the members were post-graduate students at the Royal Academy of Music. This attractive concert with a varied and well performed programme formed part of the 2017 Arts Alive Festival. In November the violist Sarah-Jane Bradley accompanied by John Lenehan gave an interesting recital of works by Handel, Vaughan Williams, Brahms, Prokofiev and Rachmaninov. This was a rare opportunity to hear the viola as a solo instrument. The highlight of our season came in January when the London Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Jessica Cottis returned to Dorking, probably for the last time, to give us a superb concert which started with Mozart's Marriage of Figaro overture and concluded with Schubert's 9th symphony, The Great. Chloe Hanslip gave a beautiful performance of Brahms' violin concerto. The Sacconi Quartet made a welcome return to Dorking for our string quartet series which had a Czech theme, playing quartets by Dvorák, Suk and Janácek. They also performed the interesting and approachable quartet Company by Philip Glass. It was a series very much enjoyed by appreciative audiences. In April Alexei Grynyuk gave a truly virtuoso piano recital to a packed Martineau Hall playing works by Bach, Beethoven, Chopin and Liszt. The season concluded with a concert in the Grand Hall given by the Yehudi Menuhin School Orchestra conducted by the school's recently appointed director of music, Oscar Colomina i Bosch. It was wonderful to hear these gifted students play works by Howells, Vaughan Williams, Vivaldi and Schubert with such skill and musicianship. The concert concluded with Oscar Colomina i Bosch's own arrangement for string orchestra of Schubert's string quartet Death and the Maiden.

This season we were fortunate to receive a generous grant of £2,000 from the Humphrey Richardson Taylor Charitable Trust and we received a legacy of £1,000 from Renée Stewart who died in February 2017. Renée was a very much valued member of the Concertgoers who for many years was a Trustee and member of the music subcommittee. Although the season was a great success musically we sustained a loss on the season of over £8,000. We cannot continue to lose such sums hence you will see that our 2018/19 season consists of only seven concerts with no orchestral concert.

Looking ahead

Dorking Concertgoers' seven concerts for the 2018/19 season comprise our usual string quartet series of three concerts and four varied recitals. The season starts on Saturday 6th October with the harp & flute duo of Oliver Wass and Henry Roberts. This concert, which features music by Bach, Bartók, Piazzolla, Lutosławski and Schubert, promises to be fascinating and forms part of the Mole Valley Arts Alive Festival. Oliver is sponsored by the Countess of Munster Musical Trust and we are very grateful to the Trust for their support. Our second concert on Saturday 10th November will be a piano recital given by Clare Hammond, noted for the virtuosity of her playing. Clare will play works by Haydn, Mendelssohn, Chopin, Debussy, Rimsky-Korsakov and Rachmaninov. The Dante String Quartet make a most welcome return to Dorking in January and February for a series of three concerts, each programming one of Beethoven's wonderful Razumovsky quartets. They will also play quartets by Haydn, Smetana, Glazunov, Shostakovich and Schumann. On 30th March the prize winning Australian violinist Emily Sun, accompanied by pianist Jennifer Hughes, will give a recital of works by Beethoven, Poulenc, Strauss and Saint-Saens. Emily is kindly supported by Making Music's Philip & Dorothy Green Young Artists Scheme. Our final concert is given by the duo of James Meldrum, clarinet and Maciej Kassak, piano. Their wide-ranging programme includes Debussy's Première rapsodie, Poulenc's clarinet sonata, and music by Piazzolla, Joseph Horovitz and Gershwin.

As well as receiving the sponsorship from the Countess of Munster Musical Trust and Making Music's Philip & Dorothy Green Young Artists Scheme mentioned above, we have been most fortunate to receive substantial sponsorship from five of our own members. Anne Usher, whose husband John our dynamic chairman very sadly died in October 2008, has sponsored our quartet series. Sir Brian & Lady Unwin are sponsoring the hire of the piano for our piano recital in November, and Chris. & Sue Pratt are sponsoring the piano hire for the clarinet recital which concludes our season. It is most gratifying that these members have supported us in this way and we are extremely grateful to them for their most generous sponsorship.

My appreciation and thanks go to all the committee members for their hard work, time and considerable expertise, upon which the Concertgoers depend.

NOTES ON THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH JUNE 2018

1 Accounting Policies

- (a) Basis of Accounting. The statement of accounts has been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the provisions of the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008, the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities (revised 2005) and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable to Charities (FRS102) effective January 2015
- (b) Income. Donations and legacies are accounted for when received by the Society. Other income is accounted for on an accruals basis as far as it is prudent to do so. Income is shown net of Value Added Tax.
- (c) Grants receivable. Revenue grants are credited to the income and expenditure account as received, unless related to a specific period, when they are placed in a restricted fund until used.
- (d) Taxation. As a registered charity the Society is generally exempt from Income Tax and Capital Gains Tax, but not from VAT. Irrecoverable VAT is included in the cost of those items to which it relates.
- (e) Depreciation of tangible fixed assets is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life:

The role of the Trustees, who are the Society's only volunteers, is to manage all aspects of the Society's activity of promoting and presenting classical music concerts.

None of the Trustees received any remuneration; Trustees' expenses reimbursed totalled £687.
