OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The Trustees continue to be guided by the original objectives as set out by the Trust Deed of 1985 which are embodied in the updated Trust Deed of 2009.

The Trustees are mindful of their need to be in tune with developments in the treatment of leukaemia and related blood disorders in the 21st Century and remain in negotiation with Bradford Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust about the creation and development of a new site for such treatment. Representatives from AFLRF have attended further planning meetings with hospital managers over the course of the year with this in mind.

The trustees have had regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and are mindful to ensure that the charity remains adherent to the guidance.

The objective as set out in the Trust Deed is the relief of sickness and in particular leukaemia, lymphoma and other related haematological diseases by implementing the improvement of patient facilities and promoting research into the cause, treatment and cure of such conditions in Bradford and surrounding district.

The charity aims to fulfil its objectives by providing direct financial support to patients and their immediate families, and on a wider basis, promoting initiatives which improve the quality of care.

The charity also provides financial assistance towards the purchase of new equipment and resources which facilitate improvements in client care and enable medical research and clinical trialling of new treatments.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

This has been a challenging year for AFLRF particularly in the light of a very sudden announcement by Bradford Teaching Hospitals Foundation Trust to close the Annette Fox Haematology Unit with very short notice in February. The unit has provided outstanding care and treatment to patients since opening in 1994 and it was a shock to us all that it should close so abruptly.

As far as we were concerned there was very little time for either ourselves or staff and patients to prepare and plan for such a massive upheaval. The office was closed with less than a week's notice and Michelle our administrator was left with no office to work in, and nowhere to store documents.

We now find that the inpatient part of the unit has moved to Ward 33 and the day patient part is on Ward 16. This is where our office is now located but unfortunately the two parts are at opposite ends of the hospital causing significant inconvenience for all concerned.

This sudden move has had an impact on fundraising, and our activities were temporarily disrupted because nobody knew where we had gone. The unexpected office move contributed towards the reduction in income during the year.

However, we have continued to support our core projects with aromatherapy sessions still being provided every week by Sandra Weatherall and still much appreciated by patients. She has offered her service to over 350 patients and has actually treated 200.

We have continued to support the increase in hours to our Welfare Rights Officer and his services are much sought after with a range of patients and their families benefitting from his support and advice and providing actual financial assistance for equipment and financial survival to patients suddenly affected by leukaemia.

Negotiations with the hospital regarding supporting the funding of a full-time research nurse have been successful, and the post is set to be operational from April 2018. We will be providing the sum of $\pounds40,000$ per year for three years.

As we have done previously, we supported a trip for children with serious blood disorders during the school holidays which proved popular for all.

Being mindful of increasing governance requirements we have also embarked on providing and accessing Trustee training and this will be an ongoing process to equip the trustees for the skills needed.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

As noted above, the current year has seen a reduction in income compared to last year.

Investment returns have however remained steady, and investments continue to be actively managed on an annual basis.

Fundraising efforts have continued and once again a very successful Gala Dinner Dance raised £12,000 in February of this year. Our thanks go to Smokie and all their supporters for making the night so special. We also held a successful Summer Ball, and thanks go to Shirley Taylor for organising this on our behalf.

We were also pleased with the increase in income from sales of Christmas cards.

Donations in memory of loved ones, income from various online donating streams such as Just Giving, and via Payroll Giving continue to provide regular income streams.

Cake stalls are always popular, and Doreen is still holding her regular weekly market stall for us at Shipley Market an outstanding contribution to the AFLRF over the years.

Finally, we would like to extend our grateful thanks to everyone who has supported us over the past twelve months; we really do appreciate your support and contributions.

The trustees are constantly looking for new opportunities to fund research and to improve the way in which care and support is provided to those in clinical or financial need.

The general fund amounted to $\pounds 1,100,061$ as at 31 March 2018 (2017 $\pounds 1,136,172$) which is considered prudent having regard to the charity's anticipated future requirements.

The Trust Deed provides that the trustees may invest monies in accordance with the Trustee Act 2000.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The charity is a non-corporate registered charity (number 516208), founded by Trust Deed in 1985 which was updated in May 2009.

Trustees are appointed by the Board of Trustees and serve for an indefinite period. The Trust Deed provides for no minimum or maximum number of trustees, although a quorum of four trustees is required at any meeting.

The trustees determine the general policy of the charity and agree the broad strategy and areas of activity for the trust, including consideration of grant making, investment, reserves and risk management policies and performance. The day to day administration of grants and the processing and handling of applications prior to consideration by the trustees is delegated to the administrator.

The Board keeps the skill requirements for the trustees under review and in the event that a trustee permanently retires or additional new trustees are required, the board seeks new trustees from persons known personally to them, or from a list of persons recommended to the Board by donors or sponsors. The ultimate decision on selection is, however, a matter for the Board of Trustees.

The induction process for any newly appointed trustee comprises an initial meeting with the Chair and the Board, followed by a series of short meetings with the chair on investments, the grant making process, powers and responsibilities of the trustee board. The welcome pack includes a brief history of the Trust, copies of relevant Board minutes, a copy of the latest annual reports and accounts, a copy of the governing trust deed and a copy of the Charity Commission's guidance 'The essential Trustee: What you need to know'.

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The financial statements have been in accordance with the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting (FRS102) effective 1 January 2015, and with applicable charity law.

There are no material uncertainties about the charities ability to continue.

The charity is a public benefit entity, providing support and advice to all members of the community as a need is identified.

No judgements were made in the course of preparing accounts.

FUNDS ACCOUNTING

During the financial year the charity did not have any designated, restricted or endowment funds hence the total funds are unrestricted and may be spent on any legitimate charitable aim as laid down in the Charity's Trust Deed.

INCOMING RESOURCES

Income is recognised generally when the charity becomes entitled to it, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount receivable can be measured reliably. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Donations are recognised on receipt, unless there are specific terms and conditions which must be satisfied before the charity becomes entitled to the resources. Donations in kind, where material, are included in the accounts at market value.

Legacies are recognised when it is probable that they will be received. Receipt is normally probable when there has been a grant of probate, it has been confirmed that there are sufficient assets in the estate to pay the legacy, and any conditions attached to the legacy have been satisfied.

Investment income is recognised where the general conditions for income recognition are met.

RESOURCES EXPENDED

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis when a legal or contractual obligation exists at the balance sheet date.

Resources expended are allocated according to the nature of the activity undertaken.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services including grants made to fund a research assistant, grants to individuals and their relatives and dependants for the relief of suffering

Fund raising costs include expenditure related to the organisation of promotional events such as dinner dances, family days and sponsored events, and items for re-sale.

Administration costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity, general running costs, independent examination fees, and costs linked to the strategic and day to day management. Other costs, including the costs of trustee meetings are met by the trustees personally
