Boxing4Life Annual Report 2017-18

Activities

During the year our weekly term-time sessions at two venues in Leytonstone attracted 70 students in total. In addition we had an active year with outreach sessions provided to ReachOut in Whitechapel, Leytonstone School, Sybourn School, Jenny Hammond School and Waltham Forest's summer activities programme - reaching some 75 further students. We also worked with young people participating in the National Citizen Service's Summer Programme.

For Jenny Hammond School in addition to non-contact boxing we provided a weekly Self Esteem session for 9 students (Years 4/5) selected by the school for extra support. This took the form of a discussion group about issues raised for the students by viewing films which included "Sing", "Asterix and the Mansions of the Gods", "Kubo and the Two Strings" and "The Princess Bride". Led by our gifted teacher, Greer Nicholson, topics for discussion included school and family expectations, fears and ambitions and personal challenges. These young people face many issues but were able to look at those and plan for the future. The classes were very popular with good attendance; parents were also enthusiastic.

At Leytonstone School we trained GCSE students and contributed to a very successful year for the school's PE department, which was No1 in the Borough and in the top 5% nationally.

This total of some 145 students compares well with 107 in the previous year.

Outcomes

This year we enhanced our Outcomes and monitoring processes to three core areas:

- 1. Increased Fitness & Boxing Skills,
- 2. Adopting a Growth Mindset,
- 3. Increased Confidence & Self-Belief.

The indicators used to measure these outcomes were:

- 1. Exercise and Skills performance
- 2. Raised aspirations, determination & resilience
- 3. Increased focus and sociability

We created a Fitness Tracker combined with a Skills Development Booklet this year in consultation with a pilot group of our students. Students were able to log their scores from circuit training exercises on a termly basis along with their growth mind-set rating and self-set goals. For example, one young person has progressed from doing 124 skips per minute (spm) to 183 spm over a 3 month period. We noticed that keeping a record of their results has created healthy competition and an increased determination to beat their last result by at least 1/2 extra repetitions.

We also introduced a 15 metre bleep test (timed shuttle runs) this year which measures endurance and stamina. Those who participated really enjoyed it. The results were mixed as expected with many achieving an average score of level 4 and above, a small number excelled achieving a level 10 which is an excellent outcome for their age ranges.
