#### Aims and activities

The principal activity of the company throughout the year was that of providing advice and support to refugees and refugee organisations and those who support them.

Refugees in Effective and Active Partnership (REAP) is an independent, refugee-led organisation in West London that works for equality for refugees and aims to empower refugees and asylum-seekers to live as equal members of British society. We believe that it is essential to protect the right to refuge so people can escape danger and suffering caused by persecution, and that one implication of giving refuge is that there must also be reasonable level of effective and equitable support for people as they recover and rebuild. We work towards our aim through practical and policy-oriented activities in partnership with others: through improving communication, enhancing the voices and building capability of those individuals who have sought refuge in the UK, and their communities; by promoting equality and equitable treatment for refugees in all their diversity; by facilitating organisations and individual activists and professionals that support refugees to rebuild their lives. REAP campaigns on policy issues identified in its work and responds proactively to policy developments, aiming to get the needs of refugees considered at all levels.

#### Structure, Governance and Management

In accordance with the Memorandum of Association, REAP trustees are voted in by Company Members at an AGM or if necessary an EGM. Occasionally, when there have been early resignations or there is a need to strengthen the Management Committee in specific areas, trustees are coopted to serve for the period until the next opportunity for a full election.

Trustees are provided with a briefing pack, and encouraged to take up one of several opportunities for further training as trustees available through the charity's contacts in the voluntary sector, primarily through the local CVS or London umbrella CVS body.

#### Achievements and Performance

2017/18 was a somewhat uninventive year, with a number of smaller projects and volunteer led activities running smoothly to their conclusion, and some new small funds to start new projects based on existing capacity, experience, membership and participants, especially in the area very local to REAP's office base. But there were no new strategies, initiatives or major new activities. However activities, staffing and finance were in balance throughout the year and important contacts and networks were well-maintained with lively exchanges and ideas.

Successes in previous years with networking were repeated with a number of very well received and useful networking events, especially consolidating networking activities relating to refugee homelessness and the annual conference, which drew an excellent turnout of professional contacts, many of whom had attended earlier REAP events. Again, we were successful in making the most of contacts with fully updated databases, email networking and new resource and link pages on REAP's webpage.

We are very grateful to the Frontline Workers' Network for supporting 'Refugees and Homelessness' events and activities.

The interpreting and 'Health Connector' work continued to provide experience and income to several REAP members, many of whom also gave back through volunteering time. The 'Grass Roots English Groups' however started to struggle without a strong range of volunteers, as there were no substantial opportunities to recruit or train new volunteers. However a couple of unlooked for new volunteers contacted REAP directly because of their own interests and commitment, and have brought new skills and approaches to the Grass Roots groups.

The HEAR Equality and Human Rights Network concluded it's time hosted by REAP, having obtained independent Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) status the previous year and starting to control its own funds from 1st April, though REAP continued hosting staff, funds and projects until the Autumn under earlier grant arrangements, then transferred staff and remaining assets to the new CIO at a suitable break in funding arrangements. REAP continues to work in close partnership with HEAR and intends to carry on doing so for the foreseeable future.

REAP has continued to host and facilitate the Afghan Women's Support Group, including facilitating crèche support and payments from EACH counselling. The Afghan Women's Support Group provides a very important support structure for some very vulnerable women, in the midst of a much larger group of women and REAP is proud to support it.

#### Financial Review

It was a year in balance, in which hard decisions in previous years allowed us to work for the year confident in the knowledge we could manage well enough even with very limited resources, without cutting into reserves. Unrestricted income was again a priority, though not as substantial as the previous year, but several extremely generous donations, in particular from Methodist churches in the area, and also from individuals, provided the additional funds to let us work beyond the minimum core activities - in particular supporting the English groups and enabling REAP to continue networking - areas of work that are of no interest to most grantmaking bodies at present.

As usual, the largest proportion of expenditure was salary and casual contract staffing (Health Connectors) costs with a small proportion going to interpreters payments and costs. There was no cost of living increase but pension percentages rose in line with Auto-enrollment requirements. We maintained our principle of never paying below the London Living Wage.

<u>Trustees</u>
The present Directors/Trustees are as shown on Page One, with four trustees standing down, and one new trustee, plus others who expressed interest in standing in future years. Following the AGM the Acting Chair agreed to continue as Acting Chair as no other trustee felt able to stand for Chair. The Company Secretary remained the same throughout the year.

Bridge to Community: Refugee and Migrant Families in Community Life (Big Lottery Fund - Awards for All: Feb 2017 – Jan 2018) A one year project working closely with 12 primary schools and Childrens Centres plus additional services, support and work with a larger group of schools and Children's Centres in West London to engage refugee families directly at and onsite in the school, linking them to wider community opportunities for confidence, opportunities and community integration.

#### 1 Accounting policles

#### (a) Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and comply with the Microentity regulations. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland (FRS102)(effective January 2015).

#### (b) Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity.

#### (c) Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are general funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

#### (d) Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities (SOFA) when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

#### (e) Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources. Management and administration costs (governance costs) are those incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

#### (f) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost including any incidental expenses of acquisition.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost on a reducing balance basis over their expected useful economic lives as follows:

#### (g) Pension costs
