#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Willow Garden Project is an independent community based charity garden project. It is governed by a Deed of Trust dated 22nd February 2012 for keeping the project focused on its purpose – ensuring it is solvent, meeting legal requirements and those of good governance.

The charity trustees are responsible for the general control and management of the charity. Trustees meet at least four times each year to take all decisions necessary jointly with regard to the review of the Charity's activities and achievement of objectives. All trustees give their time voluntary and received no remuneration or other financial benefits.

Ongoing costs of the project's core activities is funded in many ways, including charitable grants and awards on the basis of achieving agreed targets and outcomes, or conducting specified activities. These funds are supplemented with unrestricted monies raised by fundraising, community donations and organised charitable events.

#### STAFF AND VOLUNTEERS

The garden has nineteen volunteers supporting the work and fundraising events, but only a small group of nine who support the different weekly activities — we have a minimum of two people supporting each group gardening session. There is one paid member of staff, Mrs Pamela Laird, who is the project's founder and a qualified horticultural tutor working as the site manager and workshop facilitator. There are also six voluntary trustees.

Sessional workers are contracted on a self-employed basis when expert services are required by the project to run workshops in addition to those that are normally scheduled over the three days a week. In these circumstances the funding source (restricted) is included within the successful bid/award grant and payment would be made on completion of the specific piece of project work.

## **OUR PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES**

Established in 2012, the garden has been built on derelict underused land leased from the local cricket club. With the good will and help of experienced volunteers, including support from the local councils, charities and other groups it has become a flourishing community serving garden - including a cabin fit for purpose/disabled access building. Funding for the garden work is raised by organising fundraising and profile-raising events and is supported through general public donations and by service users.

The purpose of the charity is to provide facilities for healthy recreation (particularly gardening and horticulture) and leisure time pursuits in the interest of social welfare for people living in Fleetwood and surrounding areas who have need of such facilities by reason of their infirmity or disablement, youth, age, financial hardship or social circumstances with the object of improving their conditions of life.

Today we have around forty-five regular service users (adults with physical and mental disabilities) attending weekly — with some really good results. More recently we have extended our support to people living with dementia and cancer. We also provide different sessions to local nurseries, schoolchildren and other organisations and businesses on an ad hoc basis.

Our main objectives of the year continued to be the promotion and delivery of a professional, independent and outcome-based support services to a range of clients. Developing community links and working in partnership and in collaboration with Lancashire County Council, Healthier Fleetwood and other supporting organisations and potential service users to undertake targeted pieces of work and encourage new users to the project.

The project's founder, Pamela Laird takes responsibility for the ongoing day-to-day management of the community-serving garden site. A team of volunteers contribute to the routine cultivation of the garden; and help organise the charity's activities, including:

- Practical gardening group sessions to learn and engage in food growing activities.
- Making green and upcycled crafts in our 'cabin' resource centre
- Organising seasonal workshops in the run up to Easter, Halloween and Christmas
- Marketing the flowers and vegetables grown in our garden
- Supporting neighbouring groups and organisations with developing their gardens, planting etc.
- Raising funds through regular bag packing in local supermarkets
- Other fundraising events such as open days, fayres and community activities.

#### **REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS**

The main activities and achievements from this accounting period are described below.

We currently deliver weekly gardening therapy to local residents living with disability, isolation and mental or physical ill-health. The workshops led by a Willow horticultural Instructor take participants through a wide variety of gardening activities and nature crafts. A small group of volunteers help with the sessions — these people are a real asset, offering enthusiastic participation, hands-on skills and support with fundraising activities.

A grant from United Utilities Lancashire Community Fund has enabled us to initiate new group gardening sessions for people living with dementia. Delivery of the garden sessions have been run onsite, one-on-one home visits and for small groups in 3 Care Homes. As part of this grant sessional Tutors have been recruited and trained in Dementia care to support these sessions, approximately 70 workshops with the aim to help people living with dementia feel sociable, included and able. Feedback is positive on this new work.

Additional funding awarded by two local supermarkets has helped to sustain the project's ongoing horticulturally based activities and workshops; enabling us to promote health and wellness in other activities and events across the Fylde Coast and for facilities development; BT Business Line and Broadband service has been installed, the cabin refreshed with new flooring, storage units and new benches and a table purchased for around the pond area.

A further grant awarded by a local Councillor has been used to remodel our pond areas; installing an ecosolar pump, new safety grid and treatments to clear the pond water with new fish and plants.

The business owner of Unique Estate Agency in Thornton Cleveleys is now giving the charity regular support with a monthly payment donation. This money is being used to help with costs associated to our workshop programme, materials for purposeful activity and charity fundraising events.

We have also been fortunate to receive one-off donations from other local businesses; including Co-op Funeral Care, Gee Tees store and BP Northwest Everest Platform. As well as a legacy payment from the estate of one service user who has died. A hugh thank you also goes out to Nicole Danielle Booth for arranging a fantastic fundraising day for the Willow Garden Project at Blackpool Wakepark — the sun shined all day and it was a great turn out by our supporters. Donations of compost, seeds and other things have been given to the project by people following our Facebook pages.

With the wider community, the project offered free veggie plants to schools and nurseries via our Facebook page, great response with produce given to 20 schools in Fleetwood, Cleveleys, Bispham and Over Wyre including Child Care Day Nurseries.

The project was selected as a finalist in the Annual Enterprise In Society Awards (Selnet Awards 2017). Being shortlisted in two categories; Enabling Ability Award and Environmental Champion of the Year but not chosen as the winner.

Again, we were pleased to be part of Fleetwood's Britain in Bloom 2017 efforts working in partnership with the wider community to help raise the profile of the town and make the place look nicer. Our service users helped in planting flowers around the town and in creating the project display at Euston Gardens – the small park between the North Euston Hotel and the waterfront at the Fleetwood Esplanade. Our display had individual handcrafted butterflies on sticks made by all the service users, large crafted sunflowers and lady birds and bees painted on pots and a planted wheelbarrow of different vegetables growing made up in cocreation workshops at our garden site. There was also a number of flower planters that had been set up at our new dementia gardening workshops in local residential care homes. Our beautiful display was admired, and the RHS North West in Bloom judges presented us with a 2017 Its Your Neighbour award of level 5 – Outstanding.

We at Willow Garden are helping to improve quality of life for local people, we offer a holistic approach to wellbeing through therapeutic gardening that anyone with different abilities and disabilities, including mental health issues can take part in, benefit from and enjoy gardening.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

The results for the year and financial position of the charity are set out in the annexed accounts. The trustees have examined the requirement to maintain reserves for the ongoing work of the charity and concluded that the most appropriate level is between three and six months of operational expenditure. The trustees consider the financial performance by the charity during the year to have been in line with their expectations.

The Statement of Financial Activities shows an overall deficit for the year of £5,606 (2017: surplus of £2,709) and reserves stand at £66,745 (2017: £72,351).

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

# 1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with The Charities Act 2011, and Accounting and Reporting by charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102 (effective 1 January 2016 – Charities SORP (FRS102)).

# 1.2 Reconciliation with Previous Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the Managing Trustees are responsible in law.

#### 1.3 Income and endowments

Donations, and other forms of voluntary income, are recognised as incoming resources when receivable and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Grants received are treated as income and are reflected in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Income from fundraising activities are accounted for under the accruals concept. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers.

#### 1.4 Expenditure

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. Expenditure is allocated between the following categories:

- Cost of raising funds
- Cost of activities in furtherance of the charity's objects
- Governance costs

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

#### 1.5 Funds

Restricted funds represent donations or grants received for a specific object. The funds may only be expended on the specific object for which they were given. Any balance remaining unspent at the end of each year must be carried forward as a balance on that fund.

Unrestricted funds are general funds which can be used for the charity's ordinary purpose.

#### 1.6 Fixed Assets

Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £500. They are valued at cost or a reasonable value on receipt.

# 1.7 Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:
