During the period the Trust raised funds largely in the form of voluntary donations from clients and staff of Noble Caledonia and a donation by Noble Caledonia for the following purposes;

To conserve and protect the natural environment for the public benefit, the NCCT assisted with the South Georgia Heritage Trust's rat eradication programme. This will enable birds to breed and return to nesting in South Georgia and increase the populations of endemic species.

To conserve and protect the natural environment for the public benefit, the NCCT assisted the Polar Bears & Humans project raise awareness of the illegal hunting of Polar Bears and promote their conservation and protection

To assist victims of natural disaster, preserve health and promote education the NCCT assisted with the repair and restocking of the Portsmouth Library in Dominica.

### Achievements and performance

The Trust is supported by Noble Caledonia Limited which has provided generous support over the period. As a consequence, the Trustees are able to use or earmark all the funds donated by clients of Noble Caledonia Limited and members of the public for charitable projects and activities".

The Trust principally raises funds from members of the public who travel on Noble Caledonia Limited's cruises and who wish to provide support to communities and institutions carrying out charitable work in the regions that are visited by Noble Caledonia cruises. The Trust uses mailings, presentations, auctions and crew shows to raise funds. Noble Caledonia Limited's staff also carry out fundraising activities on behalf of NCCT and its projects. The main achievements during the year were:

Continuing the Trust's work in area of the Philippines devastated by Typhoon Yolanda; funds were donated to build a day care classroom in a resettlement community in Ivisan where those whose homes and livelihoods were destroyed by the typhoon have been rehoused. The school is under the supervision of the local Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) and supported by the local community. The classroom can be converted to a safety shelter/haven in eventualities of disasters like typhoons.

The Trust supported expedition team members working in the West Indian Ocean on the MV Island Sky to collect seawater samples for microplastics analysis. More work on the clean-up of the fragile ocean environment is planned.

Assisted the South Georgia Heritage Trust in the conservation and protection of the bird population of South Georgia by eradicating rats from the island. The NCCT held an auction during a cruise to South Georgia and Antarctica of items relating to the area and facilitated talks from the SGHT to raise donations.

Gave relief and assistance to the people of Dominica following tremendous hurricane damage by assisting the repair of the Portsmouth library roof and restocking the library to promote education.

In addition NCCT, supported the work of the Humans and Polar Bear research project aimed at creating awareness of the impact of illegal hunting on the polar bear population.
