TRUSTEES REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of GOODS FOR GOOD (GLOBAL) for the year ended 31 March 2018. The Trustees confirm that the Annual report and financial statements of the charity comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charity's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005.

Structure, governance and management

Government document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust and constitutes an unincorporated charity

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error

Objectives and Activities

Objectives and aims

Goods for Good (Global)'s charitable objective is to prevent or relieve poverty by providing items to individuals in need and/or charities or other organisations working to prevent or relieve poverty. In practice, this means that the charity sources both new, overstocked goods from British industry and second-hand goods from the community, and delivers them to vulnerable communities overseas.

The aims of Goods for Good (Global) are:

- To encourage and support British businesses and retailers to divert overstocks to vulnerable communities rather than sending them to landfill or for incineration
- To establish and nurture relationships with humanitarian aid organisations working on-theground with displaced communities
- To ensure smooth and swift transportation of the goods sourced to those in need

Significant activities

The activities that Goods for Good undertakes to achieve its aims include:

- Working with humanitarian aid organisations operating in places affected by war, persecution, and natural disaster to identify the types of goods needed to alleviate poverty and restart lives
- Working with British businesses and retailers to source new, overstocked goods that will meet the needs identified by the humanitarian aid organisations on-the-ground, thereby saving the goods from becoming waste
- Transporting the goods to where they are most needed
- Welcoming donations of second-hand goods from the community in and around its base in Borehamwood, Hertfordshire, which are then included in the international shipments
- Since February 2018, second-hand sorted goods are being distributed to local UK registered charities supporting vulnerable people; such as the homeless, refugees and asylum seekers.
- Hosting and supporting volunteers who come to the Goods for Good warehouse to process and pack the donated goods.

TRUSTEES REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

Achievement and performance

2017/18 is the second year in which Goods for Goods (Global) has presented its Annual Report and Accounts as a registered charity and it has been a year of tremendous growth for the organisation.

We measure the performance of Goods for Good both quantitatively in terms of the amount of goods we divert to those in need, and qualitatively in terms of the difference our work makes to our recipients.

Between 1 April 2017 and 31 March 2018, we achieved the following quantitative milestones:

- We established and nurtured relationships with 75 companies
- 820 tonnes of goods worth £5m were transported overseas
- 768,000 vulnerable people benefitted from the goods we sourced
- We had 150volunteers registered to come and pack goods at our warehouse in Borehamwood
- We sent goods to twelve different overseas charity recipients for distribution-

In terms of the difference we make to the quality of life of people who have been displaced or who are living in poverty, we receive regular written reports and photographic evidence from our humanitarian aid partners on the ground and representatives of Goods for Good travel to see our work in action.

In terms of the resources we have secured to deliver our work, we raised significant funds through private donations and small family-run trusts, but, to be able to do more in the years ahead, we know that we need to increase our fundraising during 2017/18 and we are planning a summer supper quiz event. We wish to thank all our funders during the year.

We were grateful to JAMI, the mental health service for the Jewish community, which continued to allow us to use space in their warehouse in Borehamwood so that we could collect second-hand goods from the community. We were also grateful to our remote warehouse partners in Leicester and Manchester, which allowed us storage space at no or little cost. During the coming year, we expect to move to a new facility in Borehamwood, which will allow us to streamline our operation and process an increased quantity of goods.

Our last vote of thanks goes to our volunteers, without whom we would not be able to carry out our important work. Having recently carried out a volunteer survey, we now know more about the people who give up their time to support us, and we have made plans to make their time volunteering with us more comfortable when we move to our new premises.

Charitable activities

Goods for Good (Global) delivers humanitarian aid collected from both British Industry and communities to impoverished communities outside of the UK. Whilst companies have been donating their overstocked goods to us, we ensure that we maintain a high level of donor care by thanking them for their help and keeping them updated with our activities. By doing so, many of our donors come back to us to donate more. By donating their goods to us and protecting their brand, they are not sending overstocked goods to landfill or destroying them, a knock-on environmental benefit appreciated by all. The constant movement of large volumes of new goods has been facilitated by our charity partners in the Netherlands, www.hrif.nl, who help us collect, sort, repack and deliver the large volumes of donated goods from the UK to the recipient charity, via their humanitarian aid warehouse in Weesp.

TRUSTEES REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

We inform our corporate donors, our community donors and volunteers of our progress by writing to them, sending out newsletters, and keeping our social media channels updated. During the summer months of July-August 2017 a graduate volunteered and helped with the running of our operation. During that time we increased our capacity with community outreach.

Our volunteers have supported us during the year by attending regular packing sessions at our warehouse. Their time and dedication to our cause is reflected in their collecting, delivering, sorting and packing vast volumes of second-hand goods – all of which are as-new condition. These goods are shipped to the charities we support overseas together with the new goods donated from British industry. The volunteer packing sessions are always supervised to maintain a high level of quality control. Goods which are not of high enough quality are recycled and a small income is made from their sale. Similarly, if designer goods with labels are found during the sessions, these are put on to our eBay shop to raise funds. One volunteer who is an experienced eBay seller volunteer for us one morning weekly.

We work with schools and inter-faith groups and places of worship, youth clubs, families, communities and companies to encourage the involvement of all age groups in both donating goods, time and funds for logistics.

On Mitzvah Day, our charity hosted an afternoon event to which over 50 inter-faith volunteers between the ages of 10 and 83 came to our Borehamwood warehouse to help us sort and pack school stationery for overseas refugees in Kurdistan. A wonderful community spirit prevailed as people worked together for a common important cause.

GOING CONCERN

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies.

CONSTITUTION

The principal object of the charity is to collect and distribute goods to impoverished communities out of the UK. In February 2018 the Trustees voted to support local UK charities with clothing and shoes, toiletries, nappies and hygiene goods.

METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OR ELECTION OF TRUSTEES

The management of the charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Trust deed.

RESERVES POLICY

The trustees have set reserves policy which requires that:

- Reserves are maintained at a level which ensures that six months of Goods for Good's core
 activity could continue during a period of unforeseen difficulty.
- A proportion of reserves are maintained in a readily realisable form.
- This policy and the level of reserves shall be reviewed annually at the meeting immediately following the Annual General Meeting

Plans for the future

As Goods for Good moves into its third year as a registered charity, our intention is to consolidate what has been achieved so far and continue to invest in our operational base so that we can receive, process and transport an increased quantity of goods.

To do this, we will:

- Open and fil-out a new donated facility in Borehamwood or surrounding area, so that we can take
 in larger deliveries of goods from business partners and our local community
- Involve more UK companies in our work as a part of their CSR policy.
- Invest in training and improved support for our volunteers, enabling more people to come and help
 us with packing the goods for onward transportation
- Increase our efforts to diversify our income sources through fundraising so that we can scale up our work, particularly in terms of the numbers of staff we are able to employ.
- Work with a broader range of international supporting their activities through the donation of particular types of goods

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015). The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' published in March 2005 and applicable accounting standards.

1.2 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

1.3 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of financial activities when the charity has entitlement to the funds, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Donated services or facilities, which comprise donated services, are included in income at a valuation which is an estimate of the financial cost borne by the donor where such a cost is quantifiable and measurable. No income is recognised where there is no financial cost borne by a third party.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Income tax recoverable in relation to investment income is recognised at the time the investment income is receivable.

1.4 Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular activities they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

1.5 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

- Office equipment - 25% reducing balance
