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## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

## FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2018

The Trustees, who are also Directors of the charity for the purposes of Company Law, present their annual report together with the accounts for the year ended 31st March 2018. They are prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1st January 2015) (as amended by Update Bulletin 1 on 2nd February 2016).

## **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### **Objects and activity**

The charity's objects are:

- the relief of unemployment for the public benefit in such ways as may be thought fit including assistance to find employment.
- the relief of poverty through the provision of advice, information and legal representation.

The beneficiaries of these objects are all adults who live in the Unitary Authority of Luton and the surrounding area within Bedfordshire.

The Trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing their aims and objectives and in planning future activities. In particular, the Trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Luton Rights was formed in 1982 as a TUC Centre for The Unemployed at a time when there was rising unemployment and political and social unrest in England.

Luton Rights continues its work today in an environment where changes through the Government's welfare reforms have left many people confused and anxious; increasing digitalisation of application forms from benefits applications to job applications are leaving those without IT skills and access to IT at a serious disadvantage; whilst it is true that the official unemployment rate is the lowest it has been, increasing numbers of working people are in part-time work or zero-hours contracts, having to work in two or more jobs. The work of Luton Rights is needed just as much today as it was when we were formed.

Over a number of years all of the main advice agencies in Luton have made changes to the way they work with the aim of increasing efficiency and reducing back-office costs which provide free-ofcharge advice to the residents of Luton against a backdrop of considerable financial cutbacks in both the public sector and voluntary and charity sectors; the co-location of Citizens Advice Luton, Law Centre and ourselves at Community House located on New Bedford Road, supported by Luton Borough Council, has enabled real efficiencies and cost savings without reducing the levels of front-line services.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE (continued)

2017/18 has been full of challenges and opportunities:

<sup>o</sup> We successfully moved our administrative centre to Unite the Union's main Luton Office in King Street as services continued to be provided at Community House and outreach without disruption providing a specialist welfare benefits provision at Community House.

<sup>o</sup> We successfully completed the project "Information Support Network Development" (funded by Luton Borough Council) and we continue to work successfully within the Luton Access Partnership, and a key component of the partnership is the delivery of advice services from a co-location which is being successfully delivered by the partners.

<sup>o</sup> We have continued and developed access to advice for the most vulnerable and at risk residents of Luton through our community outreach service.

<sup>°</sup> We continued to be providers of Family Mediation and have been successful in re-tendering with the Legal Aid Agency to continue providing the service to those who qualify for Legal Aid beyond September 2018.

<sup>o</sup> We were successfully included in Voluntary Works bid to deliver the ESF and Big Lottery Fund's "Building Better Opportunities – support to understand your money" project. The project has been successful in engaging with over and above the target numbers and due to this we have been able to work with more participants with the project delivery to come to an end during December 2018.

As we have streamlined our services over last couple of years, particularly around debt and housing, we have nevertheless proven to successfully meet the demand of our service users and this has also allowed us to reflect on the challenges faced by the town and target our services better, working in partnership with other organisations and statutory services within the town and the surrounding area.

In the last 12 months Luton Rights has focussed on providing specialist level welfare benefits advice as its main area of work. During the year Luton Rights has provided:

<sup>o</sup> Specialist Welfare Benefits advice - we continued to provide the specialist component of Welfare Benefits within the co-location at Community House, with our work primarily focused around mandatory reconsiderations and appeals.

<sup>°</sup> Community outreach advice at four community locations outside the town centre, focussed on increasing access to advice for the most vulnerable and disadvantaged and our thanks go to the managers and staff at these community locations for supporting us in our work and promoting the service.

• **Family mediation service** for Luton residents who are separating or facing divorce. HM Court Service requires couples to first engage with mediation before the Court will hear their separation or divorce proceedings. With the huge cuts introduced by HM Government to Legal Aid, clients who meet the criteria are able to claim Legal Aid for this area of advice.

<sup>o</sup> **Employment Support** - supported unemployed clients to gain employment, accredited training or move closer to the job market. Funded by European Social Fund and The Big Lottery Fund, the project focuses on helping unemployed people manage their money more effectively and at the same time improve the employability skills and career options.

During the year Luton Rights provided help and advice to 1,333 residents of Luton with over 1,000 receiving specialist welfare advice which resulted in over £4.5 million of benefit gains. This means Luton residents are £4.5 million better off than before they sought our help. Nearly 200 vulnerable and at risk residents were supported through our community outreach service and 44 people helped through our Building Better Opportunities project – nearly half of whom have gained paid employment.

Despite the challenges, we have had a year of successfully delivering services to those in our communities who are in need and this has been due to the hard work and commitment of all our staff and volunteers and our thanks to everyone who has contributed to making this another successful year for Luton Rights.

We would like to thank Unite the Union for continuing to support us with office space at their new site without which we would not be able to provide the level of service that we have been able to provide. The support of Unite has made it possible for us to re-connect with our roots and to promote our services to those who may not have been previously aware of Luton Rights.

The Board of Trustees and centre manager would like to extend our thanks to all our funders for their support, especially London Luton Airport Limited and Luton Borough Council who have continued to support us to provide services to those who are most in need living and working in Luton.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

The results of the charity for the year are set out in the Statement of Financial Activities on page 9.

Overall the charity had a surplus for the year of £6,113 (2017 - £5,178 deficit).

#### Investment powers and policy

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the charity has the power to invest in any way the trustees wish.

#### **Reserves policy**

#### Restricted

The following are classified as restricted, as the donor has imposed restrictions on the use of funds, which are legally binding.

#### Building Better Opportunities - Voluntary Works

The project aims to support unemployed or economically inactive individuals improve their financial capacity and tackle out of work poverty which will enable them to be more job ready, and in the longer term move into work.

Project objectives:

• increased awareness by individuals of the support available for financial inclusion and understanding on how to manage finances;

• lower levels of poverty and therefore bringing more prosperity to the local communities;

• increased understanding of the effect of welfare reforms, benefits cap, universal credit and better off calculations;

• increased partnership working.

#### **Unrestricted funds**

In accordance with guidelines issued by the Charity Commissioners, the Trustees have adopted a policy regarding reserves to ensure that sufficient finance is available to adequately respond to the potential for a curtailment or cessation of operations in the event of a significant variation in funding.

The level of reserves is considered and reviewed at regular intervals by the Trustees.

## PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

We will continue to work in partnership through Luton Access with a focus on welfare benefits advice and our community outreach service.

We will seek resources for delivery of additional advice services targeted at those who are vulnerable and are not able to access mainstream advice in the town centre.

Consult with stakeholders and produce new three year business plan.

Continue working in partnership within Luton Access, our other partners and develop new partnerships.

Refresh of marketing and promotional materials developing a new website for Luton Rights.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### **Governing document**

The charity was formed in March 2003 as an unincorporated charity which was registered with the Charity Commission. It was incorporated on 24th May 2006 as a company limited by guarantee, and was re-registered with the Charity Commission on 22nd March 2012.

The governing instruments currently in force are the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

There are currently 6 members (2017 - 6), each of whom agrees to contribute £10 in the event of the charity winding up.

#### **Appointment of trustees**

Trustees are appointed by the members at the Annual General Meeting, which is normally held in December.

#### Trustees induction and training

All new Trustees are given an induction pack to keep. These packs are reviewed and updated regularly.

#### Organisation

The names of the Trustees who served during the year are set out on page 7.

The Trustees meet on a regular basis and the day to day management of the charity is delegated to the Centre Manager.

#### Management committee

The Luton Rights Management Committee is a committee of the Board of Trustees and as such is answerable to it. The committee is established for an annual term every year. Should the Board not be able to place confidence in the work of the management committee during the year, an EGM must be called for the committee to be disbanded. As part of the renewal process, the Board must assess the work done by the management committee against the requirements of the Board.

#### Purpose of management committee

The management committee will provide an advisory service to the Board of Trustees.
- To provide the role of "critical friend" through receiving reports and making comments on the plans, delivery and impact of Luton Rights work, making recommendations and raising concerns where necessary to the Board of Trustees.

#### **Risk management**

The Trustees carry out an annual review of the risks which the charity may face, have established systems and procedures to mitigate any risks identified and minimise any potential impact should any identified risks materialise.

## NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

## FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2018

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### (a) Basis of preparation

- (i) The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.
- (ii) The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1st January 2015) (as amended by Update Bulletin 1 on 2nd February 2016) and the Companies Act 2006.
- (iii) The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102.

#### (b) Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the charity are the trustees named on page 7. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to  $\pounds 10$  per member of the charity.

#### (c) Fund accounting

- (i) The charity's unrestricted general fund consists of funds which the charity may use for its purposes at its discretion. The designated funds are set aside from unrestricted general funds for specific future purposes.
- (ii) The charity's restricted funds are those where the donor has imposed restrictions on the use of the funds which are legally binding.

#### (d) Income recognition

All income is accounted for when the charity has entitlement, there is certainty of receipt and the amount is measurable. Income is accounted for on a receivable basis, except where donors specify that donations and grants given to the charity must be used in future accounting periods, then the income is deferred until those periods.

#### (e) Expenditure recognition

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

#### (f) Fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is charged on the reducing balance basis over the expected useful lives of the assets at the following rates:

Computer equipment - 33.33%

#### (g) Pension costs and other post - retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension held in a separately administered fund. Contributions payable to the pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
