Your committee worked hard during the year carrying out their various honorary roles. But, as can be seen below, were also involved in all the key events and actions in the year. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the committee and other members for all their help during the year.

Key Events and actions

- HADAS was involved in another excavation in conjunction with UCL at Hendon School.
 This kept the digging team under Bill Bass busy not just the excavation but the postexcavation analysis of artefacts and the report.
- The digging team went on to support the Battle of Barnet project by digging test pits in the grounds of Wrotham Estate. Little evidence of the Battle was found maybe next time!
- Another aspect of HADAS is the Sunday morning gathering in the basement at Avenue House organised by Bill Bass. Here finds are processed, digs discussed, planning applications reviewed over coffee.
- On 29th June there was a successful "Bus Pass" outing initiated by Jo & Jim Nelhams to the Crossrail exhibition at Docklands Museum.
- Then in September we had the long HADAS trip to Frodsham successfully organised by Jim & Jo. These trips take a lot of hard work to organise finding a suitable hotel, identifying what and where to visit, planning the coach routes and ensuring appropriate facilities, etc. This year's trip was particularly successful (see full reports from 18 members in HADAS newsletters).
- The HADAS "Finds Processing" Course ran successfully again this year tutored by Jacqui Pearce with 16 students. This was the 13th year of the course.
- In November, after a lot of work by Roger Chapman, a new HADAS web site was introduced and a successful transfer from our old difficult-to-maintain web site was achieved.
- In December we had the HADAS Christmas party put together by Jo and Jim with help from Vicki Baldwin and Liz Gapp. Although it was a successful event many people could not attend due to snow causing transport issues.
- On 24th of March we had a full-day practical archaeology training day for Birkbeck College Archaeology Society. This event was organised by Melvyn Dresner with help from many HADAS members. It was a very successful event with all the participants saying how much they enjoyed it.
- Throughout the year, Peter Pickering reviewed all the planning applications in the Borough of Barnet from an archaeological point of view and ensured that Historic England were informed if appropriate.
- The production of the newsletters was successfully supervised by Sue Willetts despite a number of difficulties.
- The winter lecture series with speakers arranged by Stephen Brunning was wellattended. Getting new and interesting speakers for our eight winter series lectures is a difficult and time-consuming task which Stephen, our honorary membership secretary, successfully achieves.
- A HADAS team took part in four of the "Avenue House" quizzes winning some, losing some!

All-in-all the year ending 31st March 2018 was a successful year for HADAS.

Our dwindling number of active committee members worked very hard to bring you these events as well as carrying out all the normal routine tasks. Mary Rawitzer has retired from looking after the production of the newsletters – we thank her for all her hard work. Fieldwork report for HADAS AGM 2017/2018.

Hendon School Golders Rise, Hendon, London, NW4 2HP. TQ 23610 89011 June 2017 HADAS/UCL (Institute of Archaeology) Site Code: GDR17

HADAS and the UCL conducted an excavation and a program of activities to introduce archaeology to the pupils of Hendon School.

Following on from previous community work at the school between 2006 and 2012 where finds from the Roman to Modern periods were found, a further a 6 x 2m trench was excavated in June 2017 along the northern boundary of the playing field adjacent to the tall chain-link 'catch fencing', a further two small test-pits were excavated just to the west of the main trench.

The natural London Clay was overlain by a disturbed plough soil containing a smattering of degraded Roman pottery, an amount of medieval pottery and examples of building material, claypipe, pottery etc from the 17th to 20th centuries. The topsoil produced a similar material with modern coinage, glass and so forth.

Although the results were mixed, it showed the continuing presence of archaeology and gave the pupils a flavour of what local-history and field-archaeology is about.

Battle of Barnet Survey

Wrotham Park, Barnet, Herts TO 524813 198577 2nd- 6th Oct 2017

Huddersfield University/ Barnet Museum

Site Code: BOB17

As members may be aware there has been a wide ranging archaeological survey and small-scale test-pitting excavation over the last couple of years to test the theory that the Battle of Barnet took place further north than the accepted area of Hadley Green. The survey is being undertaken by Glenn Foard of Huddersfield University and Sam Wilson of Cotswold Archaeology with Barnet Museum organisation and volunteers. Part of that search is to try and locate the Chantry Chapel said to have been built after the conflict possibly over or nearby burial pits containing the dead.

The 2017 campaign included a further metal-detecting survey and a range of test-pits over the possible site of the chapel. This area has been previously surveyed with geophysics but this had been inconclusive, the land had also been built over by subsequent owners perhaps masking earlier archaeology. On this occasion HADAS were involved by supplying volunteers from our Fieldwork Team together with digging tools, volunteers from Barnet Museum were also involved, all overseen by battlefield specialist Sam Wilson

A total of 16 1x1m test-pits were dug within the moated area, most of the finds were post-medieval brick and tile demolition rubble, a substantial brick built 'culvert' was seen at the bottom of one trench. There were some finds that may indicate some earlier occupation but it is inconclusive at the moment. So unfortunately as yet no real sign of the chapel foundation and not much late medieval material (so far) but the finds will undergo cleaning and processing at Barnet Museum which may reveal further evidence.

Birkbeck Archaeological Society (BAS) Training Day

Stephens House and Gardens in Finchley, East End Road, London N3 3QE 24th March **HADAS**

On the 24th March HADAS conducted a 'Training Day' on behalf of BAS, the idea being that not all students attending Birkbeck courses get a lot of 'hands on' experience of fieldwork, planning in 'Archaeological Priority Areas', finds processing and so on. As HADAS has a certain amount of experience in the above matters it was thought a good idea to arrange a day where students could partake in and gain an insight in these various projects.

The Dining Room was used for a PowerPoint presentation and talks on various methods and practice in the planning process and the differences between professional and volunteer archaeology, also the archaeological archive and books. The HADAS Basement was used for finds processing e.g. washing, marking, recording and packaging of finds, also a display of a couple of past HADAS

digs. The garden found itself being the base for practicing 'Resistivity', the laying out of base and grid lines, the methods of 'levelling' with the use of a 'dumpy level', finding benchmarks, mapping and so forth.

Initial feedback appears to indicate that it was a worthwhile exercise for the students who could apply some 'hands on' knowledge to their classes or further afield with several joining the ranks of HADAS membership.

The Basement Room

The room continues to hold its Sunday sessions in processing the finds from digs, organising the archive and the planning of future projects. The finds from the 'Evening Class' Lant Street site is also held here for the Wednesday classes. The room contains our library, finds, documents and Newsletter archive.

Planning

Planning applications have been monitored over the year with an eye being kept on those which fall within 'Archaeological Priority Areas'. These are referred to Barnet Council and English Heritage GLAAS (Greater London Archaeological Advisory Service), sometimes we will approach the developers/owners ourselves if the site is small or not of enough interest to GLAAS. A member continued his watching-brief at the ever changing RAF Museum, Hendon. Usually though sites of interest are tackled by professional units, a number of areas have been inspected over the year.

A useful article 'Protecting, Conserving and Understanding Barnet's Archaeology' was published in the August 2017 HADAS Newsletter.

Barnet Council have been reviewing their 'Schedule of Buildings of Local Architectural or Historic Interest'. Several HADAS members and other members of the public were involved checking existing entries and proposing newer ones.

As ever, many thanks to the Fieldwork Team and those who help in organising, publishing, excavating, finds processing and all the other aspects of fieldwork we undertake.

Membership Secretary and Lecture Coordinator Report

This report represents the membership year 01/04/17 to 31/03/18.

The Society is fortunate in the large legacy received from the late Ted Sammes. Some of this has been invested in charitable funds managed by Mercantile and General. It is understood that this should be used to continue Ted's work, in particular to document the digs which took place under his leadership.

These investments have performed well enabling us to maintain our reserves though we must understand the warning that "investments can fall as well as rise". During the period between mid-January and the end of March, the investment value fell by about £8,000. Nevertheless, it must be repeated that our subscriptions do not cover our annual costs of newsletters, lectures and rents. Our rent alone (£3360) equates to around £22.40 per member.

As always, the annual accounts show a snapshot at a point in time. The receipts and payments show the movements since the previous snapshot. Thus what is included can depend very much on timing.

Notes on statement.

- 1. Includes Giftaid for 2 years.
- 2. The bills and contributions for outings straddle the financial year end. Hotels are increasingly asking for early deposits on room bookings. The figures include deposits for September 2018 totaling over £5000.
- 3. This donation was used to purchase a Planning Frame.
- 4. The AGM cost £200. The balance is the cost of designing and setting up our new website.
- 5. We try to break even on the Party and outings, though an accurate budget is not possible. We do not seek to profit from the misfortunes of our members. With the weather disrupting the Christmas party, we were able to negotiate a refund for those who were unable to attend and did not have any food. This allowed us to offer a partial refund to those involved.
- 6. Avenue House have declined to accept any payments in cash, including for coffee. We therefore must bank the cash received and wait for an invoice.

At the time of writing, the accounts have not been inspected by our Independent Examiner, Stewart Wild, who kindly carries out this duty on behalf of the membership.
