ON THE FUND ACCOUNTABILITY STATEMENT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

Aims

The aim of this report is to outline how Hope Africa International conducted its financial transactions in terms of Income and Expenditure in conformity with the Charity Commission requirements.

Similarly to last year, this has been a quiet year for Hope Africa. We have commenced the trial of an education project which we hope to expand by September 2018. As will be noted from the Statement of Accounts (Income Section). Hope Africa did not receive many legacies to support the launch of new or huge projects in the local community in Malawi.

We have continued concentrating on the farming of maize, peas and groundnuts. Before the rainy season (April to September) the gardens were producing fresh produce such as cabbages, tomatoes and carrots for the local community. This year (just like last year) we have planted maize on 30 hectares of land, groundnuts and pigeon peas on 20 hectares. So far, the rainfall looks very promising and it is expected that if the rains continue to fall this way, then there will be good yield for all the crops that have been planted.

This year we were able to partner with local schools in Matindi, Blantyre Rural and the public and church partners in Malawi to provide assorted items to people in Blantyre rural. Items donated included clothes and school uniforms from the UK to families where entire homes had been washed away in the floods the previous year.

We have continued to maintain our existing bore-holes, provided 1000 bags of maize and sponsorship of four secondary school students and one University students.

Education is a huge issue in Malawi with only 30% of children completing primary school. We have partnered with the Char Char Trust to engage two teachers at Mempha Primary School with the aim of reducing students per teacher ratio in Standard One classes. It is our intention to expand this project focusing on infant classes, phonics and numeracy.

Finances

The charity activities resulted in a net expenditure of £14, 190 for the year. At the year end, the charity held £33, 033 in cash at bank.

As it will be seen in our annual Financial Report, Hope Africa did not receive many legacies with considerable amounts to enable the charity to invest in bigger projects like the previous year. However, the charity received a number of individual donations from people and organisations which together have enabled the charity to concentrate on agricultural farming projects and maintain the existing projects such as maintenance of water boreholes to continue providing safe water for people around the surrounding villages where the charity dug and provided the boreholes.

Future Plans

We look forward to reporting in 2018/2019 as projects will be underway as we continue to make a difference to needy people and families in Malawi. The Charity has plans to fund primary school teachers and resources in primary schools in Blantyre Rural, renovation of schools in Blantyre and further development of phonics training which will improve opportunities for reading for children in Infant and Junior classes.

Income solely represents grants received and bank interest.

4 EXPENDITURE

Expenditure solely represents amounts disbursed in local currency by Hope Africa - Malawi Office Grant.

5 GOING CONCERN

The project was mainly funded by Hope Africa for the period from 1 April 2017 to 31 March 2018.

6 EXCHANGE RATES

Funds received were converted at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction.

Expenditure was incurred and reported in local currency. The weighted average rate used to report the expenses in Euro in these financial statements was MK975.55/£.
