Voces Academy is a corporate member of the Association of British Choral Directors (ABCD) and The National Association of Music Teaching Professionals (MMA) which provide networking and collaboration opportunities. Voces Academy is partnered with amateur chamber choir, Evoke, which participates as the ensemble for training conductors in masterclasses and are partners in performances.

The focus of our activities this year has been on training courses, workshops and development programmes based in choral music. This benefits young musicians directly by developing techniques in conducting, musicianship and leadership; providing an accessible vocational training alternative to full-time, tertiary education with a lower financial and time commitment; and supporting emerging talent by providing pathways for young professionals as they establish a career. Indirectly it benefits the public through the enhanced skill-level of the participating musicians, enabling performances of high artistic merit and broadening understanding and appreciation of the arts through an extended network of ensembles and audiences.

Section D

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Weekend Masterclasses

In this year we ran two 2-day masterclasses, taking place in May and October 2017. Each was attended by eight conductors and 25 singers in our collaboration with chamber choir, Evoke. At each event, we presented a public demonstration of the teaching process followed by a performance of choral music. The demonstration/performance was open to all members of the public and offered free-of-charge

Study Caravan

The 2-day masterclass in May was preceded by an intensive study tour for conductors. Five young conductors who have been involved in Voces Academy activities were invited to join us in a programme that involved masterclasses and workshops in Amsterdam, Oxford, Vienna and London. This was funded by corporate sponsorship.

Musical Leadership Programme

In May 2017 our Musical Leadership Programme was launched in Oxford. Seven young conductors were successfully auditioned and participated in a 12-month programme of conducting masterclasses and leadership workshops.

Residential Masterclass – Summer Conducting Programme

The flagship event of the year was a 5-day, residential conducting masterclass held in August 2017 in the beautiful city of Worcester, UK. Strong collaborative partnerships were built with local arts community in Worcester, including Worcester Cathedral, the Elgar School of Music and the Worcester Festival, enabling us to run an inclusive and multifaceted programme that included

- vocational training for young professional conductors
- exploration sessions for young local musicians, designed specifically to introduce conducting techniques for beginners
- vocal and ensemble training opportunities for local singers, with an invitation to join the ensemble for all masterclasses
- Open masterclass sessions in Worcester Cathedral where the public were invited to observe and understand the pedagogical process of musical leadership
- Performances that were open to the public and free-of-charge
- All open masterclass sessions and performances were part of the the Worcester Festival, promoting local arts and culture in the community

Throughout the course, we involved ten young professional conductors in the early stages of their careers, eight local musicians interested in discovering conducting/musical leadership, 20 young singers from our collaboration with Evoke and at least 300 members of the greater public.

Brief statement of the charity's policy on reserves Longer term the policy on reserves is to develop a three-month balance of cash for expected liabilities. As a first year this has not been achieved but is not flagged as a risk as finances are reviewed monthly.

In our first year of operation as a registered charity, we relied upon informal loans to cover overhead running costs. In our second year, we have not had to take further loans as the programmes have been developed to start to become self-funding. The accounts show that funding receipts this year were insufficient to cover overhead costs, however the receipts plus cash in bank assets from the end of the 2016-17 year have been sufficient to cover running costs. As a result, we have made a significant impact on the overall position at the end of year compared to the previous year. The loan provided for start-up is not secured against any assets of the charity and is not under any immediate requirement for repayment (only as and when the charity is financially able to do so).

Section F Other optional information

In the coming year, we plan to continue to expand the reach of our vocational training programmes and to further develop and implement ideas for increased financial receipts in order to continue the positive direction of Voces Academy's financial position.

Planned activities include the annual Summer residential conducting programme, increased collaboration with emerging chamber choir, Evoke, and other relevant ensembles, implementation of an ongoing musical leadership development programme.
