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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 30 June 2018

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2018. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Principal Activity

The principal activity of the charitable company is the operation of a charity shop and to improve communications in the area of West Howe and make it a better place to live. To improve the quality of life for people in West Howe through creating opportunities for them to give, connect with each other, be active, learn something new and be confident in themselves and the wider community.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Achievement

West Howe Community Enterprises was set up in 2009 by residents from the local area. West Howe is a large area of social housing predominately made up of social housing which endures high levels of deprivation. Many of the residents here may not enjoy the opportunities commonplace in other areas.

We are both a Non Profit Company limited by Guarantee and a Registered Charity with the following aims:

Object 1 - Urban or Rural Regeneration:

The promotion for the benefit of the public of urban or rural regeneration in areas of social and economic deprivation (and in particular in West Howe, Bournemouth) by all or any of the following means:

- (a) the relief of financial hardship:
- (b) the relief of unemployment:
- (c) the advancement of education, training or retraining, particularly among unemployed people, and providing unemployed people with work experience:
- (d) the provision of financial assistance, technical assistance or business advice or consultancy in order to provide training and employment opportunities for unemployed people in cases of financial or other charitable need through help: (i) in setting up their own business, or (ii) to existing businesses:
- (e) the creation of training and employment opportunities by the provision of workspace, buildings, and/or land for use on favourable terms:
- (g) the maintenance, improvement or provision of public amenities:
- (i) the provision of recreational facilities for the public at large or those who by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, financial hardship or social and economic circumstances, have need of such facilities:
- (i) the protection or conservation of the environment:
- (k) the provision of public health facilities and childcare:
- (l) the promotion of public safety and prevention of crime:
- (m) such other means as may from time to time be determined subject to the prior written consent of the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales."

Object 2 - Community capacity building

To develop the capacity and skills of the members of the socially or socially and economically disadvantaged community of West Howe in such a way that they are better able to identify, and help meet, their needs and to participate more fully in society.

Object 3 - Social Inclusion

To promote social inclusion for the public benefit by preventing people from becoming socially excluded, relieving the needs of those people who are socially excluded and assisting them to integrate into society.

Being excluded from society, or part of society, as a result of being a member of a socially and economically deprived community.

Object 4 - Recycling

a) The protection and preservation of the environment for the public benefit by the promotion of waste reduction, re-use, reclamation, recycling, use of recycled products and the use of surplus;b) The relief of financial hardship by the recycling and provision of furniture, clothes and other household items.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 30 June 2018

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Annual review

2017-2018 has been a great year for us where we have had in employment 4 part time members of staff. Thanks to The Tudor Trust for continuation funding of 20,000 this year as part of a two year grant to enable us to employ a part time project manager direct. This has given us opportunity to manage projects and continue to embed our work with local residents.

We have also received support from The West Howe regeneration Partnership to deliver our skills and wellbeing programme. The programme enabled entry level learning with courses in subjects such as photography, sewing, jewellery making, cooking. This enabled residents to try something new, make new friends and acted as an introduction to learning. Residents were also able to access Let's Chat sessions where a dedicated worker would be able to discuss low level mental health problems, signposting appropriately. Sovereign Housing and Greggs enabled us through funding our Great start project to extend the skills project with the introduction of our new family learning element. Families of all ages came together to learn through workshops such as cookery and science days. These proved a popular addition with good attendance. All the sessions have allowed us to provide training, workshops and our family learning locally giving local people of all ages a chance to try new things, build their confidence and skills and improve overall wellbeing.

We also received support from Public Health Dorset in addition to the Health Helpers project to facilitate the setting up of a new diabetic peer support group locally which is continuing to grow and receiving support from local G.P's who have informed patients of the group.

The Inspiring Change continues to provide the charity with a firm base, offer volunteering opportunities and a place where local residents can find out about all our activities through the volunteers who run the day to day opening of the shop.

Funding from Dorset Community Foundation has enabled us to employ a part time cook for our wellbeing café. The café continues to evolve into a strong grassroots hub within the local community where skills and wellbeing activities run alongside. Local residents pop in for tea and find they make new friends and get involved with the activities available to them from workshops to volunteering. The Wellbeing café has continued to grow this year with increasing numbers of residents attending the café and making use of the facilities provided there. We have encouraged outside organisations to partner with us in using the space and have benefited from organisations supporting residents with a wide range of things from energy advice to employment support. We would like to thank these new partnerships, especially GDF and WEA who have provided, together with us, workshops for the community to enjoy. The success of the wellbeing café brings us closer to our vision of a connected community where needed services, activities and support are available locally and we now recognise this use of the venue as integral to a vibrant community. West Howe Community Enterprises are currently working with Bournemouth Early Help within Bournemouth Borough Council to form a management Partnership. This will enable the Henry Brown centre to be available more for the local community and maximise use of this community asset.

This year we have increased our reach and have enjoyed engagement from 749 residents of all ages who have attended our projects. This year 13 new volunteers have come on board, helping to deliver ESOL courses, the Wellbeing café and charity shop and supporting at events. Two local people were identified as having skills they were willing to share with the community. One has been delivering sewing courses at Heathlands School, as requested by a parent at one of the school consultation events. The other has been delivering Creative Writing workshops called "Bring your own words" and is now going to also volunteer at library on a reading scheme. In total there are currently 20 volunteers supporting us across all the projects. Existing projects such as the café and charity shop, Bingo and community lunch club continue to be delivered with the support of volunteers. Gaining employment is difficult to measure as not everyone informs WHCE. Some are not at that point and need more time. Anecdotally, 10 people are known to have gone on to employment, apprenticeships or training.

We continue to embed a respecting ethos and volunteers continue to contribute to the planning of projects and value each other's contributions. Activities that have continued for local residents this year have included bingo, community lunch and Give or Take days. We enjoyed a successful AGM and have increased our membership levels throughout the year.

The Wheely Inspired community bike project has now entered its 4th year. The scheme helps residents new to cycling to build confidence, borrow bikes with helmets and lights, demystify cycling, making it accessible and enjoyable especially for residents on low incomes whom are less able to travel easily to shops, work and for leisure.

We continue to run the websites www.westhowe.net and www.inspiringchange.org.uk. We continue to have aspiration to increase awareness and participation in grassroots media to ensure communities have a voice which showcases good examples of citizen journalism.

Financial Position

Total income for the year has decreased to £75,778 (2017 - £91,601) and the total expenditure for the year was £73,601 (2017 - £77,962) allowing the charity to make a surplus of £2,177 (2017 - £13,639). Resulting in unrestricted funds of £45,155 (2017 - £33,203) and restricted funds of £22,348 (2017 - £32,123).

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 30 June 2018

1. LEGAL FORM

West Howe Community Enterprises is a charitable company, that is limited by guarantee and is incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is noted on the company information page.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Trade debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the Charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs

These include the cost attributable to the Charity's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including audit, strategic management and Trustee's meetings and reimbursed expenses.

Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it was incurred.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Computer equipment

- 20% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a know amount of and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Trade creditors

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have ben acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if the Charity does not have an unconditional right, at the end of the reporting period, to defer settlement of the creditor for at least twelve months after the reporting date, they are presented as non-current liabilities.

Trade creditors are recognised initially at the transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.
