Report of the trustees for the year ended 31st July 2018

The trustees present their annual directors' report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31st July 2018 which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes.

The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

Objectives and activities

The purposes of the charity are to act as a resource for young people living in Manchester by providing advice and assistance and organising programmes of physical, educational and other activities as a means of:

- (a) advancing in life and helping young people by developing their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society as independent, mature and responsible individuals;
- (b) Advancing education;
- (c) Relieving unemployment;
- (d) providing recreational and leisure time activity in the interests of social welfare for people living in the area of benefit who have need by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disability, poverty or social and economic circumstances with a view to improving the conditions of life of such persons. The trustees confirm that they have referred to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Charity's aims and objectives, in planning future activities, and setting the policies for the year.

The charity furthers its charitable purposes for the public benefit through our community situated in South Manchester and includes Whalley Range, Fallowfield, Burnage, Chorlton, Chorlton Park, Didsbury East, Didsbury West, Levenshulme, Old Moat and Withington. The ward of Whalley Range is in the bottom 30% of total deprivation in the country, the bottom 20% for income deprivation, 15% for health.

The risk factors in the area include mental health issues and emotional well-being, teenage pregnancy, sexually transmitted infections, low school attendance and achievement, anti-social behaviour and the risk of becoming NEET. 52% of the Whalley Range population are from BME backgrounds so we provide a service that meets their needs.

CSG offers a range of activities and support services that aim to address the local needs and improve the quality of life for young people and their families.

The main activities of CSG, projects or services as shown in the accounts are:

A Community drop in and advice surgery, HLF Women's Group, Senior Men's drop in Group, A drop in service supporting young people with CVs education, employment and training—Football Leadership Sessions, Junior Football Project, Mentoring services programme, Urban Street's project, Mash It Up (Media) Club, Girls empowerment group, Friday & Saturday Nights Youth Clubs, Football coaching academy (astro turf), Easter and Summer Playscheme programmes covering some periods of the school holiday breaks with activities and fun days for all the local community families.

A review of our achievements and performance

The main achievements and performance during the year were:-

CSG have continued to offer youth, mentoring and leadership sports development programmes which have aided young people in increasing their aspirations through awareness of careers and future paths to take and learning that they are capable of achieving their dreams and career aspirations they want to go into if they just put their mind to it through structured sessions with qualified staff, workshops, educational trips and tailored mentoring plans.

Other changes to young people include improving their passion and commitment towards improving their community, and the local services within the environmental areas...

CSG run many activities for the young people throughout the week e.g. Sports, (Football, Tennis, Boxing, Dodgeball etc.). Throughout the year we have entered several competitions winning some e.g. Timperley Football Cup, Manchester City Academy tournament as well as receiving a special invite only event to Manchester United's emerging talent programme.

This has given young people a taste of what is out there, increased their aspirations and confidence in what can be achieved if they work hard.

CSG took a party of 40 young people on a funded outing to Water World in Stoke on Trent, where they enjoyed all activities in a variety of rides and other activities on this great day out.

CSG took 16 young people to a 3 day residential programme in Edale, where they took part in all outdoor learning activities, such as abseiling, kayaking, water rafting, whilst developing their team leadership skills.

We organised and hosted a Youth Football Tournament with two hundred people taking part which was dedicated to Srebrenica (UK) charity in remembrance of Genocide

We at CSG along with all the youth members invited the local community neighbours to a dinner: With the food having been prepared and served to the guests by the young people themselves. CSG has been working and supporting North Manchester community organisation to run youth activities for young girls and boys on a weekly basis.

Our young people took part in the Greater Manchester Assembly where they heard testaments and pledges made by our GM Mayor Andy Burnham

CSG continues its Saturday night project attracting a large number of young people on a weekly basis to take part in a range of different fun and creative activities and providing mentoring services, improving their communication skills and wellbeing.

The Easter and Summer Playscheme events were as always a huge success with the community participation being over 50-90 people attending the sessions throughout the holiday breaks.

The Women's Group also organised and arranged Traditional Asian Wedding Event with many special guests including all local Councillors to mix with the local communities.

CSG Girls Group is running on a weekly basis, they work with arts and crafts, baking and general fun activities. Designed to Increase confidence, motivation and self-esteem through achieving arts-base activities and one-to-ones

CSG has been constantly involved in delivering sports projects in local schools, who have requested more sports activities for their students.

CSG are delivering popular a football coaching academy to young children (6-12 yrs.) on each Sunday CSG with the Manchester United Foundation are continuing with the well-attended Street Reds project aimed at young people aged 14 - 19 years. This project is so popular with over 90 young people in attendance, each week

CSG Big Reach on-going programme is activities around increasing leadership skills knowledge and understanding; encouraging increased involvement in positive activities, leading to positive lifestyle choices: By inspiring good manners and enhancing their personal conduct skills through a volunteer experience in a position of responsibility, allowing young people to become role models for their peers.

Increase their knowledge of risks of gang membership by participating in group discussions and workshops some being facilitated by external practitioners.

Football FA Leaders Award –We hosted a junior football leader's award course for young people. This course provided an introduction to leadership skills, communication skills and working as a team.

And finally the young sports people were amazed to meet with former World Karate Champion Geoff Thompson who gave them an inspiring and motivating talk with a few tips on how to succeed. CSG is continues to be a Hate crime reporting centre

Financial review

The charity's financial position at the end of the reporting period is:

The attached financial statements show the current state of the finances which the Committee considers to be satisfactory. The Committee is working hard to secure more substantial funding for current and future projects

Investment powers and policy

Aside from retaining a prudent amount in reserves each year, most of the charity's funds are to be spent in the short term so there are few funds for any longer term investment.

Reserves policy and going concern

The balance held in unrestricted reserves at 31st July 2018 was £45,962 of which all are free reserves, after allowing for funds tied up in tangible fixed assets.

The trustees aim to maintain free reserves in unrestricted funds at a level which equates to approximately three months of unrestricted charitable expenditure. The trustees consider that this level will provide sufficient funds to respond to applications for grants and ensure that support and governance costs are covered.

The Charity's main source of income is grants and fees. The Trustees consider that it is appropriate to prepare the accounts on a going concern basis and, consequently, the accounts do not include any adjustments that would be necessary if these sources of income should cease.

Risk management

The trustees have conducted a review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed and systems have been established to mitigate those risks.

Plans for Future Periods

The charity plans continuing the activities outlined above in the forthcoming years subject to satisfactory funding arrangements.

Structure, governance and management

Community on Solid Ground is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 9/11/2010. It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission and is constituted under a trust deed dated 20/12/2010

Appointment of trustees

As set out in the Articles of Association trustees are elected annually by the members of the charitable company attending the Annual General meeting.

Trustee induction and training

New trustees are usually familiar with the work of the charity as a result of either their work within a Member organisation or as a volunteer. In addition, new trustees familiarise themselves with the roles and responsibilities of trustees as set out by the Charity Commission.

Organisation

The board of trustees administers the charity. The board normally meets quarterly. A self-employed Operations Manager is appointed by the trustees to manage the day-to-day operations of the charity.

Related parties and co-operation with other organisations

None of our trustees receive remuneration or other benefit from their work with the charity. Any connection between a trustee or senior manager with any service providers must be disclosed to the full board of trustees in the same way as any other contractual relationship with a related party. This is disclosed in note 2 to the accounts.

Notes to the accounts

1. Accounting policies

(a) Basis of preparation and assessment of going concern

The accounts (financial statements) have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes to these accounts. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16th July 2014 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

(b) Reconciliation with previous Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing the accounts, the trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102, a restatement of comparative items was needed. No restatements were required.

(c) Funds structure

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by the donor or trust deed. There are 24 restricted funds.

Unrestricted income funds comprise those funds which the trustees are free to use for any purpose in furtherance of the charitable objects. Unrestricted funds include designated funds where the trustees, at their discretion, have created a fund for a specific purpose.

Further details of each fund are disclosed in note 17.

(d) Income recognition

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations are recognised when the charity has been notified in writing of both the amount and settlement date. In the event that a donation is subject to conditions that require a level of performance before the charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the charity and it is probable that those conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period.

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank. Dividends are recognised once the dividend has been declared and notification has been received of the dividend due.

(e) Expenditure Recognition

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenses including support costs and governance costs are allocated or apportioned to the applicable expenditure headings. For more information on this attribution refer to note (g) below.

(f) Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the expenditure heading for which it was incurred.

(g) Allocation of support and governance costs

Support costs have been allocated between governance costs and other support costs. Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs include costs related to independent examination ad legal fees together with an apportionment of overhead and support costs.

Governance costs and support costs relating to charitable activities have been apportioned based on type of expense.

The allocation of support and governance costs is analysed in note 8.

(h) Costs of raising funds

The costs of raising funds consists of events, publicity and sponsorship.

(i) Charitable Activities

Costs of charitable activities include governance costs and an apportionment of support costs as shown in note 7.

(j) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

All assets costing more than £500 are capitalised and valued at historical cost. Depreciation is charged on the following basis:

Computers Equipment 33.33% on cost 25% on cost

(k) Realised gains and losses

All gains and losses are taken to the Statement of Financial Activities as they arise. Realised gains and losses on investments are calculated as the difference between sales proceeds and their opening carrying value or their purchase value if acquired subsequent to the first day of the financial year. Unrealised gains and losses are calculated as the difference between the fair value at the year end and their varying value. Realised and unrealised investment gains and losses are combined in the Statement of Financial Activities.

(I) Pensions

The charity currently administers contributions to a pension scheme on behalf of one individual.

The trustees all give freely their time and expertise without any form of remuneration or other benefit in cash or kind (2017: £nil). Expenses paid to the trustees in the year totalled £nil (2017: £nil).
