	The purpose of Art with a Heart is the advancement of Arts, Heritage and culture through the provision of events, exhibitions and displays in the Arts and Heritage Centre and at off-site locations. This is makes the arts and heritage more accessible to a wider audience. In addition, we aim to develop the skills of young people through our volunteer programme, therefore enhancing their future opportunities while improving their 'soft' skills.

The Activities undertaken by AWAH in support of these objects for the public benefit includes:

- 1. Free creativity area available to the public during the Centre's opening hours, including materials
- 2. Free permanent Heritage Area displaying local artefacts, photographs, historical books, copies of Maps of the local area dated from the 1750s to 1950s, donated items from the local community and historians and items on permanent loan from STAG and the Transport Museum
- 3. Regular workshops (Heritage and Arts) organised in the Centre and the local Library, available as a drop-in activity. These are generally free to encourage a wider participation. These are typically created and developed by the volunteers to develop their skills, and therefore enhance their employment opportunities
- 4. Free regular Arts and Heritage exhibitions and events, inclusive and accessible to all, irrespective of gender, age, race, religion, sexual orientation or disability held in the Gallery space.
- 5. Outreach activities including workshops, business window displays, organising and participating in public art trails, empty unit displays and involvement in Festivals and celebrations in support of Arts and Heritage, including Easter, Halloween and other religious festivals, eg Diwali. We also deliver the Arts focus to local In Bloom groups. These activities challenges the preconception that Art can only be viewed or appreciated in Art Galleries and Museums.
- 6. Engage with local schools to develop their arts activities and their engagement in the local community and groups, for example Timperley In Bloom
- 7. Volunteering opportunities to further skills development and employability of young people, including Duke of Edinburgh, School Student one/two week work experience and regular volunteering
- 8. Volunteering opportunities for DWP clients with health issues
- 9. Volunteering opportunities and free activities to support the 'Over Fifties', therefore improving their health and well-being, including reducing social isolation and improved community cohesion. This also encourages intergenerational activities between all our volunteers.
- 10. Maintain an online presence through social media, websites newsletters, advertising and press releases to promote and raise the awareness of the Arts and Heritage in the Altrincham Area and the volunteering opportunities in AWAH
- 11. Collaborate with other groups, organisations and businesses to help raise the awareness of the Arts and Heritage in the area,

In 2017/2018, total hours delivered by approximately 40 Art with a Heart staff, volunteers and trustees in support of the objectives is approximately 5,162 hours, of which 4,503 was volunteer hours. With the support of the volunteers we were able to encourage over 3,000 visitors to the Centre in Altrincham from July 2017 to end of June 2018, therefore giving the people a reason to visit the town while encouraging them to dwell.

Achievements and performance

Main achievements in 2017/2018 reporting year were:

- 1. Continue to develop and enhance the facilities of the Arts and Heritage Centre, resulting in
 - a. Further collaborations with Trafford Fablab to provide additional skills development in new technologies to the young volunteers, including organised training and workshops, eg textile art and electronics, laser cutting and inkscape
 - b. A dedicated Gallery space for regularly updated arts and heritage displays. Exhibitions included:
 - i. The touring art exhibition, Marvellous Days Out project managed and curated by the Intern, expanded to include historical information of women of note from each area. This information was researched by the history university intern as part of her university placement
 - ii. George Allen Art Exhibition, work of a prominent deceased local artist
 - iii. Art Exhibition of Trafford College, end of year Art and Design students, including A level and BTEC
 - iv. Jewel in the Crown heritage exhibition, an exhibition of the history of Altrincham, using the drawings created by one of the volunteers, converted into plaques using laser technology by the other volunteers
 - v. Art display of Resident Artist, Daniel Adler, highlighting his journey of his Art and living on the Autistic Spectrum and other local artists
 - c. A permanent Heritage area, displaying all the Heritage artefacts, maps and books to be freely enjoyed by the members of the public
 - d. A permanent Creative Area, freely accessible to the members of the public during the Centre's normal hours of operation as well as organising and running free arts and heritage workshops outside these times for local schools and organisations, including a curatorial tour and workshops on the Marvellous Days Out exhibition for a local Primary School
- 2. Increased the Heritage collection through donations and loans from the local community, in addition to the maps (dated 1876), books and artefacts of the local area
- Increased the number of young volunteers, including Duke of Edinburgh and work experience students, with the aim of skills development through the Arts
- Recognised as an organisation supporting people with disabilities by the DWP, and offering volunteering opportunities and skills development in the Arts and Culture
