Objectives and Activities

Summary of the purposes of the charity as set out in its governing document	Para 1.17	 For the benefit of the public, to relieve the suffering of animals in need of care and attention and in particular, to provide and maintain rescue homes or other facilities for the care and treatment of such animals. To promote humane behaviour towards animals by providing appropriate care, protection, treatment and security for animals which are in need of care or attention by reason of sickness, maltreatment, poor circumstances or ill usage and to educate the public in matters pertaining to animal welfare in general and the prevention of cruelty and suffering among animals.

Our fundraising activities and donations from supporters Summary of the main Para 1.17 and (see next sections) have enabled us to carry out our activities in relation to those main objectives ie. to rescue as many unwanted, purposes for the public mistreated and abandoned dogs as possible, give them benefit, in particular, the veterinary treatment where necessary, microchip to activities, projects or prevent future strays, neuter and find them new forever services identified in the homes. accounts. We have continued to take in animals primarily via the dog pounds and occasionally from local vets and from members of the public who could no longer care for their pets. Our policy remains to take as many as possible from risk of being put to sleep, particularly younger, healthy dogs as we believe they deserve a chance of life. All were given a full vet check, vaccinated, microchipped and if appropriate, given necessary medical treatment. All were either neutered or we provided a free neutering voucher. They were also cared for in kennels or by one of our fosterers until suitable homes could be found. Before rehoming, potential owners were subject to a home check to ensure premises were suitable and that gardens were properly fenced and gated. Where dogs were rehomed some distance away, vet reference checks were undertaken to ensure dogs were being rehomed to responsible owners. Individuals were made aware of the commitment needed to care for the lifetime of a dog and assurances sought that dogs wouldn't be allowed to stray, that they wouldn't be left for extended periods without companionship, that booster vaccinations would be administered and that proper diet and exercise would be given. 2018/19 was another busy year for us and we managed to rehome 114 dogs. The majority of the dogs came to us from Sheffield, Mount Pleasant (Doncaster), Flushdyke (Wakefield) and Cliffe (Barnsley) stray pounds and without our intervention might otherwise have been put down.

We are still not seeing a reduction in the number of bull breeds such as Staffordshire Bull Terriers and American Bulldogs being abandoned plus the number of Lurchers in Pounds has continued to increase. We have taken in a disproportionate number of Staffies but thankfully there are still people prepared to adopt them and who recognise that they are much maligned and make loyal family pets. We have continued our good working relationship with the trainer at Kinsley Greyhound stadium and have taken on several ex-racing Greyhounds for rehoming. We are happy to help with this lovely breed.

We have maintained a good partnership with Julie Fridlington, ("Julie Follow My Lead") a Barnsley based dog trainer and behaviourist. She offered to help with any dogs that we had problems with. We sometimes get dogs that suffer from stress and separation anxiety which is not too surprising after they have been abandoned by their previous owners. She works with new owners in the home environment and we have had favourable comments from people regarding the advice that Julie has given and she is an important addition to our aim of successfully integrating dogs into their new forever homes.

Our Facebook page has continued to flourish and is, in part, responsible for the number of dogs finding homes. Facebook attracts many visitors every week, we get photo's and updates on dogs that have been rehomed and is really popular with our supporters. Jo & Julie who put the dogs on Preloved for us have also helped maintain traffic. Thanks go to regular contributors such as Dave Goddard & Peter Beard.

We have provided help to other organisations during the year such as Good Life Dog Rescue by sponsoring dogs and by advertising their dogs and in return, they have helped to promote ours. We have also donated dog food to Helping Yorkshire Poundies and sponsored a dog for German Shepherd Dog Rescue.

We have been out an

The charity's principal sources of funds (including any fundraising)	Para 1.47	We have been out and about fundraising nearly every weekend with bucket collections, tombola stalls and selling goods forming the majority of our income. We also charge an adoption fee for our dogs but this is heavily subsidised. This is helped by the provision of neutering vouchers from Dogs Trust, however, people have to pay the first £50 (up from £35) towards the costs. BADAW refund this to our adopters on production of a receipt but in view of the increased liability to us, our adoption fees are currently under review and may now have to rise. Several local summer galas that were also planning to run dog shows got cancelled in 2018 due to the extremely hot weather so we lost some opportunities to raise funds during that period.
		Staff at Wilkinson's store in Wombwell nominated BADAW as their charity of the year again and have arranged collections of pet food, treats and knitted blankets on our behalf. The donations have been put to very good use for our dogs and we extend sincere thanks to all the staff for their support. Thanks also go to John Beardsley, House of Beauty (Pitt St, Barnsley), Greenside Podiatry, Pet Bay, Mapplewell and Pride & Groom, Penistone for filling collection boxes.
		We also received donations from our Trustees, substantial donations from Anita Saunders and regular contributions from Sylvia Taylor, Vickie Bastow, Ed Morris, Angie Brown, Julie Tate, Jo & Julie Hutchinson, Judith Gibson, Chris Burkill, Sarah Tomlinson, B Speight and Iain Brough. Our grateful thanks go to them.
		Finally, we received substantial donations during the year from Pets at Home "Support Adoption for Pets" charity and would like to thank all the staff for their continued support and generosity. We provided help with the Summer fundraising drive (Scratch card sales) at Barnsley, Cortonwood, Wakefield & Rotherham stores and with Santa Paws fundraising (Give a pet a Christmas dinner) at Barnsley, Rotherham, Cortonwood, Dewsbury and Wakefield stores. Partnerships with Pets at Home have since been reviewed nationally and from April 2019 charities can only partner with a maximum of 2 stores. This is likely to have a knock on effect and we anticipate that from the new financial year, donations from Pets at Home will be substantially reduced.

Fortunately, Netherlands kennels in Kilnhurst found space for us and helped us out at a particularly busy and stressful time. Our grateful thanks go to them.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019
