The charity is run and managed by its Trustees. The Incumbent and churchwardens are ex officio trustees, holding the licence of the Diocesan Bishop although the churchwardens are also elected by the Annual Vestry meeting of the whole parish.

The remaining trustees are elected by the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, with two representatives (Atlm Robinson and Allan Farrugiavella) being elected as Deanery Synod representatives and the remainder as elected PCC members. Appropriate training and support is provided to new Trustees adapting to their role.

LEGAL STATUS

St Edward the Confessor Church, Mottingham is a registered charity (No. 1164675) and is governed by the Parochial Church Council (Powers) Measure 1956 and the Church Representation Rules, made under the Synodical Governance Measure 1969.

OBJECTS

The alms and objectives of the charity are to co-operate with the Incumbent in promoting in the ecclesiastical parish the whole mission of the church: pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical (The PCC (Powers) Measure 1956), serving the local community to promote its health and well-being and provide a place of worship and focal point for spiritual and community activities whilst working in partnership with local people and various statutory and voluntary organisations.

Constitution: The Charity is established under the PCC (Powers) Measure 1956^[1] and governed according to the Church Representation Rules^[2] as revised from time to time in accordance with the Synodical Governance Measure 1969.^[3] Although it is an independent charity the PCC is also a part of the Church of England and accountable to Southwark Diocese.

The Chair of trustees is the Rev Dr Catherine Shelley, the Vicar

The trustees elected at the APCM In April 2018 were:

Pat Dockree and Ruth Slater, Pastoral Assistants and joint Treasurers

Elaine McNaughton – PCC Secretary until the APCM (Ruth Slater took over as correspondence secretary until the end of the year and the minute taking aspects of the secretarial role were shared between Jenny Furlong, Atim Robinson, Ruth Slater and Elaine McNaughton until December 2018 when Ruth Slater assumed the full secretarial role)

Paula Logan, Steven Punt, Jenny Furlong, Debbie Leader and Val Gillman were also elected and Diane Kapp – who was appointed Children's Leader – was co-opted.

Sub Committees:

The following members of the StEP committee were appointed from the PCC – Rev Dr Catherine Shelley, Ruth Slater, Pat Dockree, Claudette Mills, Atlm Robinson and Jenny Furlong. In addition, Maureen Gallagher (Chair), Laurie Bell (Treasurer), Margaret Nye (Play ad Stay), Kathy Wickes (Senior youth worker) and Sue Kennedy (PCSO) have also been members of the StEP committee. Sue Turner is the Project Manager and has written a separate annual report about StEP's activities.

During the year a consultation process was undertaken about StEP becoming a separate charity to enable more independence and recruitment of members from the wider community who may not wish to attend church. An application for registration as a CIO was submitted in July 2018 and StEP was registered as a separate charity (using the model constitution for a CIO) in February 2019 (Charlty No. 1182060).

Two further sub-committees have been convened during the year:

Fundraising and fairs – members are Val Gillman, Mary Maguire, Pat Dockree and Ruth Slater, along with the vicar; they have also worked with Mottingham Community Association on planning joint fairs.

Buildings Sub Committee – of which the members are the vicar, Steven Punt, Allan Farrugiavella, Errol Furiong and a representative from the Treasury Team. Two representatives from StEP are also to be elected and additional external members, with buildings expertise, have been approached about being involved either as full members or advisers. The PCC also works with David Swarbrick our Inspecting Architect in relation to building developments.

Policies, Risk Assessments and Training:

The PCC has continued to adopt and review a range of policies covering Safeguarding, Equalities, the Environment and has also adopted new policies during the year covering financial procedures and accountability and GDPR.

Risk Assessments have also been reviewed and updated in relation to use of the hall, the kitchen, the church and the respective activities organized by StEP and the church.

All members of the PCC undertook safeguarding training in August and several StEP and church volunteers also attended a safeguarding briefing from the local LADO. Sue Turner and Catherine Shelley have also undertaken fundraising training and Senior First Aider training.

TRUSTEES REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2018

Objects, Activities, Achievements and Partnerships:

The PCC is established for the benefit of the public both within its parochial area and for any who wish to visit the church or the activities in the church hall. Its purposes are Christian Mission as part of the Church of England and the worldwide Anglican Communion. St Edward's lives out its mission through a commitment to inclusion and welcome for all who wish to attend worship, services and/or community activities. We also seek to live out the mission priorities of the Anglican communion to welcome and baptize new members; to live out the Gospel, serving our community, seeking social justice and living sustainably in creation.

In addition to Sunday services during 2018 we have started a Wednesday evening service, daily moming prayer and the church is now open to the public for quiet prayer each day. Numbers at Church services are healthy and gradually increasing and over the year bible studies, Alpha and confirmations have enabled both new and existing members to engage more deeply with their faith. It was also encouraging to see increased numbers for the Easter and Christmas services. Numbers of funerals have also increased though sadly it means we have lost a number of our longest standing members. On a happier note people continue to bring children for baptism and we have had a couple of adult baptisms too. We have also had a number of wedding blessings.

It was a joy to be able to reinstate the Sunday School thanks to several new volunteers coming forward. Assemblies in both Mottingham and Castlecombe Primary schools have also helped build relationships with the schools. Mottingham Primary has held both Easter and Christmas assemblies in church this year and both schools will host assemblies here in 2019.

We also serve the wider community through our community outreach and volunteering. In this respect 2018 has been a good and busy year. A number of new activities have been started including film nights, pantomime and dance thanks to funding from Blg Local. The activities run by StEP continue, as detailed in the separate StEP report and numbers are growing, particularly for the toddler group. There is a sense of positive feedback from the wider community. This was borne out by good support for the Summer fair for the church's 60th anniversary and a successful Christmas Fair, as well as our regular activities.

We continue to have good relations with our local councillors, the Community and Learning Shop, Mottingham Community Association, the Links GP surgery and local businesses, particularly the Co-op. We continue to host Community Impact Days acting as a base for statutory services to visit local trouble spots and have hosted the Community Action Panel, a safer neighbourhood forum and meetings of Mottingham Big Local. During the year we have also developed our relationship with Elmstead Lane Nursing Home and a new relationship with Clairleigh Nursing Home.

We are grateful to the many volunteers who help with projects from our toddlers to our most senior residents, as well as specifically church related events and to those who run other activities, like Zumba Gold and karate from the hall. As well as volunteering for projects run by and through the church members of the church volunteer at various local organisations including the Sense Charity Shop, the Community and Learning shop, the Tenants' and Residents' Association and the local schools. Volunteering roles range from shop front work to trustee governance roles. The Vicar is also chair of governors at Mottingham Primary school and a local committee member at Castlecombe Primary.

Funding, Finances and Sustainability:

This year the charlty's finances are looking healthier than for some time. This is partly due to increased donations and successful fundraising, including from hall use as well as grant funding from a variety of sources like Chislehurst Rotary, the Co-op, Big Local and continued funding via StEP from Peter Stebbings and the Tudor Trust. In addition, careful budgeting has improved cash flow and financial management.

A focused campaign of fundralsing for our buildings has brought in grants from Garfield Weston, the Bernard Sunley Charitable Foundation, Veolia and some smaller donations such as the Slaughter and May Community Fund. This means that we are now in a position to install secondary glazing and have the majority of the funds needed to replace the aged and inefficient heating system. The outcome of one more bid is needed to complete the fundralsing for the heating, roof repairs and insulation. We have also raised some funds from the Laing Charitable Trust towards installing more tollets and kitchen facilities in church, although continued fundraising will be needed to complete those works.

The charity continues to maintain reserves of three months running and salary costs. Management of restricted funds has been made easier by maintaining separate accounts for StEP and church activities as well as a building fund to account for all funds raised towards the building development. In the coming year we plan to review the investment of capital funds and reserves if they are not to be used imminently.

TRUSTEES REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2018

The charity has also been considering our environmental footprint and working towards the A Rocha Eco Church award, The plans for developing the buildings are almed at improving both environmental and financial sustainability. In addition, we are seeking to reduce energy use and increase the consumables that we can recycle. Part of the partnership with the Co-op is also almed at reducing food waste.

The future:

Going forward although the church and StEP will become separate charities we will continue to work closely together and with our wider community partners. In the coming year we will continue to develop our services to the community, which are likely to continue to be in increasing demand as austerity and economic uncertainty continue. We will also continue to improve our environmental footprint and the development of the buildings for the benefit of the community.

Trustees Responsibilities

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Report of the Trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales, the Charities Act 2011, Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations and the provisions of the trust deed requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charity for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to:

 Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent Prepare financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is happropriate to presume that the trust

StEP Report

INTRODUCTION

StEP continued to work with the PCC in its contribution to work from the church buildings in the parish. It had been anticipated that StEP would have been registered as a separate charity before the end of the year but delays in response from the Charity Commission meant that this was not achieved until Febrary 2019. StEP is now an independent charity under charity number 1182060. Regardless of the legal structures the church and StEP will continue to work closely to serve the community.

This report covers the last 12 months. I have given a brief update of each of the projects. An overview of the progress and future of StEP closes this report.

PROJECT UPDATES

Mini Ed's

Wednesdays 4.45 - 6.15 pm for school years 4, 5 and 6

This group is going well. Numbers are consistent and all young people engage well. We opened the session to year 6 in September In order to do transition work which started in January. We have a volunteer who worked for Place2B, who is an organisation working mainly in primary schools, specialising in work with young children who have behaviour issues or who need counselling support. This area of expertise has proved extremely successful in engaging some of our young people, building their self- esteem and confidence.

Youth Café

Wednesdays 7 – 9pm school years 9 plus

This session continues to attract our local young people and is going well. Although numbers fluctuate, as is the nature of this age range, some good pleces of work have been conducted and strong relationships with staff and young people exist. Chislehurst Rotary has supported this group greatly in the last 12 months not only through very generous donations but also by running some taster driving sessions. As is imagined this was well received and again we saw confidence rise in all of our young people. Whilst food is still very much the focus of the group much work is being done around employability skills including CV writing, interview techniques and completing application forms. We have had some successes and are hopeful that some of the young people will participate at the next afternoon tea.

- Play and Stay

Tuesday 10.30 - 12pm Parent and toddler group

This group has continued to expand mainly through word of mouth. We are increasing the time and cost after the February half term. However numbers have increased to the point where we are considering opening a second session for health and safety reasons, as we do not wish to turn people away. Also developing really well is the social aspect for parents and carers. We have seen social groups developing and this has helped address issues of isolation and for new parents the chance to talk to others about concerns is building confidence especially for first time parents or those new to the area.

Community Brunch

Thursday 10.30 - 12pm

Brunch remains popular with a core group of regular attendees who will often help Pat to clear up at the end of the session.

Community Lunch

Friday 12.30 - 2pm

This session continues to grow. We have been supported by food donations from the Coop which has allowed us to offer a more varied menu. Recently, the Coop has been undergoing a refit so donations have been drastically reduced however this has not affected the variety or quality of meals on offer. We have recently increased the price from ± 3.50 to ± 4 for a 3 course meal with unlimited tea and coffee but this has not had a detrimental effect on the attendees.

Counselling

By appointment

We are still receiving funding from Mottingham Community Association to support this project although currently we have 5 clients, all of whom are financially contributing something to their session. The clients who range in age with the youngest being 14 years old have contacted us either by referral or recommendation.

Afternoon Tea

We continue to hold these events and have been successful in securing a small grant from Big Local which has enabled us to hire a singer for each event which has proved most successful and we are now catering for 60 people at each event.

Christmas Lunch

This was a huge success. We were again fortunate to get much support from the local Coop with food for the meal, staff and funding which enabled us to refund £5 to each ticket holder. We also had entertainment by Tracy, the singer who had been at the afternoon tea, and the 60 people attending thoroughly enjoyed the event joining in with the singing and for some, dancing.

Yoga

After much discussion it was decided to end the session as it was not financially viable and was consistently carrying a deficit.

Miscarriage Support Group

Again it was decided to end this session due to lack of take up.

OVERVIEW

The last 12 months have been busy. There have been some successes and some failures. These do not make us despondent but rather, allow us to learn, grow and improve all the time.

Evaluation is a crucial element in this progression and monitoring of projects allows us to make informed decisions ensuring we are providing an environment where people of all ages and backgrounds are welcomed, are safe and where there is opportunity to grow and develop, Play and Stay being one such example and we must continue to expand and review our projects to ensure we are meeting the needs of the community and in so doing are reaching out to all.

We are going to start a support group for parents of Autistic children as a result of talking to parents and organisations. This will launch after Easter and will be supported by our counsellor Linda and our child psychologist Angela, who has first - hand experience of being a parent of a child with extra needs.

Closing Thoughts

The future remains positive and funding already secured means that our vision is on its way. The passion and determination of those involved is still as great as ever and through the dedication and hard work of all we will succeed

Basis of preparation:

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with:

The Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

and with the Charitles Act 2011.

The charlty constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue in operation as a going concern.

The charlty has applied Update Bulletin 1 as published on 2 February 2016 and does not include a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is applying FRS 102 Section 1A.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Income

Recognition of Income

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when:

- the charity becomes entitled to the resources;
- the trustees believe it is probable they will receive the resources; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability

Income with related expenditure

Where income has related expenditure (as with fundralsing or contract income) the income and related expenditure are reported gross in the SOFA.

Grants and Donations

Grants and Donations are only included in the SOFA when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Tax reclaims on Donations and Gifts

Income from tax reclaims are included in the SOFA during the same period as the gift to which they relate.

Gifts in Kind

Gifts In kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the charity or the amount actually realised. Gifts In kind for sale or distribution are included in the accounts as gifts only when sold or distributed by the charity. Gifts in kind for use by the charity are included in the SOFA as income when receivable.

Donated Services and Facilities

These are only included in income (with an equivalent amount in expenditure) where the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the charity of the service or facility received.

Volunteer Help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

Investment Income

This is included in the accounts when receivable.

Expenditure and liabilities

Liability recognition

Labilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources.

Governance Costs

Include costs of the preparation and examination of statutory accounts, the costs of the trustees meetings and cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

Support Costs

Support costs are those that assist the work of the charlty but do not directly represent charitable activities, including office costs and administrative payroll costs if any. They are incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charlty and are all directly attributable to the general church operational activities.

Pensions

A workplace pension scheme is available to eligible employees. Contributions are charged to the statement of financial activities when payable.

Assets

Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity
