Principal activity

The PCC of St. John with St. Andrew's PCC has the responsibility of co-operating with the incumbent, the Rev'd Paul Dawson, in promoting in the ecclesiastical parish the whole mission of the church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. It also has the maintenance responsibility for St. Andrew's Church building and St. John's Church Centre.

Members

The appointment of PCC members is governed by and set out in the Church Representation Rules.

Committee

The PCC also operates through the standing committee. This is the only committee required by law. It has power to transact business of the PCC between its meetings, subject to any directions given by the Council.

Review of the year

Since our last APCM the full PCC has met six times and the standing committee an additional four times.

Parish team

St Andrew's

Chris Weir continued in his role as youth worker and Administrator for the parish. The Revd Edward Millais returned as Assistant Curate.

Kristian Lending continued as a Ministry Trainee and Harry Ovey began as a Ministry Trainee in September 2018.

St John's

Jeremy Day continued as a Ministry Trainee.

Finances

Chris Weir continued in the role of Parish Treasurer.

Church attendance and electoral roll (as at March 2019)

There were 93 parishioners on the electoral roll, of whom 63 are not resident in the parish. Attendance at the 10.30am service at St Andrew's is 45-60 adults and 10-20 under 16s, and at the 7pm service is 25-30 adults. Attendance at the 11am St John's service is 35-45 adults and 10-15 under 16s.

St John with St Andrew's report:

At St John with St Andrew we want to give local people repeated opportunities to hear the gospel of Jesus Christ. We want to learn the gospel for ourselves, so we are better equipped to share the gospel and are motivated to give financially to others sharing the gospel here in the UK and overseas. With these aims the PCC had ambitious plans, under God, for 2018. In February we presented our budget for the year to the church families predicting a deficit of £20k. As we look back over 2018, a year with many trials and sadnesses, we are very thankful to our heavenly Father for sustaining us, drawing us closer together and closer to him. We give him all the praise that he has been at work in and amongst us as, in our weakness, we have learned to lean on him more and more.

Our main expenditure for the year was expected (and continued) to be staff costs, including the portion of the Common Fund that pays the stipend and accommodation of Paul Dawson, our vicar. Alongside Paul our staff team in 2018 consisted of Andy Mason, vicar at St John's and Chris Weir, who is involved in bible teaching to teenagers and adults as well as running the parish office. We were sad to see Robin and Annabel Silson and Sam and Alice Ashton leave us in June but are very pleased that they have both moved on to further theological study – Robin in Edinburgh and Sam undertaking a doctorate in Chicago. We are very thankful to God for all that he did in and through them during their time in Chelsea. We were delighted to welcome Edward Millais, with Alice and the rest of the family, back to the Parish as assistant curate at St Andrew's in July.

Kristian Lending continued as a Ministry trainee at St Andrew's and Jez Day continued as a Ministry Trainee at St John's. Graham Dickins, at St Andrew's, ended as a Ministry Trainee in June 2018 whilst Harry Ovey began as a Ministry Trainee in September 2018.

We are thankful to God that we were able to maintain our giving outside of the Parish – donating \pounds 38.5k to various partners in the UK and overseas who are seeking to share the good news of Jesus where God has placed them. This amounted to 9.2% of the total income for the year.

The main large building project undertaken in the year was repair of the large West-facing window at St Andrew's, costing \pounds 6.5k. Significant sacrificial giving from the congregations, further increase in the hire of the St Andrew's building (our two main sources of income) and a one-off gift of \pounds 15k changed the result for the year to a surplus of \pounds 6k.

The work with children and teenagers continues to be a highlight of our ministry. Groups for children during the main services on Sundays at both churches and the youth group for teenagers on Thursday evenings allow our young people to have Bible teaching pitched appropriately for their age and level of understanding. FAB club at St Andrew's maintains good numbers and is a great opportunity for under 11s to hear the good news of Jesus whilst the three 'Messy church' afternoons in the year at St John's encouragingly attracted a good proportion of guest families. At St Andrew's during the year we initiated monthly 'Thank God for...' family all-age services. We have been encouraged by guests of all ages attending. Our relationship with the chaplain at Chelsea Academy continues to offer opportunities, with our 'drop-in' after school group continuing to be open on Thursdays at St John's for students from the school and the Christian Union 'Grounded' meeting on Tuesdays in the chaple within the school. We are thankful to the Fulham YMCA who supported the youth ministry in the parish with £17.5k in 2018 and have pledged a further £17.5k in support of our ministry in 2019.

One of the 'Messy Church' afternoons was during the 'Love World's End' week at the start of July. A Big Supper and a number of other events were also held during this week and lots of guests heard personal accounts and Bible teaching of the good news of Jesus Christ. A number of these guests were contacts from the Gym at St John's, which continues to be well used by local men from the World's End. At St Andrew's Christmas continues to be a good opportunity to invite guests; our festive wreath-making, carol service, family carols and nativity play were all well attended with some good follow-up happening subsequently. One of the highlights of the year were evangelistic courses – Life Explored and Christianity Explored – run at both churches. These were well-attended and proved once again to be fantastic both for those new to Christianity to understand the gospel for the first time and those who had been around church for a while to brush up on the basics. We are delighted that these proved crucial as some understood the good news of Jesus and put their trust in him.

As church families we have been invigorated through teaching on Sundays – spending time in Isaiah and in a 'how do I grow?' series at St John's and in the epistle to the Ephesians, the letter of James and the gospel of Mark at St Andrew's. Our midweek groups continue to thrive and both churches had encouraging Weekends away in March (for St Andrew's) and October (for St John's).

We are very thankful to God for keeping us and providing for us. He has given us all we've needed and by his grace has allowed us to contribute to the spread of the good news of Jesus in the local area and further afield.

Financial Review

Total voluntary income, including tax recovered, was £251,949 (2017: £235,165), an increase on last year. Investment income was similar at £12,266 (2017: £12,287). In total income from property lettings was £155,252, compared to £157,681 in the prior year.

Total expenditure decreased 6% in the year from £432,222 to £404,725.

The net result for the year was a surplus of £4,413 (2017: deficit of £25,047). The balances carried forward at 31st December 2018 on unrestricted funds totalled £111,837 (2017: £106,799).

Reserves Policy

The PCC policy is to maintain sufficient reserves as deemed necessary to mitigate against key financial risks.

Responsibilities and basis of report

1. Accounting policies

Basis of accounts preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with current Church Accounting Regulations together with applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" FRS102 version effective 2015.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for the valuation of investment assets, which are shown at market value. The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their main affiliation to another body, nor those that are informal gatherings of church members. The current and comparative periods each cover 12 months. the accounts are prepared in £ Sterling.

Fund accounting

Restricted funds represent;

(a) income from trusts or endowments which may be expended on those restricted objects provided in the terms of the trust or bequest, and

(b) donations or grants received for a specific object or invited by the PCC for a specific object. The funds may only be expended on the specific object for which they were given.

Any balance remaining unspent at the end of each year must be carried forward as a balance on that fund. The PCC does not usually invest separately for each fund.

Unrestricted funds are general funds which can be used for PCC ordinary purposes.

Income

Planned giving, collections and donations are recognised when received.

Tax refunds are recognised when the incoming resource to which they relate is received.

Grants and legacies are accounted for when the PCC is legally entitled to the amounts due, the income is probable and can be measured reliably.

Dividends are accounted for when receivable, interest is accrued.

Rental income from the letting of Church premises is recognised when it is receivable.

Expenditure

Grants and donations are accounted for when paid over, or when awarded, if that award creates a binding or constructive obligation on the PCC. The Diocesan Share is accounted for when due. Other expenses are recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes VAT and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the Church in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries.

Church management costs include these costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the Church.

Tangible fixed assets

Consecrated and beneficed property is not included in the accounts in accordance with section 10(2)(a) of the Charities Act 2011. Movable church furnishings held by the vicar and churchwardens on special trust for the PCC and which may require a faculty for disposal are inalienable property, listed in the church's inventory which can be inspected (at any reasonable time). For anything acquired prior to 2000 there is insufficient cost information available and therefore such assets are not valued in the financial statements.

Tangible fixed assets are valued at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Church equipment

25% straight line

Individual items of equipment with a purchase price of £1,500 or less are written off when the asset is acquired.

Investments

Investments are valued at the mid-market value at the balance sheet date and the gain/loss taken to the Statement of Financial Activities.

During the year the PCC employed 5 members of staff (2017: 4).

As Church Administrator and Youth Worker, Chris Weir, who is a member of the PCC, was paid a salary of £33,406 (2017: £31,103) during the year, with an additional £5,673 (2017: £4,665) being paid into his pension.

Revd Sam Ashton, assistant curate and PCC member received a stipend of £19,154 (2017: £37,600) and accomodation costs of £11,495 (2017: £23,135). Robin Silson, church worker and PCC member received a salary of £17,619 (2017: funding of £12,800 plus stipend of £9,366) plus £2,458 (2017: £1,405) of pension contributions.

Jeremy Day, ministry trainee and PCC member, received funding of £7,500 (2017: £2,500) plus pension contributions of £6,827 (2017: £8,193).

Barbara Sherwood, who is a member of the PCC, received a donation from the Church of £7,200 (2017: £9,700) for her work supporting pastors throughout Africa.

As curate, Revd Andy Mason, PCC member, received a salary of £29,383 (2017: £27,309) plus pension contributions of £6,827 (2017: £8,193) and accomodation costs of £2,082. As assistant curate Revd Edward Millais received a salary of £23,917.

No trustees were remunerated for their role as a trustee. No other council members, or any persons connected with them, received any remuneration or expenses during the year.
