Narrative in support of 2018 accounts

In 2017 we reported that special support was being given to the creation of a "quiet" space at Storrington Primary School. This has now been concluded and the benefits are being felt already, so say all those users. In total, we granted the School £2k.

During the year, our Charitable donations amounted to £3189, just exceeding our plan of £3k. Once again, the beneficiaries included deprived youngsters, allowing many to attend school visits, providing some slightly older ones with Lap-tops, equipment and expensive art materials to ensure their ongoing studies.

2018 saw the conclusion to necessary works to bring the fabric of our buildings up to an impressive standard, completing internal decoration at a cost of £9.1k, various minor works such as providing plate warmers, kitchen hatches and the like costing a further £1.8k.

One of our sources of income, namely our Outside Brick building, which we rent to the Community Mini Bus Association needed a completely new roof. The original woodwork was rotten and in need of urgent attention, and it was decided that an entirely new roof was the only answer. We applied to the Sussex Community Foundation for a grant and were delighted when they gave us £5k towards the cost of a replacement roof. The final cost was £7.3k but now affords us the use of this building, namely to rent at a small annual value (£1.2k) to another vital community charity.

Hall Hirers included the Storrington Museum, Storrington Bridge, Art and Dance Groups together with Sewing, Exercise classes and Lunch Clubs. The Old School is widely used by the whole community.

Regular Outgoings amounted to £13.9k, giving us a surplus of £16.1k.

Apart from the planned project work which over-ran by nearly £2k (the internal decoration by £2.1k), the only other sizeable unplanned expenses arose from an asbestos risk assessment (inspection cost £672), which happily reported no issues.

There was a net excess of expenditure over income of £855.

In 2019, apart from the daily running expenses of the Old School and associated buildings, we expect to run at a profit of £15k.

Our final anticipated expense to bring our facilities to the highest standard will be the purchase of new chairs which will cost approximately £6k.

At this time we will continue to liaise with local schools and those in need.
