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# Report of the directors for the year ended 31 July 2018

#### Introduction

The directors submit their statutory accounts for The Vincentian Volunteers Limited for the year ended 31 July 2018.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in notes to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published on 16 July 2014 (as amended by Update Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016).

# Status and administration

The Vincentian Volunteers Limited is a registered private company limited by guarantee with a company registered number of 09033278. It was incorporated on 9 May 2014 and the first period of accounts extended to 31 July 2015. The company was dormant to 31 July 2015.

On 1 August 2015 the activities and net assets of the Vincentian Volunteer Trust (registered charity number 1053019) were transferred to the Vincentian Volunteers Limited.

The Vincentian Volunteers Limited is a registered charity with a registered number of 1161536. The company was registered with the charity commission on 5 May 2015. It is administered by the trustees whose details and report on the activities and achievements of the charity are set out below.

# **Principal Aims and Activities**

The principle object of The Vincentian Volunteers Limited is to advance the Christian faith and education of young people and to aid the relief of poverty, sickness, and old age by promoting establishing and developing opportunities for young people to undertake or assist in community work in England, Wales and Scotland.

# **Public Benefit**

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and activities and in planning the future activities of the charity.

The charitable purposes relevant to the charity's aims and activities are;

To create opportunities and provide an inspiration for young people to

- Deepen their Christian faith
- To serve, to be with, and to work towards the relief of, people on the margins of society due to disability, poverty, sickness or old age.

• Live together in a Christian Community. (Rooted in the Roman Catholic Tradition.)

The following paragraph reviews the activities undertaken by the charity in the year. The activities undertaken reflect the charity's aims and the stated charitable purposes.

#### **Review of the year**

The trustees have successfully recruited 4 volunteers for the volunteering year 2017/18. Operating as one community based in Manchester. It has been an interesting year with many highlights including an excellent presentation day held in April 2018 at Christopher Grange in Liverpool, where our volunteers enthusiastically provided detailed feedback regarding their work placements and all that they had achieved throughout the year. This further demonstrated to the team and its supporters the immense benefit that the volunteers receive from participating in the programme each year. The volunteers also participated in the celebration activities for the 400 years of the Vincentian Family joining with many other Vincentian families in Cardiff in October a great day was had by all.

#### **Detailed description of Volunteer Community Activity**

## Background

- We offer volunteering programmes for young (Christian) people age 18 -35 from around the world (including Britain).
- Our Volunteers commit a year of their lives to the service of vulnerable people.
- During their year with us they live in a community of three or four people and engage in voluntary work, in partnership with other, well known charity organisations.
- Their work helps the impoverished, the homeless, the disabled, the refugees and those suffering with addictions in the local community.
- The individual volunteers who join the programme for the year normally come after Sixth Form or university.
- Some have worked for a few years.
- · Most have not experienced any long term commitment with people who are vulnerable.
- The year is comprised of 3 main experiences:
  - 1. The experience of working with vulnerable and disadvantaged people as a large part of their work time.
  - 2. The living in small communities of likeminded people, which enables mutual support & challenges each to live up to their values and ideals.
  - 3. Alongside this, there is a spiritual formation programme, which emphasises the Vincentian Charism.

## Our commitment to the volunteers

For the duration of their year with us we provide them with:

- paid accommodation (shared between 3-5 volunteers)
- small weekly allowance to cover food, travel, living expenses and pocket money
- tailor-made work placements to suit individual interests, skills and abilities which operate in the Vincentian Charism
- a dedicated area co-ordinator, as a first point of contact
- Spiritual guidance through weekly meetings with the co-ordinator, planned programmes and seasonal retreats

#### Manchester Community

The Manchester community consisted of 4 volunteers, Bella from Indonesia whose placements were with L'Arche Manchester and Salford Loaves and Fishes. Brendan from the USA whose placements were with Faith for Change and the Whitechapel Centre in Liverpool, Urbanus from Kenya whose placement was with the Booth Centre in Manchester and Joseph, are first ever volunteer from Norway, whose placements were with the Bread Church and Christopher Grange in Liverpool and Salford Loaves and Fishes.

#### **Financial Review**

During the year the income increased to £43,099 (2017: £41,124) and expenditure decreased to £43,543 (2017: £47,401) leaving a deficit of (£444), (2017: (£6,277) deficit). The deficit has been reflected in a corresponding decrease in the charity's bank and cash balances.

In addition to the costs included in these accounts it should be noted that the accommodation for the volunteers is made available at little or no cost and that the coordinators and trustees give freely of their time.

#### Post year events

We have recruited 4 volunteers for the 2018-19 volunteer year all based in a community in Manchester.

#### **Reserves Policy and Future Plans**

The charity is reliant upon volunteers and needs balances at bank to ensure that the work can continue. The trustees are developing a fund raising strategy to ensure the work is continued.

#### **Risk Management**

The Trustees have examined the major strategic, business and operational risks which the Charity faces and confirm that the systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen the risks.

### 1 Accounting policies Basis of accounting

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Practice.

The charity has applied Update Bulletin 1 as published on 2 February 2016 and does not include a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is applying FRS 102 Section 1A.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest  $\pounds 1$ .

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

#### Income recognition

Donations and other voluntary income are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities as they are received. Legacies are accounted for when notified, once the value of the legacy can be measured with reasonable certainty and any conditions to enable the legacy to be received have been fulfilled. Charges to work placements are accounted for in the period in which the work was carried out.

#### Expenditure recognition

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

#### Debtors and creditors

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

#### Taxation

The charity is an exempt charity within the meaning of schedule 3 of the Charities Act 2011 and is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.
