Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Achievements and performance

1. Research

MJR is continuing to develop the strands of research already undertaken: '*Proving Legacy*', focussing on educational issues; and '*Talking Legacy*', focussing on the high prevalence of schizophrenia and diabetes among the African Caribbean diaspora. Further reports will be published when this research is completed.

2. The Zong Project

The Zong Project has been the main focus of activity this year. Good links have been made with organisations and individuals in the various ports to be visited and the trustees have been very encouraged with the amount of support the project is receiving. It was originally hoped that MJR would sail a C17th schooner fitted out as a replica slave ship around Britain in July 2019. However, the trustees have decided to defer the voyage until the summer of 2020 to allow greater time for fundraising.

The aim of the project is to provide the ship as a free resource to support local groups in developing associated activities and long term follow-up projects. Whilst nearly half of the funding to support this aim has been raised, the trustees felt that more was needed before they could allow the project to proceed. Deferring the project will not only allow time to secure the necessary funding, but will also enable a greater level of planning, and concur with the feedback from some ports who requested more time to plan related events. During the year, the trustees have established a renewed vision and strategy which we believe will ensure that the project will be delivered in 2020 and beyond. The Zong 2020 voyage will aim to:

- Raise awareness of Britain's leading role in the transatlantic slave trade.
- Stimulate and collate research into local involvement in this trade, and the legacy of the both the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade and industrial exploitation in Britain.
- Provide encouragement to existing and a catalyst for new local community-led projects seeking to address the issues identified.
- Create a greater national collective understanding and sharing of information and ideas to address legacy issues
- Assess levels of interest in establishing a permanent legacy centre.

Zong Project Strategy for 2019 / 2020:

- The trustees will work in partnership with local groups to organise a series of meetings to establish ways in which the visit of the Zong could most benefit and support local initiatives.
- Plans to produce an exhibition on-board the ship are progressing well and the extension will allow time for full consultation and planning to ensure the exhibition is appropriate for a subject of this sensitivity and importance. A smaller mobile exhibition will also be produced.
- Monthly updates of project news and prayer needs will be sent to supporters who sign up for this service.
- Fundraising is continuing and various new options are being considered such as encouraging paying passengers to sail on the ship from one port to the next; and working with partner organisations, providing display space on-board the ship.

Achievements and performance

3. MJR Manchester

In addition to the legacy of enslavement, about which the Zong Project is our major piece of work, MJR is investigating the legacy of industrial exploitation. This was an issue highlighted in the 'Proving Legacy' research on educational achievement which showed that poverty affects achievement levels among the white working classes more than any other group.

2019 marks the 200th anniversary of The Peterloo Massacre and many organisations in the Manchester area are planning commemorative events. In June 2018 MJR held an open meeting to investigate ways in which MJR could link with other like-minded organisations to mark this anniversary. It was agreed that MJR would work with various church and community groups to organise a Memorial service in the Cathedral on Sunday July 7th 2019. The three-fold theme will be: repentance; celebration of the social justice projects now in place; commitment to work towards social justice and equality in the future. A series of follow-up events are also being planned.
