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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2018

The Committee present its reports and the financial statements for the year ended 31st December 2018.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and activities

Our charitable objects are to promote kindness and to prevent or suppress cruelty to animals and to do all such lawful acts as the Society may consider to be conducive or incidental to the attainment of those objects. The objectives of the Branch are particular reference to the area covered by the Branch ranging from Dagenham & Barking in the South to Epping & Nazeing in the North, Waltham Abbey to the West and Abridge to the East, in accordance with the policies of the Society.

Public benefit

In shaping the Society's objectives and planning our activities, the Trustees have complied with the duty in Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charities Commission.

Animals welfare concern is always our top priority and our primary aim is to provide emergency lodging for animals in needs of rehoming and those who were mistreated, abandoned, neglected, at risks and strays. Animals under our care receive veterinary treatments, vaccination, neutering, micro-chipping and are assessed for rehoming. We take in animals who are lost and find ways to reunite with their owners. We support our local inspectors by accommodating rescued, injured and strayed animals free of charge and provide support to underprivileged groups and owners who suffer ill-health and financial difficulties for the care of their companion animals. With the aim of population control to prevent unwanted litters being born into an uncertain future, we offer free and affordable neutering treatments to owners of companion animals who are unable to pay in full or in part through the support of C4 Free Neutering for Cats Scheme. We advocate kindness to animals and provide information and advice to the local community including young people with the aim of developing empathy to animals at young age and prevent cruelty in the future. We work in partnership with local businesses for fundraising events. We establish networking with other charities in sharing knowledge and skills and providing volunteering opportunities to those who wish to help and participate in all activities that will help us to achieve our work in animals welfare.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2018

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The Essex South West Branch, like all RSPCA branches, is financially independent of the RSPCA. Our income derives mainly from donations, collections, legacies, adoption fees and fundraising events.

In 2018 we continued our policy of keeping our animal welfare activities to a consistent level which results in a more sustainable financial position. Our boarding arrangements for rescued dogs with the Goddard Chingford Boarding Kennels and for dogs and cats with the RSPCA Danaher Animal Home continue to operate satisfactorily. We hired a number of cat pens from London East Branch, so that we can operate cats rehoming activities at the same premises at Goddard Chingford. Two Animals Welfare Officers were seconded from London East Branch individually during the period from February to June and from August to December on a paid one day per week basis. This arrangement enabled the Branch to perform cats rehoming activities. Whereas we are restricted to take in dogs only from the Inspectorate and from emergency case concern, we are to follow the Society's protocol to rehome dogs which require behaviours and risks assessments in accordance with our safeguarding policies. In one extreme case, we employed the service of a qualified animal behaviourist to assess whether a dog can be rehomed. Therefore the rehoming activities have shown a downward trend from that of previous years with most incoming animals transferred out to RSPCA or other animals centres through a wider network for rehoming.

A total of 59 animals were taken in during the year, these include 38 dogs and 21 cats. We have rehomed 6 dogs (2017: 41) dogs and 3 cats (2017: nil) from Goddards Kennels and 2 (2017: 8) dogs and 8 (2017: 26) cats were rehomed by Danaher Animals Home. 25 dogs and 4 cats were transferred out to RSPCA or other animals centres for rehoming. 2 dogs and 2 cats were euthanised or found dead during our care. 1 dog and 1 cat were reunited with their owners for happy endings. We have 2 new foster arrangements during the year.

The Branch also provided support to the long-term fosterers in particular to a dog who was attacked by another dog in a park suffered with severe injuries. The dog received immediate veterinary treatments in a private animal clinic and was reported doing well after the treatment. Our fostered dogs and dogs with pre-existing conditions for adoption received veterinary treatments where possible at clinics under Goddard Veterinary Group.

The Branch also provides assistance to members of the public with veterinary bills, where people are on benefits and unable to pay for their pet's treatment.

Other activities and outlook

Early in the year 2018, there was the possibility that the Branch could be merged with a neighbouring branch. The benefits and risks are assessed on a plan of the two branches pulling resources together would seem to have synergy benefits in many operational and financial aspects, whereas the risks remain on the coverage of larger geographical areas which would require more human resources and expertise. The proposed merger has ground to a halt during the year largely due to the neighbouring branch not being ready to merge. However, there will be another opportunity to merge with neighbouring branches in the future and this was on our recent agenda.

Our shop strategy was on focus for several months during 2018. We realised the risks of sole reliance on income raised by donations and diminishing income on rehoming activities would not benefit the Branch. We recognised the opportunity to establish a shop in Chingford area will improve our income stream and have seen it as a good source of fundraising. We made an offer to occupy a shop in the Chingford area but was not successful due to competitive bids. We remain optimistic in finding and establishing a shop in the future.

With the legislation of General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) came into force in May 2018, the Branch has taken every steps to make sure it is fully compliant. We have established policies to protect the rights of members of the branch, donors, animal adopters, fosterers and volunteers by how we collect, use and store information. We requested consent to hold personal data for specific purposes and reviewed privacy note regularly in the interests to all parties concerned.

The 2018 Annual General Meeting was postponed to November due to insufficient number of trustees to form a Committee. The recruitment process for trustees took place in July. We have five other new trustees joined the Branch from the election of AGM in 2018 and co-option post AGM. We look forward to continuing the Branch work with a strong board of trustees offering different skills and expertise.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

We thank our volunteers who work tirelessly in the front lines and the support from the Society to aid the Branch to achieve its quality work. We thank the management and staffs at Goddard Chingford Kennels who gave us tremendous support and assistance in carrying out our work in animals welfare. Special presentation and thank you was given to a particular volunteer who has served the Branch as a dog walker for over 20 years. We also gave our condolences to the family of ex-trustee and branch secretary Mrs Patricia Borrott who passed away in December 2018. We thank for her dedication to the Branch for her work in fundraising and animals welfare.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

A net income of £497 is resulted in the year due to strict control of our expenditure, compared to deficit of £10,171 in 2017. The major items of expenditure remain boarding fees and veterinary costs. Overall income was down by 25% due to a reduction in donations of 64% and in rehoming fees of 79% although income from fundraising and collection boxes has shown a 4% increase. There were no legacies and grants received in the year. Boarding fees and veterinary costs have been reduced by almost 50% compared to last year. This is supported by the reduced animals rehoming activities during the year.

There are no restricted funds. Unrestricted funds of £81,977 compared to £81,480 in 2017, are general funds to meet ongoing operating expenditure. With the uncertainty in our incoming resources, we have kept our reserve policy to a level that allows resilience and capacity to manage unforeseen financial difficulties. We have kept cash reserves of £50,000 in an Income bond account with National Savings and Investments earning interests at a rate of 1.15% gross per annum. We forecast to breakeven or earn a modest net income that will allow the cash reserves to be kept at a consistent level in the year ahead.

The Branch has carried out a review to identify major risks and has taken steps to mitigate them. The major risks identified are loss of reputation due to error or fraud, and the availability of sufficient funds to cover the costs of animal welfare activities. It is the opinion of the Trustees that the Branch's policies, procedures and controls are adequate to minimise the possibility of financial loss through error or fraud and to maintain the future financial viability of the Branch.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

RSPCA Essex South West branch is an unincorporated charity association and operates as a self-governing branch of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (the Society) subjects to its Rules for Branches effective from 18th February 2009.

Committee members are elected from every Annual General Meeting (AGM) from the members of the branch. Each candidate is nominated by at least two eligible branch members and must receive the votes of at least fifty per cent of the eligible branch members present and voting. All Committee members must be the Society members for a minimum of three months from the date of election. Up to three co-opted Committee members may be co-opted by the Committee to hold office until the next AGM. The Committee may at any time appoint a replacement Committee member from eligible branch members to fill a causal vacancy. The Committee holds monthly meetings at which decisions are made, tasks are delegated for actions, risks are assessed and written reports on the Branch's financial position and activities are reviewed. Minutes of each meeting are kept.

The animal welfare work is reported by the Society's Chief Inspector in the South East 2 Group and the Branch Support Specialist. We are run entirely by volunteers, these include dog-walkers, fosterers, home-checkers, donation-tins collectors, social media administrator, etc. and have to raise our own funds.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2018

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
