Accounting Policies

Basis of measurement and preparation of accounts

These accounts have been prepared on the basis of historic cost in accordance with:

Accounting and Reported by Charities – Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP 2005);

And with Financial Reporting Standards for Smaller Enterprises (FRSSE) and with the Charities Act

Turnover Policy

The turnover policy shown in the profit and loss account represents revenue recognised by the company in respect of goods and services supplied during the period. The charity is not VAT registered therefore VAT has not been deducted from any income.

Tangible fixed assets depreciation policy

As the charity acts as service provider it does not hold any fixed assets, these remain the property of the buildings we operate in. For this reason depreciation of fixed assets is not relevant.

Intangible fixed assets amortisation policy

The charity does consider itself to have and therefore has not accounted for any intangible fixed assets

Valuation information and policy

Any stock held is valued at its original wholesale value. Costs include all expenses that are directly attributable to the cost of delivery of services.

Aims and Purposes

4 The Youth is a Charitable Company Limited by Guarantee set up by local professionals to provide a practical framework to continue to run local youth projects for local young people that would have otherwise closed as the statutory youth services have been forced to focus their resource elsewhere. 4 The Youth believe in working with others in both voluntary and statutory sector to maintain and improve provision for young people based on their needs.

Objectives and Activities

4 The Youth aims to provide young people living in Horsham and surrounding areas with access to youth work provision that meets their needs. 4 The Youth works for the benefit for the local community, specifically young people through their organisation of activities that support their growth, develop skills, capacity and capability to empower them to participate independently in society. Our provision for young people is provided in a number of ways including:-

- Providing youth clubs that provide a safe, fun informal learning environment for young people from age 8 19 including those with additional needs.
- Volunteering opportunities that enable young people to develop their own skills while supporting their peers.
- Residential trip opportunities that allow young people to independently experience new challenges with their peers.
- Training opportunities and project work which enable young people to develop skills and gain qualifications which increase self-confidence and employability.

Achievements and Performance

Forest Year 7, 8 and 9 Club

4 The Youth was able to work with the Forest School to secure the continuation of the Year 7 Club on a Friday evening (average 180 young people per night). Year 8 Club on a Monday evening (average 80 young people per night) and year 9 club on a Wednesday evening (average 30 young people per night) at Forest Youth Wing. With the generous donations from parents, nightly subs and income from the tuck shop 4 the Youth are pleased to have been able to run this club on a self-sustaining basis with The Forest School allowing the charity to use the building and covering utility costs. These clubs are to continue in partnership with Forest School.

Holbrook

4 The Youth work in partnership with the Holbrook Community Centre to provide a popular Junior club (approx. 60 young people per night) to young people in the local area including those attending the local primary school as well as a senior club (approx. 10 young people per night). The Junior club has a strong team of senior members who have benefited from taking part in training through 4 The Youth.

The Riverside Project (formally known as The Elm Grove Project)

4 The Youth worked as the lead organisation in partnership with Saxon Weald, Sussex Police and Horsham Matters to provide targeted provision aimed at young people with diverse needs and in some cases at risk of offending, predominantly living in social housing in and around the Elm Grove area of Horsham. Through the continuation of the project providing activity based sessions both on and off the site an average of 20 young people engaged in each session which aimed to build young people's independence, life skills, self-confidence and employability.

Reserves Policy

It is our policy to maintain a balance of unrestricted funds that allows 4 The Youth to meet its fixed liabilities for a minimum period of 6 months without income to cover any unexpected event or significantly lower than expected financial performance.

Volunteers

We would like to thank all the volunteers who work hard to make the clubs run successfully. Volunteers work tirelessly within our clubs supporting a small team of paid youth work staff and are pivotal to keeping the organisation running.

Structure, governance and management

4 The Youth is a charitable company limited by Guarantee with a board of directors. All members that attend our clubs are encouraged to be involved with the decision making process by joining our young people's steering group. Appointment of additional directors is encouraged and on election by the board as set out in the Articles of Association.

The full board met 4 times during the year, in addition working groups met and communicated on a regular basis with each director responsible for different areas of the organisation and reporting back to the board at full meetings.

Administrative Information

4 The Youth was based at Horsham Youth Centre, Hurst Road until July 2012 at which point the building was taken over by West Sussex County Council. Since July 2012 4 The Youth has been based at Forest Youth Wing, The Forest School, Comptons Lane, RH13 5NT with office space as well as the youth wing facilities in the evening. The space is provided free of charge and clubs run in partnership with the school.

4 The Youth is registered in England and Wales with the charity commission (1144413) and as a company limited by guarantee with Companies House (07699716).

The Directors would also like to thank West Sussex Council for Voluntary Youth Services, the management committee of Horsham Youth Centre, Holbrook Youth Centre, Needles Youth Centre and staff at Forest Youth Wing and School who worked with us in the face of an uncertain future not losing sight of the importance of ensuring services continued to run for young people in spite of the political issues and funding cuts affecting the sector.

Notes to the Accounts

Recognition of incoming resources

Incoming resources are only included on the P&L when the charity becomes entitled to the resources, the trustees are virtually certain they will receive or have received the resources and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Incoming resources with related experience

Where incoming resources have related expenditure the incoming resources and related expenditure are both reported gross in the P&L.

Grants and Donations

Grants and donations are only included on the P&L when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources. Conditional or restricted funding is only recorded once services have been delivered.

Tax reclaims on donations and gifts

No tax has been reclaimed on in this financial year.

Gifts, services and facilities kind

Gifts in kind for use by the charity are only recorded in the P&L when there is a clear monetary value. The value of voluntary help is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees report. The value of facilities such as buildings and the support of delivery partners have not been included in the P&L as it is not easily separately quantifiable.

Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources.

Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity

These are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £500. They are valued at cost or reasonable value on receipt. It should be noted that 4 The Youth does not hold assets such as sports equipment, minibuses etc as these remain the property of our partner venues where delivery takes place.
