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# INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2018

I report on the accounts of R.S.P.C.A. North Essex Branch for the year ended 31 December 2018 which are set out on pages 2 to 16.

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The Charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The Charity's Trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year (under section 144 (2) of the Charities Act 2011 (The Act) but that an independent examination is needed. The charities gross income exceeded £250,000 and I am qualified to undertake the examination by being a qualified member of Association of Accounting Technicians.

It is my responsibility to:

- Examine the accounts under section 145 of the Charities Act,
- To follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioners (under section 145(5)(b) of the Charities Act, and
- To state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

#### Basis of independent examiner's Statement

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioners. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the Charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes considerations of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

#### Independent examiner's statement

In the course of my examination, no material matters have come to my attention which gives me cause to believe that in, any meterial respect:

- the accounting records were not kept in accordance with section 130 of the Charities Act; or
- the accounts did not accord with the accounting records; or

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2018

#### 1. Accounting policies

#### 1.1 Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement on Recommended Practise applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015). (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

#### **Cash Flow**

The financial statements do not include a cash flow statement because the charity, as a small reporting entity, is exempt from the requirement to prepare such a statement under Financial Reporting Standard 1 "Cash flow statements".

#### 1.2 Incoming resources

Income from donations and grants, including capital grants, is included in incoming resources when these are receivable.

When donors specify that donations and grants, including capital grants are for a particular restricted purpose, this income is included in incoming resources of restricted funds when receivable.

#### 1.3 Resources expended and recognition of liabilities

All expenditure is incurred on an accruals basis. The majority of costs are directly attributable to the specific Charitable activities.

Liabilities are recognised on the accruals basis in accordance with normal accounting principles.

#### 1.4 Depreciation

Depreciation is provided to write off the cost of fixed assets over their expected useful lives, at the following annual rates:

The Committee consists of Trustees elected by members of the branch and any individuals coopted by the Trustees during the year.

The North Essex Branch of the RSPCA is an unincorporated charitable association and is a separately registered Branch of the Society. The objectives of the Branch are to promote the work and objectives of the Society: to promote kindness and to prevent or suppress cruelty to animals by all lawful means.

We have complied with the duty under the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Commission.

We support our local inspectorate by taking in mistreated or abandoned animals. The Society's inspectorate, as well as providing education, information and advice, rescues animals in distress and enforces laws against the cruel mistreatment of animals by bringing prosecutions.

We provide subsidised veterinary treatment for animals that are sick or injured and belong to local people on certain State benefits. We do this through the provision of a part-time welfare clinic. We also provide micro-chipping of companion animals, and an annual neutering service when funds allow. This helps to promote responsible pet ownership.

Animals in our care receive veterinary treatment, vaccination, neutering and micro-chipping and are assessed for rehoming. This work helps to control the incidence and spread of disease and suffering.

We rehome animals in need to people willing and able to have a companion animal. Our policy of accepting a reasonable donation for animals aims to highlight the ongoing personal and financial commitment of pet ownership. It would not be in the best interests of animals to rehome to those who could not afford to keep them.

We respond to enquiries (both directly and via the Society's national call centre) from the public about animals locally. We offer free animal care advice by telephone and at the clinic. The public benefits from knowing that we can intervene to assist animals in need.

Within the terms of our governing document, we support the National Society.

We provide volunteering opportunities for those who support our work, including trusteeship, fostering, home-checking and fundraising. This benefits local people and companies by providing the possibility of doing work which is compassionate and rewarding.

## **Branch Manager's Report**

This has been a challenging year for animal welfare. The clinic saw a total of 1092 animals: 789 dogs, 276 cats, 8 rabbits, 8 birds, 6 budgies, 3 guinea pigs & 1 hamster. Of these animals we neutered 90 and microchipped 120.

We said goodbye to Annie Clarke, who had been our Branch manager for 11 years. Feeling that I had a big pair of shoes to fill, I started in August last year. I was glad of the three months of working alongside Annie to gain and learn all that I could. This gave me the skills I needed to continue the role solo from November.

My thanks go to our excellent band of homecheckers: Kerry Childs, Dorothy Lee, Gordon & Iris Thorpe, Louise Hall and Ed Van Der Mark, who carried out over 100 homechecks this year for us and many of our neighbouring branches.

In September at my first Regional Board Meeting we applied for two grants. One was to upgrade our computer systems within the three shops and one was for a dental machine for the clinic. We were successful with both. The shops had the computers installed, which has allowed for better communication, has streamlined documenting the shops' intake and has allowed the staff to look up items on the internet. The advent of the dental machine at the clinic in November has been incredible. We started using it immediately and it has been invaluble for our patients with desperate dental problems.

Once again we couldn't do this work without the amazing team of staff and volunteers that we have working for our branch, both at the shops and at the clinic. Thank you all for your time and continued support.

Inspector Adam Jones and Inspector Lucy Brennan have been seconded to the wilberforce project. This is the new tasking system for the RSPCA. Lucy and Adam are helping with the rollout and training aspect of this project.

A thank you to all branches for their support over the last year from all of the Essex Team. Inspectors and ACOs have been taking turns to attend branch meetings where we can. The last year has been extremely busy for us all but hopefully the branches have felt supported when needed by the Inspectorate. The networking team have been a great support to the group and enabled us to still bring in the animals in need where a branch has been unable to help. With the support of Danaher animal home we have been able to get the animals in and then network them out where needed.

Danaher have had a very good success rate of rehoming the animals before they are even networked out to other centres. This means that they can begin their rehoming journey whilst they are waiting to be moved which is better for the animals' welfare and prevents them sitting in private boarding establishments that do not offer a re-homing service.

The Essex group relocated in November 2018 to the Danaher animal centre where there now is a new group office. The group office also offers two kennels which the Essex team has access to 365 days a year 24 hours a day. These kennels can host any animals for up to 16 hours. Already since November we have used this facility out-of-hours on eight occasions. These animals would normally have had to go into out-of-hours boarding or vets which would have cost a lot of money. We are grateful for this facility and it ensures that any officer at any time has somewhere safe to take any animal.

#### Successful prosecutions

The North Essex area have had a successful year with both prosecutions / AWC (adult written cautions) Some examples of these are:-

Monshur Alom (DOB 28/11/1981) of Jodrell, London, appeared before Chelmsford Magistrates' Court on Thursday 31 January, where he pleaded guilty to three counts of failing to meet the welfare needs of two Asian leopard cats and eight white ducks.

The offences were during the period of June 13 to June 21 at an address in Golf Green Road, Jaywick, Clacton-on-Sea, where he failed to meet the needs of the animals by failing to provide reasonable daily care and supervision in respect of their protection from harm; failed to meet their needs of a suitable diet; and failed to meet their need for a suitable living environment.

The defendant was given a 12-month community order of 180 hours unpaid work and was disqualified from keeping all animals for a period of 10 years, which he cannot appeal to be lifted for five years. He was also ordered to pay £600 costs and an £85 victim surcharge.

The court also imposed a deprivation order for the two cats. The ducks had already been signed over into RSPCA care prior to the court hearing.


The Asian leopard cats have been identified as listed under the Dangerous Wild Animals Act 1976 and were seized by the local authority. The cats have now been found a suitable home at a specialist centre.

RSPCA Inspector Emma Beynon said: "The two Asian leopard cats were being kept in a conservatory at the back of a property which was being renovated, and the ducks were at the rear of the garden, where the only water they had was dirty and the area was littered with faeces.

"All the animals were left unattended for a period of eight days and their needs had not been met, including failing to provide a suitable diet, suitable environment and reasonable supervision."

The two cats have been identified as listed under Dangerous Wild Animals Act 1976 and the defendant did not have a licence.

She added: "The location where the cats were being kept was completely inappropriate and they had little environmental stimulation. This case highlights the RSPCA's concerns about the trade and keeping of exotic pets.



Both cats who have since given birth to 5 kittens each are now in a zoo in Belgium being cared for

Rescues and Collections.

Rescues and collections are always coming in thick and fast and here are just some examples of what the Essex team have been up to over the past year.

A deer in netting is something we see far too often here in Essex. Unfortunately the deer could not be saved as the damage done by the netting to the deer's antlers was too severe to release it to the wild again.

This pheasant clearly wanted to come in from the cold and after smashing its way through the window. It had to be rescued by Inspector Jess Dayes who was able to release it as, luckily enough, it had no injuries, maybe just a sore head in the morning.




As the branches are aware one of the big issues we face here in Essex is the multiple cat households. We are extremely lucky to work closely with Cats Protection and the branches are often a great support when dealing with these issues. Last year alone we dealt with so many of these, each house often containing over 30 cats.

We also faced a horse crisis last year and the RSPCA worked hard to publish this fact to highlight the ever-increasing numbers of equines we are seeing coming into our care as a result of being mistreated, abused and neglected.

The RSPCA is in a midst of a horse crisis, convictions have risen by 25% in two years and the charity has 45% more horses in its care than two years ago.

Here in Essex we are working hard with other agencies and charities to try and crack down on the known problem areas. There is now a NEWC (National Equine Welfare Council) meeting that is hosted by the BHS and Redwings in the Essex area. This meeting is of great value as we are all working alongside each other to tackle the same issues.

To finish: I was shown this RSPCA report from 1963 whilst visiting the Colchester clinic the other day. It makes a very interesting read and it was lovely to see some RSPCA history. A very different report is given from the one I am giving today.



#### INSPECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT

I beg to submit my Annual Report for the year ending 31st December, 1963.

During the year ninety six complaints of alleged cruelty were received and investigated, resulting in advice and cautions being given.

Three cases were reported to Headquarters resulting in four convictions and two monitions. Two monitions were also sent in a case reported in 1962.

Forty cautions were also given by me in lesser cases of cruelty.

I humanely destroyed eighty two dogs, two hundred and eighty four cats, seventeen swans, one seal and ten birds.

Three hundred and ninety new homes were found for animals, the animals concerned being, two hundred and twenty eight dogs, one hundred and thirty five cats, three geese, ten rabbits, two ducks, eleven guinea pigs and one tortoise.

I have regularly attended the Animal Welfare Centre at Clacton on Sea where one hundred and ten animals were

humanely destroyed and two hundred and twenty two were

One hundred and seven animals were treated and given first aid etc. thirteen destroyed by Veterinary Surgeons under the free

One hundred and sixty one cats, twenty one dogs and veterinary voucher scheme. twenty seven birds were humanely destroyed by Branch

There were three animal rescues during the year. Auxiliary Secretaries and Chemists. The Cattle Markets have been regularly attended and

observation kept on the handling of all animals brought Slaughter houses and Knackers yards have been

visited as often as possible and observation kept on the killing of evice During the severe winter special watch was kept on Is in field animals in fields and on swans and ducks on frozen lakes killing of animals.

Numerous reports were received stating that swans

were frozen into the ice and were unable to get out. All these

All Circuses that visited the district during the year were visited, the animals examined and the performances attended.

I attended the Donkey Derby at the Castle Park in Colchester where a number of donkey races took place; all the donkeys were in good condition and were not overworked.

Frequent visits were made to Parkeston Quay regarding the import and export of horses, weekly reports have been submitted to Headquarters on the number of horses imported and exported.

During the summer months observation was kept on donkeys ponies and landau horses in the Clacton, Jaywick, Holland and St. Osyth areas.

All Pet Shops in the area have been regularly visited. Numerous people have called on me for advice about their pets and I have done my best to advise them.

I have patrolled all areas of the Branch as often as possible on foot and by motor van.

I have visited Riding Schools as often as possible and am pleased to report that, in general, the schools are well

In conclusion I should like to thank all Branch Officials, run and the animals well cared for.

Police of all ranks; Veterinary Surgeons, the Manager and Manageress of the Clinic, Manager of the Dogs Home and the Press for all the help and assistance they have given me.

#### **TREASURER'S REPORT**

The beginning of 2018 saw a major change for us in the merger of our Essex North East branch with the North West Essex Area of the RSPCA, forming the 'new' aptly named North Essex Branch. Both the 'old' branches finished the previous year (2017) in an excellent financial position, carrying forward a very healthy bank balance into 2018 for North Essex.

With the ever increasing use of internet banking and card payments instead of cash, we've seen the closure of many local High Street bank branches. This has impacted on our shops forcing us to find alternative ways to bank our takings, eg. by using local Post Office deposit facilities. Also, as a charity, having always dealt mainly with cash, it is important that we keep up to date and move towards accepting card payments 'as the norm'.

The reduction in the public's use of cash for payment has also impacted on our collection boxes. Sadly, this is an area which will continue to decline, so finding alternative ways to raise funds is key.

In the latter part of 2018, with monies received via grants from RSPCA HQ and from our own resources, we made some much needed improvements to our shops and clinic. We updated computer/IT equipment at our shops to bring them into the 21<sup>st</sup> century and to help improve their efficiency and security. We also installed a much needed dental machine at the clinic which has already made a big impact on the service we provide there.

At the end of 2018, our book-keeper, Richard Scrivener, retired having provided many years of accounting support. A very big thank you goes out to Richard for his hard work and dedication to the branch. He will be very much missed and we wish him all the best in his retirement.

Finally, despite a challenging year with many big changes, the North Essex Branch finished 2018 in a very strong financial position.

#### **Re-homing**

Danaher Animal Home is an independent charity which is affilliated to and works closely with the RSPCA.

The Home takes in unwanted animals (principally dogs, cats, and small domestic animals) from the dog warden and the RSPCA branches. In addition it takes in animals from the RSPCA inspectors – these animals are normally the subject of cruelty cases, and are often in poor condition. A temporary refuge is provided for the animals where they are assessed, treated by a vet, cared for and nursed and then, hopefully, rehomed. Danaher now absorbs all veterinary charges but retains the adoption fee.

In 2018 Danaher on behalf of the North Essex Branch admitted a total of 120 animals, made up of 46 dogs and 74 cats and successfully rehomed a total of 138 animals, made up of 53 dogs and 85 cats.
