

COMMITTEES OF THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL

The PCC operates through a number of committees that meet between full meetings of the PCC.

Standing Committee

This is the only committee required by law. It has the power to transact business of the PCC between its meetings, subject to any directions given by the Council.

Other Committees:

Fabric Committee

Attends to matters concerned with the repairs and maintenance of the church fabric.

Missions Committee

Makes arrangements, in co-operation with neighbouring churches, for the annual Missions Bazaar and similar fund-raising activities. Makes recommendations to the PCC regarding the distribution of St. Edmund's share of these funds, and where appropriate, of the funds allocated by the PCC to charitable causes.

Christians Together in Southwold

Arranges ecumenical events in Southwold and neighbouring parishes.

Catering Committee

Makes arrangements for catering at the annual Harvest Supper and all the other social events planned by the PCC.

Buildings Committee

Attends to matters concerned with major building works and/or re-ordering of the church building.

REVIEW OF THE YEAR 2018

The PCC met on 8 occasions and in addition there were informal meetings when required of Subcommittees for Buildings and Fund Raising.

Sadly it was necessary to employ scaffolders in the church when large portions of plaster came down from high up on the tower wall. This was remedied fortunately in time for Christmas making it unnecessary for the flower arrangers to disguise the scaffolding with greenery as they had to for the flower festival held in September.

The Church held an average of 18 services a month and 4 baptisms, 9 weddings, 11 funerals and 6 memorial services. The services included Messy Church and Family @ Church, a Harvest Festival, a Blessing of the Nets service and a Carol Service. Christingle was held on Christmas Eve and was a smash hit as usual. In November a meeting was held to 'brainstorm' ideas as to how the Church worship should move on. It was well attended with many ideas being put forward many of which is it hoped will soon be put into practice.

We are lucky to have Lay Elders who can take Communion to St Barnabas and Crick Court and lead prayers and hymns at St Barnabas with a special Christmas carols and readings at Crick Court. Additionally Lay Elders help the Rector by visiting and sometimes taking Communion if required to the housebound and sick.

The newly furbished back of the Church is proving to be a very successful place to bring people together. There have been several coffee mornings, a wonderful Flower Festival – and in fact the Christmas decorations were so spectacular as to warrant a special mention. Additionally coffee is served every Sunday and after the Eucharist on Thursdays. The Church hosted two events during the Southwold Festival –

Barry Crier and a concert with Mica Paris which were both very successful and drew large numbers of people to the Church who might otherwise never have crossed the threshold.

There are many who deserve thanks this year. Simon our Rector should be first but I want to mention particularly Marcus Knight our Church Warden who has been a tower of strength in the Church as with unbounded good humoured energy he has resolved many of the problems which arise in the running of the Church when lights don't work or the Central Heating doesn't come on or plaster falls off the walls. Hugh Williamson takes many services in the Team as well as acting as an excellent Secretary to the PCC, and is invaluable. Sadly we are saying goodbye to Mike Carter who retires as Treasurer after many years of, often thankless, painstaking work but as he continues to sing in the choir and ring the bells, he is still a very important part of the team. We are very grateful to Jill Horne who bravely takes up the baton. Thanks goes to other retirees, firstly Ian Johnson, our Fabric Officer for many years and Shirley Cordeaux who managed to produce rotas for helpers at all the services although we hope she will still be putting her beautiful handwriting to good use in the Baptism book and other memoranda around the Church.

Particular thanks must be given to the other laypeople who take Messy Church, in particular Halcyon Meldrum and Sarah Smith, Joan Goldsmith our Verger, flower arrangers and caterers, dusters and polishers, welcomers and sidespeople as well as the choristers and bell ringers, our organists and piano players and the group of musicians who lead Messy Church and other services on occasion.

Finally I want to make a personal thank you to everyone who has made my time as Church Warden so rewarding. I leave a space for someone younger and with enthusiasm for what is a very interesting and involving job.

Financial Review 2018

Unrestricted Funds (General Fund)

Principal Sources of Funds.

The principal sources of unrestricted funds in 2018 were, in order of magnitude, as follows;-

- 1. Covenanted Giving by parishioners,
- 2. Dividends from investments in CCLA securities. (CCLA are our investment management consultants)
- 3. Service collection plates,
- 4. Income Tax recovered on gift aided donations
- 5. The Gift Chest at the entrance to church.
- 6. Regular giving in envelopes
- 7. Fees for weddings and funerals

Total unrestricted income was £110,888, a healthy increase compared with last year's total figure of £86,287. The gift chest donations have increased by £6,908. Loose plate and gift aid church collections have also increased by £1,585. These increases are most probably the result of the church being open on a more regular basis to visitors.

Investment income and interest on the deposit account together have increased this year by £407.

Total unrestricted expenditure was £100,180; this, for the second consecutive year was less than income. This should give us the opportunity to replace money drawn from the deposit account during the year which had to be withdrawn to pay for some of the Parish Share.

The return on unrestricted investments was 3.36%, an improvement of 3.4% on last year.

Funding Objectives,

The objectives of the General Fund are to meet the monthly running costs of the church, to fulfil our obligation to the Diocese by making our full contribution to the Parish Share, to meet our commitment to the community by our Christian ministry and, where possible, by contributing to local and overseas charitable work.

Payment of our Parish Share represented 58% of our total unrestricted income in 2018 compared with 65% in 2017. The Parish Share for 2019 remains the same as 2018.

Fundraising for charities is normally carried out separately from the main church account by the Home and Overseas Missions committee which had a difficult year.

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The cake stall in the market place was cancelled owing to inclement weather and the Flower Festival was held in place of the Missions Fair.

Our Flower Festival in September raised £3,600, of which £1,200 was donated to the Marine Conservation Society. At the annual "blessing of the nets" service a further £126.53 was raised for the Marine Conservation society making a total of £1,326.53. Donations to Mercy Ships totalled £660.66. This amount was raised at the "blessing of the nets", the vicarage tea party and at a service in September when Dr Tony Giles spoke of his work as a surgeon on the ships. At the Remembrance Sunday service the sum of £1647.54 was raised for the British Legion and at the annual Christingle service £679.09 was raised for the Children's Society. These amounts were restricted at the time of donation and disbursed immediately after collection. Half the carol service collection, £354.73, was donated to the Southwold Mayor's Charity Fund. A total of £333.95 was donated to the Scripture Union, Beach Mission from collections on two consecutive Sundays. We have supported 'Transforming Lives for Good' at Southwold Primary School with a contribution of £900 this year and a commitment to continue for a further year.

We keep in reserve in liquid funds a minimum of three months salary for each of our employees and sufficient to cover anticipated utilities charges for the half year. We also reserve each quarter our Diocesan "Parish Share".

St Edmunds Hall is now leased to the Sole Bay Arts Centre for a peppercorn rent and has not drawn on PCC funds in 2018.

Restricted Funds (Restoration and Fabric Fund)

<u>Principal Sources of Funds</u>:- Murray Legacy, Usher Legacy, Mullock Legacy and Restoration and Fabric investment funds.

The Mullock legacy is invested in CCLA Property funds and restricted such that only the dividend income can be used for the restoration of the fabric of the Lady Chapel. The Usher legacy is held in CCLA securities by the PCC and the whole of the capital and the dividend income can be used for restoration and maintenance of the whole church building. The Murray Legacy is held in CCLA securities and both capital and income can be used for the improvement and maintenance of the fabric of the church. A portion of the income from this fund has been used for payment of costs arising from the KLASP project. Further income arises from other funds invested in CCLA securities.

Income from investments in restricted funds was £32,837, an increase of £745 compared with 2017. The average yield on restricted investments was 3.91% with the percentage increase being 4.5%.

Funding Objectives

The funding objective of the Restoration Fund is to carry out necessary repairs and restoration as expeditiously as possible whilst retaining a suitable level of reserve to cover possible emergencies. There is an outstanding need for major works arising from the quinquennial inspection carried out in 2016.

The policy on the Restoration Fund is to keep in reserve sufficient funding for routine maintenance and an emergency contingency of £50,000 on cash deposit.

KLASP Fund

The KLASP project was completed at a final cost of £715,807. The fund has now been closed with any remaining resources being transferred to the Restoration and Fabric Fund.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ending 31 December 2018

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

In preparing the accounts, the members of the PCC have considered whether in applying the policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP 102 a restatement of comparative items was needed. No restatements were required.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for the valuation of investments which are shown at market value.

The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their main affiliation to another body, nor those that are informal gatherings of church members.

Preparation of accounts on a going concern basis

The assessment of the PCC is that the charity is a going concern.

Funde

Restricted funds represent a) income from trusts or endowments which may be expended only on those restricted objects provided in the terms of the trust or bequest, and b) donations or grants received for a specific object or invited by the PCC for a specific object. The funds may only be expended on the specific object for which they were given. Any balance remaining unspent at the end of the year must be carried forward as a balance on that fund. The PCC does not usually invest separately for each fund. Where there is no separate investment, interest is apportioned to individual funds on an average balance basis.

Unrestricted funds are general funds which can be used for PCC ordinary purposes.

Income and endowments

Planned giving, collections and donations are recognised when received. Tax refunds are recognised when the incoming resource to which they relate is received. Grants and legacies are accounted for when the PCC has sufficient certainty that receipt of the income is probable and the amount can be measured reliably. Dividends are accounted for when receivable, interest is accrued. All incoming resources are accounted for gross.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party. The diocesan parish share is accounted for when due. Amounts received specifically for mission are dealt with as restricted funds. All expenditure is accounted for gross.

Fixed Assets

Consecrated and benefice property is not included in the accounts in accordance with s.10(2) of the Charities Act 2011.

Moveable church furnishing held by the vicar and churchwardens on special trust for the PCC and which require a faculty for disposal are inalienable property, listed in the church's inventory, which can be inspected (at any reasonable time).

Investments

Investments are valued at market value at 31 December.

6 FUNDS

The Murray legacy, both income and capital is restricted to Restoration and Fabric. During the year income of £10,292 was received and there was an unrealised loss on investments of £3,358.

The Mullock legacy, both income and capital is restricted to expenditure on the Lady Chapel. During the year income of £6,497 was received and there was an unrealised gain on investments of £3,384.

The Usher legacy, both income and capital is restricted to Restoration and Fabric. During the year income of £11,527 was received and there was an unrealised gain on investments of £6,678.

The Southwold Saints Legacy income is restricted to Restoration and Fabric. During the year income of £837 was received and there was an unrealised loss on investments of £379.

Restricted funds collected for missions and charities are discharged in the year.

The General fund's investments, which are unrestricted, produced income of £16,012 and showed an unrealised loss of £7,166.

The investments of the Restoration and Fabric Fund, income of which is restricted to the restoration of the fabric of the church, produced income of £3,166 and there was an unrealised loss of £1,432.

7 DONATIONS AND LEGACIES

There were no legacies given to the church in the year (2017: £1,000).
