During the year Synod did an audit for all the church websites in the deanery, and St. Mary's came out as 'excellent'. This is thanks to the hard work and expertise of Michael Hughes, for which we are hugely grateful. However it is not 'mobile friendly' in its current software, and Michael is asking to step down from this role in 2019. We are therefore looking for someone with the appropriate time and expertise, particularly as we explore the possibility of a Benefice website with discrete areas for the two parishes.

St. Mary's has also received excellent support from the Deanery Finance Chair, Colin Cohen with regard to our Common Mission Fund payments, helping us achieve a reduction for 2019 over that requested and formulate a 'flight path' to meeting our payments in full.

Deanery Synod has also variously focused on its dMAP (Deanery Mission Action Plan) agreed in January 2018, the availability of parenting courses, sharing best practice including that from the 'Benefice of the Future' work on best practice in rural multi-parish benefices, various forms of parish communications, and welcomed overseas guests.

ELECTORAL ROLL

Under the Church Representation Rules all parishes were required to prepare a new Electoral Roll in 2019.

The new roll has been available for inspection (for correction only) from 31st March 2019 for 14 days.

For 2019 it contains 92 names, of these 46 are resident within the parish and 46 reside outside the parish.

DEANERY SYNOD

The Parish of Eversley and Darby Green is part of Odiham Deanery. In addition to the clergy, we have two elected members of Deanery Synod, Dr David Lister, and at the start of the year Dr. Robin Felix. Due to Robin's imminent move away from the area, he stood down during 2018, and Mr Tony Ford has taken up this responsibility. We are grateful to them all for their time and commitment.

BACKGROUND:

The Parish of St Marys, Eversley contains the rural population centres of Eversley and Bramshill and includes the Parish Church of St Mary's as well as the Bramshill Mission Chapel. It lies to the west of the town of Yateley and is on the north-eastern corner of the Diocese of Winchester on the boundary between Hampshire and Berkshire. It is in the Deanery of Odiham, and the parish has an approximate population of 1800.

The PCC shares responsibility with the Churchwardens and Priest-in-Charge for the mission of the church and the pursuance of its charitable objects. These are laid out in the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure 1956 and the Synodical Government Measure 1969:

"The functions of the PCC shall include: Co-operation with the Incumbent in promoting in the parish the **whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical;** the consideration and discussions of matters concerning the Church of England or any other matters of religious or public interest".

When planning objectives and activities for the year, the Priest in Charge, the Churchwardens and the PCC have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. We fulfil our objectives through activities associated with six main Objectives:

- 1. Regular public worship open to all.
- 2. Sacred space for personal prayer & contemplation.
- 3. Pastoral work, including visiting the sick and the bereaved.
- 4. Teaching through sermons, courses and small groups.
- 5. Taking of religious assemblies ("Collective Worship") in schools.
- 6. Promotion of Christianity through events, meetings, and literature.

PCC REPORT:

This year the PCC has experienced considerable change. The appointment of Rev'd Lerys Campbell as Priest-in-Charge (Sept 2017) has naturally resulted in a change of style of leadership within the PCC and we are grateful for everyone's support, patience and understanding during this time of change. Rev'd Rachel Hartland (previously on placement with us) was also appointed Associated Priest (SSM) in April 2018 across the Benefice.

Three subcommittees have been formed within the PCC: worship, finance, and buildings. These committees meet every other month and report back to the main PCC meetings, which are now held on the intervening months. This has resulted in a more efficient PCC.

The PCC now rotates the day of the week used for meetings to ensure that no eligible member of St. Mary's is barred from the PCC because they unable to attend meetings on a particular day of the week.

During the year the PCC held a joint 'Away Day' with St. Barnabas at St. John's Hartley Wintney.

One of our Deanery Synod representatives, Dr Robin Felix, resigned during the year and has been replaced by Mr Tony Ford.

ADMINISTRATION AND MAINTENANCE

FABRIC REPORT

Purpose: To maintain the church fabric

The annual inspection of the fire extinguishers at both St. Mary's and Bramshill Mission Chapel has been carried out and those extinguishers that were approaching their expiry date have been replaced.

General maintenance has continued, with the rate of replacement of lightbulbs being a major concern. Dimming the lights has resulted in a significant drop in the number of lightbulbs failing. The three bulbs in one fitting have been replaced by LED bulbs and if this proves successful then all bulbs will be changed to LEDs which will result in a significant power saving.

Our grateful thanks go to the maintenance and cleaning teams all of whom have given their time and practical expertise to keep the church and its environs looking cared for and running smoothly.

Local members of The Arts Society Church Recording group have continued to record details of St. Mary's and hope to present a book detailing their findings during the week of the Kingsley 200 celebrations.

In April the PCC set up a Buildings Committee to manage regular maintenance, action the quinquennial and take forward the hall redevelopment. In August the committee visited other churches with hall developments and are planning to create an Architect's Brief early in 2019 to move the project forward.

On 24th January, we rang for the funeral of one of our ringers, Margaret Ellis. Margaret and Tim, our churchwarden, learnt to ring together and rang their first quarter peal in 2017. She will be sadly missed.

In Holy Week we do not ring the bells, so instead of the usual Wednesday practice, on 28th March we all went to the Frog and Wicket for a social evening.

On 9th April we rang a quarter peal for Rachel Hartland's Licensing Service.

For Heritage Day 2018 we put a camera in the bell chamber and had a screen in the church so visitors could watch the bells in action. We demonstrated ringing and gave the visitors a go.

2018 was the 100th Anniversary of the end of the First World War and ringers throughout the country took part in special ringing for the various events that occurred. One of the events was for the ringing community to try to recruit 1400 new ringers in memory of those ringers lost during the 4 year conflict. We recruited 3 new ringers, Sam, his father and Jenny. We also rang a quarter peal on Remembrance Sunday.

During the Christmas period we rang carols on handbells in two local pubs to raise money for the new set of bell ropes which we put in this year. We also rang handbells in the Candlelit Carol Concert.

Practices are well attended with usually 8-12 ringers. We try to ring a quarter peal on the first Wednesday before the practice, for one of the band to ring something they have learnt, and hold an advanced practice on the last Wednesday which encourages ringers from others towers to join us.

Overall, a busy but very enjoyable year of ringing at Eversley.

PCC met 8 times in 2018

The PCC Sub-Committees, (Worship, Buildings and Stewardship) which were set up following the APCM in April met twice to conduct business under their own terms of reference, and reports were received by the full PCC and discussed when necessary.

In addition, the Priest-in-Charge met regularly with Churchwardens and weekly with a Churchwarden, Parish Administrator and Associate Priest to identify matters of general concern and importance to the parish to be brought to the attention of the PCC.

Thank you to all who served on the PCC in last year and we look forward to those joining the PCC in 2019 to serve the church.

CHURCH VISION:

Over the last year we have begun a process to review and renew our vision for the church. At our Away Day in January, we agreed that we would create three sub-committees of the PCC to look at and move forward three areas of church life. These were Stewardship, Buildings, and Worship. Following the election of a new PCC in April we begun to look at these three areas and have made some progress as you will see below. In July and August the clergy both went on retreat to seek God for his vision and direction for the churches as we begin a new 3 year cycle looking at our Parish Mission Action Plan (pMAP) and creating a new one for the next three years. In September we began the review process of our pMAP by looking at what had been achieved over the previous 3 years. We also had several of the PCC attend a seminar led by the diocese to explain the process for moving the pMAP forward.

As part of these discussions we agreed that in 2019 we will create a new pMAP document. In order to help with this we planned an Away Day in January to meet with community representatives and work out what it is God is calling us to do to serve him in this community. The diocesan four strategic priorities are:

- 1. We grow authentic disciples
- 2. We re-imagine the church
- 3. We are agents of social transformation
- 4. We belong together in Christ

Please continue to pray for us all that as we listen to God, look to our community and its needs and respond, we might see new disciples coming to faith, new opportunities for us all to serve, and discover more about God together.

Once her appointment as Associate Priest to the Benefice had been agreed, Rev'd Rachel Hartland agreed to fill the vacancy, and started undertaking the appropriate training. Other Foundation Governors in 2018 were Suzanne Craddock (Chair), Robin Spicer, Trevor Aylen, John Haynes, Peter Sloan, and David Horrocks. In September 2018, Rev'd Rachel picked up the leadership of the small, half-termly prayer group that meets in the school to pray for its life, and the well-being of all connected with it.

The clergy of the parish are also involved in leading Collective Worship, in a bi-weekly pattern that fits with our 'Open The Book' ministry (see below). They also attend other forms of collective worship and celebration. As part of their Leavers' Service in July 2018, Jane Hughes (LLM-in-training) presented Youth Bibles to each Year 6 child as a gift from St. Mary's Church.

The whole school also walk across the fields to church for services, whenever appropriate and possible. Staff, parents and pupils were invited to worship in church for Easter 2018 and on Founder's Day (12th June, anniversary of the birth of Charles Kingsley), thanks to the police being available to cross them over the busy A327. This is proving increasingly difficult to achieve as regularly as both the church and school would wish. The Headmistress, Mrs Zoe Charlton, is exploring alternative ways of achieving this important aspect of the church/school relationship.

Mrs Charlton, the school choir and other members of the school community, came and led our Advent All Age Sunday Service for us in December 2018. This continues to be an important high point in the worshipping year, as we continue to integrate the worship of school and church. This year the choir also performed in both halves of our Candlit Christmas Concert.

We are deeply grateful to Mrs Charlton, the governors, staff and families of Charles Kingsley's who so enthusiastically support and help to maintain our link with the school.

ABC - ADULTS, BABIES AND CHILDREN

Purpose: ABC – Adults, Babies, and Children is a church group that is run every Thursday during term time from 10am - 11.30am. The group meets in the hall at St Mary's Church, Eversley.

We always start the morning with a Christian story. At the moment we are working our way through a wonderful book: '99 Stories from the Bible'.
