Dear friends

A really warm welcome to this booklet! As you delve in, please join me in gratitude to God for His amazing love and grace towards us. God is very good!

First things first. Seven months since our arrival at St Helier, it still seems to be the right thing to have happened. We thank God for this blessing. Thank you all for the warm welcome at my Licensing Service of 2nd September 2018. Undoubtedly this has been a momentous time as we settle down and try to belong. We are certain that our relationships will continue to flourish in the days ahead.

I will say three things. One is a big thank you to all who labour in this huge vineyard that our churches are. Some are visible, others are hidden but without the bit that each of you does, we would all be impoverished. Please allow me to encourage you. The Christian life has often been likened to a race with a prize awaiting those who finish. The apostle Paul in his letter to the Philippians describes the ultimate aspirations of his Christian journey as, 'to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus' (Phil 3:14). As we join with the apostle in striving to do our best to bring God's kingdom to bear in our common lives and in our community, may our ultimate desire be to respond to God's amazing love and generosity with every bit of our lives. Being a follower of Jesus Christ means stepping out of our comfort zones. It means making Jesus our sole agenda in our personal and common lives. It is sweaty, inconvenient business. No wonder our founder likens it to grabbing a large wooden beam of a cross on a hot afternoon and following him through a jeering crowd. (Matthew 16.24-26)

Thirdly, as we progress the process of the appointment of a colleague leader in the parish, please pray that God sends the right person to us. We are still going through a transitory period and which should hopefully settle in the next little while. God is good, all the time!

Chairs Report

Sue Knight read the Wardens Report and Heidi Morton summarised the Pro-Warden report from Bishop Andrewes

Sue Fifield endorsed the work undertaken by the Wardens (Sue Knight, Jimmy Moore and Heidi Morton) and asked the Parishioners to express their thanks.

Treasurer's Report

Andy Morton confirmed that the Accounts for 2017 had been prepared, independently examined and adopted by the PCC for presentation to the Annual Meeting. He presented a summary of the Financial Report as follows:

Income: £95,264 in 2017 (compared with £109,852 in 2016)

Tax efficient planned giving slightly down Gift Aid recovered increased (due to higher number of claims presented) Social Club rent final payment for 2017 fell into 2018 Reduction in hall lettings

Expenditure: £94,259 in 2017 (compared with £109,637 in 2016)

Increase in Parish Pledge Reduction in church running expenses (due in part to Vacancy) Less expenditure on major repairs (although this will increase in 2018)

There are many ongoing issues in both church buildings but always cost money and time. Please continue to pray for our buildings.

Ministry Report 2018

My time in the parish on Sundays throughout the whole year has continued to be split between St Peter's and Bishop Andrewes' and am fully involved in the life of both churches. I am not around much in the day time, as I continue to divide my time between parish ministry and my work at The Royal Marsden Hospital Sutton, where I am employed 4 days a week by the NHS, and licensed by the Bishop as Chaplain.

8 months of the year was spent in interregnum, and we have been grateful to Revd Naomi Whittle and Revd Martin Hayward who helped us regularly on Sundays during this time of vacancy.

On Pentecost Sunday evening, we were very blessed that Horizon Church partnered with us, and led a Resonate worship evening at BA, and also helped to lead the worship at Revd John Itumu's Collation Service on Sept 2nd.

Messy Church has continued to thrive during the interregnum, and we have built up an enthusiastic team of dedicated helpers, including some of our children and young people. We have continued to meet every other month, and in August had a Messy Church picnic on the open space near Sutton Arena.

I have continued to prepare families for baptism and to do some pastoral visiting and home communions.

In 2018 we have held 2 funerals in church, a memorial service for a Budge Lane resident, a Ruby Anniversary wedding blessing for a couple married at St Peter's 40 years ago, and I have taken 16 baptisms (6 at BA and 10 at St Peter's). This year has been the busiest for weddings for many years, with 6 wedding from the middle of June to the end of August, all on sunny days and I have been very grateful to Sue Knight and Jimmy Moore, our Wardens, for all their help and support on the wedding days.

In July we said goodbye to Cat Hubbard, who was selected for ordination training at a Bishop's' Advisory Panel, after a period of discernment. Cat started residential training at Cranmer Hall in Durham at the end of Sept 2018 and is very grateful to everyone at BA for their support and encouragement during this time. Just before Christmas we also said goodbye to Tim and Hazel Manley, and are thankful to them both for all they have given to the life of the parish, and to Tim for his Reader Ministry.

Justina Foli was selected for SPA training in July, and began her training in Sept, and once commissioned, will develop her pastoral role within the Parish.

As we continue, together, to discern God's purposes for the ministry and mission of the St Helier Parish, I am continually encouraged about what God is doing in our midst and have been very grateful to everyone for their encouragement and support.

Deanery Synod Report 2018

The February meeting was hosted by St Oswald's Cheam and this was the new Area Dean, the Revd Canon Angela Gbebikan's first meeting, and also the first meeting for the new Lay Chair, Mrs Alison Huneke. A presentation on Discipleship and Vocations was given by Revd Dr Raewynne Whiteley, a member of the Southwark Vocations team. The presentation covered the following areas:

a. What's your call, exploring the team of all Christian's being called to serve, with a rich diversity of gifts

b. Ministries: Ordained and lay, including Readers, Church Army, Religious Orders, pioneer ministries, Fresh Expressions and Church planting

c. Vocations team The vocations team consists of about 80 people, both lay and ordained, including: Ordinands director, Vocation Advisors, Examining Chaplains and Vocations' Champions d. What the Vocations Team do A number of events are laid on to help people in the early exploratory phase of vocational discernment : Vocation Fairs, Vocation Conferences, Retreats and Quiet Days. Later on, with clergy approval and support, there are Vocation Forums, where the calling starts to be articulated in a way that is realistic, informed and obedient. Then candidates may be assigned an advisor for 1:1 discernment.

e. What parishes do: support those seeking to explore their vocation through prayer, listening and encouraging, welcoming, sharing expertise, exploring and studying scripture together.

The June meeting was hosted by All Saints, Hackbridge.

The main item was a presentation by the Archdeacon of Croydon, the Venerable Chris Skilton, and the Dean of Fresh Expressions, the Revd Will Cookson, on Mission and Fresh Expressions.

Four questions were posed for members to discuss briefly

a) Who is missing from your church?

b) Which single word would you use to describe your church?

c) Which one word describes your parish?

d) What is the most significant issue in your local community?

The Sutton churches are involved in joint initiatives such as the food banks and Street Pastors, and individual churches have a range of their own community projects. So why are we so hesitant and so ready to put ourselves down?

We should have the confidence to invite people to come and join us at regular Sunday services. But for those who would never come to a church normally there are other ways to reach out to help, and share God's love with people of different backgrounds or cultures.

These come under the banner of "Fresh Expressions" and there are as many different ways as there are churches to arrange them: Messy Church, Monastic groups, Cafes and study groups are a few examples.

We should not be ashamed of the gospel but be convinced and convincing in all that we do. We should concentrate on what we do well and work out how to develop it and do it better, until it becomes time to do something else.

The Church needs to return to its pioneering roots in order to reach the 98% who are not active members. There are three forms of Pioneering:

- (i) Replication a traditional church plant
- (ii) Pioneer Adapters Cafe church and Messy Church

(iii) Pioneer Innovation - new forms of church adapted from our traditions.

A Deanery Project was also proposed at the meeting: that we work together as a deanery on a project that would be too large for a single church to undertake.

The October 2018 meeting was hosted by St Patrick's Church, Wallington.

Colin Powell, Director, Southwark Diocesan Board of Education (SDBE) was welcomed as were Steve Harris, Diocesan Communications Officer and Daniel Stone, Web Manager and Social Media Officer. Colin Powell explained that SDBE will be submitting a new bid for a Secondary School in Sutton by the deadline 5th November 2018. SDBE has 106 schools in the diocese including 14 secondaries. 91% are rated good or better and of these 37% are outstanding. The board has had approval for 2 new primary schools in Horley and Lewisham. The process calls for an approved bid before a site is allocated or finance put in place. Sadly, the previous SDBE bid in 2016 was not accepted although the bid was strong; the Local Education Authority found no weaknesses but chose Harris Federation. If approved the school would open with 180 year 7 students and grow to 1,150 including a 6th form. It would specialise in Maths and Music delivering high quality education .The previous bid had 1,300 expressions of support from across the borough and Colin asked synod members to again add support and encourage their PCCs and parishioners to do likewise.

A presentation was made by Steve Harris and Daniel Stone on Digital Presence. Steve gave an insight the diocesan approach to communications. It seeks to maintain a partnership with parishes and to be a buffer between the diocese and the outside world. He is keen to improve and facilitate communications between the diocese and parishes and encouraged parishes to send in event and good news stories for publication on the diocesan website and in "The Bridge" as this should encourage other parishes to do likewise. Southwark was the first diocese to establish a website in 1996 and it has had a substantial makeover in 2015/2016. Departments can maintain and update their own pages and all parish web pages in Sutton Deanery are currently up to date, but reliant on parishes monitoring and updating their pages.

Daniel Stone discussed the wide range of social media which is now available including; Twitter, Facebook, Blogging, with Podcasts to be introduced. The Diocesan twitter account has 5,672 followers and the 3 area bishops also have Twitter accounts as well as the Dean of Southwark. The blog is typically updated with a good news story from across the diocese every Saturday morning at 10:00am. Pages on the diocesan website carry the diocesan Vision at the bottom "Walking, Welcoming, Growing". He discussed the website "A Church Near You" which has information on every church and which has 10M views each year; 80% viewing for the first time, and can he give advice on Parish websites.

Financial Report

I am sure that the interregnum, as well as the external economic influences have impacted on our finances during 2018, but God has blessed us again as we have been able to use some of the savings built up over the years to fund some capital projects such as the new toilets at Bishop Andrewes. We have also had the benefit of some grants awarded to help us.

Our income during 2018 increased to over £100,000 once again, even though our planned giving did in fact reduce further. This reduction in giving is something we would often expect during an interregnum due to some people moving on, however, you would hope it would increase again with the arrival of a new incumbent. The main reason for the overall increase in income was due to 5 payments from the Social Club during the financial year and the significant grants for the toilets. We now need to pray that the loss of the income from the Social Club from December 2019 will be replaced by some other income as it is so fundamental to keeping our finances healthy.

Our costs have also increased during 2018, quite significantly, although this is primarily due to the cost of the new toilets. Our Parish Pledge increased by £1,250 and we are blessed that we have been able to continue paying the full amount to the Diocese.

During 2018 we continued to put savings away into our Capital Projects accounts, St Peter's increased by around £4,500. However, we needed to use around £15,000 of Bishop Andrewes savings to pay towards the toilets. Due to the uncertainty of the interregnum, in June 2018 we decided to keep our donation to the Diocese at £43,750 for 2019, under the "Parish Pledge" system.

We have continued to donate 10% of our income to our designated charities but agreed not to include the Social Club rent or Gift Aid recovery in the calculation. Therefore, our giving dropped down to just over £5,000, down on last year.

I would again like to thank everyone who has helped me this year, both counting the money on Sundays, collating it on a regular basis and banking it. I would also like to thank Ken Steer, once again, for undertaking the financial examination of the accounts and confirming that they are all in order.

Our Bible links have been the stories of Noah, the Parables of Jesus, Esther, Creation, Gideon and Christmas. In the summer we went to the St Helier Open Space playground area for a picnic. There was a Parent's Evening in July when Rev Anne Doerr presented our special trophies, uniform shields and prizes. Afterwards the girls waited on their parents with a tea of sandwiches, plus cakes and biscuits that they had made in previous weeks. We had a Sparkle Party on 5th November, made lots of craft things in December and finished the year with a Christmas Party.

There were 5 Church Parades on Sunday mornings during the year, with a quite a few parents attending. We try to encourage the girls to attend Church events, such as the bi-monthly Messy Church and the Light Party. We also thank Rev Anne Doerr for her help and encouragement in her role as Chaplain of our Company.
