President's Report for the Year Ended 31 December 2018

Organisation and Administration:

I would like to start by thanking all of those who have volunteered to serve as Officers and as Members of the BTS Executive Committee, during the past year. In particular, I would like to acknowledge the contribution of Dr David Jones from the UK Medicines Regulatory Authority, the MHRA, who has served 2 x 3 year terms of office on the Executive Committee and so retires this year. Also, many thanks to Dr Jo Kilgour who, until very recently, served as the BTS Scientific Meetings Secretary.

We are grateful for: the contribution from the Members of the 5 BTS Subcommittees: (I) Finance - administered by Dr Liz Martin from AZ (ii) Nominations - led by Dr Ernie Harpur, (iii) Scientific - led by Dr Jason Gill, (iv) Communications - led by Prof Paul Baldrick, (v) Education Training and Career Development - led by Dr Tina Mehta, to the Organisers of BTS Specialty Sections, to members of the Public Communication Working Group and to BTS Ambassadors (one in each major employer) and to all of those who have contributed to the running of The British Toxicology Society in many different ways, during the past year. Professional networks can be invaluable for career development and facilitating such networks is one of the obvious benefits of BTS membership

The BTS is administered by a Commercial Organisation, Executive Business Support (EBS), based in Lichfield Staffordshire, under a rolling contract, which was reviewed and updated in 2018. The BTS simply could not function without their help and support - for which we are grateful. A very substantial part of the organisation of the BTS is the dealt with by the unpaid Officers: and we are all deeply indebted to them: particularly to Dr Diane Benford, the General Secretary and to Dr Elizabeth Martin, the Treasurer.

Membership:

I am pleased to report that there are currently over 800 Members of the BTS. More information will be provided in the report by the General Secretary.

Fellows and Honorary Fellows of the BTS:

In 2018, the BTS nominated 6 distinguished Members of the BTS as new Honorary Fellows:

- " Professor Alan Boobis OBE, Imperial College London, a former President of the BTS,
- " Professor Ruth Roberts, of Apconix, a former President of the BTS,
- " Professor Lewis Smith, Former Director of the MRC Toxicology Unit and a former President of the BTS,
- " Dr Frank Sullivan a distinguished Reproductive Toxicologist,
- " Professor Faith Williams, University of Newcastle,
- " Professor Anne Willis OBE, the Current Director of the MRC Toxicology Unit.

In addition, 9 Members of the BTS (4 women and 5 men) were nominated as new Fellows (FBTS). It was agreed that the BTS Fellowship Committee (President, Immediate Past-President, Vice-President, General Secretary and Chair of the Scientific Sub Committee) will meet at 2 yearly intervals to consider nominations for new Fellows and new Honorary Fellows. A list of Fellows of the BTS will be available in the Members section of the BTS website.

Finances: As you will hear from the Treasurer, the BTS is in a sound financial position, with reserves sufficient to fund the Society through any likely period of financial or operational turbulence.

Future Strategy of the BTS:

As Members may be aware, the Executive Committee hold a Strategy meeting at 2 yearly intervals. In May 2018 this meeting focussed on 1. understanding who Members are and their current & future needs for professional support, 2. the role of BTS Specialty Sections and opportunities for the BTS to support emerging areas of Toxicology, 3. Interactions with related Scientific Societies and opportunities to organise joint meetings, joint sessions at scientific meeting and joint training courses or webinars, 4. Public Communication and Advocacy by the BTS on matters where members have professional expertise and 5. partly to comply with guidance from the Charity Commission, Risk Management and Risk Mitigation for the BTS. Minutes of this meeting and of other Executive Committee meetings are available in the members Area of the BTS Website.

It is a pleasure to report that the Societies' Official Journal, Toxicology Research, led by Professor Heather Wallace of the University of Aberdeen, as Editor in Chief and published by the Royal Society of Chemistry, is now indexed in Pub Med. This will increase the online visibility of published articles and the impact factor of the Journal. As the BTS receives a financial benefit for each article published by a BTS Member, please consider Toxicology Research when you are planning and submitting your next scientific publication. The BTS is also represented on the Panel of the UK Register of Toxicologists and to ensure good linkage with the UK Register, the Chair of the Panel is a co-opted member of the BTS Executive Committee.

President's Report for the Year Ended 31 December 2018

Education and Training:

The BTS continues to provide practical and financial support for training and career development: with a range of prizes and financial awards, to recognise achievement and to enable Members to attend scientific meetings. In 2018 the BTS provided 12 bursaries to junior researchers from 8 different institutions, to attend our Annual Congress in Newcastle. At the 2018 BTS Annual Congress there were joint scientific sessions with the British Society of Toxicological Pathology and the in vitro Toxicology Society.

In July 2018, in conjunction with the American College of Toxicology the BTS, again ran a successful, week long, Cambridge-based training course on Practical Applications of Toxicology in Drug Development. This course, which has for several years been led for the BTS by Dr Ernie Harpur, was attended by about 30 participants and plans are well advanced for the course to run again in Cambridge in July 2019. In Sept 2018, the BTS co-organised a meeting in London, with the Royal Society of Chemistry and the British Society of Anti-Microbial Chemotherapy, entitled Tackling Anti-Microbial Resistance. Members of the BTS continue to benefit from these interactions with related Scientific Societies and also from our affiliation with the Royal Society of Biology, EUROTOX and IUTOX.

Regional Meetings:

These short, scientific exchange and networking meetings, are organised by local BTS ambassadors. They are generally held over 2hours or so, in the late afternoon and early evening. Funding of £250 is available from the BTS towards the cost of venue hire and refreshments. Successful meetings were held at the University of Strathclyde in Dec 2018 and at the University of Cambridge in February 2019 - the latter attended by about 80 participants. The BTS would like to encourage more of these meetings, so if you have not yet had the opportunity of attending a BTS local networking event, please speak to your local BTS Ambassador and prompt them to organise an event, ideally in conjunction with other local Ambassadors.

BTS Public Engagement & Position Statements:

Following feedback from BTS Members and an interactive workshop at the end of the 2018 annual congress, Dr Phil Botham from Syngenta led a Working Group who have developed 2 succinct, public information documents on: 1. "Distinguishing Hazard and Risk" and 2. "The use of Animals in Toxicology and Safety Science". These documents are intended to inform interested members of the public, they may be of interest to educators, to journalists or to students and to junior members of the Society. Several other topics are being considered for similar BTS position statements.

Remit of the BTS, Charitable Status & Accountability:

Documents describing the roles and responsibilities (statutes) of the Executive Committee and all 5 of the BTS Subcommittees were either written, or updated, in 2018. All of them are available on the BTS website. For governance purposes and to comply with guidance from the Charity Commission, The BTS also has polices for compliance with General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR), Conflict of Interest (all BTS Trustees, aka Executive Committee Members, and Subcommittee Members complete a disclosure form) Complaints, Financial Reserves, and a Risk Register.

Finally, all Members of the BTS are encouraged to contribute ideas to promote the development of the Toxicology and Safety Science. The BTS mission is: to advance the science of Toxicology for public benefit, by supporting the scientific and professional needs of its Members. The BTS is your Society and, what can be achieved by the BTS is very dependent upon what the you, the Members are willing to contribute. I trust that we can count on your continued support in 2019 and beyond and that the British Toxicology Society will continue to serve scientists, the public and to play its part in the broader scientific community, here in the UK and Internationally.

Operating and Financial Review for the Year Ended 31 December 2018

General Secretary's review

The major activities of the Society are documented in the reports from the President and other Officers and Subcommittee chairs so this report will highlight some of the developments I have been involved in over the past year, ably supported by EBS.

The Executive Committee met on four occasions in 2018/19. In addition, the Officers held 3 meetings by teleconference. Until recently, the minutes of our meetings have been available only to the Executive Committee, but we have now made them available in the Members area of the website at http://www.thebts.org/membership/minutes-2/.

The year began with the need to implement the new GDPR by 25 May 2018. This involved agreeing a privacy policy and a number of associated policies which are on the website at http://www.thebts.org/information/policies/. The BTS Executive Committee took the view that we have a contractual obligation to provide all members with information related to the benefits they expect from society membership and the ways that their subscription is spent. However there are other communications, such as job advertisements, that we will not send to you unless you consent to receive them. You can make sure your communication preferences are up-to-date on this secure page of the website http://www.thebts.org/membership/preferences/ or by emailing the secretariat at BTS@execbs.com. We have decided that the Vice-President should hold the position of Data Protection Officer, and I would like to thank Shirley for her help with developing the policies.

As mentioned in the President's report, the Executive has adopted a number of other policies related to governance during the year. These are also available on the website at the page noted above.

As promised last year, we have set up a Member search facility in the Members area the website: However so far relatively few Members have given permission to have their contact details available to other members. We have made it easier for you to sign up for the Member search facility as well as updating your preferences for communications, including Specialty Sections on this webpage: http://www.thebts.org/membership/preferences/.

I understand from EBS that some Members have not actually logged into the website. There is a lot of information available without logging in, but access to the restricted area requires you to log in. If you are not sure how to log in for the first time, or have forgotten your access details, please ask EBS for advice, on BTS@execbs.com.

A more comprehensive account of the society's activities and future plans is set out in the detailed reports already supplied to members.

Financial review

1. Financial Performance for 2018

As detailed in the financial accounts, the BTS made a small loss on its charitable activities during 2018. This loss includes financial support provided to the Annual Congress and the Practical Application of Toxicology in Drug Development (PATDD) Course in Cambridge. The BTS also gave travel support to members and provided funding for a Summer Project Scholarship. Advertising revenue is down compared to previous years, whereas donations were similar. Significant efforts were made by the Finance sub-committee and the Executive Committee to prudently manage the BTS finances during 2018.

2. BTS Contribution to Society Meetings

The BTS budgeted £25,000 in 2018 to subsidise the Annual Congress, although not all of this was required, and the final contribution was £13,000.

The BTS provided financial support to the PATDD Course which was jointly organised with the American College of Toxicology (ACT). The BTS and ACT both donated £3,594.

The BTS also provided £236 for a joint meeting with the Royal Society of Chemistry on "Tackling Antimicrobial Resistance".

3. Donations to BTS

The level of donations attracted in 2018 (£7,408) was similar to that received in 2017. I would like to take the opportunity on behalf of the Society to thank all those institutions who continue to support us in this way.

4. Advertising Income

Advertising income, which is almost entirely generated from employment opportunities advertised on the BTS website, totalled £7,748, which is approximately £5,000 less than received in 2017.

5. Fellowships and Training

The BTS offers a range of travel awards including the Gay Hawksworth and Gordon Gibson Fellowships, and the Meetings Travel Support scheme, as well as bursaries offered to students to support attendance at BTS and EUROTOX meetings. The funds offered were not completely used in 2018, and the Executive committee would encourage more members to apply for these during 2019.

The BTS provides funds for two Summer Project Scholarships, for students or new graduates to experience working in the field of toxicology. Each scholarship covers living costs for 6 - 8 weeks (approximately £1,500) and in 2018 only one scholarship was applied for and awarded. We therefore encourage members to apply this year.

6. Membership Subscriptions

The BTS membership subscription fees were increased in 2019 by approximately 5%. Full membership is £94 per annum when paid by direct debit. Membership fees for students, early career and retired members is free or substantially less. It is proposed that there is no increase in membership fees in 2020, but the fees will be increased by approximately 5% in 2021.

7. Accountancy

The BTS accountants, BullockWoodburn, and the Finance Executive at EBS have continued to assist the Treasurer throughout 2018. I would like to thank BullockWoodburn and EBS on behalf of the Society for the support they have given myself and the Finance sub-committee during the year. As in previous years, the accounts have undergone an Independent Examination by BullockWoodburn (a form of external scrutiny of accounts specifically designed for charities) rather than a full annual statutory audit, which saves the Society some expenditure compared to a full audit.

Reserves Policy

The trustees review reserves on an ongoing basis and are confident that at current levels they are sufficient to honour commitments to studentships, bursaries and meeting subsidies, whilst allowing for changes in the budgeted income streams, as detailed below. During 2010 the Society invested some of its reserves in either 1 or 2 year Treasury bonds, whilst leaving sufficient reserve funds in the lower interest bank deposit account to conduct all Society business. This has been continued in 2018 as this still represents the most advantageous rates available to us as a Society.

Funds materially in deficit

No funds were in deficit during the year.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 December 2018

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2018. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and significant activities

The Society is established for the promotion and advancement, for the public benefit, of education in the science of toxicology. In deciding the aims and activities of the society, the trustees have paid due regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit. Toxicology is the science of disease induced by chemicals present in the diet, medicines, and in the environment. The British Toxicology Society (BTS) is a leading international toxicology society, based on the highest quality science, and promotes the advancement, communication and understanding of the scientific disciplines necessary to foster public health and environmental safety.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The Society is a company limited by guarantee and the liability of members is limited to an amount not exceeding £1. It is exempt under Section 60 of the Companies Act 2006 from the requirement to use the word 'Limited' in its title. The Society is governed by the Memorandum and Articles of Association. It is registered with the Charities Commission, number 286197, and no liability to taxation arises.

The Executive Committee are Directors for the purpose of company law and Trustees for the purpose of charity law. Directors/Trustees are appointed by the Society's members at the Annual General Meeting. When a Trustee retires, the Executive Committee nominates new Trustees. Additional nominations may be made by the membership, provided they are signed by six members of the Society.

Informal induction procedures are in place for new Trustees, conducted by an existing member of the Executive Committee and they are also provided with relevant documentation to formally advise and inform them of the Society's constitution and objectives and also their duties and responsibilities as a trustee.

One third of the Executive Committee ordinary members retire each year in rotation but are then eligible for re-election. The society is organised so that the Trustees, in the form of the Executive Committee, meet regularly, usually on a quarterly basis, to manage its affairs. There are also sub-committees which are responsible for advising and researching the various activities and development of the Society, who report to the Executive Committee.

Statutes for the workings of the various sub-committees are continually being revised and updated to ensure that the terms of reference are clearly defined and the ways of working are consistent. This also enables transparency of committee elections and duration of membership, while allowing the committees to work to agreed aims, backed up by comprehensive set of Standard Operating Procedures for the Society.

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Society is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the Society, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to major risks.

All of the officers and members who serve on the Society's committees are unpaid. They are entitled to be reimbursed for any out of pocket expenses incurred in attending meetings.

No related parties, related party transactions, beneficial relationships or conflicts of interest requiring disclosure by the Charities' or Companies' Acts existed during the year.

Attendance by Executive Committee members has been reasonable throughout the year. The co-opted members continue to provide liaison with the relevant Sub-Committees and Speciality Sections.

The day to day administration of the Society is undertaken by an outside agency on a fee basis.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of The British Toxicology Society

Independent examiner's report to the trustees of The British Toxicology Society ('the Company')

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2018

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Income

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- . income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- . legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- . income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- . income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Notes to the Financial Statements - continued for the Year Ended 31 December 2018

1. **ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued**

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- . expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- . expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- . other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Taxation

3.

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
