Independent Examiner's Report on the Accounts

Report to the trustees of St Joseph's African Aid on the accounts for the year ended 31 May 2018

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 (The Charities Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

Structure, governance and management

St Joseph's African Aid (SJAA) is a registered charity established by a Trust Deed dated 9 July 2001.

The Trust Deed provides that there shall be at least four trustees. New trustees are appointed by the existing trustees. In selecting persons to be appointed as new trustees, the existing trustees take into account the benefits of appointing a person who through residence, occupation, employment or otherwise has special knowledge of the area of benefit or who is otherwise able by virtue of his or her personal or professional qualifications to make a contribution to the pursuit of the objects or the management of SJAA. In line with this policy, Denzil Mascarenhas was appointed a trustee on 18 January 2019 and brings with him considerable business experience and knowledge of logistics.

Robert Hamilton was elected Chairman for 2018. Michael Powell is the Project Director; Neil Twist is the Finance Director.

The trustee board normally meets three times a year and this was the case in the year under review.

The day to day business of managing SJAA is delegated to an Executive Committee consisting of the Chairman, the Project Director, and the Finance Director. They communicate frequently.

All trustees give of their time voluntarily and receive no remuneration for their services. SJAA has no employees.

A review of the charity's financial controls was carried out by the trustees during the period and it was concluded that the appropriate procedures were all in place.

Objectives and activities

SJAA's Trust Deed sets out that its principal objectives are the relief of poverty, sickness and distress, and the advancement of education, in Africa. There has been no change to the objectives of SJAA as stated in the original 2001 Trust Deed.

SJAA operates by making grants for the furtherance of its objectives. Its aid is directed towards the support of schools and other community projects in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC), the Cameroon and in Gabon.

SJAA works closely with the Josephites, a Roman Catholic order of religious founded in Belgium in 1817, who established schools and missions in the DRC (formerly known as the Belgian Congo and subsequently Zaire) and elsewhere in Africa. The Josephites remain active in these countries and provide the local presence through which the projects funded by SJAA are managed and implemented.

Suitable projects for grant-aiding are identified by both the trustees and by the local Josephite communities and their contacts. Projects are assessed according to the criteria of the benefits they would bring to their communities, their cost effectiveness and the likelihood of a successful implementation.

Grants are approved by resolution of all the trustees of SJAA. Authority to approve projects up £1,000 has been delegated to the Executive Committee.

The trustees confirm that they have complied with their duty to have regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charities Commission.

Achievements

Education in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC)

Supporting education has been one of SJAA's key aims since its inception and most of the funds it has disbursed have been for this purpose. This has taken the form of grants for school buildings, supplementing teachers' low Government-financed salaries, and providing basic equipment for the schools such as desks and educational materials. We are active in a region of the south-west of the DRC known as the Kasai where we support 8 schools in llebo, Domiongo and Bulongo which together educate over 3,000 pupils of whom about half are girls.

As we have done for many years now, this year we again supported teachers in these schools by augmenting their low salaries, and by providing funds for the purchase of educational resources such as books and other classroom resources. The money to do this comes largely from donations generously given from their salaries by staff at St George's College and its Junior School, from fundraising events organized at the schools, and from the schools themselves.

The schools we support need more buildings to accommodate more pupils so this year SJAA financed new 2-classroom blocks for the primary school at Ilebo (St Jacques) and for the sewing school in Domiongo (Institut Ste Marie).

Last year we provided funds to the Technical College at Ilebo to purchase necessary textbooks for the new Technical and Commercial Syllabus which the Education Authority in the DRC had mandated. New textbooks were required for the new course but there was an absence of government funding for this. We provided the funds for these textbooks so that students at the Ilebo college could follow the new courses properly. This year we have similarly financed textbooks for the Technical and Commercial College in Domiongo.

The Scholasticate at Kimenza, on the outskirts of Kinshasa, is an educational facility run by the Josephites which houses young men during their formation. The building had deteriorated to a poor state of repair which made its continued use questionable. The necessary funds to effect the much-needed refurbishment was provided to SJAA by a single, generous donation restricted to that purpose.

The Cameroon

We continue to support communities in the far north of the Cameroon which exist largely on subsistence farming. Safe access to adequate supplies of clean water is a chronic problem for many communities in the region whose womenfolk may have to travel long distances to fetch the water their families need. This year we financed the drilling and installation of a well at Gagala. This is the sixth well we have financed in the region. The messages and photographs we receive from the villages where we have been able to finance a well are a poignant testament to the dramatic improvement in the quality of life it provides.

Travel in the region isn't easy and some form of motorised transport is essential if widely spread communities are to be reached and helped. In the year we provided funds for the purchase of 2 motorbikes for the parish of Roua in North Cameroon to help in the pastoral and community work being carried out.

Contact by Trustees with the communities SJJA supports

The close connections we have with people on the ground in the areas we support are one of our strengths. These connections, via the Josephite communities, enable us to monitor effectively where we can best help and, equally important, how the grants we make are used. We are particularly fortunate that one of our trustees, Fr Jacob Beya, is a regular visitor to the areas where we are active. His first-hand reports and advice to the trustee board are invaluable.

Grants

This was another high year for grant-making. Total grants of £139,775 were close to 2017's record high of £151,562.

Most of the grants went to the DRC who received £123,388 (2017 - £103,251) with £16,387k going to the Cameroon (2017 - £46,141). None was sent to the Gabon (2017 - £2,170).

Financial Review

SJAA's Accounts for 2017/18 have been prepared on the Receipts and Payments basis as opposed to the Accruals basis SJAA had used since its inception until two years ago. SJAA may elect to use the Receipts and Payments basis because its turnover is less than £250,000 and this avoids reporting requirements which would be unduly burdensome for a charity of SJAA's relatively small size and simplicity of operation. In SJAA's case there is no material difference between the results reported in these Receipts and Payments Accounts and those which would have been reported on an Accruals basis.

Donations received in the year of £89,884 (2017 - £41,355) included a single donation of £47,000. Excluding such exceptionals, our donation income was in line with our long-term average.

Interest received was only £137 (2017 £874) reflecting the very low rates of interest currently available. Gift Aid claim (1 year) yielded £7,910 (2017 £14,503 – 3 years' claim).

Total Receipts were therefore £97,931 (2017 £56,732).

Grants made were £139,775 (2017 £151,562). These 2 years have seen the largest amount of grants in SJAA's history. This is the result of some very generous, large donations coupled with the confidence amongst trustees of SJAA when making grants that comes from the experience of previous grants being well used.

The expenses of running SJAA remain low and amounted to £1,963 (2017 £2,000) of which the cost of printing and distributing the Newsletter, professional fees, bank charges, and website expenses account for all the costs. The total cost is kept down because support and administration is provided free of charge by voluntary help.

The cash balances of SJAA decreased by £43,817 during 2018 (2017 - £96,830 decrease) to £113,942 at 31 May 2018. This planned reduction reflects the use of substantial donations received in previous periods. A further reduction is planned for 2019 consistent with trustees' wish to retain sufficient reserves for emergency requests and to underpin recurring grants such as support for the teachers in the Kasai.

The cash balances of SJAA are held with Barclays Bank plc (SJAA's clearing bank) and on deposit with COIF Charity Funds at call. SJAA holds no shares, bonds or other assets.

At 31 May 2018, £28,458 (25%) of SJAA's total Reserves (2017 - £25,142; 16%) are classified as Restricted Income and may only be used for their defined restricted purposes. In practice, conforming with these restrictions does not cause any problem with grant-making decisions.

The trustees maintain a Development Plan, which is reviewed for each trustee meeting, which matches existing reserves and forecast income to the cost and timing of probable and possible future grants. The trustees have regard to this Plan when considering the relative priorities of projects which come forward for approval. There is no shortage of worthwhile projects we would like to support but our income is insufficient to fund all.

SJAA's policy on reserves is:

- a) To retain sufficient reserves to:
 - 1. Pay all grants that have been approved but not yet paid
 - 2. Cover the cost for a reasonable period ahead of grants that have not yet been approved but which, because of their recurring nature in the past, might be expected to continue.
 - 3. Accumulate reserves so as to so as to be able to fund larger scale projects such the provision of clean water and the building/refurbishment of schools.

In view of SJAA's low operating costs, the trustees do not consider it necessary to designate any reserves to cover such costs because it would be an immaterial amount.

b) To release reserves as grants only when reasonably certain that the projects to be aided are appropriate to the development needs of the local communities, have the requisite priority compared to other potential projects, and will be well executed so using SJAA donor-income in an effective way.
