ANNUAL REPORT 2019

As a new registered charity, this is our first annual report and accounts. As a project working under former umbrella charity, the 'British Athletics Charitable Trust', we became a charity in our own right in March 2018. That divorce is now complete, and independence has greatly oiled processes of funding applications and marketing. A hugely successful launch event at City Hall drew high profile guests including the Metropolitan Police Commissioner, Cressida Dick, and International Amateur Athletics Federation President, Lord Sebastian Coe.

Met-Track's 'performance years' run alongside the academic year which also coincides with the frequency of payments from our main funders, the National Lottery Community Fund. The financial year 2018-19 covers the tail end of the second year (of four) of the current lottery grant, and the first six months of the third. Operating costs reduce each year from 100% to 75, currently 50, and soon to be 25% from September 2019 as we enter the final year of the current grant agreement. The two salaries of part-time employees are covered 100% throughout, and there are budget lines for support working that do not change. Met-Track continues to work alongside a multiplicity of partners including the Metropolitan Police Service, sports governing bodies including England Athletics, the Jack Petchy Foundation, and others.

The year 2018-19 saw continued hugely successful delivery against all the agreed performance indicators with the National Lottery. Met-Track engaged with almost 1000 vulnerable young Londoners, and well over 90% who engaged with the project for four weeks or more failed to offend or reoffend - a statistic that all concerned can be very proud of. Indeed, demand for our services continues to outstrip our ability to deliver, such is the reputation built over our now 15-year history. Maintaining a traditionally flexible approach to delivery, we are continuing to scope opportunities now to produce a format that can also offer countermeasures to the soaring knife crime and gang culture in London. To this end we have engaged with the London Countering Violent Extremism Team at City Hall. In December 2018 we staged a partnership forum with the Mayor's programme team with representative young Londoners drawn from our Hammersmith Scheme attending and giving feedback.

Sport has continued to be the core element of delivery, but we have continued to diversify introducing boxing, basketball, football and general fitness as well as athletics, ensuring participants have the best chance of remaining engaged. Our coaches have gained the necessary qualifications to deliver these activities, and venues continue to be predominantly school premises. Sources of income have been varied, with schools playing a big part. However, we were extremely disappointed to have failed in our bid for a share of the Young Londoners Fund offered by the Mayor of London in 2018. We have re-applied for phase 2 of this fund with an amended bid this year.

The coming year is likely to see further outstanding performance figures almost certainly outdoing the previous 12month period, but the main challenge as we enter 2020 will be a third bid for funding from the National Lottery. This will be challenging, but with the high level of success we have delivered over two grants spanning seven years, we are ever hopeful of success. Failure in this respect could lead us toward a decision centred on closure.

Finally it should be recorded that Operations Manager Matthew Threadgold, one of the two part-time paid employees of the charity, has done an outstanding job in coordinating the 23 schemes in 18 boroughs over this year, ably supported by CEO John Powell MBE, whose strategic oversight, decision making and forward planning has kept operations on an even keel.
