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Annual Report

Background

On 31 December 2003, under the provisions of a Pastoral Scheme, the former Parish of St John and St Peter, Notting Hill, was dissolved. In its place two new Parishes of St John, Notting Hill, and St Peter, Notting Hill, were created with effect from 1st January 2003. In addition, the Notting Hill Group Ministry was established with these new parishes as its members.

Administrative Information

The Parochial Church Council of the Ecclesiastical Parish of St Peter, Notting Hill, (referred to as The Parish of St Peter, Notting Hill) is a charity registered with the Charity Commission under the Charity Registration number 1133807.

Structure, governance and management

The Governing documents of the Parish of St Peter, Notting Hill are the Parochial Church Council (Powers) Measure 1956 and the Church Representation Rules.

Members of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) are either ex-officio or elected at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting in accordance with the Church Representation Rules.

Objectives and activities

The Church exists to witness the good news of the God made known in Jesus Christ. St Peter's seeks to be open to God and relevant to the needs of the neighbourhood.

The Church continues to be well used and we are pleased with the number of community groups that use the building. We charge a minimal amount for this use, as what we want to develop is a weaving together of community groups.

The PCC could not achieve its objectives without the invaluable contribution of numerous volunteers and helpers throughout the year.

Given the charitable status of the Parish, the PCC have given due consideration to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on Public Benefit.

Membership

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. The members of the PCC are regarded as the trustees of the charity.

Review of the year and our achievements and performance

2018 was another busy year for St Peter's and St Peters has seen a growing momentum and energy.

St Peters went on a GAP Year in 2018, with three priorities being 'Gathering' on Sunday, 'Alpha' and 'Prayer'. Consolidating the 3 services (10.30am, monthly 9am and evening service) into one morning service helped brings St Peters a muchneeded momentum in the morning. The fruit of this has been seen, with many new people joining the church. Alpha was also a real success, with up to 70 people attending on a Wednesday night during our Spring course, with many of the church family doing it again, but also a number of guests. Home Groups klcked off again, after some years of not having them, which sees a good number of church members in them. The vision is that everyone will be part of a home group, where true community and discipleship happens, and friendships are formed. Concerning prayer, St Peters started a weekly Tuesday morning prayer meeting that happens from 7.15-8am, which everyone is welcome to. Prayer ministry was also very much encouraged during and at the end of Sunday services. So, it was a busy GAP year, but one which helped give a focus to St Peter's energy.

2018 continued to see a faithful children's and youth ministry taking place week by week. The key festivals of the year were also marked and celebrated. Easter services

saw some strong turnouts, with a good number of the congregation joining the walk of witness down the Portobello Road on Good Friday. There were also very positive services at Pentecost, St. Peter's day, Harvest and Remembrance Sunday. However, Christmas was a different level. St Peters had a very enjoyable all-age Christingle service, where the vicar dressed as a giant orange! Fortunately, this did not scare off too many people. The carols by candlelight service again proved very popular, with some 230 people in attendance, and wonderful singing by the Skolia and Gospel choirs. St Peters also had a packed-out crib service, with some of the children dressing up and playing the parts of the nativity characters. Some excellent acting!

Alpha was run on two different occasions last year, with up to 70 people coming on a weekly basis in the Spring term. There was very positive feedback from the experience, with the majority of the church family taking part. It also saw a few new members come into the church. The course was repeated in the Autumn, except this time hosted in 'Farm Girl Café', which is located in the church hall on the Portobello Road. This worked exceptionally well, being an ideally sized space for the needs and providing a great location with a more relaxed atmosphere. The plan is to continue hosting courses there. The PCC thanks all who helped volunteer!

The Church continues to be extremely active in promoting faith to the wider community who visit. The relationship with the homeless charity, 'The 240 Project', continued with a successful exhibition of their works in the gallery. Other groups such as 'Mind' and 'Memories Café' continue to benefit hugely from use of the church building.

The PCC was also thrilled to host BBC's 'Question Time' on the 17th May! David Dimbleby was in the chair, and Diane Abbot, amongst others, was on the panel. A number of regular members were able to watch silently on proceedings from the balcony, and it was a fascinating evening. A great picture of the call as the Church to be engaged in the issues of society.

St Peter's Nursery School continues to be a warm welcoming haven to children and their families. The Nursery, led by Tracey Lloyd, continues to be a vibrant and happy place where dedicated staff continue to attend well to each child's Individual needs.

As part of our Public Benefit approach the Nursery adheres to the tenants of the ethos of the Church in that it aims to make education accessible to as many families as possible.

2018 was also a year of farewells, as the church sadly said goodbye to Peter and Morgan Yarde-Martin. Peter was the music director for more than 7 years, doing a wonderful job on a Sunday, as well as hosting many other musical events and running the gospel choir. Morgan was the much-loved youth pastor, running YOYO, a role she had done for several years. They will both be greatly missed. As well as

saying goodbye to them, Karen Fong, one of St Peter's Licensed Lay Ministers, moved on to St. John's Notting Hill as she further explores her sense of calling to ordination. The PCC trusts she will be as much of a blessing there as she was at St Peters with her preaching and leading.

The PCC recognise and acknowledge the great work and dedication of all the staff across the Church, Parish Office, Under 3s Drop-in and St Peter's Nursery School and the invaluable contribution of all those volunteers who support the all the activities that have been undertaken.

Church Attendance

At the end of the year, there were 128 people (2017 - 217) on the Church electoral roll. On a typical Sunday there are approximately 60 adults and 20 children and young people. Rosemary Conway continued to act as the Electoral Roll Officer.

Financial Review

During the year, the Church raised almost £446,510, with:

- £163,670 received as donations, and
- £282,817 generated from St Peter's Nursery School, the Under3s Drop-in and other Church activities and fees from other groups for using the Church buildings.

In the year, the Church spent a total of £413,436, with:

- £88,300 as a Diocese of London Common Fund contribution funding the clergy in the Diocese (which included £7,700 additional voluntary support),
- £6,585 of additional voluntary mission and charitable giving,
- £78,917 spent on Church running costs,
- £24,433 spent on office running costs, and
- £215,201 spent on events and activity costs (including running the St Peter's Nursery School and Under 3s Drop-in).

In total, the Church generated a surplus of £33,074.

This increased total funds in hand at 31st December 2018 to £244,603, made up of:

- £135,912 of Façade Restoration appeal funds,
- £50,568 of Kensington Churches Relief appeal funds (the fund established by the Bishop of Kensington in support of victims of the Grenfell Tower tragedy),
- £16,883 St Peter's Nursery Funds,
- £21,271 of unrestricted funds designated by the PCC for the Façade restoration and
- £19,969 remaining unrestricted general funds.

Overall, this represented solid financial results for the Church, with:

- funds available for the Façade restoration built up in anticipation of undertaking the restoration project during 2019,
- the Kensington Churches Relief fund available to be distributed in support of victims of the Grenfell Tower tragedy under the guidance of the Bishop of Kensington, and the St Peter's Nursery School, Under 3s Drop-in and general funding of the

Church all operating at modest surpluses.

Reserves Policy

The PCC review Church's reserves policy each year, ensuring a balance between spending on immediate needs and setting aside a reserve to manage any unanticipated shortfalls in income or unanticipated additional costs.

The aim of the PCC is to maintain a general reserve of three months' general fund operating expenditure of the Church. This equates to a reserve of around £50,000.

The reserves are currently below this level due in part to previous capital expenditure and to the current priority to build up funds for the Façade restoration.

At the end of 2018, the Church held a general fund reserve of £19,969 (2017; £11,331), supplemented by £16,883 (2017; £9,562) restricted St Peter's Nursery School funds.

The PCC consider the current level of reserves held to be adequate for now, with the aim to continue to gradually build the level held.

Details on the restricted, designated and unrestricted reserves of the Church are set out in note 8 to the accounts.

Investment Policy

It is the policy of the PCC to invest funds in an instant access deposit account with the CBF Church of England Fund. Remaining funds are held with Unity Trust Bank

Future Plans

The Church aims to create a strong community life together, meet pastoral needs and nurture faith, progressing on the spiritual journey both as individuals and as a Church. St Peter's will be looking to expand the extent of its youth work that we continue to have as many young people as possible continue to be involved in the Church as they grow up. **Planned Giving**

The PCC continue to consider initiatives to raise the ongoing income of the Church not only by planned giving but other means as well. It is clear that we need to implement a medium-term strategy to increase the overall income of the Church to enable surpluses to be generated and thereby allow funds to be set aside for future capital expenditure.

Risk Assessment

As part of its ongoing overview the PCC considers risks that the Parish is exposed to and takes steps to ensure there are systems to mitigate those risks. The approach adopted by the PCC is to consider different categories of risk, namely risks related to financial, regulatory, statutory, legal and operational matters. The PCC has also mandated a separate committee to oversee the operation of the Nursery.

Looking Forward

The PCC is excited about new team members Cait O'Neil and Ami Oprenova joining the church as Young Life Pastor and Worship Pastor respectively. They have already brought huge energy and vision.

There are plans to launch a new evening service in the Autumn, to help reach and serve a different demographic and group of people than the morning service is currently doing.

Other exciting plans for building deeper community and seeking more of God's Kingdom are also in the pipeline.

Statement of Responsibilities of the PCC

PCC responsibilities in relation to the financial statements.

- Prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Parish will continue to operate

The PCC is also responsible for:

- Preparing and preserving financial statements which comply with the Church Accounting Regulations 2006 and the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008;
- Keeping proper accounting records, which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Parish;
- Safeguarding the assets of the Parish, and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detections of fraud and other irregularities.

I report to the Members on my examination of the financial statements of the Church for the year ended 31 December2018 which are set out on pages 12 to 23.

Accounting Convention

Legal form

The Parochial Church Council of the Ecclesiastical Parish of St Peter, Notting Hill ('the PCC') is an unincorporated charity. The address of the PCC's principal office is detailed on page 1.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with:

- The Church Accounting Regulations 2006;
- The Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (Charities SORP (FRS102)) issued on 16 July 2014 and effective from 1 January 2015; and
- The Charities Act 2011.

The Parish is a Public Benefit Entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in Sterling, which is the functional currency of the Parish.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in compliance with SORP FRS102 as it applies to the financial statements of the Parish for the year ended 31 December 2018.

Going concern

The PCC considers that there are no material uncertainties about the Parish's ability to continue as a going concern.

Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

Fund accounting

General funds, Including those generated from the Under Three's Drop In, represent the funds of the Church that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use and are available for application on the general purposes of the Church.

Designated funds represent funds of the Church that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use but that have been set aside by the PCC for a specific purpose of the Church. These funds are in respect of a legacy, which has been designated for capital works.

Restricted funds are subject to restrictions regarding their use. These funds are in respect of:

St Peter's Nursery School and represent funds that relate to the operations of the Nursery School.

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- The Façade Project and represent funds that relate to fundraising in respect of the restoration of the Façade of the Church.
- The Kensington Churches Relief Fund established by the Bishop of Kensington that represents funds in relation to donations and expenditure in support of the victims of the Grenfell Tower tragedy.

Income

Voluntary income

Planned giving is recognised only when received. Collections and donations are recognised when they are received. Tax recoverable on Gift Aid giving is recognised when the donations to which they relate are received. Legacy income is recognised only when received.

Income from Church events and activities

Parents' contributions and government funding to St Peter's Nursery School are recognised on an accruals basis. All other income is recognised when received.

Investment Income

Interest on funds held on deposit income is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably.

Services from volunteers

The value of such services is not recognised in the financial statements as it cannot be reasonably guantified.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred. Expenditure is classified under the principal activities of the Church.

Allocation of support costs

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the Church but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include office costs, premises costs, personnel and governance costs. These costs have been allocated to the principal activities of the Church.

Diocese of London Common Fund

The Parish's contributions to the Diocese of London Common Fund are accounted for when paid as they are a gift from the Parish.

Fixed assets

Consecrated property

Consecrated and beneficed property of any kind is excluded from the accounts by Section 10(2) to (4) of the Charities Act 2011. All expenditure on consecrated or beneficed buildings and on movable Church furnishings, whether maintenance or improvement, is written off.

Moveable church furnishings

Moveable church furnishings held by the VIcar and Churchwardens on special trust for the PCC, and which require a faculty for disposal, are accounted as inalienable property while consecrated. For inalienable property there is insufficient cost information available, and therefore such assets are not valued in the accounts.

Equipment

Equipment is stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided on a straight-line basis over four years. Individual items of equipment with a purchase price of \pounds 1,000 or less are written off when the asset is acquired.

Debtors and prepayments

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due, less provision for amounts that may prove uncollectable. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks and other short-term investments with original maturities of three months or less.

Creditors failing due within one year

Creditors are recognised where there is a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably.

Financial instruments

The Parish only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of loans, which are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Leasing

Rental payments under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In the application of the Parish's accounting policies, the Parish is required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised, if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The PCC considers that there were no estimates and assumptions which have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities.

8. Reserves

General Parish Funds, including those generated from the Under Three's Drop In, represent the funds of the Church that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use and are available for application on the general purposes of the Church.

Designated funds represent funds of the Church that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use but that have been set aside by the PCC for a specific purpose of the Church. These funds are in respect of a legacy, which has been designated for capital works on the Church.

Restricted funds are subject to restrictions regarding their use. These funds are in respect of:

- St Peter's Nursery School that represents funds in relation to the operations of the Nursery School.
- The Façade Project that represents funds in relation to donations and expenditure in respect of the restoration of the façade of the Church.
- The Kensington Churches Relief Fund established by the Bishop of Kensington that represents funds in relation to donations and expenditure in support of the victims of the Grenfell Tower tragedy.

12. Transactions with members of the PCC

No member of the PCC received any remuneration or any benefits in kind during the year.

A payment of £500 was made to one PCC member as a contribution to the costs of a SOMA mission to the Democratic Republic of Congo.

Except for reimbursements made in respect of expenditure incurred on behalf of the PCC, no other payments were made to members of the PCC.

The PCC has no policles of insurance against loss arising from neglect or negligence of any PCC member. Nor is there any indemnity for PCC members in respect of the consequences of any such loss.

13. Related party transactions

During the year £40,188 (2017: £33,000) was paid to the St Peter's Hall (1991) Charity as a contribution for Hall Charity finance, administration and facility management staff time supporting St Peter's.

During the year £4,204 (2017: £nil) was received from the St Peter's Hall (1991) Charity for the cost of St Peter's cleaning and communication staff time supporting the Hall Charity.

In relation to these recharges, as at 31 December 2018 the Church had an amount due to St Peter's Hall (1991) Charity of £3,627 (2017: amount due from St Peter's Hall (1991) Charity of £591) as set out in the notes for Debtors and Creditors falling due within one year above.

14. Volunteers' services and St Peter's Nursery School

In all its various activities the PCC is dependent upon the services of unpaid volunteers. The value of such services is not recognised in the financial statements as it cannot be reasonably quantified.

The Nursery also enjoys immense support from the parents of the children attending the Nursery. The parents are responsible for organising a variety of fundraising activities and the funds raised are allocated in accordance with the wishes of the parents committee.

The operation of St Peter's Nursery is also dependent on the support of the St. Peter's Hall (1991) Charity, which provides premises at no cost to the Nursery. The value of this support during the year has been estimated at \pounds 65,000.

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
