Our aims and purposes as a charity

St Symphorian's Parochial Church Council (PCC) has the responsibility of cooperating with the Priest in Charge, Fr Benjamin Eadon, in promoting in the ecclesiastical parish, the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. The PCC is also specifically responsible for the maintenance of St Symphorian's Church and the Parish Centre.

What we planned to do to achieve our charitable objectives

When planning our activities for the year, our Priest in Charge and the PCC considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and, in particular, the specific guidance on 'charities for the advancement of religion'.

The council has complied with the duty under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016, fully recognising its duty to have due regard to House of Bishops' guidance on safeguarding children and vulnerable adults.

For 2018 we discussed and planned the following objectives and activities to fulfil our aims:

- Enabling as many people as possible to worship at our church
- Enabling as many people as possible to become part of our parish community
- Teaching, baptising and nurturing new and existing believers
- Maintaining an overview of worship throughout the parish
- Considering how services can involve the many groups that live within the parish
- Putting faith into practice, through prayer and scripture, music and sacrament
- Offering worship and prayer, learning about the Gospel, in small group situations
- Promoting the gospel and assisting people from all walks of life to find life in Jesus Christ
- Provision of pastoral care for people living in the parish
- Providing assistance to the poor and needy of the parish
- Charitable giving
- Reaching out to the wider community through social events and activities
- Maintaining the fabric of the church and the church hall as a place of worship and for the community to enjoy

What we achieved and how we affected beneficiaries' lives

Attendance at worship

The church family welcomes visitors from within as well as outside the parish boundary. Visitors attend by personal choice and it is our great pleasure to welcome anyone from all walks of life to take part in the life of the church. We contend that voluntary attendance to worship the Lord Jesus Christ is a major demonstration of the public benefit of our activities.

Over the course of the year we have seen a small rise in regular weekly attendance at the Sunday Mass – the median number of people attending worship on Sundays for 2018 was 71 and the mean number was 82 (the number increases at festivals and on Sundays when baptisms are celebrated).

We look to encourage the deepening of faith for all ages, and, alongside the provision of Mass, there is a programme of worship for young people which includes Children's Church, Space at the Table, and craft mornings.

Christmas is a very special time of celebration where many sections of the community come together to join in the services. Children and adults alike join in and memories are made. Over the course of carol services and other Christmas services we saw a total number of 1,042 people – this included a carol service for Turning Tides and a carol service for the Laurels Primary School.

At Easter we welcomed our Archdeacon, the Venerable Douglas McKittrick, who gave a series of splendid homilies throughout Holy Week and we were encouraged by attendance at the Holy Week and Easter services (115 people attended the Easter Vigil and Easter Day Mass).

Other significant liturgical events included our Patronal Festival, at which we welcomed Bishop Peter Wheatley, as well as Stations of the Cross during Lent, a joint service with New Life Church for the Durrington Festival, and several joint services with neighbouring parish churches.

Teaching, baptising and nurturing new and existing believers

In 2018 there were 3 weddings; 7 funerals conducted for parishioners; 19 baptisms and 3 candidates confirmed.

Nurture courses run in 2018 included a Lent Course, as part of the Year of the Prayer, as well as Bible Studies and preparation for baptism and confirmation.

In June a group of about 20 people went on pilgrimage to Our Lady of Walsingham for a time of prayer, fellowship, and fun.

In the courses and the pilgrimage people had the opportunity to learn more about living life as a Christian and also had the opportunity to socialise, get to know people at a deeper level, share experiences, and spend leisure time and meals together.

Evangelism and outreach

Highlights of the year included the Summer Fete and the Christmas Fayre — events for the community around us and were enjoyed by many. We also took part in the Durrington Festival Parade and had other events such as a St Patrick's Evening, a tea party at the Vicarage, a big band evening and some parish lunches. The Bookclub, You Group and Knit and Chat group continue to thrive. It's been good to see people from the wider community able to enjoy themselves and to involve themselves in activities and entertainment which is inexpensive or free. They also provide an opportunity to get to know other members of the community and for some help to combat issues such as loneliness.

A start has been made on implementing the Mission Action Plan. This has included the introduction of Space at the Table, a fresh expression running on the third Sunday afternoon of the month and a pop-up Café on the second Tuesday of the month.

Links with the three schools in the parish continue to grow and we were pleased once again to welcome Hawthorns to church for a Harvest Thanksgiving service and the Laurels for their carol service. There have also been class visits to church which have linked into the school curriculum and the clergy have helped with classes in the schools, taken assemblies, and Fr Ben continues as a governor of the Laurels where he and Fr Ian also give time regularly to support pupils with special education needs.

Provision of the church building and church hall for people to enjoy

Our church continues to be appreciated by our parishioners and many others, as a space where life events are celebrated with joy and thanksgiving. In 2018 it was enhanced by the installation of a new image of Our Lady gifted to us from All Souls' Church, Hastings. This was put up in thanksgiving for the golden wedding anniversary of Fr Keith and Eunice Smith.

In addition to worship, the church building is used for other occasions such as concerts, social events, meetings, and meals.

It is also important to us that the church is available for private prayer not just to the church family but to the wider visiting community. To this end the church building is open from 10am-1pm on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays and visitors do pop in, whether it's to pray, light a candle, have a look around, or just have a moment of stillness.

The church hall also continues to be used regularly by a diverse range of community groups such as fitness and sports groups, support groups, and uniformed organisations and is hired out regularly for parties at affordable rates.

Provision of pastoral care for people living in the parish

The clergy and Home Communion team are responsible for visits to the sick and housebound. Communion is regularly taken to the housebound and a monthly communion service is held at the Heathers care home. An average of 12 people make use of these services on a monthly basis.

Provision of tangible support to the poor and needy and charitable giving

Of particular encouragement this year was designating part of the funds raised from our social events to be donated to causes – this raised a total of £870 to be distributed between three causes in 2019. Appeals were also held for Christian Aid, Turning Tides, Imara Uganda, the Children's Society and Oak Grove School. We continue to subsidise certain community groups to make use of the Church Hall and offer free use of the church for certain charitable causes. Church members also continue personally to support local charities such as Turning Tides, St Barnabas Hospice, and Worthing Disabled Swimming Club through volunteering and fundraising.

Financial Review

Incoming and outgoing resources

The total receipts on general unrestricted funds received were £86,336 and are detailed in the Financial Report.

The planned giving though envelopes and banker's orders increased by 1.1% and there are a higher proportion of people taking advantage of the Gift Aid Scheme. Our total voluntary income including tax recovered, but excluding legacies and grants decreased by 1.5%. This was mainly due to £100 Fund appeal held in 2017.

The PCC was grateful for grants from the Listed Places of Worship Grant for Roofs totalling £3,672 for the second phase of the church roof. This project is now complete. The Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme has also given the PCC £3,550. This, with the income from the Sharp Investment, facilitated the repairs to the organ and general upkeep of the church. We also received a grant for £2,000 to from The John Booth Charitable Trust to launch 'Space at the Table' on Sunday afternoons. All Churches Trust has given the church a grant of £1,500 towards the refurbishment of the north end of the church hall.

Sharing the ministry costs of the Diocese of Chichester

The largest expenditure of the PCC was £43,400 to the Diocese for our share of all churches' Parish Ministry Costs. This amount covers the housing, stipend and pension costs of the clergy, and, also a standard sum for diocesan central costs, clergy training and a contribution to national church funds. Although this was a decrease of 2.67% on the previous year, this is due to the church insurance being paid directly to Ecclesiastical Insurance Company rather than through the Diocese.

Currently, the church continues to meet 62% of the costs allocated to this church. We received a credit for mission for the remaining 38% of the Parish Share. It is also important to note that approximately 100% of the total paid relates directly to the clergy costs of this parish, the remainder being the shared costs of the Christian family throughout the whole Church of England, including assistance towards the upkeep of churches less able to manage than ourselves.

Staff costs

The PCC pays for a Parish Administrator, who undertakes office duties on behalf of the Priest in Charge and PCC, and an organist, who plays on Sundays and for other major services and festivals.

Further details are provided in the notes to the accounts.

Trustee payments and expenses

The PCC supported the clergy by paying Council Tax of £3,325, Water and environmental charges amounting to £280 for the Vicarage and 26 Vancouver Close plus other annual costs towards travel, hospitality, telephone, postage and broadband amounting £3,145.

Six other trustees received £2,957 for supplies and fees.

One person related to a trustee has received reimbursement of £840. No other payments were made to persons related to, or connected to, the trustees.

Repairs to the fabric of the church building

During the year the final payments for the Church Roof Project were made totalling £2,261. At the south east of the Nave, a Statue of Our Lady with Child was installed. The cost of this project was £1,526, £1,200 of which was covered by a donation to the Church. The organ has had a number of repairs this year including replacement of the pedal leathers at a cost of £4,710 and a replacement organ blower at a cost of £1,218. The church boiler has continued to cause problems and with regular maintenance being required. The PCC was grateful for the free loan of a space heater over the Christmas period from Brandons. During the year an electrical report was carried out on the church at a cost

of £912 and a Quinquennial Report for £811. All this work was financed from the Sharp Investment income with Listed Places of Worship grants where applicable.

The condition of the church hall remains a focus of the PCC. An inspection of the roof in 2017 stated the whole roof should be replaced within the next year or two.

Why we hold some money in reserve

It is PCC policy to maintain a balance on the general unrestricted funds (excluding property) which equates to approximately two months' worth of unrestricted payments as contingency against unforeseen situations. The closing balance of £11,472 this year did not achieve this, although we still expect to have sufficient cash flow to continue to pay bills when they fall due.

It is PCC policy to invest temporarily surplus general funds with the CBF Church of England deposit fund, returning proportionately these funds to our current account, as they are needed, to pay day-to-day bills. There are insufficient general funds to invest temporarily in this way at 31st December.

As well as holding the above general reserves, from time to time the PCC receives restricted legacies for expenditure on particular purposes, defined by the donor. We aim to expend such money as soon as possible after receiving the legacy, depending on the specific objectives of the donor. At 31st December 2018 £36,416 Sharp Investment Income was held at the CCLA.

Structure, governance and management of the charity

The Parochial Church Council (PCC) is registered with the Charity Commission as required by the Charities Act 2011. Its governing document is the Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure 1956.

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The PCC is a public benefit entity within the meaning of FRS102. The financial statements have been prepared under the Charities Act 2011 and the Church Accounting Regulations 2006, in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the current (2016) Statement Of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities, (SORP (FRS 102)).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the inclusion of investments at market value \and the revaluation of fixed assets\. The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their affiliation to another body, nor those which are informal gatherings of church members.

Funds accounting

Funds held by the PCC are:

Unrestricted funds - general funds which can be used for PCC ordinary purposes.

Designated funds - monies set aside by the PCC out of unrestricted funds for specific future purposes or projects.

Restricted funds - a) income from trusts or endowments which may be expended only on those restricted objects provided in the terms of the trust or bequest; b) donations or grants received for a specific object or invited by the PCC for a specific object. The funds may only be expended on the specific object for which they were given. Any balance remaining unspent at the end of the year is carried forward as a balance on that fund.

Endowment funds - funds for which the capital must be maintained; only income arising from the investment of the endowment may be used, either as restricted or unrestricted funds, depending on the purpose set out in the terms of the original endowment.

Income and endowments

All income and endowments, accounted for without deduction for any costs of receivability, are recognised when there is evidence of entitlement, receipt is probable, and the amount can be measured reliably.

Donations and legacies

Collections are recognised when received.

Planned giving receivable is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement, receipt is probable, and the amount accords with the Gift Aid declaration or other record of intention to donate.

Gift aid recovered is recognised when the income to which it is attached is recognised.

Grants and legacies are recognised when the formal offer in writing of the funding, is received by the PCC.

Charitable activities

Statutory fees for weddings and funerals are recognised when the office occurs.

Other trading activities

Trading activities are where income is receivable in return for selling goods or providing services. Income from trading is recognised either: a - when received, or b - in the case of concerts: for the year in which the event occurs, irrespective of date of receipt. Advance bookings are included in creditors until the concert has taken place.

Sales of magazines and study notes are recognised when received.

Rents from property are recognised in accordance with the rental agreements, when receipt is probable.

Investment income

Dividends are accounted for when due and payable. Interest entitlements are accounted for as they accrue.

All other income

All other income is recognised in accordance with the above overall policy.

Gains and losses on investments

Realised gains are recognised when the investments are sold.

Unrealised gains and losses are accounted for on revaluation at 31 December.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement, payment is probable, and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants

Grants and donations are accounted for when paid over, or when awarded where the award creates a binding obligation on the PCC.

Church activities

The diocesan parish contribution is accounted for on an annual basis, reflecting the allocation set by our Deanery. Any parish contribution unpaid at 31 December is provided for in these accounts as an operational (though not a legal) liability and is shown as a creditor in the balance sheet.

Fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets

Consecrated and beneficed property of any kind is excluded from the accounts by s.10(2) of the Charities Act 2011.

Movable church furnishing held by the Vicar and Churchwardens on special trust for the PCC and which require a faculty for disposal, are accounted as inalienable property unless consecrated. They are listed in the church's inventory which can be inspected but are not included in the financial statements. For other property acquired prior to 2009 there is insufficient cost information available and therefore the cost of such assets is stated at a nominal £1 in the financial statements.

All expenditure on consecrated or beneficed buildings and individual items costing under £1,000 are written off in the year they were incurred.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated to write down the cost of tangible fixed assets, excluding freehold properties, over their expected useful lives. The rates generally applicable are:

Land Nil
Buildings Nil
Fixtures and fittings 20%
Audio visual equipment 33%
Office equipment 25%

No depreciation is provided on freehold buildings as the useful economic life of these assets exceeds 50 years and residual values so high that potential depreciation would be immaterial. It is the PCC's policy to maintain these assets in a continual state of sound repair. Resulting from regular impairment reviews, provision will be made if there has been any permanent diminution in value.

Investments

Investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date.

Current Assets

Amounts owing to the PCC at 31 December in respect of fees, rents or other income are shown as debtors, less provision for amounts that may prove uncollectible.

Short-term deposits include cash held on deposit either with the CBF Church of England Funds, or at the bank.
