MISSION STATEMENT

"Our mission is to work in partnership with vulnerable and disengaged young ladies aged 11-21 and provide a dedicated emotional well-being service which in turn supports positive mental health from the boroughs of Lambeth, Lewisham, Merton and Croydon."

AIMS

The charity aims to provide vulnerable young women aged 11-21 years with the insight, confidence and resilience to overcome the negative impact of feelings of isolation, peer pressure, bullying, family breakdown, stress and anxiety, the risk of or involvement in criminality and gangs and those who may be at risk of school exclusion.

The charity provides young women with the opportunity to build up a trusted and mutual relationship with a trained mentor for up to 12 months.

By working in partnership with youth clubs, schools, children's social care and other statutory and voluntary organisations, the charity is able to target young females who may benefit from being referred or may wish to self-refer directly for mentoring or to attend one of the events.

CURRENT POSITION

Ashdon Jazz Academy has been running for over 3 years and has supported more than 150 female teenagers through the charity's mentoring project and events (i.e. public workshops, drop in sessions, focus groups and female summits). The constitution was adopted on 23rd April 2016 and amended 19th December 2018 (to include services for young women up to 21 years).

This year, we have introduced a Peer on Peer Mentoring Scheme for young ladies aged 18-21 years to be mentors to young women of their own age. These mentors shadow older mentors as well as develop their leadership and coaching skills.

The Ashdon Jazz Academy mentors are trained using the XL-Mentoring Project (XLP) is a nationally accredited scheme. Mentors are appointed through rigorous recruitment (including interview by the CEO and two Trustees), DBS, reference and vetting procedures and completing specialist training. Mentors are required to undergo further training each year, regular supervision (every 6 weeks) and attend mentor network meetings. Mentors are required to follow the charity's Safeguarding Policy and Procedures, Code of Conduct and Working Alone Procedure. Mentors understand their role is not to be a parent, counsellor, rescuer, social worker or other authority figure. An Ashdon Jazz Academy mentor's fundamental role is to be a befriender.

As at March 2019, 20 women work as volunteer mentors. All have had references confirmed, been interviewed by two trustees and separately by the CEO and have an up to date Enhanced DBS before starting. All are trained using XLP training guide. All mentors complete accredited level one safeguarding training. Mentors also receive training throughout the year and undertake monthly supervision with coordinator.

We have developed girls as Ambassadors. These are either previous mentees or girls who have attend our events who are recognised as being positive role models and want to give something back to their community. They represent our charity at public events and may even become a peer mentor to other girls. We work to build up their life, leadership skills and team building skills, entrepreneurial talents and social responsibilities. In 2017, the increased involvement and recognition from Merton Council led to one of our Ambassadors being selected to shadow the Mayor of Merton in 2018. This involved attending some official engagements with the Mayor and representing Ashdon Jazz Academy on those occasions.

OVERVIEW OF LAST YEAR

Mentoring Project

Ensuring that vulnerable female teenagers have trusted and reliable adult to talk, continues to be a fundamental service for the charity this year. Having trained two cohorts of mentoring volunteers over the year, there was a need to ensure all young ladies who had been identified were matched with a suitable mentor. Supervision consultations and weekly summaries demonstrate that the mentees are progressively working through their difficulties assisted by their mentor. Quarterly evaluation summaries are being completed by mentees to help evidence the impact of mentoring. There were 20 mentoring relationships that have taken place during the year across the boroughs: Lambeth (5), Croydon (5), Merton (6) and Lewisham (4).

In summary:

20 girls received mentoring last year.

- 9 girls completed the mentoring programme successfully
- There were 11 girls still receiving mentoring at the end of the year (all regularly complete quarterly reviews and report on self-confidence and esteem levels)
- 90 % of girls undertaking the mentoring programme reported that they had low self-confidence and self-esteem at the start of the programme
- 10 % of girls undertaking the mentoring programme were supported for academic and aspirations purposes. They reported they had medium to high levels of self confidence
- Out of the 9 girls who successfully completed the mentoring programme, 89% reported an increase in self-confidence and self-esteem as a result of the project

This year there was an increase in the number of external visits as well as workshops focussed around mental health and emotional wellbeing. One residential weekend was held at Hind Leap Warren. We held several outings:

- What Next Career Day
- Theatre
- Manhood Academy
- Creams
- Shades of Beauty Exhibition

We held 13 workshop sessions covering different topics:

- Knife crime
- Healthy relationships
- Soap making
- Colour therapy
- Black history
- Singing
- Movie night
- Retail training
- Creative hair
- Eyelash makeover

Girls' Night - Ambassadors

The ambassadors expressed the need to meet more regularly and informal feedback from parents endorsed this. As a result, regular weekly sessions are now being held for young ladies aged 13- 18..

Following evaluation from the session's ambassadors reported that they enjoyed the workshops provided on the girl's night and also learning new skills such as eyelashes application, soap making and colour therapy. There is a planned schedule for the girls' night sessions.

Activity and Impact Data

Referrals are mainly made by youth leaders, parents and by self-referral for mentoring and to attend any of the girls' events.

In 2018-19, 31 girls' events were held (6 workshops/drop in sessions, 6 focus groups and 5 girls' summits). 137 girls attended these events (57 at workshops/drop in sessions, 23 at focus groups and 67 at girls' summits):

In the last year, 20 girls were referred for mentoring and all were successfully matched with a mentor. 9 girls completed the mentoring programme in 2018-19. At any one time there were 9 girls on the waiting list for mentoring.

We have seen a steady rise in the number of girls attending our Ambassador Events. As a result of this prestigious programme, the charity received funding to complete and manage a social action project over the year. The girls successfully completed the first team building stage of the programme and are currently working on their second programme action.

Our capacity and capability

The charity has been able to start from scratch and develop as a mainly volunteer based organisation through grants, fundraising and donations. These have all helped the charity to grow and be maintained over the last 3 years for which we are grateful. To enable us to develop and reach more young women, we will be more ambitious in our funding strategy over the coming years.

There are 20 active trained mentors (as at March 2019) from a baseline of 10 at the end of 2015-16. All mentors have a current Disclosure & Barring Scheme check and have attended safeguarding training in the last 2 years. The percentage of vetted and trained mentors receiving regular supervision once a month is 80% (same as in 2017-18).

The charity is managed by Patricia Hewitt (CEO) who is the founder and mentoring coordinator.

There is a Board of 4 Trustees who meet bi-monthly to make decisions, review policies and conduct financial reviews. All Trustees have a current Disclosure & Barring Scheme check and have attended safeguarding training in the last 2 years. Our trustees have had nearly 100% attendance at trustees' meeting over the 2 years.
