REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

The Trustees present their report along with the financial statements of the Charity for the year ended 5 April 2019. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRSSE) entitled "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities, effective January 2015.

Legal and administrative details

The Trust was established under a Trust Deed dated 1 May 1974. The settler is the Honourable Christopher James Makins. The Four Lanes Trust is a registered charity, number 267608.

The Trustees stand possessed of the Trust Fund upon Trust to pay or apply the income thereof at their discretion for charitable purposes, in particular in the administrative county of Hampshire and the Basingstoke and Deane district in particular. The Trustees may also at their discretion, in any calendar year, similarly apply the capital of the fund to the extent of not more than 10% of the value thereof at the beginning of the said year.

Appointment of Trustees

The trust deed specifies that there should be a minimum of four trustees. The power of appointing trustees was vested in the settler, the Hon Christopher Makins, during his lifetime; currently the statutory powers of appointment apply.

Organisation of the Trust

The Trustees hold three meetings a year and all decisions are made or ratified at these meetings. The Trust actively seeks applications for funds that comply with the objectives of the Trust. All applications for funds that comply with the objectives are considered at the trustee meetings. The charity is not involved in fundraising.

Statements of Trustees' Responsibilities

Laws applicable to charities in England and Wales require the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the Charity's financial activities during the year and of its position at the end of the year. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Major risks

The major risk faced by the Trust is the fluctuation of its income and the value of its investments. The Trustees have invested the permanent endowment in assets designed for the charity sector to mitigate this risk.

Investment Policy

The Trustees are following a low/medium risk investment policy geared equally between income and capital growth.

Reserves policy

The Trust may use up to 10% of the capital fund in any one year; consequently it does not consider it necessary to hold reserves of unrestricted funds. Generally the Trustees aim to spend the income from the Trust's investments each year.

Objects and activities for the public benefit of the trust

The settler stipulated the following areas of interest for the trust:-

Charitable purposes within the County of Hampshire, in particular Basingstoke and Deane district for:

- Advancement of education, including the arts
- Promoting the social welfare of the inhabitants, particularly by providing recreational and leisure time facilities.

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the trust's aims and objectives and in planning future activities and setting the grant making policy for the year

Grant making policy

The Four Lanes Trust has established a grant making policy to achieve its objectives for the public benefit by awarding grants to organisations with ideas and projects which will improve life in Basingstoke and the surrounding district. The trust's interests lie mainly in three particular fields:

- Social and community action
- Education
- The arts

The Trust provides an appropriate amount of money for each project and ensures the funds are used for the purpose for which they were given.

Grants made in the year

The impact that The Four Lanes Trust has had on the charitable sector in the Basingstoke and Deane Borough has been achieved through the provision of small grants to groups that enable them to set up, enhance and develop their work and achieve aims that would otherwise remain unmet. To this end the Trust awarded 38 grants, totalling £28,810 in the 2018 – 2019 year, which had the following impact on our area of benefit:

Providing equipment . This included:

- Equipment for schools and pre-schools. There was a notable increase in applications from schools and pre-schools especially for outdoor play equipment and resurfacing of play areas to improve safety. Eleven schools and pre-schools were successful in the applications including:
- Four primary schools who were awarded play equipment and resurfacing of the play areas with safety surfacing
- Resurfacing additional car-parking area for a village primary school to reduce the risk of accidents at the beginning and end of the school day
- A further three primary schools received a digital piano, a white board to replace one that had broken and a replacement garden shed that had been vandalised
- An outdoor reading seat for a nursery school
- Camping equipment for a secondary school Duke of Edinburgh group
- Sensory equipment for a sensory room at a nursery catering for children with special needs

Equipment for voluntary groups and community associations. A further 15 groups received equipment including:

- An exercise bike, to replace one that was broken, for a Cardiac Rehab charity
- Outdoor gym equipment for a youth centre to encourage more exercise among young people
- A Kayak for a Canoe Club, whose existing Kayaks are too large for the increasing number of young members that they are attracting
- Redecorating a Bowling Club clubhouse and providing intruder alarms for another Bowling Club
- Play equipment for a village park
- A hearing loop for a Village Hall

- Teaching equipment for young members of a chess club
- Resources for a Memory Club and Nursery within a Community Hall
- Carry cases for instruments in the Area Youth Orchestra
- Uniforms for the Town Centre Chaplains
- Notice Boards for a Scout Group
- Sensory equipment in a garden room for a charity providing holiday respite for families with a child with a life-limiting condition
- A cooker and fridge for a Community Association
- Refurbishing the CCTV system in the local council of voluntary service.

Supporting set-ups and start-ups. These provided support for existing groups who wanted to offer an additional service to their members or to support a new group setting up a new service. This year we have helped 5 such groups to develop their service including:

- Buying Forest School equipment for a youth charity getting young people involved with gardening and cooking. The equipment will help them to do everything in the open air
- Providing resource for a large meeting (staff, volunteers and members of a local mental health charity) to allow them to become more user-led in what they offer
- Supporting a group providing services for the visually impaired to set up a Talking News Service for their members
- Re-launching a youth club for disadvantaged young people
- Providing resource to support the set-up of a new Men's Shed

Additional support for other community projects. This included:

- Support for events planned by local groups
- Support for a summer school for disabled young people
- Support for a scout trip to Scotland
- Support for volunteer expenses to allow them to accompany older residents of care homes on a holiday trip to the Isle of Wight
- A Christmas lunch for members of a village club
- Other support:
- A provision to ensure that a local breast feeding clinic could continue to operate
- Support to enable a CAB to complete its IT update by providing new licences for new computers and safe disposal of old computers
- Rent costs for a local youth arts group to enable them to move into new premises

In making these grants the Trustees have had due regard to public benefit guidance.

Review of the past year

Income from quoted investments for the year amounted to £27,612 (2018:£34,307) and deposit account income amounted to £61 (2018: £34).

Resources expended on charitable activities amounted to £36,727 (2018:£26,560) and included grants payable of £28,790 (2018:£18,706). This comprised grants approved of £28,810 (2018:£21,239) and grants written back or repaid of £20 (2018: £2,533). Grants were awarded to the organisations detailed in note 5.

The excess of expenditure over income for the year was £20,031 (2018: Surplus £50,530). This includes realised profits on disposals of investments of £1,584, and by the end of the year the market value of the quoted investments increased by £44,259. Accordingly the Endowment Fund increased in value by £33,282 (2018: £5,297 decrease). Total funds increased in the year by £24,228 (2018: £2,484).

The Four Lanes Trust continues to make grants to a wide range of organisations in the Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council area.

Future Plans

The Trustees intend to continue providing grants in a similar way to the recent past.

Notes to the financial statements

1 Accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the inclusion of investments at market value and in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRSSE) entitled "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities, effective January 2015.

Recognition of incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Investment income

Investment income is accounted for in the period in which the trust is entitled to receipt.

Resources expended

Expenditure is included on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred.

Charitable Activities

Charitable activities comprise grants payable and related administration and management costs. Grants are recognised once they have been approved by the trustees and the offer conveyed to the recipient.

Governance costs

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity including the costs of the preparation and independent examination of the financial statements.

Investments

Investments are stated at the closing mid-market value at the balance sheet date. Any gain or loss on revaluation is taken to the Statement of Financial Activities.
