Treasurer's Report for the year ended 31 December 2017

I express my sincere thanks to Brook Carbutt for carrying out a thorough examination of the church accounts in his role as Independent Examiner. A copy of his report follows afterwards.

These annual accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Church Accounting Regulations 2006, as amended by the Charities Act 2011 and using the Receipts and Payments method.

A full copy of the Accounts, approved by the PCC at a meeting of the council on the 11th March 2019 are exhibited on the notice board in the Fellowship Area (by the inner door). Copies of these accounts are freely available for anyone as required, please ask myself. An abbreviated set of Accounts follows this report.

Receipts

The total of all receipts was £95,468, including an extremely generous donation of £10,000 to be used specifically towards the restoration of the Frampton Mural and a very welcome donation of £600 in memory of a loved one to be used for general Church purposes. Both donors wish to remain anonymous. The amount freely available for general church use i.e. the total of unrestricted funds was £82,860.

Overall, giving by members of the congregation rose by 4.74% and we are very grateful to all who continue to support and donate towards the upkeep of your Church.

A successful appeal raised £1,251 for the purchase of a defibrillator. An education group hire the Fellowship Area Monday to Wednesday 3.30 p.m. to 7.15 p.m. during term times and this has added over £7,200 to our overall income. If you are aware of any other groups who may wish to hire the Fellowship Area please have a word with Paul.

Expenses

One again we have paid the parish share due to the Diocese, amounting to £45,281, in full. This largely provides the stipends and housing for the clergy. The Church general running expenses, i.e. those payable from the unrestricted fund, amounting to £77,412, were down 17.62% over those of 2017. This was helped by the long hot summer and the fact that little was spent on major church repairs other than on the central heating boilers. There are considerable repairs required to the roof and supporting woodwork to the north porch and it is hoped to progress these in 2019. In addition an area on the south roof was damaged by vandals in late December and not all of the costs of repair will be covered by insurance.

As part of the fulfilment of our mission to help others less fortunate, we have made donations to numerous charities totalling £4,008 and a full list

of those supported is displayed on the notice board.

In addition following special fund raising events donations have been made to Christian Aid and Tear Fund respectively in support of famine relief particularly in the Yemen. A special service was held on behalf of Christian Aid, and at the united service on Remembrance Sunday the collection was on behalf of the Royal British Legion.

Conclusion

The net result for the year was an excess of receipts over payments of £5,548 on unrestricted funds, (in the 2017 financial year there was a loss of £6,929 on unrestricted funds). Adding bank and deposit balances brought forward at the beginning of the year, the balance carried forward at 31st December 2018 on unrestricted funds totalled £28,269. This represents approximately 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ months of unrestricted payments. A reserve is held to help smooth out fluctuations in cash flow and to meet any emergencies or towards future contingencies.

VICAR'S REPORT

Another year in the life of our church has come and gone. The cycle of services and events has turned. We should be heartened. In among those regular events like the Summer Fete, Bonfire Celebration and Christmas Fayre, we added a commemoration of the Centenary of the World War One Armistice and a presentation about the Frampton Mural.

In the building we've seen the renewal of the servery, creating a much more attractive and usable space for refreshments, and the restoration of the vestry stained glass window. At the end of 2018 we were disturbed by the theft of lead from the roof on the south side and the realisation that there was significant work to be done due to a botched repair after lead theft on the north side.

In the graveyard we've tackled the problems with old trees including the removal of one adjacent to the road which required the rebuilding of the wall which the tree had damaged. Dogs left to run free by irresponsible owners have caused much distress to relatives of those buried in the graveyard - a problem which in ongoing.

Despite all this we have met all our financial commitments, partly due to the careful management by our treasurer, Alan, and by the increased giving as a consequence of our stewardship campaign in the autumn.

During this past twelve months we have said goodbye to some faithful members of our congregation: Peter Mitchell, Pat Pickles, Dorothy Wiles and Ann Crabtree, closely followed by David Crabtree. We also lost Pastor Anne Smaje from our Christian community. We remember them all with love and gratitude.

A group has come together regularly to look forward as we plan celebrations for the church's, our, 900th Anniversary. Beginning at the Patronal Festival Service on 30th June there will be some special services and events as we take the opportunity to raise the awareness in the community of the life of this church past and present. We have the opportunity to show God's love in words and action; to invite people to events, services and new life in Christ - which is really what the church is all about. Visiting preachers

including (so far) three bishops, as well as exhibitions, commemorative merchandise, and publicity, will all help to make the year special. There is still room for involvement in the work of the group and for fresh ideas. Please remember though, this is not my celebration, this is not the 900 group's celebration, this is our celebration - which means that everyone, that's YOU, needs to be involved if the celebration year is have the impact we hope for.

As ever I am grateful for those who support me, particularly Annette, Denise; Leif and Wendy; and all the Pastoral Ministers. But also to all the church members who fulfil a wide variety of ministry roles. May God bless us all as we grow in Worship, Fellowship, Discipleship, Ministry and Mission.

CHURCHWARDENS' REPORT 2018/19

FABRIC

- 1 The combi boiler in the kitchen, the twin boilers, the clock, the organ and the fire extinguishers have been serviced.
- 2. The Quinquennial inspection has been carried out by the architect. It is a requirement of the inspection that an electrical installation be inspected. This also has been carried out.
- 3. Dead leaves have been removed from paths, down pipes and drains. Also the upper gutters have been cleared.
- 4. A PAT testing has been carried out by Fred Lister and all electrical items have been tested.
- 5. On 28th December 2018 thieves stole lead from the south side of the church and from the south porch. Extensive damaged had been caused by the theft. A temporary repair has been carried out on the roof. We have insurance of up to £7500 to pay for the damage and any shortfall will have to be met by the church.
- 6. The kitchen has had new units fitted on the west side and a zip tap has been fitted. All works were paid by Bridge.

On going works

1 The architect is drawing plans for the repairs to the north side roof. We will be seeking grants for the cost of the repairs.

The architect is also drawing up plans for the repair works after the lead theft.

- 2 The down pipes are to be painted in spring/summer. The top half with anti climb paint.
- 3 The vestry window has been removed and repaired. It was refitted on the 8th March.

Plate

The church plate is correct. Thank you to the Sanctuary Guild for their constant care in cleaning the silver and brasses.

Furniture and Fittings

These are in good state with the exception of the chairs in the fellowship area which sometimes need repairing. Luckily for us we have a vicar who makes an excellent chair repairer.

General

A big thank you to Ian Cromack and Colin Hartley who have worked tirelessly in the graveyard cutting the grass and keeping the weeds at bay.

I would also like to thank everyone who has helped me in my churchwarden duties.

Special thanks to Fred Lister, Raymond Gallagher, Adrian Ellwood and Andy Rhodes.

I am grateful for all the help given to me by the Duty Wardens, Margaret Bell, Sue Charlton, Eva Lockett, Dave Chapman, Jonathan Keer and Raymond Gallagher who is Warden Emeritus.

DEANERY SYNOD

The Deanery Synod has met three times jointly with Dewsbury Deanery. In May John Knox, Director of Resourcing Parishes, explained how the diocese can provide various support services to Parishes. Information on these services can be found on the diocesan website. The synod also discussed the merging of Birstall and Dewsbury Deaneries and came to the opinion that they might eventually merge after consultations with PCCs of the parishes.

At the October meeting David Ashton gave a report on the General Synod held in York. Emily Tidball spoke about Near and Faithful Neighbours which helps the Church to remain present in areas which are religiously and ethnically diverse. The main speaker was Kim Leadbeater (Jo Cox's sister) who gave a presentation about 'More in Common'. She spoke about Jo's life, and the work done since her death to combat loneliness and bring communities together. She also outlined plans for the Great Get Together to be held in June 2019.

The meeting in February (2019) was addressed by Revd. Canon Joyce Jones a member of the General Synod Business Committee which organises the agenda for General Synod. She spoke of the difficulties in getting a fair and balanced agenda which included all of the business before Synod and also included those who wished to speak on various issues. The synod was reminded of the importance of meeting our parish share and paying as soon as possible as the Diocese has to cover it's expenditure throughout the year. We then had a presentation on evangelism; being prepared to give an answer for our faith. Growing our churches not just in numbers but in spirituality, mission and outreach. A 75% challenge for 75% of parishes to grow in the next 5 years.

In May 2018 the children raised £100 for Christian Aid by having a Mystery Seed sale – this time using compostable newspaper pots - children at St Peter's Playtime enthusiastically helped by planting seeds too. Thank you to St Peters' Congregations and Playtime parents for supporting this. For 2019 members of the Rock Solid group have sown seeds to grow produce which will be on sale in May. The younger children will be planting bee and butterfly friendly plant seeds as well as vegetables.

To commemorate 100 years since the end of the First World War, Explorers and Little Fishes made a poppy wreath from plastic bottles, which was then presented in church as a symbol of Remembrance.

At Christmas, for the first time, we presented the nativity play during the Crib Service on Christmas Eve. Alexander Bethany and Alasdair did an excellent job at narrating. Sam stood in for Reuben who had chicken pox. An open invitation was given to any children attending the service to dress up as nativity characters, and many did. Several children joined in with the play and all the children taking part contributed to a very special Nativity. One Grandparent commented that her 10 year old grandson was thrilled to have taken part. During the service each child was invited to bring their angel (crafted by Bridge members and members of the congregation for each child at St Peter's School) and place it in the crib.

SAFEGUARDING - CHILDREN AND VULENERABLE ADULTS

DBS checks and Confidential Self Disclosures continue to be undertaken and reviewed as required. There is a Safeguarding notice board in the fellowship area of St Peter's providing information and contact details. This is in the process of being updated in line with Church of England requirements.
